

Brixworth swings into action for DIY SOS

Local volunteers have come together to build a suitable toilet and wet room for a local disabled woman.

Shelley Balding has been suffering complex health issues following a stroke, which left her with two blood clots on the brain, epilepsy, bleeding kidneys, and a severely dilated left ventricular myopathy. Despite her determination, she will never walk again.

Brixworth resident Julie Wykes had met Shelley through their mutual love of dachshunds. Shelley had offered to look after Julie's dogs while she was away, but when Julie visited Shelley to discuss arrangements, she found Shelley distraught over the conditions in her house.

"Shelley has been fighting for six years with various people to get a grant for a toilet she can get into and a wet room," Julie explains. "I said 'leave this with me' – I had to do something to help. I came up with the idea of putting it on social media as a local DIY SOS, and the response has been amazing."

Nic Haysey of Haysey Designs came up with a plan to create a wet room and an area for Shelley to relax in after seizures. Darren Wood and Jon Billson of JB Builders took on the heavy lifting, such as demolishing the walls. More help came from Conor Haldenby, Phil Lee from AMC Electrical, JML Plastering, and Jamie Yates did the plumbing. Local printer Mark Valentine provided custom T-Shirts, Julian Gaywood, Michael Warner and Sam Toseland sorted out the flooring, Luke Bryan pitched in for the painting, Marcus Mabbutt did the tiling and Jon Noble was fetching supplies. We have had amazing help from supplies from TBS for building supplies, Damian at Dodd Group for electrical supplies, Mark Huntley provided a new sink from TMT Kitchens and Bathrooms, Swoon chipped in with a bespoke chair, and Geberit UK with the toilet. Wickes, Walls and Floors, and Stone Superstore donated further materials including walls and tiles, Plumbase provided all plumbing equipment and Zumba with Charlie are donating money towards a garden shed.

Many more offered to help in other ways, such as cleaning, tidying the garden (thank you Marcus Rose!) and fundraising – a cake sale organised by Sharon Payne added £144 which will be used for soft furnishings. "I cannot thank the Brixworth community enough for making this happen and all the hard work, time and love that's been involved," Julie says. "If there is anyone I have forgotten I am sorry as we have tried to keep track of everyone and people are coming on the team every day."

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Challenge to Special Landscape changes fails

The borders of the area designated as Special Landscape to the west of Brixworth are more likely to be changed, after Daventry District Council dismissed a challenge by the Parish Council to the changes.

The changes will see an area of land running from Boughton Crossing to Maidwell stripped of its current Special Landscape Area protection, including land west of Northampton Road and Froghall.


“Areas designated as highly sensitive in the Neighbourhood Plan will still be protected but it is the loss of the additional, higher, layer of protection for some of the surrounding countryside is a cause for concern,” explains Bob Chattaway from the Neighbourhood

Plan Steering Group. The Steering Group had worked with Brixworth Parish Council and a professional planner and a landscape consultant to challenge DDC’s decision, but the Council’s planners dismissed the concerns.

“It seems strange that one side of the Brampton Brook valley will remain in the SLA while the other, the Brixworth side is omitted,” Chattaway says. The groups may use this argument to make further representations on grounds of the soundness of the Local Plan.

DDC is still consulting on the changes, with the latest consultation period closing on 5th October. There will be a public exhibition from 2 to 6.30 pm at Brixworth Library on 3rd September and similar exhibitions at Daventry Library 5th Sept 9.30 am – 6pm, Naseby Village Hall 6th Sept 3 – 7pm and Moulton Community Centre 12 Sept 2 – 6pm. – *cfw*

Co-op considers Red Lion site

Brixworth Co-op is considering relocating to the site currently occupied by the Red Lion pub. The company submitted a pre-application outlining their ideas at the July planning meeting of the Parish Council.

The Red Lion pub would be demolished to make way for a store two or three times the size of the existing one. The larger shop would stock a broader range of goods, include provision for an on-site deli, and also include space for the Post Office, which would benefit from longer opening times. Outside would be a dedicated car park with parking for around thirteen cars. The larger store would allow the Co-op to employ more staff from the village.

The Co-op’s planners answered many questions from the Parish Council and the public during their presentation. Many of the questions centred around the impact on the current shops, as the departure of both the Co-op and the Post Office would leave big vacancies that would need to be filled. Some were concerned that the move – if it goes ahead – would create a second centre for the village.

Most questions were around the issues of traffic, parking and highways – whether the number of parking spaces provided would be sufficient, whether shoppers would start parking on the road, causing issues on the High Street and increasing the risk of accidents.

