Pytchley Court Nursing home rated 'inadequate'

One of the care homes in Brixworth has been rated "inadequate" by the Care Quality Commission. Pytchley Court Nursing Home has been in breach of regulations since 2016.

The home has been deemed unsafe mainly for a list of shortcomings in clinical care. These have included inadequate systems in place to assess the physical health of the home's up to 40 residents; staff not always recognising when people were unwell; a failure to undertake proper clinical observations; and individuals not having been referred for medical assistance in a timely way, even after falls. Proper care plans have not been in place and medicines have not always been administered as they should.

The Commission has also criticised a lack of leadership. The home was without a registered manager for one year and was led by four different managers in recent years. A reliance on agency staff has meant that staff did not know the residents and were unable to follow required processes. The last manager has since left the organisation.

A spokesperson for HC-One, the company that runs Pytchley Court, said: "The health and wellbeing of residents is always our number one priority, and we take all feedback from the CQC seriously.

"Following the inspection in September, we quickly put in place a comprehensive action plan to address the feedback we received. A dedicated turnaround manager has been appointed, who is working alongside the senior regional team to support home staff to make sure improvements are made and maintained.



"We are pleased that a recent Local Authority review provided us with very positive feedback on the quality of care being provided, and the priority now is to demonstrate that these improvements are embedded and sustained over the long term.



"We continue to work closely with the relevant

authorities, and we are confident we will have made significant positive progress by our next inspection."

New Saxon Spires surgery opens after lengthy delay

The new doctors surgery in Brixworth opened at the start of February, some eight months later than initially expected.

The move had suffered lengthy delays over difficulties in getting internet installed, which these days is an absolute must for surgeries. "Resolving this issue proved to be more complex than expected, due to the number of different agencies involved in the provision of primary care IT services," practice manager Claire Deare told the Bulletin. "We had to explore a number of options to ensure we were able to have all systems working fully.

A boost for the Neighbourhood Watch

Brixworth Parish Council will help the Neighbourhood Watch (NHW) by replacing old and broken signs around the village and add a few more. "We want to help NHW increase their profile as a deterrent to criminals operating in the village. It is only one of the things villagers can do to prevent crime on their properties and in their neighbourhoods, but it is a very visible one," said Bob Campbell, new NHW member and Parish Councillor.

The plan is to put new signs up on the five roads leading into the village and highlight that NHW is active in the area. More signs will be added on major junctions in the village.

The NHW is run by volunteers and covers over 8 million households around the UK. It's a charity and its members play a vital role in helping the police along with local authorities,

Spring term topics

At Brixworth Primary School we aim to provide the children with a broad and balanced curriculum. Every term each phase chooses a new topic to explore. This term we have lots of amazing learning opportunities and experiences planned for our children and we have transformed our learning environments to inspire and motivate the children in their learning.

In Foundation stage the children began their topic of "Amazing Animals" by finding three huge, mysterious eggs laid in a gigantic nest in the outside classroom. This led to lots of discussion about how they may have got there and what might hatch from them. Later in the term, we will be having a visit from Bugtopia allowing us to observe animals at close proximity. We will finish our topic with a trip to a farm where we hope to see some newborn animals. map and compass skills. To end this unit of learning, the children will put an exhibition together where their learning from art, music, dance and science will be shared with parents.

This term year 5 and 6 will be studying The Tudors. Their Wow Start included a 'Tudor Quest' that involved the children finding clues hidden around

the school to help them discover their class Tudor. During the first morning back, the children made Tudor houses and decorated their classrooms. After February half term, we

are having a Tudor visitor come into school for our Marvellous Middle. Our Fabulous Finish Is going to be an exhibition of all the children's work that has been produced throughout the term.

Play Galleon

Recent visitors to the school could not have failed to notice the amazing wooden galleon that has sailed onto the playground. The ship (*pictured, left*), which was generously funded by the PTA, has

become very popular with the children and has been enjoyed in PE lessons and during lunchtimes and playtimes.

