Almost done: the Brixworth Neighbourhood Development Plan

The Brixworth Neighbourhood Development Plan 2011-2029 will form part of the Local Plan for Daventry District and will be used in the determination of planning applications within the Brixworth Parish. The plan has been drawn up following extensive interviews and answers to a questionnaire delivered to all residents last year. It has to comply with National and Local Government requirements as well as EU Law.

Brixworth has seen rapid housing growth over recent years -

beyond that envisaged for the area. Residents feel that future housing growth should be limited because the shops, roads, school and medical facilities are at or near capacity for the present population.

A development at the village entrance on Northampton Road (Barratts Phase 2) should be the last large piece of the development jigsaw for the period of the plan. The development will bring much-needed improvements to the village facilities, including a new and enlarged doctors' surgery with car parking, advance funding to increase the capacity at the school and additional parking at the Library & Community Centre. The Brixworth Neighbourhood Development Plan proposes that the only development supported after this will be limited infill, and no further large-scale development.

The plan seeks to protect vital community services, open spaces, footpaths, community buildings and the Conservation Area. It also highlights the valued views into and from the village and builds on the work of the Village Design Statement.

The draft plan has been prepared by the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, who are all residents and volunteers, and we would like your views before it is put into its final version. It also has to be submitted to a range of statutory organisations for their comments. Finally, it will need to be approved by village residents in a referendum organised by Daventry District Council. All who are on the electoral roll will have the opportunity to vote. – *Bob Chattaway*

Your chance to view the plan

Now that the draft Neighbourhood Plan is published, a six week community consultation is about to start.

The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group's chairman, David Parnaby, said: "It is vital that members of the community view the proposals and have their say."

The Group is arranging a display in the Library & Community Centre foyer from the beginning of June until mid-July and a public meeting on Thursday 11th June at 7.30pm.

Nick Bunting takes Wiig's seat to rejoin DDC

Brixworth has re-elected Nick Bunting as a Conservative Councillor on Daventry District Council in the local elections on 7 May, taking the seat previously occupied by Liz Wiig for

Bunting won with 2601 votes, representing 67% of the votes cast and beating Labour candidate Robert McNally with 726 votes (19%) and Steve Whiffen for the Greens, who received 515 votes (13%). He takes up his new post with immediate effect.

"I plan to build on my past record of stopping overdevelopment in the village, and inappropriate industrial development such as the windfarm projects that had been proposed around the village a few years ago," Bunting says. "Right now I'm particularly concerned about the impact of travel on the A508 - we're starting to see drivers skip through the village when traffic on the bypass is backing up. The planned Buckton Fields development at Boughton will only add to this."

Bunting, who apart from his role as District Councillor is chief executive of a professional charity, had previously served as District Councillor for Brixworth from 2000 to 2013.

He joins fellow Brixworth Councillors Ian Barratt and Kevin Parker (both Conservatives) at Daventry - their seats come up for election



in 2017 and 2018, respectively. The third seat had been won by Wiig for the Conservatives in 2011 but became UKIP when Wiig switched allegiance in 2013. Wiig announced last year that she would be standing down at this election, and resigned from the Parish Council - where she has sat for [xxx] years - at the same time.

No other UKIP candidate stood in Brixworth, though Brixworth resident Stephen Pointer did stand as a UKIP candidate in the Daventry suburb of Drayton. He came third in that election, behind Amy Howard (Conservative) and Ken Ritchie (Labour). -cfw

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Petshop planning application goes to **Appeal**

Celebrations that the planning application to convert 130 Northampton Road - currently better known as Northampton Pets - into a fast food takeaway had been rejected by Daventry District Council proved to be premature as the owner of the building has decided to appeal against the decision.

The Parish Council Planning Committee will be writing to the Planning Inspectorate to reiterate its objection to the development there are concerns about the lack of parking at the site, as well as how noise, smells and rubbish from the takeaway would affect the area. The neighbouring shop at 132 Northampton Road was already granted permission for a similar conversion last year.

The appeal will be heard by a planning inspector who is expected to make a final decision by the end of July. The appeal will receive written evidence only, though the inspector will visit the site in person.

DDC has until 4 June to submit its response. Until that date, residents can comment on the appeal at bit.ly/1QKqZsX – Claudia Flavell-While

Pointer vs Parish Council set to

run and run

The legal battle between Parish Councillor Stephen Pointer and Brixworth Parish Council is set to continue until the autumn at least, and could even drag into 2016. A preliminary hearing at the end of April brought proceedings no closer to resolution.

