

### MORE TURBINES PUT WIND UP PROTESTORS



Mercedes HPE have submitted a planning application to erect two wind turbines, each 127 metres high on their Brixworth site positioned as shown on the map. The photograph shows a predicted view from the churchyard.

A considerable number of local residents has reservations about the installations of the two locations (Bolderstone plc & Mercedes HPE) for wind turbines for some understandable reasons. However two important points have been raised by the applicants.

- 1. An important report by Logica CMG claims that in only 8 years, demand for energy could outstrip supply by 23% at peak times. The increasing demand will have to be matched with increased generation. Coal and gas fired power stations take many years to build and nuclear power stations take about two decades.
- 2. The Large Combustion Plant Directive which came into force on 1st January 2008, covers all generating plant above 50MW of capacity which is likely to emit sulphur during the combustion process, limits such plant to 20,000 hours of generating time between 1st January 2008 and 31st December 2015 after which time they must close unless they had fitted gas desulphurisation equipment before 1st January 2008. They can therefore only produce electricity for 28.5% of the available hours in a year. This compares with the capacity factor of around 22% to 35% for a typical wind farm.

A site meeting was held at Morgan Drive on Saturday 1st November and the intention was to raise a blimp to a height of 127 metres to show the height of a turbine, but the hot air balloon was buffeted by high winds and the demonstration was unsuccessful.

Ola Kaellenius, Mercedes HPE Managing Director, spoke to me on 11th November and sent through the following statement.

'Mercedes-Benz HPE and Wind Direct would like to confirm that they have temporarily withdrawn their planning application for two wind turbines in Brixworth in order to allow additional information to be provided to D.D.C. This will enable a more informed decision on the project.

Mercedes-Benz HPE and Wind Direct intend to resubmit the application early in the New Year. We would like to take the opportunity to consult with local residents and stakeholders during this period and have also decided to postpone the exhibition due to be held on the 13th November until the New Year.'





### Winner who receives £25: Ian Topham 'Chair in a window'









### **ALL SAINTS' CHURCH - REPAIRS**



Every five years, those responsible for the Church, i.e. the Vicar and his church council are obliged to commission an architect to inspect and report on the state of the church fabric.

The last report in November 2006 listed much that required attention. Had all that was listed been put right, the cost would have exceeded £100,000.

Priority always has to be given to keeping the water out. Thus it was decided to dig into a reserve of funds kept for such a rainy day.

Urgent roof repairs just completed will cost £15,000. Much of this is the cost of complying with Health and Safety legislation concerning scaffolding.

With reserves now depleted and further work needed before long, there is a serious funding problem, likely to be beyond the ability of a declining congregation to meet.

In future it is possible that appeals will have to be made to individuals, families, groups, organisations and businesses in the village to sponsor specific work. Might it be that a potential donor would agree to fund the painting of one down pipe or a group pay for some new stone work for a window. There is perhaps satisfaction derived from seeing how one's Derek Grass money was spent.

On Sunday, 5th October, Mary and the congregation for the 8a.m. Holy Communion Service discovered water running down the inside of the south wall of the St Catherine's church. On investigating they found a quantity of lead had been stolen from the lower roof and the heavy rain that morning had poured in.

The churchwarden covered it with tarpaulin as a temporary measure to stop further damage and reported the theft to the

### **BIOFUELS AND BRIXWORTH**

A wind farm is proposed for Brixworth, the Government has just increased its pledge to reduce green house gases by 2020 and new forests of 6ft tall grasses are springing up around Brixworth. Are these totally independent phenomena or are they all interrelated

Remember the summer of 2008, or what there was of it? You will certainly remember the furore around the increase in food prices, the riots in Asia when rice became scarce and the increase in petrol prices. Remember that the increase in food prices was put down to the enormous expansion in biofuels? Remember also how shortly after, fuel prices dropped in late October and somehow the argument around biofuels seemed to fade away? There is one unifying concept behind all these issues, that is global warming and the fact that it is perceived that we need to do something about it.