A full planning application may already have been submitted by the time this issue of the Bulletin is published so do check Daventry District Council’s website for further information. – *Neal Brown & cfw*


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Allan Pope BEM

Allan Pope got a surprise when he received a letter from the Cabinet Office. "Haven't I paid my tax bill?" he wondered. He was even more surprised when he found out he had been nominated for the British Empire Medal in the Honours List for his youth work and community service in Brixworth. Pope had to keep the news under wraps, even from his own family, until the Queen's Birthday on 9th June.


Many Bulletin readers know Pope from his role as an elder at Brixworth Community Church, and as a keen member of the drama group and the Brixworth Bowls Club. However, despite his significant involvement in our local community, he actually lives in Kingsthorpe.

Pope believes the honour has been awarded for the thirty years he worked at the Northamptonshire Association of Youth Clubs (NAYC), but he left his job there over ten years ago and has only been involved in Brixworth life for the past 4-5 years. He says: "I haven't the slightest idea of who put me forward and you are not told."

The award will be presented by the Lord Lieutenant of Northamptonshire, David Laing, from whom Pope has also received a letter of congratulations, but Pope doesn't know when. He expects an invitation to a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace to follow at some point.

Pope started working at NAYC, a voluntary organization funded by trusts, fundraising and voluntary donors, as a field officer when he was invited to help set up a centre in Peterborough after helping in a church youth club. Pope then returned to fill a vacancy in Northampton, where he has spent most of his life. His work with NAYC involved visiting youth clubs across the county, helping to start new ones, and organizing training courses and competitions. He also held the role of personnel officer, responsible for recruiting volunteers, and then became deputy chief executive.

The highlights of Pope's time at NAYC included bringing the



disabled and able-bodied together for weeks away, and taking groups for adventure holidays to locations as far-flung as the Hebrides and even overseas to Iceland and Yugoslavia.

He says the ethos at NAYC was to give young people time and allow for risk-taking, and to be prepared for a hard slog. Sometimes he returned home late in the evening feeling his work had been very rewarding, at other times he wondered why he was doing it.

And while young people's interests and activities have changed – "In my day it was all ping pong and snooker" – he doesn't feel their needs have changed at all over the years. "Young people still need to feel wanted and loved." – *Jennifer Fitzgerald*

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Parish Council asked to tighten up financial oversight

External auditors looking at Brixworth Parish Council's accounts for 2016/17 have noted a breach of proper practice and asked the Parish Council to tighten up its financial oversight.

The auditor highlighted that there had been insufficient budget for the legal fees as part of the Employment Tribunal brought by Stephen Pointer that had been ongoing at the time, and that the council hadn't reallocated sufficient money from the reserves budget before the invoices were paid. In addition, some legal payments were made before they were formally approved by the Parish Council, in order to meet payment deadlines.

The audit report recommends that in future, the council monitors budgets more closely, and does not approve spending before sufficient funds are reallocated from other budget lines.

The errors occurred under a previous parish clerk and the current clerk says he has already put in place measures to ensure the auditor's recommendations are met.

Other issues raised were relatively minor and relate to a failure to reclaim VAT on some small expenditures (since rectified by setting up a direct debit card for the Parish Council) and an overspend of a few hundred pounds on the purchase of Christmas trees for the village in 2016.

The audit is part of normal practice for parish councils; Brixworth's accounts for 2016/17 were subjected to a more in-depth audit after two local electors recorded concerns over the accounts. Dealing with these questions raised the cost of the audit from around £400 to £1,394. – *Claudia Flavell-White*

Farewell Jill Barber

Jill Barber, a familiar face at the library for 17 years, will be leaving us sometime during the coming months. Although she heard this news last October, Barber does not yet know her leaving date. "I've really no idea when," she says.

Although Barber has had time to get used to the idea, she says: "It was a shock at the time. It's an odd position to be in."

Barber's role has been made redundant as part of Northamptonshire County Council's spending cuts. Management of Brixworth's library, which is currently shared by Barber and her job-share partner, Heather Williams, will pass to Sheila Jolley at Kettering.

Barber started working in the library during the half term of October 2001, a few years after the Community Centre opened. Barber feels that being part of the Community Centre makes the experience of working at Brixworth quite unique. The library staff take care to coordinate their activities with other events that take place there.

There have, of course, been a great many changes during her time. Barber says they undertake far more activities than when they started. "Our hours initially were 23 a week, now they are 44."

Working with children has become a big focus of the job and has involved a huge learning curve for Barber and her colleagues. The library experienced an uptake in visitor numbers when it took over Universal Children's Services, which includes running Rhyme Time and Play and Learn for the under-ones.

When asked about personal highlights of her time at Brixworth, Barber says: "Seeing the children come in as babies, watching them grow, then seeing their siblings, is lovely. They call us by our first names, they have such trust in us, and they tell us what they are doing." Brixworth has become a large part of her life – many people don't realise that Barber actually lives in Kingsthorpe. She said: "I feel a lot of my customers are friends, people come in and chat. I feel

part of their life and they have also supported me through tough times, not only at work but personally."