Notivate

The Notivate Singer/ Songwriter Programme is a creative music course for children aged 9 – 13 years, in which they write and record their own songs. The programme enables children to express themselves, explore their feelings and perhaps try something for the first time. It offers children the chance to feel better about themselves and is about music, but is more about "me".

"Some of our Year 6 children were fortunate to experience Notivate where they had a chance to write,



rehearse and record their own songs," said Mrs Marsh, their teacher. "They had an amazing day at The Stables in Milton Keynes and I am confident they will have made many memories they will treasure for a long time."

The children said they had a brilliant time. Luke from Year 6 said: "We got our own dressing room, recording studio and sound room. We also had to sing our song twice. It was really challenging but worth it in my opinion because you have to sing the song solo."

Community Club

The school is fortunate to have a committed, hardworking staff who provide a diverse range of lunchtime and afterschool clubs. The newest club is the year 2 community club. The children have been visiting a group of residents at Boniface House to join them in a range of activities (*pictured, below*). The children and residents have mutually benefitted from this shared experience and have created many new and lasting friendships.





In Years 1 and 2 the children started their topic of "Polar Adventures" when suddenly their lesson was interrupted by a lost explorer. The explorer told the children about the polar regions. It was brought to the children's attention that the explorer was finding it difficult to make an igloo due to global warming. The explorer set the children a challenge of making igloos out of other materials. Back in class the children worked as teams to try and help the explorer solve his problem.

In Years 3 and 4 the children began their new topic of Super Heroes with an actionpacked day. Firstly, the teachers dressed as super heroes and performed a comic for all the children. Children then had a go at writing their own comic. In the afternoon, the children were visited by some real-life super heroes- an army officer, two RAF officers, a firefighter and a midwife. Through the topic, which focusses on geography skills and knowledge of America, the children will be visiting Brixworth Country Park to develop

Brampton Valley Way to be diverted during bridge works

Users of the Brampton Valley Way will need to take a short diversion for a few weeks around June while Bridge 11, between the Windhover pub and Chapel Brampton station, is being repaired.

The bridge will be closed for up to six weeks starting on 3rd June while a new concrete deck is put in at the top of the bridge. The bridge was built in 1879, and whilst well built to the standards at that time, over the last 140 years water has made its way into the brick and damaged it. The concrete deck will prevent this in future and stop further deterioration, allowing engineers to tackle the damage caused.

The works will involve removing the existing railway line from the bridge and excavating the railway ballast and Brampton Valley Way footpath down to the brickwork of the arches as well as down to the piers to expose the original drains. For this to work, this has to be done across the complete width of the structure. It will take two weeks to cast the concrete, which is then coated in sealant and backfilled. After that, the team will put in drainage to funnel water away from the brick structure in future. Only after all this is done can the footpath across the bridge be reinstated, fencing and track put back, and any delaminated brickwork under the bridge repaired to ensure that it retains its load bearing capacity.

The Brampton Valley Way will be diverted locally, taking a few steps down into the valley to bypass the bridge and up again the other side. Cyclists and anyone pushing prams and the like should take note, it is expected that the diversion will involve some steps.

The work is part of Northampton and Lamport Railways' southern extension project, which will eventually see the railway run all the way to Boughton and a new station platform there. NLR volunteers, working with students from Moulton and Northampton College, have already made a promising start to the new station and the first 25 meter section is well underway (see photo). However, with over 200m left to build, there's still a long way to go!

In order to complete the project, the team needs another $\pounds 18,000$ and NLR is appealing for donations to help achieve this. On top of that, the team would love new volunteers, especially anyone with bricklaying experience. If anyone can help, even just for one day, please do get in touch. As an incentive, NLR is offering all new volunteers who help out on the extension a free family ticket to travel

on the railway, as well as a year's free membership to the Northampton and Lamport CIO.

Elsewhere on the Railway, cladding of the new engine shed is progressing well. This should be finished by the time you

receive this issue of the Bulletin.

Magnus can only manage limited time in the classroom thus the device will be an amazing bridge to all that he is missing.