Pointer, who is partially sighted, sued the Parish Council and the then-chair, Mike Lacev, in October 2013 over allegations that the Parish Council had failed to make reasonable adjustment for his disability. Specifically, Pointer had asked the Parish Council to provide him with an aid such as an iPad to allow him to read meeting agendas, minutes and other associated paperwork, but while the Parish Council did buy a £514 iPad the deal eventually failed as the parties could not agree the details of the arrangement.

The lawsuit, heard by the employment tribunal service, accuses the Parish Council of discrimination against a disabled person for failing to provide a suitable reading aid, failing to conduct a proper workplace assessment to ascertain Pointer's needs, victimisation, and five counts of harassment.

Presiding Judge David Moore attached a £250 deposit to all claims apart from the failure to provide the reading aid - this means that unless the claimant pays the money, the claims will not be heard. Deposit orders are made for claims that the judge feels are unlikely to succeed.

The time delay in hearing the matter is down to the complicated way in which the case has been brought, and the fact that the list of complaints keeps being amended. An initial pre-hearing, in December 2014, was adjourned after two days without reaching a conclusion. The second pre-hearing in April ended when Moore threw out an attempt by Pointer's legal advisors to expand the initial claim for being unclear and badly written. Pointer has now agreed to personally redraft the modification request ahead of a third prehearing on 8 June.

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Clearly exasperated, Moore said: "This is an extraordinarily simple case that is complicated by muddled arguments. We have a partially sighted parish councillor who wants a reading aid. When the aid is not immediately forthcoming, he sues. As the issue proceeds, this - unsurprisingly - causes some friction with the body he's suing."

A date for the actual hearing is yet to be set but is unlikely to be before the autumn at the earliest.

Meanwhile, legal costs are mounting. The Parish Council has so far spent £26,670 on its defence, a number that could end up being much higher by the time the matter is concluded; Pointer, who lives on benefits, is represented free of charge by pro-bono lawyers.

The Parish Council, which has to fund the costs from its reserves, plans to put in a claim for wasted costs to recover at least some of the money from the claimant. Moore had little sympathy for Pointer's concerns that he would struggle to pay such costs in the event that he loses the case.

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Police Report

A few topics for me to cover for this issue. Firstly, with the summer months now rapidly approaching there are numerous fêtes, parades, carnivals and village festivals being planned. There is little doubt that the challenges facing modern day policing are more complex, challenging and varied than they have ever been. To put these demands against a continually reducing budget, we as an organisation have to approach problems differently. It has seen the introduction of PCSO's and now the introduction of Parish Special Constables, the first of whom arrives shortly for Cold Ashby and the surrounding villages. The aim of the parish constable is for local communities to support their local policing effort within a community which means something to them, to provide a visible presence in the local rural areas, and to improve the overall feeling of safety within a community, by focussing primarily on community engagement, crime prevention and problem solving.

We are continuing to look for volunteers to join us in a multitude of ways, from Horse Watch to Speed Watch, Neighbourhood Watch and of course, Parish Special Constables. If you are interested in any of these please get in touch for more details.

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Verging on controversy

Were you one of the many people who were unhappy with the knee-high grass growing in front of your house last year? Most of the complaints the Parish Council received in 2014 concerned the unkempt state of the grass verges in the village.

Up until now, Northamptonshire County Council has been responsible for cutting the grass in the village three times a year, with the Parish Council funding two additional cuts. A problem arose last year because it was not considered a fast-growing season, so the contractors were not obliged to mow so frequently.

Due to the complaints and general frustration of Brixworth residents, the Parish Council decided to take matters in hand and negotiated to take all the grass cutting in-house. However, another challenge now stands in the way of Brixworth looking as attractive as it might.

It is a common sight throughout the village to see cars parked on grass verges. While this is not illegal, it causes a number of problems. Parking on grass creates unsightly damage and spreads mud on footpaths. Inappropriately parked vehicles can obstruct a clear view of the road for other motorists. Also, vehicles are not permitted to drive over pavements for pedestrian safety. For these reasons, while people may not be aware of the consequences, parking on a grass verge

may put personal convenience ahead of consideration for other residents.

There is also a very practical consideration to take into account. Where cars are parked on the verges, the Parish Council's groundsman cannot access the grass for mowing.