It's obvious Barber is sorry she has to leave. "I'm quite sad that I'm going but I get to spend more time with my grandson and it will be a new chapter in my life." Barber had already gone part-time last year and in future will have even more time to spend with her twenty-month old grandson, and to pursue her love of motor racing. She has been attending the Grand Prix at Silverstone for the past 36 years and her diary is full of motor events lined up at Snetterton, Brands Hatch, Rockingham and Donington.

Although she is going, Barber is reassuring that the library will be left in capable hands by a team that visitors are already used to – including Gemma, Sam, Christine, Zoe and Abby. "I'll miss my colleagues because we have a good working relationship, we get along well and have a giggle. We are a very happy team, I have loved working with them."

Indeed, Barber feels so attached to the library that, while not making any promises, she may come back to support the library as a volunteer. "I will see how I feel. I am not ruling it out," she says.

Retirement for Lee Brown as Holcot Road Garage shuts

The garage on Holcot Road shut at the start of June, and its owner, Lee Brown, went into retirement after providing tyres and general mechanical repairs to the village for 35 years.

Brown had known for several years that the land which housed his premises would be sold on to a developer. There are plans for four sizeable new homes to be built on the plot.

Brown very much enjoyed working in the business and says if the land hadn't been sold, "I would have probably carried on." Before closing, he had considered finding another unit in Brixworth to run the business from, but couldn't find anything suitable. As 90-95% of his customers were local, the difficulty in finding an appropriate alternative site in the community was also a stumbling block for passing the business on.



Brown began his career working on cars in the village with Dave Watts of Ideal Motors, who had two sites in Brixworth at one time. He moved into Holcot Road in April 1983. He built up the business, initially with contracts with a number of large companies, and at its height, the business had five employees. However, when car leasing became popular, firms tended to take contracts from main dealers and Brown shifted to offering services to local people. The business subsequently grew as Brixworth did and Brown says his customers matured alongside him.

Hanging Houghton and Lamport News

The older residents of Hanging Houghton will remember Judith Davidson who died in June. She and her husband John worked the Clint Hill Farm until it became too much for them, when they moved to a bungalow in Brixworth.

Following that, the farmhouse was refurbished and the land sold for development, leading to the creation of Manor Gardens.

John died some years later. He had been very active in the community and was chairman of the Parish Council for a good number of years while he lived in the village. Judith ran a thriving business selling the produce from her goats and chickens.

You will have no doubt noticed that the old telephone box has now been refurbished and turned into a defibrillator box. It is hoped that the training of the volunteers will soon take place so that this facility can start to be put to good use. – *Mike Philpott*

Another familiar face in the garage used to be Brown's mum, who helped out in the office and with the bookkeeping. She died a couple of years ago, and since then, Lee has been doing everything by himself.

Brown says it is too early to say what he will be doing with his new-found leisure time. He may become more involved in gardening – if his wife, Aileen, lets him! He is certain he will miss the contact and conversations with local people and would like to pass on his heartfelt thanks. The sun shines on the Country Park

Earlier on in the year it felt as though the sun would never shine, and then, suddenly the heatwave arrived and memories of the wet and chilly start melted away. The grass and meadows have been tinder dry over the summer and we would like to thank our visitors for being safe with their barbecues.

Although our picnic benches each have a stone slab next to them (to place a barbecue on) a few people still put them on table tops or straight onto the grass. As well as causing unsightly damage to the picnic benches and meadows, it could have had more severe consequences if it had set fire to the grass.

Brixworth Country Park

It is with immense pleasure that the Rangers can announce that by the time you read this the Sensory Garden renovation project should be complete. The project was made possible with funding from GrantScape and the Mick George Community Fund, as well as the hard work of our regular volunteer team, several corporate volunteer groups, a plethora of work experience students, and the ranger team, who have all been working on the project for months.

Our regular volunteer team spent many weeks with paint brushes in hand adding a splash of colour to the Sensory Garden, often in the extreme heat and with little shade. Jacob, our volunteer dog, kept an eye on everyone, inspecting their work and often getting paint on his ears, nose and tail.

The volunteers also helped with the heavier work, including building raised beds in the Food for Free area. These will be planted with vegetables whose foliage should provide a variety of textures, and our education rangers will be able to use the area with school groups.

A group from Nationwide spent a long, hot July day repairing the fence around the pond. Some of the old posts had rotted and snapped in the ground, and they did a fantastic job in the heat digging out the rotten stumps and putting in new posts. It is not an easy job on the best of days, but they were determined not to be defeated by the conditions, including the dry ground which has been as hard as concrete.

