# Decision on Co-op appeal imminent

Brixworth residents are keenly awaiting the outcome of the planning appeal about the plans to build a new Co-Op store on the site of the former Red Lion pub. The appeal will be heard on 11 September at Daventry District Council.

The plans to build a new supermarket on the site have met with fierce resistance from Brixworth Parish Council and village residents who fear that the new site does not have enough space for parking

and that its location on a bend will pose a significant risk to traffic.

obstructing visibly on what is already a difficult double bend."

Daventry District Council last year rejected the plans, on grounds that they were not in keeping with the area, did not make a 'positive contribution' to local conservation, and had insufficient parking.

The Co-op's planners lodged their appeal, arguing that the 14 parking spaces they have planned for are sufficient and that their plans show that the proposed building will not compromise safety.

"The biggest issue for us is parking - the 14 spaces provided will be nowhere near enough, especially once you factor in members of staff who may want to park nearby too," members of the local action group CTRL-NO told the Bulletin. "And then there's the deliveries. There's no plans for off-street delivery bays, so all delivery lorries will need to park on the road,

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It also dismissed the other grounds for rejection, noting that the existing pub has 'no historic merit' and only makes a 'negligible' contribution to the conservation area. The planners claim that in a previous consultation, three quarters of shoppers at the existing Co-op said they would welcome a new and expanded store.

The new Co-op would replace the existing store on Hunters Way. With 5,000 square foot of floor space it would be more than twice the size of the existing store and have considerably more storage space. That would

allow it to significantly expand the range of goods on sale and make the shop more easy to manoeuvre with trolleys, wheelchairs or prams. There could also be space for more tills and self-service tills, cutting queue time, the Co-op says.

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# Jonathan Harris, new DDC councillor: I want to hear from you!

Jonathan Harris, who in July was elected to join Daventry District Council (DDC) as one of Brixworth Ward's three councillors, is putting communication and engagement with the community at the heart of his agenda.

#### **Listening Posts**

Jonathan will hold regular 'Listening Posts' in Brixworth and the surrounding communities – open-door drop-in sessions where anyone can come and discuss any issues they have. The first Listening Post will take place in Brixworth on Saturday 7 September, from 10-11.30am, upstairs at Brixworth Community Centre and Library. Similar exercises will be held in other villages in the Brixworth Ward in the following months.

He says: "Councillors should make themselves accessible and listen to people's views. It's a good idea to put information on a website, and I will do that, but I want to be more proactive than that. People need a chance to ask questions and bring forward matters that concern them – it will be interesting to see what they bring to the table!"

Jonathan is keen to keep people informed of DDC activities, through the listening posts, by attending local parish council meetings,

"There's a lot going on that people should know about, even if they're not interested in politics – how the council spends its money and the services we receive, for example," he says.

#### **Unitary Council**

The biggest issue coming up will be the changes to DDC as it moves towards becoming a unitary council in 2021. At that point, Daventry and six other district councils will be abolished along with Northamptonshire County Council and two new Unitary Authorities created, meaning new elections. "It surprised me when I was campaigning how many people did not know about this. The information is available but only if you search for it."

#### Liberal Democrat

As a Liberal Democrat, Jonathan says he is the first non-Conservative to be elected for Brixworth Ward in some twenty years, since Sue Verallo served as an independent.

Jonathan Harris and his wife Christine bought their first house together in Brixworth 2I years ago and have lived in the village ever since. Together, they run a Learning & Development consultancy. The role takes them all around the world but gives him the flexibility to also carry out his DDC work.

He shares his house with two Italian Spinone dogs called Bailey and Florence. A third is due to join the household soon. "Having the dogs is great because you meet a lot of people while out walking and they keep us fit," he says. In his spare time, he enjoys music and photography.

He filled a vacancy left by the resignation of Fabienne Fraser-Allen earlier in the year. "I have lived in Brixworth for 21 years which I think helped a lot," he says.