To highlight this problem, the Parish Council took to its Facebook page and posted a photo of a grass verge in the village that has been seriously damaged by cars parking on it. Alex Coles, Parish Council vice chair, said, "We only wanted to say a gentle 'Please don't'. We were not targeting anyone specifically and we were careful not to include any street names or licence plates in our photograph".

However, the post generated a number of comments from residents pointing out that they have nowhere else to park their vehicles than on the grass. The Councillors were quite taken aback by the fierceness of some of the responses.

The Council hopes it can count on the community's support in addressing an issue



that so many residents raised as a priority last year. However, it appears there are intensely held mixed views about this matter, so the online debate may continue for some time yet. - Jennifer Fitzgerald

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Country Eye

Welcome back, Red Kite

So how do we get rid of all those undesirables? Where our wildlife and wild places are concerned it seems all too easy. But first I think we need to settle what we mean by the word. To me it seems to mean any plant or animal that turns up in the wrong place, especially if that place has somehow escaped the heavy hand of humankind. Such arrogant behaviour on our part towards the natural world is not new of course. What has changed, especially since the 1940s, are the development of tools that enable us to make ever-more drastic alterations to landscapes that have remained broadly untouched since the last Ice Age.

Our attitude towards our semi-wild surroundings needs to change, and change swiftly, as we are approaching a point where the wanton destruction worldwide will trigger off an unstoppable avalanche of mass extinctions of species. We, who think we know so much, in truth have hardly begun to scratch the surface of the complex relationships among and between the species out there. As I have said before, it's a certainty that out in my garden there are plants and animals that are completely unknown to science. In other words never before been seen by humans, let alone studied by them. Without such knowledge how can we hope to make sense of the intricate life web of which we are a part?

Of course there are things happening out there to the benefit of our wildlife community. The recent welcome reappearance of two birds of prey in the skies over Brixworth is a case in point. I refer to the red kite and the buzzard, both of them driven into local extinction by relentless and misguided persecution. Locally the red kite was well on the way to oblivion by the middle years of the nineteenth century.

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Accused of carrying off lambs and chickens, its fate was sealed. Let's admit that young chicks, especially of game bird species are vulnerable to them, and need to be reared under protective cover. Yet thorough and painstaking observation shows that in sheep-rearing upland areas, sheep carrion can be a major food source. At lambing time their enthusiastic clearing up of placentas could be regarded as a service. Instead it may have given rise to the lamb-stealing notion. It has been pointed out that the long legs and small feet of the red kite make it impossible for it to kill a lamb.

Here, the red kites occupying territories around Brixworth will seek their prey among other birds like wood pigeons and blackbirds, while in season they prey heavily on the eggs and young of carrion crows and magpies. Certainly, abject panic seems to ensue whenever the large narrow-winged, wedge-tailed silhouette of a red kite in hunting mode appears over my house. Returning again to the issue of large prey, it is certainly one of our larger predators, with a wingspan that can measure five-and-a half feet. Recently I asked members of my family to guess the weight of an adult red kite. As I expected their guesses came in way too high, including one at sixteen pounds. (I won't mention any names but you know who you are Dave). Actually my son got it more or less spot on when he said 'the same as a bag of sugar' i.e. Ikg. So how is a lightweight like this going to be able to carry off a lamb weighing around 4kg?

Sad to say the illegal killing of these entirely useful birds still takes place. As a scavenger on the hunt for prey it is easy to tempt them with a bit of meat laced with a pesticide or other poison. And it is by no means unknown to find the corpses of birds that have been shot. It seems the conviction of the minority lives on that anything with hooked beak and sharp talons must be destroyed. Red kites often nest close to us, and in some parts of their range they have been attracted to large garden bird tables stocked with meat. So could it be that a red kite is coming to a bird table near you some time soon?

Next time I will write about the buzzard that has spectacularly recolonised our county, entirely under its own steam.

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Putting the Church at the Centre of the Village

Unbelievably, a full two years have passed since Rev Chloe Willson-Thomas arrived at All Saints Church. Although dwindled to a very small number, she says the congregation she inherited in 2013 was "very kind and supportive".

Since then, Rev Chloe has been busy. Believing that "The church should be the centre of the village", she has introduced many changes "to get the church moving more, to get people more involved". This has included morning family services, a toddlers' group, and Taizé evening services incorporating candlelight and easy-to-learn chants from the Taizé community in France. Attendance has been rising gradually and Rev Chloe was thrilled with the turnout of about 80 people on Mothering Sunday.

