The building will revert to residential use as part of the Pound House following the closure. The shop hours, Wednesday to Saturday, are from 10.00am and 5.00pm.

PLASTIC BAGS BAN CAMPAIGN COMES TO BRIXWORTH

Residents and businesses in Brixworth are being encouraged to join in a new campaign to stop the use of plastic bags in the village.

Daventry District Council is working with local traders on the initiative, which could see Brixworth as the first village in Northamptonshire to become a plastic bagfree zone. The campaign is being spearheaded by staff at the Council's Brixworth Information Service, based at the library and community centre in Spratton Road.

In the UK alone 15 billion plastic bags are used every year. A large number of these bags end up in land fill where they can take between 500 and 1000 years to decompose. The rest pollute rivers and oceans and can destroy wildlife.

The campaign stems from an idea by Brixworth resident Heather Pool, who also works as a Customer Advisor at Brixworth Information Centre. She said "I was reading about the effect plastic bags have on the environment and the ban in the town of Modbury in Devon. There is a similar sense of community spirit here in Brixworth and, as a village, we could work together and improve our environment."

Initial discussions with businesses in Brixworth over the plans have proved positive and work is now under way on consulting both traders and residents on their views.

Stephen Troop, who runs the greengrocer's in Hunters Way, Brixworth, said "I think this is a wonderful idea and I support it all the way. I hope the customers will come on board with this initiative when it is launched and I feel we all have to change the way we think about going shopping and try and remember to take a reuseable bag with us. KELSAE BELL ONION TROPHY

In 1979, a small group of regular drinkers/amateur gardeners who frequented a popular pub in Great Houghton decided that things could be livened up with a little 'competitive spirit' to add to the usual alcohol spirits! Several gentlemen of this group, who regularly fished just over the border in Scotland, heard about a local onion which grew to an enormous size – it wasn't just the size of the salmon that could be boasted about over a wee dram at the bar! This onion was the Kelsae Onion and so the Northampton Onion Competition was born.



The annual Onion Party has taken place every year since 1979, in early October, under strict supervision by Arnold Haddon, renowned vegetable market stall holder in Northampton whose wife Penny, used to run a greengrocer's shop in Brixworth. With Arnold's experienced eye and one who knows his onions(!), he ensures that only Kelsae Onions are eligible – anything that doesn't fit the exact criteria of a Kelsae in



colour or shape is promptly disqualified before the serious ceremony of the weigh-in takes place.

This select group has now grown to about fourteen couples – it's not just the men who do the sowing of, nurturing of, feeding of, weeding of and talking to the onions. Of course, nobody lets on what actually is used to feed the onions. To each, it is a closely guarded secret. The record weight so far is 4lbs 4 oz which has a long way to go before beating the national record

of about 15lbs. However, we are proud to announce that the trophy, an inscribed bell, has come to Brixworth in 2007, won by Maddy and Pete Kottler with the grand weight of 2 lbs 10 ozs. Not a lot but still the winner! Actually this is the second time a Brixworth couple have won the trophy, Kate and Jerry Fitchett won it in 2005 with a weight of 3 lbs 7 ozs.

A new partnership was announced at the beginning of January with the aim of encouraging more Northamptonshire volunteers to come forward as governors in local schools — a unique initiative undertaken by the education charity, the School Governors' One-Stop Shop (SGOSS) and Northamptonshire County Council.

SGOSS is dedicated to recruiting volunteer school governors with a passion for giving children the best possible start in life, to fill some of the 40,000 vacant places on state school governing bodies in England. They welcome everyone over 18 and believe that representative governing bodies make an important contribution to social cohesion.

The collaboration will introduce quicker application procedures, improved communication and more efficient placement of governors within schools. Currently over 200 people in the county have come forward with the help of SGOSS, but with the new streamlined application process, this is forecast to increase by approximately 100 each year.

People wanting to come forward and volunteer as a school governor will receive an efficient and quick application process.

DOUBLE YELLOW LINES FOR BRIXWORTH

- Well just a few.