Jonathan Harris is now one of two Liberal Democrat district councilors at DDC, along with five Labour and 29 Conservative councilors. Having two councillors makes it much easier for the Liberal Democrats to raise issues formally. Harris has already attended his first council meeting and joined the planning committee.

"I stood for election because the only way to make a change is to get involved," he says. "I have no political ambitions beyond DDC and hopefully serving in the Unitary Authority, but if there's a legacy I want to leave it is to re-energise people and make them realise they can make a difference."

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# Brixworth Music Festival draws in music lovers

This year's fifth Brixworth Music Festival was held, as ever, in the Church of All Saints, thanks to Rev. Chloe, who has supported the festival from the beginning. This year's festival was the most ambitious yet, and its very mixed programme succeeded in drawing in music lovers of all persuasions. The attendance was excellent, the very reasonable "Festival Pass" proved to be very popular drawcard: for little more than the price of two concerts it was possible to go to a total of nine concerts! The psychology behind this was to tempt people to go along and hear music that probably wouldn't have been

on their wish-list - if only to get their money's worth (similar to these "All you can eat buffets"). And it worked. One of the aims of the Brixworth Music Festival is to get people interested in all kinds of music - "tasting and trying out" unfamiliar musical fare. The emphasis is on classical music, but there is also a copious offering of lighter entertainment.

The festival opened with a rousing start on the 10th May with the Northampton Male Voice Choir.

To a packed church, and in the very capable hands of conductor, Stephen Bell, the audience were treated to a feast of well-loved songs, ranging from musical theatre to folk songs and pop ballads, reliably supported by their regular accompanist, Andy Poole. Although the programme lasted for nearly two hours the audience were shouting for more at the end. This is one of the best male voice choirs in England, with superb part-singing, impressive dynamic range and welltrained voices.

Now becoming a festival highlight is the newly formed **Brixworth** Festival Orchestra, conducted by Peter Dunkley. And once more, on the 11th May the church was packed to hear this great ensemble.

After the sombre chords and drama of Beethoven's Egmont Overture came Mendelssohn's Violin Concerto, with soloist Richard Roper, who is Head of Strings at the Northampton Music and Performing Arts Trust. This work is one of the most difficult in the concerto literature for violin. Praise must go to Richard Roper for his performance of this work which requires enormous virtuosity

But perhaps the most stunning event of the evening was the performance of Beethoven's Eroica Symphony. It is universally agreed that this is one of the greatest (and historically most important) symphonies ever written. To have the opportunity of hearing it live in a small church in the Northamptonshire countryside is probably a once in a lifetime experience.

In contrast to the two larger opening events of the festival the renowned Northamptonshire Ensemble, **Fiori Musicali**, gave a more meditative concert on the 12th May. This was a beautifully balanced programme dedicated to "Our Lady of Fatima", which is a Catholic title of the Blessed Virgin Mary, based on the famed Marian apparitions reported in May 1917 by three shepherd children at the Cova da Iria, in Fátima, Portugal.

The Fiori Musicali Choir is renowned for its purity of sound, and the Brixworth Church of all Saints proved to be an ideal acoustic environment for this superb vocal ensemble. Interspersed and providing a contrast to these choral works were songs from the Cantigas de Santa Maria, exquisitely sung by Hungarian born Judit Felszeghy who also accompanied herself on the Celtic harp.

A thoroughly enjoyable evening with a real community feel was then to be had on the 14th May. Graham Tear not only played flute in the **John Clare Wind Quintet**, which was formed at the very first Brixworth Music Festival in 2014, but also conducted the **Northampton Community Choir** which he founded four years ago. This programme was a well-chosen mix of popular and classical works. Soloists Amanda Giuliani and Sam Pickles gave beautiful performances of Mozart's Laudate Dominum and Brixworth composer Stuart Cooper's moving love song, "You mean to me (more than I can say)" The concert ended on a popular note, the choir communicating its enthusiasm to the audience who clearly wanted to join in with Highlights from from Mamma Mia.