Her family (a husband, two teenage children still at home, and an eldest daughter away at university) have adjusted well to their move to Brixworth, too. They still return to Leicester regularly where her son is at school and they have many friends.

Rev Chloe's background as a professional singer and singing teacher has brought a new aspect to life at All Saints. In 2014, the Brixworth Music Festival was launched, which she hopes will become an annual event if funding can be secured. She says, "I'd like to develop Brixworth's reputation for music. I have a vision where music brings people to the church. The church has very good acoustics and, of course, it is situated in a lovely spot".

Working with Holcot's church organist, James Bonsor, Rev Chloe has also set up a children's choir called "Singing Saints". This caters for 10-11 year olds and new members are always welcome.

The Christmas Tree Festival last year was another successful initiative, when many village organisations supplied and decorated their own tree, making the church look very pretty and festive. Rev Chloe felt this theme was particularly apt for All Saints, given its connection with St Boniface – a relic believed to be a bone of the saint is preserved by the church.

According to legend, in the eighth century in Germany, St Boniface came across a group of pagans worshipping an old oak tree dedicated to the god Thor. St Boniface chopped down the tree and a tiny fir tree was discovered growing between its roots. St Boniface declared the fir tree would from then on be a holy symbol, its evergreen leaves representing eternal life.

In addition to All Saints, Rev Chloe also manages the Holcot Parish Church of St Mary and All Saints. She says, "Of course, it's a smaller church, but with more children. Sometimes we have had a breakfast together before the service, and we have held some outdoor services". She also holds joint services with the Brixworth Christian Fellowship at Christmas, Easter and Remembrance Day, and is a School Governor at Brixworth Primary School.

What Rev Chloe enjoys most in her role is seeing children come to the church for the first time in many years, and the opportunities she is given to help people at difficult times of their lives.

She admits that what has been most challenging has been "starting new things off and making them happen, and making the services more accessible for all."

Fortunately, she says people have responded very well to the changes. She hasn't experienced any resistance, either, to her being a female priest, which she encountered occasionally in previous situations. She thanks the Friends of All Saints Church for the help they have given her (and makes a plea for more people to join them) and says she has also been impressed with the support she has received from the Peterborough diocese for this, her first incumbency.

Rev Chloe has clear ideas about where she would like to lead the


church in future. Her main objective is to attract more families into church. She sees huge potential for this given that she conducted no fewer than 26 baptisms last year! To support such growth, it has become essential for the church to have some toilet facilities and a servery, and initial talks about this are underway with the



appropriate authorities. She also wants to introduce a Sunday school, for which she has already enlisted some volunteers.

She sees her role in serving the community as a privilege and in a historical light. "The church was founded by monks from Peterborough who were sent to several areas of Mercia. I feel that I have been sent by God to continue what they started during the 8th to 9th centuries—to spread the love of God."

"I think a lot of people aren't aware of how beautiful the church is. Do come and see what we are doing!"



Brixworth Country Park - Spring

Autumn & Winter

Since our last update much has happened at Brixworth Country Park. We have had great success in the conservation work we have completed; in doing so we have a clearer view of what to do in the coming seasons. With the help of contractors our playground is looking fresher, and we look to extend our interactive play facilities throughout the park. We have also seen some vandalism, with an attempted break in to our car park machine.

The Brampton Valley Way is also doing very well after a programme of work has seen different stages completed. There has been extensive tree management along bank to the south of Kelmarsh Tunnels,

ground and tree clearance at Keeper's Cottage, and continued work to improve the wildflowers at Triangular Meadow.



Easter saw such wonderful weather for all of us across the county, perhaps not so much on Good Friday, but Bank Holiday Monday saw our car parks full to overflowing. We also had a wonderful time exploring our natural world with visitors at our "Underwater World" and "Bugs About" activities throughout the week. Lots of inquisitive youngsters found a wide variety of aquatic life in Bottom



Pond including Dragonfly Larvae, Great Diving Beetles and lots of Freshwater Shrimp. The finds we have recorded tell us that we have a thriving, healthy pond, which we hope to encourage.

Playgrounds

With assistance from TCL and Reid Playground Maintenance, we have been able to refurbish our main playground. For some time, we have been missing three playground pieces, and the cableway has required a replenishment of bark chippings. The playground repairs include two new "springer" items, a new "spirotte", a refill of sand in the play pits and a fully restored cableway.