A new pond dipping platform was installed by a group from Barclaycard in August. This involved placing metal gabions next to the pond and filling them with stone, to act as a

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solid foundation for the new platform. Again, this was not an easy job, but we hope they enjoyed the team building experience.

We would like to thank everyone who has helped with the renovation project, and all our visitors for their patience during the works. We hope you all enjoy the new Sensory Garden.

Brampton Valley Way

September marks the beginning of the winter work programme for the rangers. This involves cutting back the hedgerows that have begun to encroach the paths over the summer, as well as scrub clearance and coppicing. Coppicing is an ancient management practice whereby hazel and other species can be harvested for usable timber (such as stakes and binders for hedge-laying), leaving the stumps – or stools – to regrow for future use.

Felling is another task that takes place in the autumn and winter. But you claim to love nature, why do you want to cut all the trees down? I hear you say.

We don't want to cut all the trees down, however, if a tree begins to die, or is diseased, we must make it safe for visitors at the park and along the Brampton Valley Way. If we can identify any trees in the autumn that might pose a problem later in the winter, we should be able to reduce the number of windblown trees blocking the path.

Sometimes, self-set saplings need thinning out to enable the remaining ones to flourish. Other trees can be made safe by removing some of the boughs rather than felling the entire tree. There are lots of reasons for felling trees but please rest assured we don't do it for fun, only to improve the area for wildlife and our human visitors.

The Brampton Valley Way isn't just a pleasant walking path and cycle track. A section of it is also shared with the Northampton & Lamport Railway (NLR), who run trains along their tracks between Boughton Road and Brampton Halt. The tracks currently run all the way to Merry Tom Crossing, but extensive repair work needed on some of the bridges means the trains cannot travel that far yet.

It has long been an ambition of NLR to extend the tracks all the way to the Spratton Road car park, and Northamptonshire County Council have recently agreed a lease in principle, pending the funding for this exciting and ambitious project.

The project is still very much in its infancy, and NLR have been working closely with the rangers, the Wildlife Trust and the Brixworth Local Planning Steering Group to ensure any future development work does not have a major impact on the Brampton Valley Way or the wildlife and habitats it supports.

The proposal is for the railway track to share the path in much the same way as it currently does. The footpath and cycle track will need to move to the side, which will result in an improvement in the path surfacing.

We wish to reassure people that that section of the Brampton Valley Way will absolutely not be clear felled. Some trees will have to be removed to make way for the improvement works, and this will be done in a responsible way. The rangers have already identified several trees that will have to be removed or reduced for safety reasons as part of our routine management work. Many of the trees and shrubs along the Brampton Valley Way are self-set; however, the removal of any trees will be supplemented by the planting of new species in other areas where appropriate.

Wildlife surveys will be carried out to see what species are currently using the area, and what actions we will have to take to ensure the area remains suitable for them. It will also allow us to improve the habitats and perhaps encourage more species diversity.

It will be several years before NLR are in a position to extend the track along that section between Merry Tom Crossing and Spratton Road car park, and this will enable the rangers to produce a management plan that ensures that any works undertaken are done in a sympathetic way. Reducing some of the tree cover will encourage more wild flowers to grow, especially on the eastern banks. This, in turn, will attract more butterflies and other pollinators, which will provide a food source for birds and small mammals. Overall, the proposed works

should see an improvement in the amount of wildlife along the Brampton Valley Way, which the rangers find quite exciting.

Many of you will already be well aware of Mighty Magnus' Medicine Fund, and others of you may have seen the eye catching Mighty Magnus' Medicine logo around Brixworth and the surrounding area.

For those of you who aren't familiar with Mighty Magnus, as he's become known, he is an incredibly brave six-year-old who lives in Brixworth with his family and who is currently fighting a rare childhood cancer.

Days before Christmas last year, Magnus was admitted to Northampton General Hospital with pain, and scans showed he had a large abdominal tumour. In January, Magnus was diagnosed with stage 4 neuroblastoma. Unfortunately the disease had already spread to his bones and bone marrow and he started chemotherapy the following day.

The treatment is punishing – a prolonged course of chemotherapy, radiotherapy, stem cell replacement and immunotherapy over one year, and major surgery to remove the tumour. Magnus will require constant monitoring in the years following.

Amazingly Magnus has responded as well as can be hoped to the treatment so far; an embodiment of the spirit and strength of the Viking warriors that he so loves.

The Mighty Magnus Medicine Fund was created in May to raise funds for essential treatment not offered by the NHS. At the time a vital drug required for treatment – Dinutuximab Beta – was not available and the family faced the prospect of having to fund this themselves. Thankfully the NHS has now since advised that it will fund this drug following a public campaign. This has come as a massive relief for Magnus' family and the other families who were facing months of uncertainty.