The **Evening of Poetry and Song** has become a regular feature of the Brixworth Music Festival and is an opportunity for the whole Brixworth community to join in an evening of fun and reflection. The programme on the 15th May concentrated more on the poetry aspect, interspersed with solos and duets sung by Chloe Willson-Thomas, Gwion Thomas and their daughter, Sian Thomas, all accompanied by pianist, James Bonsor.

The choice of poetry ranged from the humorous to more pensive reflections on life, and included poems for both young and old, all recited by members of the community. Special mention should be made of Roger Brandon-Jones who recited a number of his own

poems. These are thoughtful works and deserve to be better known.

For the sixth concert on the 16th May, we were treated to a something rare, a performance of **Caroline Chisholm**, a chamber opera composed by Vivienne Olive (co-founder and joint director of the Brixworth Music Festival) together with librettist, the well-known author and radio presenter David Saint. The chamber opera is scored for five accordions, two singers and narrator. A stalwart of the Festival, mezzo-soprano, Kay Soteriou, the "original" Caroline Chisholm, reprised her performance of the role with panache and

passion. Gwion Thomas, baritone (also co-founder and Joint Director of the Brixworth Music Festival) put in a commanding performance as Caroline Chisholm's husband, Archibald, providing some moving moments, in particular in relation to Caroline Chisholm as the "emigrants' friend". David Saint delivered the narrative thread and the accordion ensemble, Timeless D'Accord came all the way from Nuremberg in Germany to perform. Their impeccable and sensitive performance added an unusual dimension to this small theatre group. The story of Caroline Chisholm – such an important Northampton heroine – is not as familiar to people as it ought to be and it was fascinating to discover what an incredible woman she was. Vivienne Olive conducted her own score, leaving us all with a very vivid impression and sense of great admiration for this "Emigrants' Friend".



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Coopman's prize-winning work, A Winter Collage, for String Quartet and Piano, was chosen for its subtle mastery of tone colours, all contained within a slowly moving, almost static framework that hypnotised the listeners, many of whom were not well acquainted with the world of contemporary music. It says much for the work that it held the attention of the audience from beginning to end, and it was a fitting debut for the new festival piano

Oksana King's piano recital, on the 18th May, entitled "A Tale of Four Exiles", gave the audience insight into the lives of Chopin, Rachmaninov, Stravinsky and Bartok who were all forced to leave their native lands and forge a career in a foreign country. After Friday night's concert with the Tedesca String Quartet and pianist, Charles Matthews, we were now able to hear the new grand piano as a solo instrument.

Oksana King devoted the first half of her recital to works by Chopin (1810-1849) and in the second half gradually moved into the 20th century, with works by Rachmaninov (1873-1943), Stravinsky (1882-1971) and Bartok (1881-1945). The last piece in the programme was a first performance of Vivienne Olive's "Cyprus Wedding Song" which was written especially for the new piano and dedicated to the donor of this instrument who wishes to remain anonymous. This work was composed with the intention of showing off the capabilities of the instrument, with passages imitating the clanging of bells alternating with gentle una corda (soft pedal) sections which quoted from the original folk song of the same name. Oksana worked closely together with the composer and delivered a fine performance.

Our sincerest thanks go to not only the donor of this wonderful new instrument but also to Brixworth Parish Council who have contributed a grant towards its ongoing maintenance.

On the 18th May the **Northampton Musical Theatre Company Singers (N.M.T.C.)** entertained a once more packed church to an evening of Songs from the Shows. This was a cross

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section of well-known musicals, and the accomplished choir clearly has a great deal of experience in performing this style of music which often demands a good command of part-singing. Conductor, Paul Truman, was fully in control of this ensemble, and compere Robert Laurie guided the audience through the evening. Highlight of the show was the "Anthem from Chess" with a smaller ensemble giving a very convincing performance of this piece by Josh Groban. Particular mention should be made of the extremely good accompanist, Greta Maskova, who provided excellent support for both choir and soloists.