Magnus' immunotherapy treatment initially didn't go as smoothly as hoped and he had a couple of prolonged hospital stays. He has also had further surgery to assist his nutritional intake and had a device fitted to allow him to be fed straight into his bowel. However, fortunately his health is now slowly improving, and he had a lovely few days away at the end of 2018.

Magnus will finish his frontline treatment in May, after which the family plan to travel to the USA to enrol Magnus in a medical trial which they hope will prevent a relapse. This is paid for by the funds that have been raised. These trials are showing some preliminary promising results but much more research and funding is required to improve the treatments for this rare, but devastating childhood illness.

The Dixon family would once again like to thank everyone in the local community and beyond who have displayed such support over the past year and would like to encourage everyone to continue to do so. Magnus' stoicism and resolve in enduring his illness and treatment and the kindness and generosity of so many individuals helps their ongoing resolve to support Magnus to overcome this dreadful illness. Along with works by Mozart and Schumann, they will be performing the winning work of the 2nd Brixworth Competition for Women Composers. Solo pianist, Charles Matthews, will be performing on our brand new piano, donated to the Brixworth Music Festival by someone who prefers to remain anonymous, but who believes whole-heartedly in what we do.

The "official welcome" to this splendid new piano in its new home in the Church of All Saints will take place in the afternoon of the 18th May, when Brixworth pianist, Oksana King, will be giving a piano recital.

For those of you who are interested in the history of the area there will be a performance of "Caroline Chisholm – Scenes from her Life". This is a chamber opera written by joint director of the festival, Vivienne Olive, together with librettist, author and broadcaster, David Saint. David will be performing together with Kay Soteriou, Gwion Thomas, and the German accordion ensemble, "timeless d-accord".

If you enjoy choral music then you will

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be able to hear not only the Northampton Male Voice Choir and Fiori Musicali, but also the Northamptonshire Community Choir. This choir will be performing together with the John Clare Wind Ouintet which was established during the very first year of the Brixworth Music Festival. On a lighter level the Northampton Musical Theatre Company will be entertaining you to an evening of "Songs from the Shows".

In our regular feature each year, "An Evening of

Poetry and Song", Gwion Thomas and Chloe Willson-Thomas will be joining the Northamptonshire group, "Wordplay". This is always a much loved event and involves local musicians, actors and singers. Also emphasising the community aspect of our festival will be the free lunchtime concert on the last Sunday of the Festival, after the morning service. Here you will be able to hear the Brixworth U3A Songsters, the Brixworth Flute Group, the Singing Saints, and the Brixworth Primary School Choir.

Caroline Chisholm – the emigrant's

friend

Caroline Chisholm had fascinated me for many years and in 1999 I wrote the book and lyrics for a musical based on her life. I was fortunate in securing the services of award-winning composer Vivienne Olive who provided a beautiful score for the songs. We premiered it in Northampton and then took it to Australia with great success. Since then it has been translated and performed twice in Germany, first in the Opera House in Lübeck and last year in Nuremberg. It is due to be performed again on the 16th of May as part of the 2019 Brixworth Music Festival.

Born in 1808 in Mayorhold in the centre of Northampton, Caroline Jones married a Catholic Scottish soldier called Archibald Chisholm in Holy Sepulchre, her parish church.

Archie returned to duty in Madras in 1833; Caroline followed about 18 months later. She started a school for the children of ordinary soldiers and also what can rightly be called the

world's first day crèche.

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They decided to go to Australia and settled in Sydney where Caroline saw the treatment given to immigrant girls who travelled from England on the promise of a new life. Before too long she set up a home for them.

She clocked up many major achievements. She worked on behalf of the convicts, both male and female and helped many to stay in Australia, to find work and she enabled their families to come and join them.

She lobbied Parliament in London to re-design emigrant ships to have more light, space, proper rations, hygiene, special conditions for children and so on.

She was one of the first people to draw attention to the plight of the Indigenous Australians who had been denied their land rights. She had the law changed to enable immigrants to buy land and to build homes.

She was the first woman in Australia to publish a book.