In order to give Magnus the best chance of survival and avoid the high risk of relapse, he will need access to the latest and most innovative treatments currently only available in the US and elsewhere.

The immense courage and determination shown by this remarkable little boy and his family has inspired friends, neighbours and the wider community to join together to help fund life-saving treatment for him which is currently not available in the UK.

A host of fund raising events have already been held in and around Brixworth by groups and individuals, such as the Brownies hosting a delicious bake sale, the Cubs doing a sponsored cycle around the reservoir and one Brixworth resident cycling 100 miles to raise funds. A local tradesperson is generously donating a percentage of all earnings from work he undertakes in Brixworth. The village school which Magnus, his brother and cousins all attend, has run numerous events including cinema nights, sponsored runs and a viking helmet shaped cookie sale! Great fun was had recently at a Race Night hosted at Brixworth Village Hall in conjunction with

the Rotary e-club of district 1070 which raised a staggering £2500!

Numerous local individuals, companies and community groups have, and continue to generously donate money, prizes, facilities and their time to support the campaign. So far, raising over £40,000 – and Magnus's parents Kate and Sandy are overwhelmed by the support and generosity.

Kate says: "This has been such a tough eight months since Magnus's diagnosis because his treatment has been so intensive, but we could not have got through it all without the amazing kindness and support from so many people, including complete strangers who have been so generous and taken Magnus to their hearts."

Volunteers are working hard organising more great fun events including a Family Bingo afternoon on Sunday 2nd September at Caterpillar Day Nursery in Market Harborough, a 'Swish' clothes swap on Friday



12th October in Brixworth Village Hall, Walk/Run and Fun-day, hopefully at Brixworth Country Park (date tbc) and a Black-Tie Ball and Charity Auction at the Ritz Ballroom in Desborough on Saturday 24th November.

A Sad Loss for Local Wildlife

It is with a heavy heart that I announce the death – of a tree. Not just any old tree but THE tree, the one about which I have often written before, 'my tree.' I am referring to the tree that formerly dominated my front lawn. Now I am supposed to know a bit about trees, but in truth if you were to ask me its species I would have to admit that to this day I am unsure. It was there in the garden when I moved into this house in 1991, a small nondescript looking thing that grew to about 7 metres high. With pointed oval leaves, purple in spring, its twigs were thorny, and it bore red berries in the autumn, which the birds were not overfond of. My best guess is a kind of Sorbus (Rowan).

The interest for me began about 1993 when I planted at its base a small variegated-leafed ivy, which I had grown from a cutting taken from Delapre Abbey grounds. It was a weakly little plant and it took a couple of years for it to establish, but once having done so there was no stopping it. It grew and grew both in girth and branches until it had completely smothered the tree, so that as soon as you turned into the street, there it was. In the process it became a wildlife haven. Wood pigeons and blackbirds nested in it annually, while a colony of house sparrows made it their headquarters, with numbers ranging from a dozen or so up to fifty. Starlings also used it as a winter roost and on one foggy night I watched well over a thousand of them parachuting into its welcoming shelter. All these birds were completely safe from cats because the dense ivy foliage made it unclimbable, although many a moggy tried and failed.

As well as shelter and safety the ivy provided food for a huge range of other wildlife. Its black berries ripened in spring when other food was scarce. Starlings and sparrows, pigeons and doves, and most of all blackbirds and song thrushes eagerly devoured them. One winter this food supply was commandeered by a mistle thrush,

which seemed to spend more time chasing off other birds than actually feeding. In September the flowers yielded a vital late supply of nectar to bees, butterflies, moths and hoverflies, and I have often watched blue and great tits drinking from them. The dry and warm shelter amid its leaves served as hibernating sites for comma, small tortoiseshell peacock, and brimstone butterflies.

I was delighted that from the beginning the dainty holly blue butterfly colonised the tree. This tiny insect is alone among the sixty-odd British butterflies to have two generations yearly, each of them on different food plants. In spring caterpillars feed on the buds and flowers of holly, while in autumn they feed on ivy. So when I decided that this tree had outgrown my ability to cope with it, before I called in the tree feller I needed to satisfy myself that all this wildlife had somewhere else to go. This took a while and I must say sorry to any of my neighbours who may have seen me peering intently into their hedges and gardens, etc, and wondered what I was up to.

So I still have not got used to seeing a bare space where my tree once was. In its time it made a huge contribution to my enjoyment of the local wildlife. It was my connection to the real world, away from the bruising presence of the human zoo. Shall I be planting another tree to replace it? Not for a year or two but I have a great love of our Field Maple. A well-behaved little tree that would not look out of place on my small front lawn. Or maybe a cherry for the sake of the fruit.