The last day of the festival, on the 18th May, came up with two very contrasting events: first of all, a **Lunchtime Concert** after the morning service. This was an informal, very enjoyable affair — informal because some of the participants were unable to perform. Thankfully, we had musicians on hand who were willing to step in, and the "Brixworth U3A Songsters" were also able to expand their programme. The Songsters have always participated in the lunchtime concert on the last day of the festival and this time they combined traditional folk songs with pop and gospel music, competently accompanied by pianist, Anne Cooper.

We then heard two of Brixworth's "Singing Saints", Amy Hodkin and Emma Beckett, giving a delightful rendering of "My favourite things", followed by Sian Thomas – another singer who stepped in at short notice. They were all accompanied by pianist James Bonsor.

And at the end of the concert was a surprise: waiting at the back of church was the Northampton School for Boys Wind Octet, who had rushed to Brixworth with their tutor, Graham Tear, so that they could also take part. They had just been performing in the Northampton Eisteddfod where they had won a gold medal! This was indeed an unexpected treat and provided an ideal conclusion to this largely spontaneous concert.

This fifth annual Brixworth Music Festival, which proved to be extremely busy and well attended, was brought to a quieter, more intimate close on the 19th May with a concert of early music, performed by Brixworth early music specialist, **Sarah Small and Ensemble.** This took place after the Festal Evensong in the presence of the Bishop of Peterborough. In his sermon the Bishop made some very thoughtful comments about music, as did Rev. Chloe in her speech thanking all those who participated in this event. The choir, conducted by Robert Wakefield and accompanied by organist James Bonsor, rose to the occasion, providing a sense of festivity on this closing day of the festival.

After a short break Sarah Small (viola da gamba), Conor Gricmanis (baroque violin) and Jonatan Bougt (theorbo) played a programme of baroque French music. Sarah Small who comes from Brixworth has been studying in Germany, but is back once more in her home village. She has become a regular performer at the festival and always brings with her a group of expert, virtuosic players of early music. Much of this repertoire is very unfamiliar to the average music lover and this concert last night took the audience on a voyage of discovery. It was a fitting ending to a turbulent week of varied musical experiences

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# Country Eye Climate emergency is here

Our government last April made this momentous declaration. So now several months later perhaps I am allowed to ask just what has said government done about making a start? It seems from the information given to me that we as a nation are already among world leaders in combating the threats to our planet. Cutting through the impressive statistics their claims amount to not much more than greenwash. Let's say for a moment that their extravagant claims are true, and they have "cut our emissions by more than 40% since 1990," and "invested £52 billion in renewable energy in the UK since 2010." If indeed this is so then all I can say is heaven help us.

Take for example the pledge to move to net zero carbon emission by 2050. Climate experts, including the government's own advisers, say we are already falling behind on this target. But even the statement itself has weasely political doublethink in it. The key phrase is apparently net zero. This does not mean zero carbon emissions, as some might imagine, but means that any remaining carbon emissions we have are balanced by either actively removing carbon from the atmosphere, or by offsetting emissions in the UK against savings made elsewhere.

By the time you read this around five months will have elapsed since their declaration, and my bet is nothing will have been done to justify the declared emergency. Of course, MPs will have taken themselves off for their well-earned summer hols. And the climate breakdown will just have to go on without them.

The same may be said for the Brexit fiasco, which has dragged on for years and turned our political system into the laughingstock of the world. In both contexts I cannot avoid thinking of Nero. Indeed, Westminster just now seems to be packed with over 600 Neros.

The need to turn the climate crisis around should have been recognised at least thirty years ago. Even at this late date our politicians have made it clear that they are incapable of acting with the necessary urgency, and so it is down to us. That's you and me. So let's start by looking at the merest sample of what we have lost



from our local countryside these past three decades. Skylarks, linnets, yellowhammers, tree sparrows, spotted flycatchers, mistle thrushes, and the beloved cuckoo, all are among the many birds that have gone, or all but gone. Butterflies like the small heath, the wall brown, the common blue are gone or are rarely seen. And the list goes on and on: corn buntings, whitethroats from our hedgerows, grasshoppers chirping on the grass verges. All are sights and sounds that have sadly never been experienced by our young people. And it matters, for with the demise of every species we are putting our own existence at risk. Each of them bears a stark warning, like the canary to the coal miner, that things are going badly out of kilter with this world, of which, like it or not, we are all a part, and on which we utterly depend.