However just to confuse matters, a very learned professor in the USA, Denis Avery, recently questioned whether we are moving in the right direction because he believes that the world is actually cooling!

I come at it from a slightly different angle but the conclusions are the same. It has been said that we need to stop living off what the sun has put in the bank and start to live off what the sun creates today. There is a finite source of fossil fuels and somehow we have to find a renewable source of energy. All of the above factors relate directly to this issue. Let me try and briefly piece this jigsaw together and suggest how it might impact on our environment here in Brixworth.

I want to focus here on renewable energy from crops. There are many options for

renewable energy, wind farms or wave power being two alternatives. Crops which grow using energy from the sun are also a source of renewable energy. Seeing fields of Miscanthus planted locally has made me think how this issue will affect my local environment in Brixworth. Look out for the crop on the right as you drive down the Harborough road from Brixworth to Kingsthorpe. I work for a company that is a partner in the construction of a bioethanol plant in Hull, so have a vested interest in the subject. These are my personal views.

We call the bioethanol plant a biorefinery, ethanol will be just one of the products we shall produce from a renewable source, but more of that later

Just recently, on the 16th October, the UK Government committed to cutting green house gas emissions by 80%, up from a 60% target, by 2050. One way to do this is to burn greener fuels in the engines of our cars. The incentive to do this is a piece of legislation called the Renewable Transport Fuels Obligation (RTFO). This is exactly what it says. The UK Government is obliging the fuel industry to use greener fuels. In the UK the RTFO means that fuel companies will gradually have to increase the percentage of biofuels used in their products (diesel and petrol). This will start with 2.5% for 2008/9 finally reaching 5% in 2010/11.

Currently biofuels are produced from cereal crops (corn or wheat) which produce bioethanol as a replacement for petrol or from oilseed crops (rapeseed and soya bean meal) from which we can produce biodiesel. This is where the food versus fuel debate started. These are termed the first generation of biofuel crops. It is interesting that we have been producing ethanol from these crops for several hundred years but the value of the ethanol is somewhat higher when it is matured in barrels, given a fancy label and called malt whisky. This is potable alcohol, basically the method of producing the alcohol is exactly the same as producing biofuel ethanol.

What people do not know is that for every litre of alcohol produced from the starch in the grain there is a valuable co-product made up of the fibre and protein of the grain which is fed to livestock. This co-product, distillers dried grain and solubles has been a source of animal feed coming from the Scottish whisky industry for many years. Much of the best Scottish beef has been fed on this product.

So when people talk about the acreage which will be sown to produce grains for bioethanol they fail to say that basically one third of the acreage is producing animal feed, not to mention all the straw that is now being used in the open yards for rearing pigs. But the acreage we shall need to meet the RFTO is large. It is calculated that to meet the UK 2010 RFTO goals approximately 3 million tons of wheat will be required. This is a tremendous incentive for farmers to produce more wheat.

But don't forget the equivalent of one third of this land is producing the co-product for animal feed. This is a tremendous opportunity for British farmers and will help bring vibrancy back to the country side. And a final thought, when the wheat is planted it is a matter of choice whether we choose to use it for food or fuel. At some future time we may make the choice to sacrifice petrol for the car for food we eat, but by growing wheat we have the choice. We can definitely expect to see more fields of wheat planted around Brixworth.

What about the Miscanthus that is now being grown locally? These are termed the second generation biofuels. They are capable of producing more biomass per hectare compared with cereal crops because they grow all the year round, even though the amount of sunlight that they receive in a British winter is only minimal. These crops will grow in the bright winter sun available in central North America, but their ability to do so in the United Kingdom is uncertain. Miscanthus can either be dried and used directly to fire power stations or again can be used to produce biofuels. However, I wonder whether sufficient thought has gone into the logistics of cropping and drying such crops and then transporting them long distances to the power stations. I definitely know that the technology to create bioethanol from the crop has a long, long way to go and currently is no where near being cost effective. It is for this reason that I favour the first generation technology. Wheat is a crop that we know how to grow and grow well in the UK. But stands of Miscanthus are definitely a new sight on the Brixworth horizon, look out for them.