Following a public consultation meeting held on 29th January, attended by about 20 residents, the Parish Council agreed that there is now a real need for a limited number of double yellow lines at key village junctions. As a result of this consultation and listening to the concerns of local residents, The Parish Council resolved to approve the following proposals:

- Kennel Terrace / Harborough Road/ Holcot Road Crossroads: 10metre double yellow lines from each corner at the Kennel Terrace entrance outside the Post House and Chambers Butchers. The Council is no longer asking for yellow lines on the Holcot Road side. However, it would like this junction to have a STOP sign with a continued white line at the junction of the bottom of the Holcot Road where it joins Northampton Road.
- Spratton Road/Northampton Road corner. The Council approved double yellow lines around this dangerous corner and asked for the lines to stop at the drain outside No 79 Northampton Road. This should allow the residents at No 81 to park their vehicles outside their property, without having a knock on affect further on down the Northampton Road.
- Layby on Spratton Road adjacent to Hunters Way. The Parish Council has asked for a parking restriction for the layby to a maximum of one hour between the hours of 8am-6pm Monday to Saturday.
- Spratton Road/Pytchley Way T junction. Double yellows on both corners but the lines to be continued on the shops' side as far as the entrance behind the shops.
- The above proposal has been forwarded to NCC Highways Dept. for final approval If successful, a road traffic order will be raised at a cost of over £3000. It is anticipated that subject to final approval the work could commence in April/May.

For the past two years, NCC Highways Department has been obliged to work to a very limited budget (amounting to little more than essential work only) and it is only through the good offices of our County Councillor Chris Millar that the parish council has found itself in a position to

contemplate putting forward the above proposals. In his capacity as County Councillor, Cllr. Millar has access to a small budget to be spent on minor works in his own constituency. Cllr. Millar has generously agreed to donate a part of his Councillor's privileged allowance to fund the cost of implementing double yellows.



BRIXWORTH BIN COLLECTIONS BACK ON TRACK

A new system of bin collections in Brixworth is now back on track after experiencing difficulties in the first week.

In January Daventry District Council changed the way it collects the grey and brown bins at households district-wide. In any one week, half of the district now has grey bin collections with the other half having brown bin collections. There are no changes to the weekly recycling collections.

Details of how collections would be affected were included on a calendar issued to households before Christmas. However it emerged that many households in Brixworth had received the wrong leaflet and many bins were missed on Wednesday January 23.

Daventry District Council apologises to residents for this error and thanks them for their patience during this period. It staged collections the following Saturday to rectify the problem and has now distributed the correct calendars to homes...

Jo Gilford, Corporate Manager for Public Space at Daventry District Council said "We apologise for any confusion or inconvenience that was caused to residents due to the leafleting mix-up. The problems of that week have now been resolved and households have been issued with the correct calendars. The system of collection rounds has been changed to balance the workloads of our crews more evenly and we are confident it will improve the service in the long-term.

Brixworth is split into two Wednesday collections—Collection A and Collection B.

Brixworth History Society

Brixworth History Society has been meeting in the village regularly for over 15 years. The society was formed after a request for old photographs of Brixworth for a local exhibition was met with an overwhelming response. The society now has over 60 members who take an active part in opportunities to share and explore their common interest in the history of Brixworth and beyond.

Brixworth History Society members are offered a programme of activities, including talks on a range of historical topics, and visits to places of historical interest, both in England and abroad. During the past few years our trips have included Salisbury, Tewkesbury, Portsmouth, and this year, Winchester. We have also had longer trips abroad to the War Graves of World Wars I and II in France, Visits to Rouen and the Loire Valley in France, Lille in Belgium, and this year to Valkenburg in Germany.

The society provides safe storage for historical documents, photographs and artefacts relating to the history of Brixworth. A selection of items from the archives is regularly displayed in the Heritage Centre during April to October every year.

New members are given a warm welcome at our meetings which take place on the 3rd Thursday of the month at the Village Hall (except during the summer months).

FLOODING IN BRIXWORTH



To my knowledge, flooding due the inadequacy of storm drains and foul sewer drains has been a problem in Brixworth for the last quarter of a century. In 1980 there were about 500 houses and now in 2008 the number of homes has risen to over 2,000 plus innumerable extensions and conservatories. The antiquated drainage system has in part, been improved, usually by the intense pressure applied on Anglia Water by affected residents.

There are several critical areas in the village, the bottom of Harborough/Northampton Road near the Red Lion, the High Street junction with Silver Street, the bottom of Froghall (recently flooded for three days in late January 2008) and again recently near the new development on the Holcot Road. (see photograph)

Large diameter drains were installed in Tantree Lane helped by balancing tanks (hydro brake system to restrict the flow during flash floods to 4.5 litres/sec) installed in the Beazer Estate and upsizing the drains in the Harborough Road during 1996.

The developers of the 14 houses in the Holcot Road (McInerney Homes) understood that they could discharge water into the drains in the Holcot Road but investigations carried out in January 2008, revealed that the existing drains were cracked below the surface at the crossroads of the Holcot Road and the Northampton Road near the butchers and therefore could not carry the additional drainage water. It is understood that a new drainage pipe will be laid along the lane adjacent to the village hall to link the new development (Harrington Gardens) with the main drain in the Northampton Road near the George Public House.