A ray of hope for the future comes from our young people, the rising generation. They are looking around them and asking questions. With their original and fresh young minds, they are aware that things are not right, sensing that they are in grave danger of being catapulted into a catastrophic future that is not of their own making, and they don't like it. What's more increasing numbers of them are intending to do something about it. This wrinkled oldie can claim to have stood with them in their peaceful, law-abiding Extinction Rebellion movement since I became aware of them last December. Already they have been described as dangerous activists by an alarmed establishment. I have warned about our climate problems in my writing and teaching career since at least 1969, when I led over 30 in a WEA class at Kings Langley in Hertfordshire entitled "Man and his Environment." It has taken me a long time to become a dangerous activist, but it seems I have arrived! – *Brian Webster*

# Railway bridge repair complete

Work to install a new waterproof concrete deck for Bridge II on the Northampton and Lamport Railway has been completed on time and even slightly under budget.

The works started on the 3rd of June 2019 and involved removing the existing railway track and fencing, digging down to the tops of the brick arches, pouring a new concrete deck over the complex and challenging contours of the bridge's interior, painting the new slab with bitument sealant, and finally reinstating the ballast and footpath.

The work was scheduled to take five weeks and was delivered on time, despite heavy rain when the volunteers were trying to pour concrete. The bridge re-opened to walkers and cyclists on Friday 5th July, as planned. The project required the excavation of 355m<sup>3</sup> of fill material, pouring 70m<sup>3</sup> of concrete and laying 450m<sup>3</sup> of new ballast, as well as 20 tonnes of new footpath surfacing. Volunteers have given up over 700 hours of their time to come and help complete the project.

All the material excavated from the bridge was re-used elsewhere on the southern extension, meaning no material will be taken off site (helping to reduce our carbon footprint).

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# Brixworth Primary School Saying goodbye to our Year 6 pupils

Our Year 6 children have had a busy few months in preparation for them leaving us and heading off to their selected secondary schools in September.

Once again the Year 6 pupils of Brixworth C of E Primary were well above the national percentage for children achieving the expected standard in reading, writing and mathematics. 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## Drawn to All Saints Church

You could describe Barry Barlow as part of the furniture in Brixworth. He's been here a long time (seventy-odd years, some of them very odd!) and not much gets past him. Not that he's huge, he's just 'well-informed' – or

so he says! He knows all the local history of

the place and when I first met him ten or twelve years ago he made it verv clear I was a newbie so I asked him for any information he had on Brixworth. With only around eight years in the village at the time, he thought that I could never hope to understand the village without his help. He started with the sad story of Merry Tom, who wasn't a local drunk, far from it: he was a local horse! He ran

through the ironstone workings, battles with "Sprattonites" across "Spratton Brook" all the way up to advanced engineering at places including Ilmor and Mercedes where he worked for some years.

I'm pretty up-to-date on my Brixworth history now thanks to Barry. Some of it is accurate and a lot of it is Barry 'entertaining' a 'foreigner' with a few wild tales with absolutely no basis on fact. But then I've always been gullible, and I love a good yarn.

I didn't let on to Barry, but I'd actually known about Brixworth since I was seventeen – or at least the church. I studied art at school and wrote a thesis on a local church in a

place called Seighford in Staffordshire, where I lived at the time. It was essentially Norman with lots of adjustments and changes over the years as bits fell down and the rioting locals set fire to the tower. It had some bits that had gone but been recorded as Saxon so I needed somewhere I could refer to so I could de-scribe what they may have looked like. Enter stage right; Brixworth. I discovered it in Stafford local library in a book by Nicolas Pevsner and asked my Dad if we could pop over and take a couple of photos. Of course, it took us most of the day and night to drive there and back in dad's Morris Marina, but we made it; picked up a pamphlet, took some pictures and went home.