Finally, a word about biofuels and the potential risks to food supply. Have you noticed that all the fuss about the conflict between biofuels and food supply has died down? It's not that there is no issue. Biofuels will require more land to be cultivated. However, if sustainable biofuels are used and forests are not sacrificed to plant oil palms, then biofuels are a means of achieving demonstratable carbon savings in the fuel sector and making the UK less reliant on imported fuels, particularly when we happen to live in a country with only minor reserves of coal, oil or gas. The farming sector is key to the UK economy and this is a great incentive for the countryside. It is ironic that the focus on a world wide grain shortage as was reported in the summer has been followed by record world wide harvests which have allowed us to partially replenish those stocks that only four months ago were looked at with dire consequences. Farming has a knack of responding when needed.

So here in Brixworth we have a microcosm of the UK response to global warming. New second generation biofuel crops already planted, the potential to see flowing wheat fields soaking up the sun's energy, who knows maybe a wind farm. Did you realise that Brixworth is at the cutting edge of technology to cut global warming?

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The Community Panel covering Brixworth and area met again in September and local concerns were discussed. Concerns have been collated over the past 3 months and ignore previous data collected; nonetheless the 3 priorities remain unchanged at Speeding, Youth Nuisance and Parking.

### **Parking**

The proposed works for parking restrictions on the Spratton Road/Pytchley Road area, Spratton Road/Northampton Road corner and the junction of Kennel Terrace/Northampton Road and Holcot Road should be in by Christmas. Your Community Panel decided that little more could be done with regards to the parking issues and the matter would be reconsidered once the yellow lines had been laid.

### **Youth Nuisance**

The number of calls in relation to Anti Social Behaviour remains half of those received 12 months ago and the general feeling from the majority is that matters are significantly improved. The Community Panel decided that youth nuisance should remain a concern, there always seems to be potential for inconsiderate behaviour. As a result of this we continue our patrols as part of normal business. There are still a small number of youths who seem immune to the troubles and harassment they cause to the community. Much of this is caused by alcohol misuse and I remind all that Brixworth is an Alcohol Free Zone and that of course it is illegal for under 18's to purchase or be given alcohol. In the near future my staff will be provided with test strips to counter the habit of mixing vodka, in particular, into soft drinks to disguise alcohol.

Work continues on a proposed BMX track and the parish council now has a separate committee working on the project. The latest proposal is to site the track off the old Harborough Rd. Funding will be required and

### **Speeding**

Over the last 3 months 33 enforcement visits have been conducted across this sub beat resulting in 25 fixed penalty tickets being issued 2 x report to court, 8 cautions or warning letters, 5 fixed penalties for mobile phone use and 7 penalty notices for no seat belt.

Additional traffic offences of note – 2 drink drivers, one following an accident on the Creaton road and one stopped in Brixworth. Both are now disqualified from driving. Further speed enforcement is to take place in the village shortly.



The author, Dave "Tasty" West is a lifelong Brixworth villager well known throughout the village and especially in football circles where older members still remember Dave's own formidable abilities as a striker.

Dave has spent years in painstaking research to produce this history of his beloved club. He has consulted widely with football colleagues past and present as well as digging through the archives of local newspapers and official footballing records.

The result is a book of over 200 pages covering the whole history of the Brixworth Football Club from its formation in 1911 with its headquarters in the Coach and Horses through to the 2007/08 season. In between are detailed just about every fact and anecdote about the club that you could possibly want to know. The pages are liberally dotted with team photographs, as well as pictures of dozens of individual players accompanied by a brief biography. There are also details and plans of the various pitches used throughout the club's history together with extracts from various Parish Council minutes when they considered what at the time contentious issues such as whether the club should be allowed to use the Recreation Ground on a Sunday afternoon.