The stage of play development in the park will be to introduce "wild play" items along the different routes. The country park has so much to offer naturally that we hope to enhance this. As we will need to seek capital funding for the project it may take a little time to materialise, but I hope to keep you updated of any progress.

Conservation maintenance - the Bottom Pond

The drainage problem at Bottom Pond has now been resolved. With assistance from the Countryside Service's Woodland & Estates team the old fractured pipework has been removed entirely and replaced. Fibrous roots from the willow situated directly above the pipe broke through the pipe wall and slowly filled it; with nowhere to go, the water flooded the footpath in front of the pond.

We do have more work to do in the pond, which will hopefully take place in the Autumn of this year to restore the lining to the wall, bank stabilisation and new fencing. In the meantime our visitors can help with the bank erosion by keeping their dogs out of the pond, while we tackle the invasive North American Signal Crayfish.

Volunteering

A monthly volunteer group has started at Brixworth on the third Saturday of each month. Morgan leads the group around the park completing various tasks. So far, we have seen approximately seven new volunteers join us on these works days, and we are always happy to welcome more.

As well as this we have been supported by Moulton College students from a range of courses all developing their skills in a live working environment. They have been working with rangers throughout the week on tasks such as weeding, pruning, tree removal, furniture repair and other general maintenance tasks.

With volunteers assistance we have also been able to begin a programme of understory clearance and hazel layering. Self-set saplings often litter the floor of the woodlands, with brambles also

making it difficult for ground flora such as bluebells to bloom. By clearing the scrub understory we open the ground up to light and water and improve the overall health of the woodlands. Once this has been cleared we can then "layer" the hazel, using existing hazel branches cut to the wick and replanted to repopulate woodlands with a much better understory of trees. In time, we hope to harvest the hazel through coppicing as stands for any hedge-laying we carry out.

Brampton Valley Way – Oxendon & Kelmarsh Tunnels

Most recently Dan and his Thursday volunteers have completed their work clearing the southern bank at Kelmarsh Tunnels. The main focus has been to clear the west side to open the woodland floor up for flora, and to create a better flight path for birds and bats. Work on the east side will commence this coming autumn season.

With a student volunteer, the picnic area at Keeper's Cottage (Draughton Car Park) has been opened up, old or worn bench tops have been replaced and treated. Although not often used, we hope that by making the clearing more visually appealing, visitors may start to use the area for rest stops or picnics.

At Oxendon Tunnels, we have been working to clear the drainage gully, removing sludgy leaf litter, brambles and self-set trees. It is vital work to ensure water and roots cannot damage the brickwork of the tunnels.

Forthcoming Activities

Surveying

In February we started to survey areas on the Brampton Valley Way, and at Brixworth for all flora and fauna. Although at first glance there doesn't appear to be much, the meadows and woodlands are full of wildlife, even at that time of year.

To give us a clearer idea of what is there all year round; we are extending the surveys throughout the year on a quarterly basis to cover all seasons.

Dangerous Corner

On 15 April, afternoon cups of tea were rudely interrupted by a loud bang that sounded as though a bomb had exploded. A quick look out of the windows of 21 Church Street revealed a black Range Rover that had been violently pushed to the side of the road; it had a large dent in its off-side and a dislocated off-side rear wheel. It was difficult, at first glance to see whether or not anyone inside had been injured because the inflated air-bag obliterated any view through the vehicle windows.

It soon became clear that the Range Rover, which had been going up Station Road from the junction with Church Street, had been struck in its side by a van which was coming down Station Road and was about to turn left into Church Street. By the time concerned and helpful neighbours had arrived at the scene of the collision, the van had continued uncontrollably along Church Street and had come to an abrupt halt with its front off-side wheel firmly embedded in the garage wall of The Old Hare and Hounds, having brought down one of the new lamp posts in its travels.

After an interval, the police arrived, followed shortly by an ambulance. By very good fortune, it seems that the only injury suffered by the car driver was some bruising, probably caused by the air-bag. It is not known whether the van driver was affected in any way but he remained perfectly mobile.

We all know how dangerous this bend can be when taken too fast and without due care. In this case, the greatest damage sustained was by the Range Rover (which is probably a write-off), the silver van and the garage stone wall. - *George Hammerschmidt*

Since opening the Brixworth Office in '99, O'Riordan Bond has seen many changes to Brixworth and the surrounding villages.