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Music Festival sees record turnout

This year's festival was our most ambitious yet, running from 19th to 29th April. Not only are our audiences getting larger, but we are now receiving requests from musicians throughout Great Britain who want to come and perform. The new date of the festival in Spring has proved to be most welcome for any number of logistical reasons, although April this year did turn out to be rather chilly. For this reason we are going to stage the next festival in 2019 slightly later, in the middle of May. But who can predict the caprices of the British weather...

One of the reasons for the larger attendance was the introduction of a "festival pass" – a brainwave of our publicity manager, Emily Curtis. For the grand sum of £25 it was possible to come along and enjoy concerts ranging from chamber to orchestral music, from early music to pop, from amateur to professional, with truly every age represented. Listeners were tempted to come along to concerts that they would possibly have otherwise ignored, simply by virtue of having a pass that let them come to a total of eight events.

On the 20th April the festival got off to a romping start with music from the 50's and 60's, performed by local band **Memphis Blue**. After a few problems with the amplification in the first half of the concert, all was rectified in the second half and, thanks to Rev. Chloe, the audience were allowed to dance in the church aisles.

In the afternoon of the 21st April we were treated to a complete contrast: an intimate piano recital by Russian-born local pianist, **Oksana King**. The grand piano in the Church of All Saints – nearly 100 years old! – reacted sympathetically to Oksana's interpretation of works by Bach, Benjamin Britten and Vivienne Olive. The Brixworth Music Festival has started up a **piano fund** as a new instrument is badly needed for a recital of this kind. Praise must go to Oksana King for her sensitive handling of the somewhat battle-scarred grand piano which has served the church for so many years.

In the evening of the 21st April the church was packed to hear the **Northamptonshire**



County Youth Brass Band which is the senior brass band of the Northamptonshire Music and Performing Arts Trust. It is one of the best brass bands in the country and the audience were treated to a truly unforgettable evening of music from the 20th and 21st centuries. The programme was balanced and contrasted by memorable vocal performances in each half from the two winners of the Derek Needle Vocal Fellowship Awards: Freja Leveritt and Abigail Taylor provided quieter, reflective moments with solo songs (sensitively accompanied on the piano by Beth Hodgson).

Mention should also be made of trombone soloist, Sarah Williams, with her beautiful performance of the Londonderry Air, arranged by John Iveson.

On the 22nd April, and once more to a packed church, the renowned ensemble **Fiori Musicali** took the audience on a musical journey through the life of Christ, with choral and instrumental works from the Renaissance, Baroque and 20th century. The pure vocal sound of this choir is one of the hall marks of Fiori Musicali, as is their attention to authenticity. Baroque violinist Kerstin Linder-Dewan provided a virtuosic instrumental contrast, with both solo works and together with harpsichord accompaniment provided by conductor and director, Penelope Rapson.

A regular feature at each Brixworth Music

Festival is the **Evening of Poetry and Song** which showcases the varying musical talents of musicians and composers living in the area. As it was Shakespeare's birthday week on the 25th April this was taken on as an idea that ran through the whole evening, which was subtitled *If music be the food of love...* The John Clare Wind Quintet, singers and actors Kay Soteriou and David Saint, singers Gwion Thomas, Chloe Willson-Thomas, Siân Thomas, Juliet Lawson, pianists Oksana King and Richard Heyes, and composers Stuart Cooper and Vivienne Olive all came together to entertain the audience to a varied programme, which actually sported quite a lot of contemporary music as well. Highlight of the evening was a memorable performance of the prize-winning work of the First Brixworth Music Festival Competition for Women Composers. Gwion Thomas and the John Clare Wind Quintet gave a stunning performance of Australian composer Karen Lemon's *The Truth*, the *Post Truth* and *Nothing of the Truth*. Judith Weir (*Master of the Queen's Music*) was head of the jury and confirmed this as the winning piece out of a pre-selected short list.

The last weekend of the festival began on Friday, 27th April with an exquisite concert by the **Tedesca String Quartet**. This is the resident quartet of the Midland Sinfonia whose fine playing makes them very much in demand throughout the country. The Brixworth Music Festival was delighted



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to be able to invite them for the second year running. The programme included Haydn's String Quartet in d minor, op 42 and Schubert's Quartet in a minor, the so-called Rosamunde Quartet. But of particular interest was the rarely performed work by Gerald Finzi, *By Footpath and Stile*. Gwion Thomas not only introduced the song cycle but gave a perfect rendering of the work that captured every nuance of both poetry and music – a truly unforgettable performance.