She opened supply stores for gold prospectors and set up many "Chisholm's Shakedowns", very large, well-equipped equivalent of modern 'motels', and she divined water where, later, settlements grew.

The Catholic Church has begun the inquiry into her life as a preparation for possible canonisation. She is already commemorated in the Church of England's Calendar of Saints on 16 May. She was on the \$5 note, the first woman other than the monarch. There are schools and societies named after her all over Australia and, now, a school bearing her name here in Wootton. Florence Nightingale called herself Caroline's friend and disciple.

Charles Dickens was so impressed by her work that he was inspired to create Magwich the convict in 'Great Expectations', he also sent the Peggottys and the Micawbers to Australia at the end of 'David Copperfield'. He even based his 'Bleak House' character, Mrs Jellyby, on Caroline.

She returned to England to lobby parliament and died on March 25th 1877, Archibald died in August that year. Her funeral was at Northampton Cathedral on Saturday 31st March 1877.

Caroline and Archibald are buried in Billing Road Cemetery, Northampton. - David Saint

Chris Heaton-Harris MP's Westminster Report

Policing and crime prevention

Recently Brixworth has seen a spike in criminal activity, some of it very serious indeed.

I know there is a growing level of concern about this - and quite rightly so. I see this reflected in the e-mails I receive from you telling me about it, reading posts on various social media sites and when I talk with local residents.

Living just down the road in Pitsford, I can promise you these concerns are not exclusive to your village either. I think many of us were relieved to hear, back in November 2018, that a local male was arrested in connection to local rural based crime in our area.

Alas, because of various Brexit-related parliamentary activities, I was unable to attend the Brixworth Crime Prevention Evening held on the 22nd January. I know it was really well-attended and that many residents were able to talk about their concerns directly to those who look after policing locally.

As well as you letting the police know about your concerns, I am going to meet the Northamptonshire Police & Crime Commissioner in February to go over the concerns people have expressed to me and what can be done to allay people's concerns.

As you might expect, I keep a close eye on police and policefunding issues.

Currently, there are two excellent PCSOs that cover the Brixworth area and are stationed in the village. I know some of you feel that this is not enough; however, the nature of policing and the pressures on police time are changing rapidly and to be frank, I'd be surprised if this level of policing changed massively anytime soon.

This is also a subject I've raised with fellow Ministers nationally - as have, I believe, all the other MPs from our county.

Volunteers needed for Spring Speed Watch

Organisers of the annual Community Speed Watch would love to expand the programme and run it twice a year - in spring as well as autumn. However to make that happen, it will need more volunteers.

Whether or not the spring Speed Watch will happen in 2019 will go ahead depends on whether enough volunteers put themselves forward in time for the next training course, which organisers hope will take place at Caroline Chisholm School in Northampton in late March or early April.

If you cannot make that date but would still like to help out, the team for the autumn watch would also be grateful for the support. This year's autumn speed watch will take place over six weeks starting mid-September. Brixworth will be joining forces with the village of Old, so it will be a joint team covering both villages in alternate weeks.

This year the amount of funding available to Police & Crime Commissioners will go up by £800m - if they use their precept flexibility fully.

Locally, the total budget managed by Stephen Mold, our Police and Crime Commissioner, has risen a great deal over the past year and now stands at £5,227,000.

However, you should note these increases might not mean you see more police on the street locally; even with the recent spike in crime we do still live in a relatively low crime area - and long may that continue.



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As an estate agent, the question I always get asked by people wanting to move is 'How long do you think it will take to find a buyer?'

The answer, if a property is correctly priced, is normally not that long. However you don't pay a good estate agent just to find you a buyer, you pay them to get the transaction through.

Over the last decade, the conveyancing process has become more complex and time consuming, culminating in transaction times of up to 16 weeks. Forward-thinking estate agents have begun employing sales chasing staff who are trained to liaise between vendors, purchasers, solicitors, lenders and other agents in the chain. As important though is helping clients understand the process in order to avoid the frustrations often associated with moving home. I thought I would use this month's edition of the Brixworth Bulletin to summarise the sales process. I hope it gives you a better understanding of all that is involved.