Locally, the housing market was very strong in 2014 and prices on average increased by 8% across properties in Brixworth year on year. Our office registered well over 900 new prospective purchasers last year; they were a mixture of people living elsewhere who were hoping to buy a home for the first time in the village, or people who already live here looking for their next dream home. The difficulty is when you already own a home and are looking to take the next step, it is often scary going to the market with your own property when you haven't found your own next home yet.

Unfortunately, in the current property market, speed is of the essence. Unless you've put yourself in a position where you can secure the right house as soon as it becomes available, you will more often than not be beaten to the punch by somebody else who can move faster. This could be somebody who did take the leap of faith and secured a buyer on theirs, one who was prepared to sit and wait for them to find their next dream home.

This is one of the reasons why an awful lot of properties in Brixworth sell 'off market'.

Off-market selling means selling a property without advertising it publicly. It requires the

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estate agent to act as the broker to match prospective buyers with properties that are not listed on any websites or splashed across office windows. Once a phenomenon that mostly applied to high-end properties in London, off-market selling has become increasingly common in the countryside too – including in Brixworth.

A purchaser, who wants a specific house and is prepared to pay a premium for it, will register with an estate agent and wait for the right property to become available. This can often mean they have the chance to have a "one-off" viewing before the property is announced to the market.

The advantage for the seller is that it allows people with properties to sell to

gauge the interest in the old property 'on the quiet' while they search for their next move. The absence of competing potential buyers means that there is less pressure to move right away - once the interested buyer is found, it is often possible to agree the sale subject to the vendor-client finding their next dream home. This in turn moves the vendor to the front of queue when the best properties in Brixworth come to the market, increasing the chances of the vendor being able to purchase their dream home when they find it.

This kind of activity is one of the reasons why Brixworth continues to be a strong property market and why people continue to want to move to Brixworth. – Simon Bond



They are raising money for The Stroke Association and Northampton General Hospital's Gosset Ward Special Care Baby Unit.

"It's such a terrible shame. Linz was such a wonderful person that

lit up a room and had a presence that touched all that met her. She is sadly missed, no more so than by her fantastic children Lilly and Tom," says Stuart Little. "We are all close friends from the village. They guys were thinking about doing some

events and I suggested we did it in memory of Lindsay."

The donation towards the Special Care Baby Unit will help fund a high specification ultrasound machine which will help the hospital better assess and care for the – on average – 25 babies born each year in Northampton with heart disease.

The machine can also help plan further medical care, not only early on in a baby's life but also right through until the late teenage years.

While the hospital has an ultrasound machine, it is not the most sophisticated model on the market. The unit the hospital would like to buy costs £72,000. In March, the hospital was £17,000 short of that sum. The Brixworth fundraisers hope to give the hospital a real boost towards their goal.

Stuart says: "Our initial target was for £1000! But the generosity of people has been amazing many from the village so this has been smashed. Hopefully the Wolf Run in June will help us raise more and we may try and do something else before the end of the year."

The Wolf Run will take place on Saturday 13th June at Stanford Hall Leicestershire, and the fundraisers hope to have a fun afternoon with BBQ, bouncy castle, face painting etc at The George afterwards.



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Thomas Tresham's Treasures

Not a day passes but we are made uncomfortably aware of the prevalence and dangers of excessive religious zeal. This is not, however, only a contemprary phenomenon: one has only to read (or watch) Wolfe Hall to be reminded of how dangerous it was in Tudor times to declare oneself a Protestant or a Roman Catholic, depending on whoever was occupying the English throne at the time. Happily for us, one sixteenth century recusant left us two wonderful and

mystifying buildings, both within easy reach of Brixworth and both well worth a visit: they are Rushton Triangular Lodge and Lyveden New Bield.

Apart from their architectural charm and, in Lyveden's case, delightful setting, both buildings are adorned with Christian symbols which proclaim the passionate and self-harming commitment to Catholicism of their builder. Sir Thomas Tresham. The Tresham family (a great Northamptonshire dynasty alongside that of the Ishams of Lamport) was of Norman descent and they had a colourful history. Sir Thomas, as a result of his religious zeal, was heavily fined, lost his fortune and was imprisoned for fifteen years. His son, Francis, died in the Tower, having been one of the Gunpowder Plot conspirators.