I decided to draw a picture of the church and here it is.... I left off the spire because I'd clipped it off the photo which I used as reference. Don't tell lan Topham at the Photographic Society, he'd be appalled!

Anyway, from the little pamphlet I learned that Brixworth Church had used Roman bricks and roof tiles from a long-defunct villa and a lot of Saxon stonework and structure. I added as much as I could into the thesis and passed my Art A-level. That was all back in the 1974-75. When we moved to Brixworth from Holland 18 years ago I'd almost forgotten about the day trip, until I saw the church again.

Here's my original drawing of the church in the thesis c.1974 (age sixteen and drawn in a rush - must've been missing Z-Cars!)

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The church looks better than ever today. With my "old guy" hat on I appreciate the ramshackle na-ture of the Saxon stonework and the decorative tiles around the windows and doors. As a seven-teen-year-old it all looked a bit tatty. Now it looks delightfully

quirky. A real historical marvel. And just to prove the point on what's turning into a lifelong (almost) obsession I decided to draw two of the doorways just for my own fun. It's the red Roman tiles around the doors and the lovely hon-ey coloured ironstone that appeals most. The drawings look a bit more 'mature' than my thesis sketch; which actually looks like a five-year-old did it! Still, since some forty-five years have passed I'd hope they'd be a bit better. You judge.

To my mind they are quite accurate representations, although I'm not sure the original builders would notice. Some of the stonework leaves a little to be desired; in fact, I'd got so far as to say it looks like the builders spent a lot of time in Brixworth's ale houses!

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## 30 Years of Sunny Socks

Sunny Socks nursery school recently celebrated it's 30th birthday with a great garden party, attended by over 120 current families. Staff all hosted games and activities for the children whilst the parents had a good opportunity to meet other parents and see all the recent renovations that have taken place to mark the anniversary.

To mark the 30th year the nursery has undergone an extensive renovation both inside and out. The nursery has a huge garden that is home to chickens, an allotment, a bug hotel and will soon be hosting a forest school. The farm still provides a wonderful opportunity for the children to explore their natural surroundings on nature walks, visiting the cows, seeing the tractors at work, watching the chicks hatch and feeding the lambs.

We consider ourselves to be extremely fortunate to have such a wonderful setting and are very proud that we are able to share it with so many children.

Sunny Socks Nursery school was created in the spring of 1989 in the converted stable block on the Turneys farm (Park Farm) in Brixworth. The Turneys have lived at Park Farm for over 100 years. The nursery was originally set up by Maureen Turney and her business partner at the time, who wanted to provide quality childcare in a rural setting where children can enjoy and explore the great outdoors through accessing the nursery's large garden and the family's 600 acres of farmland. When the nursery first opened we were one of only a few private full-day care settings in the county. Over the years and thanks to our fantastic team of staff we have gone from strength to strength. Sunny Socks is still very much a family business now run by he next generation; Cathy and Mark Turney who have seen their own four children have a wonderful start thanks to the care provided at Sunny Socks. These days the nursery is caring for





children from 3 months to 5 years and is open from 7.30 am to 6pm, 5 days a week 51 weeks of the year.





to go and tell his friends and family all about what God has done for him.


This is what Jesus did repeatedly in the gospels---crossed barriers of race, gender, and also religion. He spoke to women, to the outcast and the marginalised.

#### Chairman's Chat

The new West Northamptonshire Unitary has been given the go ahead by Central Government and elections are to be held next May (date to be decided), to elect Councillors, initially in a Shadow Council until final changeover in May 2021. Further information on the changes and how they will affect services will be released in due course.

In the last edition we stated we were hopeful of advising plans for the spending of Section 106 and Community Infrastructure Levy monies received by the Council, unfortunately this is proving more protracted than originally envisaged but work is ongoing.

During June the Council purchased a new mower to replace the previous aging one which will hopeful improve the cutting of verges around the village.