Once you've selected your conveyancer there's a period of requesting and gathering info on your property. You will be asked to fill out and return the following forms:

- Property Information form (TA6): this is a general questionnaire and includes information on boundaries, disputes and known proposed developments (like motorways or railways), building works, council tax, utilities, sewerage, contact details.
- Fttings and Contents form (TA10): provides details of which fittings and fixtures you would like to include with the property.



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- Completion Information and Undertakings (TA13): is more technical, but also includes finalisation details including arrangements to hand over the keys, how and where you will complete, and ensuring that the house is free of all mortgages and liability claims.
- Seller's Leasehold Information Form (if your property is leasehold).

Get ahead, if you can, by having these forms ready to go as soon as you decide to sell.

Now the hard work really begins. Your solicitor or conveyancer will draw up a contract that outlines all the details of your property and sale (known as the 'contract pack'). It will include information on the sale price, the property boundaries, which fixtures and fittings are included, legal restrictions or rights, like public footpaths or rules about using the property, any planning restrictions, services to the property, like drainage and gas, and when the sale will complete.

Once you have accepted an offer on your property a conveyancer can spring into action and accommodate your buyers' conveyancers request for the contract pack. The buyers' conveyancer will review the contract pack and start conducting searches. They may have some questions for the sellers' conveyancer about items in the contract pack, known as enquiries. Once these have been answered they will need funds, either from a mortgage source or cash from a bank. They are now ready to procced to an exchange of contracts.

Exchange of contracts is where the contract is signed and you establish a legally binding commitment with your buyer. Normally 10% of the property price will be asked for at this stage and you could forfeit this money if you then pull out of the deal. Any deeds are now transferred to your conveyancer alongside a rundown of any charges such as your conveyancer's fee, any outstanding loans or mortgage amounts to settle and any estate agent fees.

The completion date is now set in stone now so you can get busy with packing and start things moving! – *Stuart Little and Adam Wellesley*

Does your home insurance really cover you?

Home insurance is big business. If you have a mortgage on your property, it will be a term of that mortgage that you have sufficient buildings insurance cover in place. Even if there is no mortgage on the property you will be well advised to keep your property fully insured up to its rebuild value and to check the policy you take out, properly covers your situation.

You are insuring your most expensive possession against damage but how often are you reading and reviewing the policy to ensure it provides adequate cover?

Providing insurance is a business and naturally the more claims that a provider can exclude or reject the better the provider's profit margins. I will not be so cynical as to say insurance providers try to catch you out when offering you a policy, but if you fail to provide accurate information you can very quickly find yourself without cover. For example, most insurance policies will exclude any damage caused during the course of construction or building works. This means that if a fire breaks out whilst construction works are ongoing, it is likely that your insurer will not cover you for the damaged caused.

Other common reasons for rejecting a claim include:

- Where a property is unoccupied for over 28 consecutive days (a real problem with rental properties and holiday lets).
- Accidental damage and damage caused by pets.
- Failure to disclose that a lodger is residing at the property

The law in this area has recently changed and generally insurance companies are not now allowed to reject insurance claims on the basis that incorrect information was provided if the incorrect information is entirely unrelated to the claim.

There are numerous home insurance comparison sites and obtaining insurance is not only simple but also relatively cheap. My advice to you is read the policy exclusions and if the cover does not fit your circumstances speak to the provider and obtain a bespoke policy.

What does a funeral celebrant do?

My name is Sheenagh Cross. I have lived in Brixworth for 40 years and worked in and around the village over those years. After taking redundancy I felt I still had plenty to give and wanted to carry on working – it was just a case of finding the right job to do.

My jobs have always involved people. I very much enjoy being able to help people and I will always give my all to whatever job I am doing. It took me a while to find the right thing, but after a lot of research I undertook my training to become an Independent Civil Funeral Celebrant. I do not belong to any religious or humanist organisation.

Some of you may understand this role and others may not, so please allow me to explain, very simply, what this job title means.