With such rich pickings it is difficult to choose a concert that stood out from all the rest. But with the newly formed **Brixworth Festival Orchestra** (pictured, left), under the baton of Peter Dunkley, all expectations were more than fulfilled. The church was packed on the 28th April and the audience were treated to an exciting concert of works by Mozart and Beethoven. Having been catapulted into the evening's programme by a furious rendering of Mozart's Overture to *The Marriage of Figaro*, the audience were then treated to Mozart's Concerto for Harp and Flute. Here the orchestra showed they could not only be fast and furious but also lyrical and sensitive when working together with soloists. Graham Tear's flute playing was not only virtuosic but almost transcendent in its beauty, both blending and contrasting with the ravishing playing of harpist, Rowena Bass.

After the interval the orchestra brought the concert to a climax with an impressive performance of Beethoven's 7th Symphony. Beethoven himself regarded this work as one of his best, and he would certainly have enjoyed listening to the Brixworth Festival Orchestra on this Saturday night. The slow second movement – which is a set of variations that uses two themes – is probably the most well known movement of the symphony, but it is the last movement that is famous for its unbounded energy. With their boisterous performance both orchestra and conductor took the audience with them on an exhilarating joyride that left everyone smiling.

The 29th April brought the Brixworth Music Festival to a quieter more meditative close.

After the morning service there was a short concert that involved three different Brixworth choirs which brought together various age groups of the community. The church was full of people who had come to hear the various voices of the **Brixworth U3A** (a regular and much-loved participant), the Singing Saints,



and the **Choir of Brixworth Primary School**. From one generation to another, the baton was passed from the younger to the older and then again to the younger members of the community. First of all we heard four singers from **The Singing Saints**, which is a small choir run by the Rev. Chloe Willson-Thomas and James Bonsor (Holcot). The singing of the four girls was delightful.

The concert was then brought to a close by the larger choir of the Brixworth Primary School. In the capable hands of their teacher and conductor, Sharon Marsh, this choir of enthusiastic children gave the audience much enjoyment with their polished performance. All of them were very attentive and obviously loved what they were doing. It was good to

see so many in the church, being part of a festival that is meant for all.

In the evening the final concert of the Brixworth Music Festival was preceded by a Festal Evensong, with the **All Saints Church Choir** in the capable hands of organist and choirmaster, Robert Wakefield. This was then followed by a delightful recital of early music, performed by the Early Music Ensemble (pictured, left), which once more took up the Shakespeare theme.

Viola da gamba player **Sarah Small** performed at the very first Brixworth Music Festival in 2014 and the festival organizers were delighted to have discovered such a special talent who actually came from Brixworth. Meanwhile Sarah has embarked on an international career and this last concert, with her newly-founded ensemble, brought the Brixworth Music Festival to a fitting close.

Without the support of the audience, the hard-working committee, the committed performers and volunteers, and especially our sponsors, the Northamptonshire Community Foundation and Daventry DC, as well as many private sponsors, this all would not have been possible. A heart-felt thank you to you all!

When I won him for wearing so much hi-vis that they said I looked like a lollipop man, it was a bit embarrassing explaining why I had a toy cockerel perched on my desk but it's a great talking point!" Simon enthused.

Which isn't to say that they don't take the sport seriously; in July they raised more than four thousand pounds for Meningitis Now by cycling 200 miles in two days in memory of Jonty, son of Velo member Paul Jarvis, who died of the disease back in 2005 aged just six.

Later this month, they'll be back in their saddles for Cycle4Cynthia, the fundraiser for Northampton's Cynthia Spencer Hospice, where they hope to pedal off with the trophy for the biggest team. "Now that would be something to crow about!" he enthused.

Cycle4Cynthia 2018, which is generously supported by headline sponsor EMW Law LLP among other businesses, will take place on Sunday 23rd September at Althorp, offering 5, 25 and 50 mile routes.

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

African Delight for the Roundabout



Another of the Parish Council's projects to make Brixworth a more pleasant place to live in is the planting of the roundabout at the entrance to The Ashway. In previous years the Parish Council had received many complaints about the appearance of this roundabout, so it resolved to address the issue by planting up African Daisies – a plant that enjoys poor soil, exposed conditions and provides colour throughout the year. A quick annual maintenance is all that is required to transform this once dilapidated roundabout.

Temporary reprieve for Number 60 Bus

Daventry District Council (DDC) has stepped in to rescue an important rural bus route which was set to come to an end this summer following the removal of its subsidy.

The District Council has agreed to pay a subsidy to keep the number 60 service from Northampton to Welford going up to the end of March 2019.

The number 60 service carries more than 28,000 passengers per year from a number of Daventry District villages including Welford, Naseby, Cold Ashby, Thornby, Guilsborough, Hollowell, Creaton, Spratton, The Bramptons and Brixworth, into Northampton.

This service was due to cease in July after Northamptonshire County Council decided to remove support for bus services county-wide as part of budget savings.

DDC's temporary funding for the bus service will allow the 60 to continue – on a slightly reduced timetable – until the end of the current financial year.