As residents are no doubt aware the Co-op have appealed Daventry's refusal for planning permission to construct a new store on the site of the Red Lion Public House, the appeal hearing is to be heard in Daventry on 11 September. In addition to this there is currently applications with Daventry for the construction of a new care home off Northampton Road and new industrial units off Mercedes Avenue.

We have, during this month, updated our website to <a href="https://www.brixworthparishcouncil.gov.uk">www.brixworthparishcouncil.gov.uk</a>. to comply with changes in information sharing. Anyone using the old web site will be redirected to the new site via a link, other changes will be made over the coming months and these will be detailed in the next issue.

At present, Village Organisations with projects in mind can apply for a Community Grant Fund from the Parish Council to help with overall funding. Applications must be in accordance with the guidelines before consideration. Applications can be downloaded from the council's website www.brixworthparishcouncil.gov.uk.

From reporting dog fouling to checking the status of a planning application, making a noise complaint to finding your local Polling Station – a wide range of services are just a few clicks away.



Residents can also access DDC's interactive mapping tool from this page, allowing them to view things like ward and parish boundaries, the location of their nearest station. polling local conservation and tree preservation areas and undetermined planning applications in their area.

From this page people download their can collections calendar. double-check which bins to put out, find out what can be recycled, check the location of their household nearest recycling centre, sign-up the garden waste service, report a missed bin, and order new bins if required.

A lot of work has gone into making DDC's website fully optimised for mobile devices in recent years, so whether you are viewing it on a desktop, tablet or a mobile phone, you should find what you are looking for.



### Mobile app is "wheelie" useful

Every week on Thursday evening in our house there is a battle to avoid being the one to "put the bins out".

This was made potentially even more complicated recently through the introduction of the three-weekly bin collections, the bi-weekly recycling collections and the every-so-often brown bin collections if Mum has remembered to pay the council.

However, this weekly race to avoid has been helped through the introduction of a mobile app in June last year to help people cope with the changes brought by the introduction of the new waste and recycling collection service.

The app allows people to set up notifications to remind them which bins to put out and features handy guides showing what can be put in each bin.

It can also be used to access the latest news from Daventry District Council as well as information about local facilities, services, shops, bars and restaurants.

The app is available for both Apple and Android devices and can be found on Google Play and the Apple App Store by searching for 'Daventry District'.

While I can't promise that your family will be tripping over themselves to help with the recycling, it does make the job considerably easier.

People are being reminded to lock their doors and close windows to help prevent burglars getting into their homes



Statistics show more than a quarter of summer burglaries reported to Northamptonshire Police happen when people leave keys in locks or within reach of open windows, leave doors unlocked, or leave windows ajar when they go out.

With high temperatures forecast again, householders are being urged to avoid all of the above as well as review their security, to help protect their homes and belongings.

Inspector Scott Little, of the Kettering Corby and Neighbourhood Team at Northamptonshire Police, "We're seeing said: an increasing number of burglaries where offenders have simply been able to let themselves into a property through unlocked doors and open windows.

"These kinds of offences are preventable but no less distressing for victims, who have to deal with the loss of their possessions and also the emotional impact of a burglary.

"Don't let a burglar in to help themselves – always lock up to keep your home and valuables safe."

#### Keep your home secure with these tips

- 1. Keep external doors locked, even when you're at home or out in the garden. If you rent a room, keep communal entry doors secure, lock your room and report security issues to your landlord.
- 2. If you open a window, always close and lock it when you leave the room or go out.
- 3. Keep all keys out of sight and reach of letterboxes, pet flaps and downstairs doors and windows.
- 4. Make sure your garden boundary and gates are secure. Lock away all tools and ladders so they can't be used to break into your home.
- 5. If you're going away on holiday, make your home look lived in while you're away. Ask a trusted friend or neighbour to open and close curtains and remove post, and use a timer to switch on an energy-saving light in the evenings.
- 6. Mark your property with your postcode and house number so it can be identified as yours and returned if stolen and recovered. Register items with serial numbers free at www.immobilise.com


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# A great summer at Brixworth