In view of past history, it is hoped that this arrangement will allow flood water from flash floods to be adequately dealt with and not cause manhole covers to lift near the Red Lion.

It is concerning that on examination of the number of planning permissions for extensions to existing houses and conservatories added over the last five years, that the drainage system in Brixworth may not be capable of dealing with torrential rainfalls falling onto the additional roof areas.

It would be useful if the Parish Council would arrange for the Anglia Water Authority and N.C.C. to bring drawings of the drainage system in Brixworth to a meeting, so that residents could understand the complex and antiquated system.

POLICE QUARTERLY REPORT

Following my last report local representatives met and discussed local issues in November and agreed to make no changes to the priorities for the area in which Brixworth falls - parking, youth nuisance/underage drinking and speeding.

Parking – work continues with partners on this issue and by the time you receive this bulletin there will have been an open meeting hosted by the Parish Council on Tuesday 29th January 08. Together we propose the laying of double yellow lines on the crossroads of Harborough Rd, Kennel Terrace and Holcot Rd, on the corner of Spratton Rd onto Northampton Rd and around the junction of Spratton Rd and Pytchley Way. In addition to this, limited waiting is proposed in the lay-by outside the shops. These proposals are seen as a solution to the continual irresponsible parking by motorists using the areas with the intention of making the roads safer and, in relation to the lay-by - alleviating the lack of space available by preventing cars being parked there all day. At weekends I remind those wishing to use the facilities in the village centre that they may use the QMP/Boniface house car park.

We have issued numerous warnings to drivers over parking and have prosecuted 2. You may be aware that at present we have placed no waiting cones at the junction of Spratton Rd and Pytchley Way. These remain in place for 2 weeks as an education exercise to indicate where it is unlawful to park. Within the first week 3 motorists have been issued with fixed penalties for parking on this coned area. Once the cones are removed we will issue a fixed penalty notice to any offenders found causing an unnecessary obstruction.

Youth Nuisance/Underage drinking - We have maintained our evening patrols and find that there has been a marked decrease in such incidents over the last 3 months - reported incidents dropping from 25 in October to 3 in January. We will continue to monitor the situation and are aware that weather plays a factor

Speeding – This is raised as an issue across all our 45 villages and we endeavour to carry out enforcement proportionate to the problem. Concerns raised in Brixworth prompted us to have a 7-day speed survey conducted on Northampton Rd near to the Holcot Rd junction in November – this showed that 8397 passed through and that there is not a speeding issue at that precise location. We will however carry out checks elsewhere in the village and report that since November 1st we have visited 80 sites across our area and dealt with 48 offenders. Further survey work is planned to identify speeding hot spots.

Crime in Brixworth has been fairly low over the last 3 months with overall figures for the year at least 10% down on last year.

An adult male is on bail in relation to theft

from the COOP in October. Following the execution of a warrant in the village in July an adult male has received an adult caution for possession of a controlled drug.

On 23rd Oct 3 Northampton males were arrested for theft of metals from Holcot Rd; all three have been reported for the offence. Theft of lead has transferred to stainless steel due to a recent hike in its scrap value.

All 3 drink drivers from the village have attended court and all have received disqualifications ranging from 15months to 3 years.

A 16yr old male youth has been to court over the reported stealing of a car on 27th Oct; the court has referred the case to the diversion clinic.

An adult male arrested having been found in possession of items stolen in a burglary in Brixworth (Aug 07) admitted handling stolen goods. He is currently serving a 15month sentence for this and other offences.

we do need something stronger than gossip to take the investigation further – if you know something about this crime please do not hesitate to get in touch.

The Trouble with Scandinavians

Despite a lifelong passion for wild nature, its conservation and the environment, I must come clean and confess that I have always had an identity crisis. In other words telling plants and animals that are closely similar to one another apart has always been a problem. Partly I guess this has been due to my complete lack of interest in "classroom" biology. I remember as an eleven year old my enthusiasm was shattered by the most abysmally awful biology teacher. His idea of a lesson was to read out two or three pages from a textbook and then order us to copy it out. End of lesson.

It's bad enough with obscure groups like spiders and fungi; my expertise with these must rank as slightly worse than zero. Even wild flowers and birds still give me trouble from time to time, as Northamptonshire's great botanist Gill Gent would no doubt confirm. Down to the present day she has come to the rescue as I struggle to put a name to quite widespread wild flowers.