Memorial bench to create a lasting legacy

A memorial bench to mark 100 years since the end of the First World War is to be installed within the Brixworth Millennium Gardens. The steel bench will feature a design with images of soldiers, crosses and poppies.

The bench is part of a wider scheme across Daventry District this year to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the end of the First World War. Many of the organised events and activities across the district will take place within the three or so months leading up to November 11, echoing the Hundred Days Offensive – the Allies' final push along the Western Front which finally broke the military stalemate.

Defibrillator for The Ashway

The village now has a new defibrillator in place thanks to some great partnership working between the Brixworth Juniors Football Club and the Parish Council. The new defibrillator is now in place at The Ashway Changing Rooms and is now all available for use.



The project has been jointly funded by Brixworth Parish Council and Brixworth Juniors with the initiative being kicked off by the Football Association. The FA had joined up with the British Heart Foundation to call on grassroots football clubs to help save more lives from cardiac arrests by installing life-saving defibrillators.

Stephen James said 'Defibrillators can be the difference between life and death, which is why the Parish Council was happy to grant aid this vital piece of equipment and have it nearby in case of an emergency.'

Planning Matters

The applications dealt with by the Committee over the past few months have consisted to a greater extent of the usual things, such as extensions and work to trees in the Conservation Area. However, there have been some major applications (and pre-applications) which have generated plenty of interest within the village. One of these is the proposal to develop the land to the west of Mercedes for commercial purposes. The Parish Council has objected to this on the grounds that it contravenes policies in the Brixworth Neighbourhood Plan, Daventry Local Plan and West Northamptonshire Core Strategy. There is also concern about an

Daventry District Council has introduced a new mobile app to help people get to grips with the new waste and recycling collection service which was recently introduced within Brixworth.

The app allows people to set up reminders which bins to put out and features handy guides showing what can be put in each bin.

The Daventry District Council app is available from Apple's App Store and the Google Play Store. It also shows the latest news from DDC as well as information about local facilities, shops, bars and restaurants.

Almost 3,000 people across Daventry have already downloaded the app since its launch when Daventry District switched to the new 1-2-3+ collection service.

increase in traffic and the environmental impact associated with this proposal, especially as the development would be outside the confines of the village.

Another proposal – which at the time of writing was only at the pre-app stage – concerns the possible re-location of the Co-op supermarket to the site of the former Red Lion pub which is now closed and vacant. The intention is to provide a larger supermarket with more than double to floor area of the existing one. This would result in the pub being demolished and replaced with a purpose-built new building.







I was overjoyed some months back to hear the Thai football team and their coach had finally been rescued. It was something that many around the world prayed for. The rescue raised a familiar question - Why is it that God answers some prayers but appears slow to respond to others? It is an age-old mystery that leaves us simply having to trust that God knows best.

Romans chapter 11 verse 33 says, "O, the depth of the riches of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable His judgments, and untraceable His ways!"

And he replied: "Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way." So I went forth, and finding the Hand of God, trod gladly into the night.

And He led me towards the hills and the breaking of day (in the lone East).

Brixworth Cricket Club v Help for Heroes

On a beautiful warm English summers day in July, Brixworth was treated to a fabulous day of cricket and family fun. The Brixworth Cricket Club played host to the Help for Heroes Cricket Club in a two-match fund raising event in support of the Help for Heroes Charity. During the ten years that the charity has been in existence, over 340 million has been raised and over 17,000 individuals and families have been helped. Offering this support to thousands more who need it remains possible due to fundraising events like this.

The Help for Heroes Team members are all recovering veterans who have benefited from the support of one of the four recovery centres in the UK funded by the charity. Cricket is part of the wider recovery program which helps the wounded, injured and sick look beyond illness and injury, regain their purpose and reach their full potential. The Help for Heroes cricket club was formed in 2013 with their inaugural game against Northamptonshire County Cricket Club disability team at the County Ground in Northampton.

The two T20 matches in Brixworth proved to be exciting and competitive. Help for Heroes took the first game, with H4H reaching 162 for 3, beating Brixworth's 136 for 7 by 26 runs. Brixworth came back to take the second match with 189 for 4, beating H4H's 129 for 8 by 60 runs. It would seem that Devon Malcolm has lost none of his pace as he

bowled a wicket maiden over.

The H4H team proved to be no easy opponents, with some competitive batting and bowling. Wickets fell and 50s were scored. The teams received generous and deserved applause after the matches and Devon Malcolm and Staff Sargent Shaun Yeomans presented commemorative medals.

One of the highlights of the day was a flypast by a Hurricane aircraft from the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight which made three passes over the cricket ground.

A petting farm, face painting, Help for Heroes merchandise stall, raffle and children's games were just some of the attractions on offer. There was also a local artist who painted the neighbouring poppy field.