Rushton Triangular Lodge is a small, most unusual building. It flaunts Tresham's passionate belief in the Holy Trinity which is repeatedly indicated in the

building by the number 3: it has three walls, each surmounted by three triangular pediments and each wall measuring 331/3 feet, each with three trefoil windows with triangular openings. The building has three floors and a triangular chimney. Three Latin texts, each comprising 33 letters run round the building on each façade.

There are numerous more symbols on this delightful folly, completed in 1597; the joy of a visit is to try and spot them resorting, when necessary, to the English Heritage guidebook for help.

Only 14½ miles from the Triangular Lodge is another of Sir Thomas's treasures, the large unfinished house, Lyveden New Bield. It was intended as a banqueting and hunting lodge and has a ground plan in the shape of a symmetrical Greek cross. It is set in beautiful countryside, ideal for a picnic. Money having run out, the house is as the builders left it in 1605 but visitors can still explore, inside and out, and identify the Great Hall and Great Chamber, the

kitchens and ovens and the first floor bedrooms. There was an intention to add a third floor but that remained unfulfilled and the house is, and has been since 1605, open to the sky.

As with the Triangular Lodge, the house is amply decorated with religious symbols, in this case the emblems of Christ's passion which are beautifully carved in stone panels; identifying these various icons makes the visit interesting, challenging and an excellent treasure hunt for younger members of the family.

Near the house is a beautiful miniature landscape including a small canal and a mound with a spiral walkway to the top, designed to be gently navigable by ladies with long skirts.

Having viewed these beautiful buildings and their peaceful surroundings, one can pause to reflect that not all religious zeal is of necessity harmful to others.


A visit to Lyveden can be enjoyably rounded off in the

tea-room which serves homemade treats, including soups, cakes, and cream teas.

Approximate distances in road miles are:

Brixworth to the Triangular Lodge -15; Triangular Lodge to Lyveden -15; Lyveden to Brixworth - 25, making it a round trip of 55 miles.





A Year in the Life



A year in the life of a Parish Council is similar to a Tax Year in that it does not start on the first of January. Each Council serves a four-year term between elections, which in turn is divided in four annual sections. In May each year, the Council members are elected to various posts within the Council by other Council members.

I have been elected to chair Brixworth Parish Council for the last four years. It was an entirely unexpected honour as well as a responsibility. There is no real school to learn how to be Chairman of a Council, there is no in-depth legal training and so, if elected you become engaged in a steep self- help learning experience. Clearly there is always room for improvement and lots of opportunity for error. I hope I have been able to minimise the latter and it is important, here, to acknowledge all the help I have received along the way.

There is, equally, no special qualification for Council membership. We all jump in at the deep end and wonder if we can swim – most do.

In the end, Councillors are normal people with one out-

standing difference - they believe they have an obligation to support the community in which they live and they do something about it.

Unfortunately, unselfish people who are prepared to support the community in which we live seem to be fewer and farther between these days.

Because of this I would like to take a moment to say "thank you" to all of those, who have served all of us, by committing themselves to our community as Parish Councillors. They are all unpaid for their work and yet they spend valuable time supporting the community in which we live and, yes, we all benefit from their commitment.

I will also remind you that next year – 2016 – is the year when a new Brixworth Parish Council will be elected for a new four-year term. If you think there are things that might be done, or done differently, why not take a positive approach and stand for election to the Parish Council? It could be one of the most important things you ever did!

In recent years, when elections come around, there have not been enough candidates for the 14 seats on the council and so those who did stand, and that includes me, were elected without a vote, by default, which hardly seems right in a democratic society. So I would encourage you to stand. You may not win a seat – I might not either, but at least we would both know we tried. – Mike Lacey

Planning Committee

Our main focus remains on application DA/2014/0900. This application, by Barratt Homes for outline planning permission for up to 90 homes on land to the east of Northampton Road on the southern border of their current development was supported by the Parish Council and approved by the District Council in February 2015. Both Parish and District attached the condition that the developers provide an entirely new Surgery for the village. Barratts have also agreed to provide five additional parking spaces in the car park on the Eastern side of the Library/Community Centre.

The Parish Council opposed the application to change 132 Northampton Road from a recycling shop to a hot food take away. Amongst the objections were that such a business did not fit into the Conservation Area, that its situation on a bend in the road would create traffic hazards and that noise, smell and litter would create a nuisance to neighbours.

Regrettably, Daventry District Council's Planning Committee was not convinced and approved the application.