A small flock of chaffinches gather annually at this time on the lawn beneath my bird feeders. Here they feast on the seeds discarded by the fussy blue, great, and cole tits from the feeders. Although the occasional chaffinch learns to hover before the feeding ports to snatch the odd seed, most of them seem to find it beyond them. So they spend their time looking upwards, watching the tits intently, and waiting for one of their handouts. Lucky for them only about one seed in four seems to be worth eating by the tits. The rest are tossed aside with apparent disdain.

A couple of weeks ago I noticed that something odd was going on with the chaffinches. They seemed to be spending much more time than usual arguing and squabbling amongst themselves. And then one day a female was found dead on the lawn. The razor-sharp keel to the breastbone indicated that it had died from starvation. No doubt deprived from food as a result of all those disputes, I thought.

And there the matter would have rested until I noticed that something was not quite

right with one of the chaffinches. The giveaway was a narrow white stripe between the folded wings and the tail, which expanded into a broad white rump, to give it the birdwatcher's term. It wasn't a chaffinch at all, but a brambling, refugee from its homelands, to the north in Scandinavia. When I looked closer there were three of them, the same length but noticeably bulkier than their close relative. I was able to admire the delicate ash-grey and black head markings, and most of all the rich salmon on their chests and underparts. So that was what all the fuss was about.

Bramblings do not often come into back gardens. As seedeaters they rely largely on the fallen seeds of beech. When this crop fails or is used up, they then have no alternative but to seek alternative supplies. In some winters they are quite rare, but in others fairly common. To me it was a rare treat to have them as guests, but obviously they were not welcomed by the neighbourhood chaffinches.

By the time you read this the first butterflies of the year are likely to be out and about.

It will be a toss-up which of three species will be first on the scene. My nomination for the earliest is the sulphur-yellow brimstone, but it could be the scarlet-and-black small Tortoishell, or even the red admiral. The latter butterfly has come on by leaps and bounds as our milder winter have allowed it to overwinter here. My picture shows a male brimstone sharing a flower with a large white.

AANGING HOUGHTON AND LAMPORT NEWS

At the moment there is very little work being done on the Clint Hill Farm site for the proposed development of 8 houses. Presumably this is due to the downturn in the housing market and the developers are waiting for things to change? The developer has been contacted about the damage being done to the grass verges in the village by the site traffic and asked to make good the damage.

Clint Hill Farm and the immediate outbuildings have now been put up for sale at £500,000. I assume that the Lamport Trust have decided to sell the property in its state rather than renovate and then sell it?

The Parochial Church Council have decided to postpone the proposed Valentines evening, and are now going to hold a fund raising evening on the 15th March 2008. This will be held at the Loder Hall in Maidwell with food, drink and good company on offer – please make a note in your diary.

Lodge Farm on the A508 between Hanging Houghton and Brixworth has applied for planning permission for a change of use on one of their barns. They have applied to convert it to light industrial use. They have also asked for permission to increase the size of the farm entrance and clear some of the existing hedges to allow better vision to the anticipated increase in traffic to the site. The PCC have commented on the potential danger of this traffic to/from the site onto a very fast and busy A508.

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DRAMA GROUP'S PRODUCTION OF 'TOAD OF TOAD HALL'



TOAD OF TOAD HALL REVIEW

For a number of years Mark Sharman has been a reliable member of the production team at the drama group, doing sets and lighting – important but never seen. Mark had a long time ambition to direct Toad of Toad Hall and this week in late January, it was realised. Not a small production to start with or a one-act cameo, but a production that strained the resources of the group – a cast of 20 and 12 delightful children from around the village doing their bit as singers and animal extras.

Everyone knows The Wind in the Willows from which the play is derived. The four central characters, Mole, Ratty, Toad and Badger play out the simple tale of country folk, yet the play yields lots of surprises and surreal and comic moments. The play provides a whole range of small cameo roles for almost the entire company, too numerous to mention. Amongst the cameos were a number from newcomers to the group and notably a group of local teenagers who have overcome their natural reticence and have thoroughly enjoyed their first experiences on the boards.

The play opens with the meeting of the delightful round mole, played by James Skeggs, whose passion for anything edible was clear; the rather more reserved Water Rat, played by Eileen Truby; and the appropriately gruff Badger; played by Mike Culverhouse. The three characters present a nice contrast in style and personality. They discuss the latest doings of the rogue of the riverbank, Toad. Cue the mellifluous amphibian himself, played by newcomer Jon Mackley. Now Toad is a complex character in this play, not the open, hyperactive, bumbling type, but a Toad where the much more calculating, devious, insincere side is very much on display, with Jon acting brilliantly more with eyes and face than by movement. In fact, this Toad is so palpably dislikeable that one wonders why the three friends bothered to liberate his house from the stoats and weasels who had 'borrowed' it when Toad was incarcerated, but eventually they did.