When a person dies there is usually a service or ceremony held to say farewell to



them. My role is to lead this service or ceremony in whatever way the family asks for, or, if the person has left instructions themselves, then to carry out their wishes. This can either be religious or non-religious or indeed a mix of the two. I am able to practice in crematoria, green spaces or chapels, but not churches. I will meet with the family as soon as possible to take their instructions and to learn about the person themselves. Each person is unique so each service or ceremony is unique too, there will never be two identical ceremonies. This is achieved by my listening to families and gaining an understanding of the person and creating that special occasion to both say goodbye and to celebrate their life.

DIY SOS Update

As many of you already know, many in Brixworth have been contributing to a DIY SOS for Shelley Balding, 47, with the goal of making her home more suitable for her health needs.

Seven years ago, Shelley suffered a stroke, which left her unable to walk and fully dependent on her family – a huge change to her previous active and athletic life.

Escalating health issues have left Shelley extremely poorly and with a limited quality of life - Shelley describes life as a goldfish bowl from which she is unable to participate. Loneliness, isolation and poverty are everyday realities.

A chance encounter last summer with fellow dog lover Julie Wykes led to the DIY SOS, which the Bulletin reported on at the time.

Since its start in the summer, the work has been going on at pace. The core team of Julie, interior designer Nichola Haysey, Jon Bilson of JB Building Services, local plumber Conor Haldenby and local builder Darren Wood drew up plans, raised money, organised volunteers and marshalled supplies. The mission was to create new wetroom, remove a narrow corridor and set up a new sitting area so that Shelley had a space to use when she couldn't use the stairlift to get upstairs and to eliminate any narrow spaces so that she can easily access her new wetroom.

Six months on, the work is very nearly finished. It has entailed a huge amount of work – tiling, plastering, electrics, flooring, plenty new fixtures and

fitting to install and so on. We had huge support from everywhere – tradespeople from far and wide donated their time, often at next to no notice, building supplies and specialist shops gave us goods, fundraisers helped us raise cash for the bits we could not get donated, couriers picked everything up – the list is long and I am sorry if there's anyone who isn't mentioned. Your help is hugely appreciated.

Thank you very much to everyone – in no particular order: Towcester Building Supplies (TBS), Wickes in Northampton, Dodd Group Electricals, Stonesuperstore, Walls and Floors in Kettering, Plumbase on Gladstone Road, Bells in Kingsthorpe, Jimmy Garrod and Plumbco, Jon Noble of JPN Distribution, Route1Express, Topps Tiles, ADS Heating Solutions, First Choice Lighting, Paul Driver at Jewsons, Jamie from JML Plastering, Richard King of R.King Plastering in Towcester, Paul Schofield of Unique Exteriors, not to forget JPP Surveyors in Brixworth and Daventry Building Control, who've been with us throughout this project. Then there was Phil Lee from AMC Electrical, Geberit, Kingsthorpe Karpets, Luke Bryans of LB Contracts, Johnstones, Kurtis Walsh of ASK Tiling, Marcus Mabbutt of MCM Ceramics, Jason Campbell and Adam Mace.

Whilst all of this was going on, Julie Wykes and Sharon Payne were fundraising in the village, baking so many cakes, carrying out sales on their front lawns and supporting the teams coming in and out of the Shelley's home.

Unfortunately, during this project, poor Shelley and her family have had to put up with a lot of noise, comings and goings, building dust and disruption. On top of this, Shelley's health has continued to decline rapidly.

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Ist Scaldwell Guides complete Swimarathon



Once again, we congratulate the 1st Scaldwell Guides for their magnificent efforts in the Rotary Swimarathon. Their two teams completed 181 lengths of the 25 metre pool in one hour and raised £150 in sponsorship. Their total swim was equivalent to 2.8 miles, that is further than from Brixworth to Scaldwell.

The above picture shows the members of the 1st Scaldwell Guides swimming teams with their certificates and medals. Teams participating in this event are able to nominate a charity or good cause to receive 50% of the sponsorship money they have raised. The 1st Scaldwell Guides have chosen to use the money to go towards the running of their group.