This book is well researched and well written and makes an enjoyable read for anyone with any interest in football or local sport. It's the sort of book that village football fans will want to keep handy for reference and to settle arguments (or start new ones) for years to come.

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### A Brixworth Family

It all started in 2001 when I received my Grandfather's medals from his service in the Royal Navy. His service lasted thirty two years spanning the first and second world wars. With the service number engraved on the edge of the medals I obtained a copy of John William Smiths service record and found that he was born in Twywell in Northamptonshire in 1897 and at the time of enlisting was resident in the then village of Corby

This was the start of research into my family history and with the surname Smith a task that at the time seemed mammoth.

Fast forward to today I have now traced the family history back to 1786 through Northamptonshire, Yorkshire, Lincolnshire, Norfolk, Hampshire and Dorset returning to Northamptonshire and the village of Brixworth.

Two of my ancestors, James (1862) and Thomas Smith (1874) moved to Brixworth between 1890 and 1900. By 1901 James was living in Church Street in Brixworth a short distance from Thomas and both had married local girls.

James was married to Hannah Tite born in Brixworth in 1867 and Thomas had married Ada, whose maiden name I have yet to discover. James and Hannah had a son Reginald born in Brixworth in 1886.

Hannah's parents Joseph born in 1818 and Sarah Tite born in 1825 also had a son Albert who was born in 1863.

My research continues and I would be interested to hear from anyone who may recognise or have any information regarding any of the names. *John Smith*

# COUNTRY EYE SPORTS

'What am I going to do with all those leaves? They're everywhere.' I heard this from a neighbour of mine a way down the street. To me this meant that a keen gardener was one thing she was not. Every single leaf is a valuable source of humus in the form of leaf mould. But first it has to be gathered in. I fear for my life whenever I see someone bearing down on me brandishing a lawn rake at this time of the year. A furious bout of activity sees the leaf bounty gathered into a heap in the centre of the lawn. If it's a windy day like as not the whole lot will be redistributed over the garden while the bin is being fetched. I have no time for lawn rakes. I find that a good stiff yard broom does the job better.

To me leaf fall is an important time. I try to gather all of them that I can, and I have two containers to hold them. The first will be filled with the bounty from last year, still rotting down into that wonderful clean-smelling mould that is so useful in my garden and on the allotment. Some experts tell us that leaf mould made in this way is devoid of nutrients for your garden plants, merely adding bulk and structure to the soil. But even this is vital for health. I believe that there is goodness in these leaves, and I have used it as a potting compost with excellent results.

The second of my containers is filled with the leaves that I have gathered this year. In the early stages it may take two years for the leaves to completely rot down. But I find with an established system they are ready after little more than a single year. Saving your own leaves is easy. The best way is to knock four stakes into the ground to form about a yard square. Then tack some chicken wire - no more than a two inch mesh - around it. Pile the leaves into it, keep it moist but not wet, cover the top with a bit of old carpet, walk away from it and just leave it to nature. If you can't be bothered with all of this, stuff a strong plastic sack full of leaves, pierce some holes in it with a fork, and just leave it in a corner of your garden. Wonderful stuff for your tomatoes or for your treasured houseplants.

An old friend of mine who lives in the village may be seen pushing a wheelbarrow around the streets at this time of year. Not content with the leaves provided by his own plot, he sweeps up those shed from the street and park trees. He comes from the wise old school you see where nothing that could be used was allowed to go to waste. I remember from my childhood days, the competition for the droppings the milkman's horse had left in its wake! Such goodness would frighten your plants into growing.

Right now you may have noticed an increase in the numbers of blackbirds and starlings in your garden. The last of the swallows and martins have gone by now, and these birds have come in from the continent, seeking to take advantage of our milder winters. They are indistinguishable from our native birds, except that bird ringers have noticed that on average their wings are slightly longer. Very sensible, don't you think, if you intend going in for long distance travel?