The story takes us from the Riverbank to the Wild Wood, to Badger's house, to Toad's defiant appearance in the Courtroom, his escape and flight around the countryside, to the weasels and stoats in Toad Hall. Many of the scenes had great theatrical quality: the Wild Wood with its thousand eyes and menacing trees; the riverbank with Toad's caravan complete with ventriloquist and apparently-talking horse; Badger's house with its realistic fire and feel of home. Then comes the incredible and riotous courtroom

scene, with the entire cast somehow on the stage as a typical parody of British Justice is enacted with conviction first, evidence later. It is a pity that Ratty failed to appeal to the Court of Toad's Rights!

Each new scene was defined by a high quality set and props that combined to give the whole production a much stronger visual element than in previous productions, and required a large and well organised stage crew (Gang-show experienced). This advance in production standards will be hard to follow. Furthermore, there was the music, very nicely played by the two Andys - Knight and Bransby - that complemented the solo and group singing. The Carol was beautifully sung by the younger cast members, and much of the score was composed by the group's own Stuart Cooper. Angela Lichfield surpassed herself with the make-up, especially Toad and Badger, while Eunice Ellis did her normal excellent job on a very large variety of costumes.


Well done to Mark and the entire group for a memorable performance based on a lot of hard work behind the scenes and teamwork on the night.

BRIXWORTH YOUTH FOUNDATION



Brixworth Youth Foundation, a registered charity, reaches a milestone on 9th March 2008 as it celebrates three years of operating. Over the three years we have gradually improved the facilities and introduced new activities. We have a new pool table, the money for which was raised from fundraising and a wonderful donation from Bran and Leubbe/SPX. We have state of the art five-aside goals, purchased with a donation from Waitrose of £1,700 and £500 from the High Sherriff's initiative. We are currently sourcing basketball poles and nets with a donation of £1,466 from the Community Youth Fund.

Although this may indicate a measure of success we began from a very 'low base' with much equipment begged and borrowed and not suitable for non domestic use. Given our location in an industrial building, for which we pay a full commercial rent, and the basic state of this building, there has been much to do. We are now seeking funds to get new carpets as the existing ones are in a shocking state. Nevertheless we are proud to have continued to provide such a facility and indeed slowly but surely improve it.

None of this would have been possible without the support of the small group of volunteers (currently we have eight committee volunteers and four non committee volunteers). In this report the focus is upon one of the non committee volunteers, Phil Reger, who runs his own property business and has been in Brixworth for almost 20 years. Phil takes charge of outdoor activities for the youth members in all sorts of weather and participates and supervises sports such as five-a-side football and cricket. In addition to this, Phil puts his wide range of skills to use by helping with repairs and minor building works. In the last year, Phil has built new storage facilities and installed central heating and hot water. Until Phil installed the heating and hot water, the building was cold and the only source of water was from an outside tap. Phil's help has been invaluable and his dogged and continued support for the Foundation is very much appreciated. Phil enjoys the respect of all the young people and is in much demand.

Members attending Brixworth Media Club on a Thursday night have developed new skills in setting up and operating PA systems, lights and smoke machines and in the music technology, DJ skills and singing.

With the support of Big About Music and at the request of the local police, a gig was organised at Brixworth Village Hall to give young people a focus on Halloween night. This event was funded through D.D.C.

We are currently exploring the establishment of a youth theatre for Brixworth and the surrounding areas. We are also interested in the concept of setting up a Social Enterprise for young people, so watch this space in 2008. We are establishing a members' committee to ensure the young people who attend our clubs have a direct say in matters as well as developing their life skills. The Foundation continues to need the support of the people of Brixworth, local businesses and County, District and Parish Councils. These are usually discarded under hedges, thrown into the branches of trees/bushes or worst of all thrown into the reservoir feeder streams. This is absolutely amazing considering that this is a public water supply reservoir!!

This is obviously not the fault of the dogs, but of some irresponsible dog owners. Surely they are capable of disposing of their nasty packages in the proper manner i.e. take them home with them, rather than leave them in totally inappropriate areas of this popular public amenity.

It is understandable why they choose to walk their dogs in such beautiful surroundings, but why do they insist on spoiling it for others?

A notice is to be posted warning dog owners against this behaviour at the entrance to the fields.

Plastic bags take hundreds of years to degrade. D.D.C. advise dog owners to use degradable bags which degrade in 45 days and deposit the bags in either the special dog 'poo' bins sited around the village or take the package home and deposit it in their grey bin. (See also page 2).