Our Swimarathon set a new record for sponsorship money raised by the competitors, reaching almost £8500. It took place in the pool at the magnificent Chris Moody Centre at Moulton College. In all we had thirty-two teams participating with just over 140 swimmers, of all ages and abilities. The youngest was under five and the oldest over 75. In a couple of teams we had some very young swimmers who needed swimming supports to compete, but they all finished with over 50 lengths. There were other remarkable achievements, with a total of 1,660 lengths completed. That works out to be nearly 26 miles.

As we move into the New Year we are all faced with two uncertainties, Brexit and the formation of new Unitary Authorities in Northamptonshire.

Until Parliament agrees a Brexit solution there is little we can do, but with regard to the Unitary Authorities, the Government is nearing its completion of consultation (due by the end of January 2019). Parish Councils have been advised there are likely to be costs associated with the changes and we have taken the step of allowing a contingency within next year's budget.

The Council is aware of recent crimes within the village and held a meeting with representatives from the police to discuss the problem and the best way to move forward in reducing these figures. The Council will use social media platforms to pass on any recommendations from the police. The police also held a crime prevention evening at the Community Centre to discuss with residents actions they can take to make their homes and vehicles more secure. We will also be investing in Neighbourhood Watch signage around the village as an added deterrent. In the meantime the police have apprehended a group from Nottingham who they believe are responsible for the latest series of crimes, and they are currently awaiting trial.

Information from the Speed Indicator Device (SID) has been downloaded, showing that vehicles are speeding through the village with speeds up to 90mph recorded going out of the village. The overall average shows 50% of motorist are speeding through the village. The SID will be regularly moved to other locations in the village.

At present Village Organisations with projects in mind can still apply for a Community Grant Fund to help with overall funding, but applications should be in accordance with the guidelines required before consideration. Applications can be downloaded from the Council's website www.brixworthpc.org.uk.

Police Liaison

The perception of crime is often the biggest problem we have and it was no different when The Parish Council met with the Daventry Community Safety Manager and the Neighbourhood Police Officer.

Brixworth crime figures are diminishing year-on-year, however there's been a spike in theft from vehicles in the village - a gang from Nottingham has been arrested. Violent crime, including domestic violence, saw a slight increase, which is in line with national trends. Is there less crime? Well, it's not quite as simple as that. Social media plays its part in increasing this perception but there certainly isn't anything to say crime is out of control. The Parish Council agreed to continue to promote community safety in the following ways:

Encourage the reporting of crime: Police resources are allocated to hot spots. Without reports, these areas cannot be identified. Use the 101 hotline to report crime where possible.

Work with the Neighbourhood Watch Team: Provide signage and resources, and encourage volunteers and community members to play a role in crime prevention.

Promote Crime Prevention: Share key messages via social media. The Parish Council can link to Northants Police who recommend products which can be used by the community.

Host Events: Such as a tool marking morning for local trades people.

Promote Seasonal Safety: From the Northants Police and the Community Safety Team.

Use the Crime Prevention Officer: Look at lighting levels, landscaping etc and recommend improvements.

New Councillor

The Parish Council are delighted to welcome Alexa Dunkley, who joined the Council in November. Alexa is originally from Brixworth and currently works as a solicitor in Leicester. Stephen James, Chairman, welcomes the expertise Alexa brings. "She's a talented solicitor and we're sure her knowledge will help us in the future".



Planning Matters

Apart from the usual house extensions and tree works applications, we have dealt with applications for new dwellings, conservatories and garages. Not all of these have been straightforward because there has been concern about the impact on the street scene. As a Parish Council we must preserve the character of the village, although the need for new buildings and adaptation must nevertheless be recognised. It is often a matter of getting an acceptable balance between the two. Some developments, no matter how much they are amended, will never be appropriate for the area for which they are proposed.

A fine illustration of this is the recent refusal by Daventry District Council for the proposed new Coop store on the site of the former Red Lion pub in Harborough Road.