Hot on the heels of this application came another by the same applicant, in respect of the immediately adjoining premises, 130 Northampton Road. These premises are currently used as a pet shop and the application was once again for change of user to a hot food take away. The Parish Council strongly objected, for broadly the same reasons as before. Additionally, there was an independent and obviously effective on-line campaign by residents against this application. The application for change of user was subsequently refused by Daventry District Council.

Work on the Brixworth Neighbourhood Plan continues and it is hoped that a summary of the Plan will be available for public scrutiny in June. – David Parnaby

We were able to budget some funds for this purpose and all that we need now is the inspiration of ideas.

One strong idea is to re-invigorate the roundabout at the junction of The Ashway and Northampton Road as you come into the village. To clean it up, perhaps plant some spring flowers, or longer lasting flowers. Maybe have a "Welcome to Brixworth" embellishment on the roundabout. We have

lots of options to think about - but only in regards to the roundabout.

Here is where you as residents come in.

Do you have an idea? Can you think of something that, within our budget, would make you, too, proud to show your friends when they visit you from outside the village? Why don't you tell us your idea and help us make it a reality.

There are only a few boundaries for your imagination. It should be something that benefits everyone in the village, not just one area. It needs to be manageable. By this we mean within our budget and able to be achieved by us, not an outside contractor. And it should be something that is sustainable for the years to come at a low cost.

Communication of the activities of the Parish Council has always been a challenging task, but if you don't know what we are doing, how can you tell us if we are doing it right (or wrong)? Social media provides us with a 21st century platform to engage with the village and fellow residents. This is how we can know what you would like us to do, both for you and with you.

Standing up for what you believe can make a

difference

Back in January of this year, the Parish Council received a planning application to change the status of 130 Northampton Road from A1 (a retail shop) to A5 (a take-away). Having previously received an identical application for 132 Northampton Road back in August 2014, we duly published the application for discussion at the February Planning meeting of the Parish Council.

The Parish Council has limited authority when it comes to planning matters. All we are able to do is accept or object to an application. Daventry District Council have the authority to approve or reject.

Most planning meetings are pretty straightforward, with only the occasional debate on this small matter or that small matter. They never tend to send the village into a heated debate.

February's planning meeting proved different!

Planning meetings tend to be held on a Monday evening at the Community Centre, and February was no exception. What was the exception was the volume of chatter over the preceding weekend on social media sites. It quickly became clear that the feelings within the village might mean we needed to change our meeting venue slightly as the number of village residents who indicated they would be attending the planning meeting to voice their concerns grew to a point that the small meeting room in the Community Centre would not be suitable.

After a quick resettling of rooms, we set out some additional chairs in the entrance to the Community Centre. What a good idea that turned out to be! We had close to a full attendance by Parish Councilors, all three District Councilors who represent Brixworth, and about 20 village residents. Oh and Ms. Katie Bland, the owner of the Pet Shop.

There were many excellent contributions from village residents and the mood was very clear - Does Brixworth really need two new take away shops in the conservation area? Not according the majority of people at the meeting.

The Parish Council was of similar mind and unanimously voted to object to the application. As I mentioned before, the Parish Council are not able to reject the application. This has to be the decision of Daventry District Council.

It was this point when the residents of the village decided to encourage Daventry District Council to reject the application by instigating their democratic right to petition the planning committee at Daventry to follow the example of the Brixworth Parish Council.

An online petition quickly

gained momentum, resulting in well over 500 signatures objecting to the application. Was that enough? It seems no. With support from some residents, Katie Bland commenced a written petition around the village. This written petition gained a further 420 signatures. Enough? No.

Our local MP at the time, Mr. Chris Heaton-Harris, received over 50 email-letters requesting his support to write to the planning committee at Daventry urging them to reject the application.

We even had a young pupil at Brixworth Primary School start her own petition with her classmates that resulted in attention from Northampton Chronicle.

All this local opinion and local press coverage drew attention to the application, and the planning team at Daventry took a very close look at the application. With support from Brixworth's District Councilors, they decided to reject the application on a number of regulation-related grounds.

The moral of this story is quite simple.

Public opinion matters. If you have a concern speak up about it and have your voice heard. We cannot always achieve everything we would like in life, but if we just shrug our shoulders and quietly walk away, we will always not achieve. But if you stand up for what you believe is right, you do at least have a chance, given that enough feel the same way, to be heard and give those who make our decisions an opportunity to listen.

Thank you to everyone in the village who signed the petition and supported the opinion. - Neal Brown