Despite the applicant having attempted to address our concerns, the fact remained that this was an inappropriate location despite Brixworth being in need of a larger store. One of the reasons given by DDC was that the appearance of the proposed building was not considered to be in keeping and did nothing to enhance the character of the Conservation Area. It would also result in the loss of the existing building, which although not viewed as being of architectural quality by some, is nevertheless considered by DDC to make a positive contribution to the Conservation Area.

The Parish Council Budget and Precept

The Brixworth Parish Council has its budget for 2019/2020. The total expenditure for the year will be £183,680 with £163,620 of this coming from the 'precept'. The Parish Council has the right to raise this money via the Council Tax process and the 'Brixworth Precept' will appear on your itemised Council Tax Bill.

The Parish Council uses it money to maintain its parks & recreation grounds, grass cutting, some street lighting and litter picking as well as playing its part in the structure of local democracy whilst it maintains its vital role in acting on behalf of Brixworth.

The proposal will increase the precept by approximately 4p per week on D band properties.

In addition to the precept the Parish Council also has money set aside for both projects and reserves.

Potholes are a real problem around the village, the county and the country as a whole (no pun intended!). The Parish Council keep pressure on the relevant authorities to get them fixed.

A lot of it is down to our weather (that old chestnut!). Freezing in the winter and then baking in the summer cracks the surface over time. Very small cracks at first, expand setting the scene for our cars to do the rest! Add the wear of heavy traffic, and remember cars are getting heavier each year, and holes start to appear. If they aren't nipped in the bud the surface degradation accelerates until large holes form.

Fixing potholes is the responsibility of Northants County Council Highways department and it is one of the most expensive problems the Highways have to deal with. If you're sad, like me, check the potholes in your road and see how many form along seams between different surfaces laid at different times, or around filled-in utility holes.

Repairing potholes can only ever be a stop-gap solution but it's the best anyone can reasonably do. Without a complete resurface the holes are bound to reappear over time, but none of us want our roads closed for a complete re-lay.

Because of funding restrictions Councils have had to prioritise. In Northants for instance: "For a pothole to be considered a safety defect it has to be at least 40mm deep but this is on our busiest roads. For more local roads, our intervention levels would start at a depth of 50mm". So not every hole will get priority treatment. And that's just the depth! Some holes in the village are one or two metres long.

It's clear that temporary fixes store up huge problems for future generations. But funding cuts over a long period of time just exacerbate the problem. Every bad winter and very hot Summer (remember, we had one last year) create yet more holes. The average repair bill per hole around $\pounds 56$ and with an estimated 2.2 million potholes around the country (apparently most of them in Brixworth) the overall cost is huge - add to that the cost of damage to cars increased insurance premiums then you have a major financial problem.

Well what a few months it has been in the House of Commons. The issue of 'Brexit' has really divided the nation not to mention MP's. The political stalemate that we find ourselves in has led to a great deal of political uncertainty and is causing much anxiety. Ultimately, we do not know what is going to happen next and how it will all pan out.

However, perhaps the political context we find ourselves in provides the Church with a wonderful opportunity to share Jesus. Folk are being forced to think about their futures, not just about their holidays and what the pound will be worth against the euro, but what they believe, who they can trust in, what are we building our lives upon, and is there anything or anyone out there that can provide real certainty?

Well faith in Jesus Christ can provide answers to these questions and much more. Following Jesus may not resolve Brexit but a relationship with God through Jesus provides real certainty and real strength, with access to God's wisdom and power and of course the opportunity to pray for our political leaders.

Jesus said (speaking about his teaching) "everyone who hears these words of mine and puts them into practise is like a wise man who built his house on the rock. The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house; yet it did not fall because it had its foundations on the rock." (Mat 7: 24, 25)

Right now it feels like the House of Commons stands on sand as our nation's politics appear to be crumbling to the ground. The certainties or 'rock' that Jesus provides through faith is knowing that God is with us in this life, no matter what personal or national 'storm of life' comes our way and he will be with us for all eternity, working all things for His Glory! In Jesus our future with God is guaranteed.
