Hundreds join the Brixworth

Country parkrun

I wrote in the last *Bulletin* that parkrun was coming to Brixworth Country Park. At that time, we hadn't run the test event and although we had a launch date, it was tentative and we couldn't tell anyone anyway. But the test went to plan and on Saturday 30 November, as the Bulletin was being delivered, we held our first event. 129 runners, joggers and walkers joined 29 volunteers on a frosty winter's morning for the inaugural Brixworth Country parkrun.

Since then, the event has gone better than any of us were expecting. As I write, we have completed eight events and numbers have grown rapidly to around 300. What is more pleasing is that although as expected we have seen a lot of parkrun tourists visiting from other events, over 200 people have started their parkrun journey by doing their first event with us. We now have 325 people calling Brixworth their home event, of which 201 have registered since the New Year. Whether you are one of those, or a long-standing parkrunner, you are very welcome.



We are also building our pool of volunteers, with 77 people having spent at least one Saturday morning in hi-viz, helping to make parkrun happen. Some turn out almost every week and some we

see less frequently, but all are essential. It feels as if we are building a community and it has great to see people making new friends. We will always welcome more volunteers; if you would like to help, please get in touch or speak to anyone in hi-viz on a Saturday morning.

So what's next? The event will continue every Saturday and as the days get longer and warmer, we expect numbers to continue to grow. We will put on themed events; by the time you read this we will have had the Alpine 'Bells and Whistles' parkrun which we expect to have filled the country park with if not the Sound of Music,

And an inexperienced core team has learned fast; if you have seen their increasingly strongly worded Facebook posts or receive their emails, you'll understand the pressure to fill the volunteer roster each week!

But most importantly, it is your event. We set it up for you, to spend time outdoors, exercise and be part of a community. Whoever you are, and however you want to use parkrun, you are always very welcome. We are at the country park every Saturday at 9am – come and see us. Climate Emergency - doing our bit

Since being elected as a councillor I have been working on a cross party working group at Daventry District Council looking at the Climate Emergency. This work has culminated in a series of recommendations that are in the process of being presented to Council (including the need to declare a Climate Emergency) and which should, if fully endorsed, live on into the life of the new Unitary Council from May this year.

One of our recommendations is to encourage the protection of, and the creation of more wildflower areas in our villages and on road verges. Why? Because wildflowers and wildflower-rich habitats support insects and other wildlife as well as helping the environment.

Creating these will require careful planning and preparation.

In the UK, we need a wide range of wildflowers to provide pollinators (bees and other insects that pollinate plants) with local food sources across the seasons – including times when crops aren't producing flowers.

Currently, the insects pollinate for free! But if the UK doesn't have a large enough insect population we may need to develop artificial pollination methods, which takes a lot of time and is expensive.

With this in mind, I would like to hear residents views on how we could greatly improve and encourage the planting and nurturing of more wild flowers, both in

Letters to the editor: Re-establishing the railway link

In the December edition of the Bulletin you discussed the possibility of re-establishing the Northampton to Market Harborough railway. You said that the reopening of the railway was broadly welcomed, but according to the consultation carried out, the number of people opposed to or concerned by this proposal was twice that of those supporting it. According to the Joint Planning Unit (JPU), many people supporting it were under the impression that this line would support local journeys, but in fact the purpose is for a high speed route connecting Northampton with the East Midlands with no local stops, except maybe at the new town that is also being considered, bringing very little benefit if any to those affected by it.

I asked the JPU for information on tangible national benefits, how the line would support the Oxford-Cambridge Arc or indeed what benefits it might bring to Northamptonshire. They were unable to do so, neither were they able to provide me with any evidence that the line would be "efficient or economic" as stated in the Strategic Plan. This leads me to conclude that the proposal is nothing more than a vehicle to support development to the north of Northampton and that vague benefits will be concocted at a later date to support the business case.

The reintroduction of the railway would mean the loss of the much used and much loved linear park we know as the Brampton Valley Way. This is a superb public amenity which provides a safe outdoor space for runners, walkers, cyclists horse riders, families and somewhere where kids can get messy and simply have fun. In addition it is a very important wildlife corridor and is officially recognised as such. Northamptonshire County Council should be commended for having the foresight to buy this old line and for turning it into a treasured public amenity.

The first consultation was very poorly advertised, leaving many - even some Parish Councils - unaware. There will be further consultations, although the one planned for this spring will probably be delayed. So I would urge all concerned readers to email westnorthantsjpu@ northampton.gov.uk and ask to be kept up-to-date with all information regarding the West Northamptonshire Strategic Plan, including further consultations. It is your environment so have your say.

Donations fund equipment at new surgery

Saxon Spires Patient Participation Group and staff at the new Brixworth Surgery would like to say a huge thank you to the many local residents and organisations that have donated money to help buy equipment for the additional rooms in the building.

The fundraising appeal got underway well before the new surgery opened its doors in February 2019. Contributions came from clubs, village organisations, businesses, Parish Councils and private donors. The total for the surgery 'wish list' of approximately £14,000 was reached and exceeded. Some donors were specific on what they wanted their donation to provide, others left it to us to decide!

On your behalf we purchased several examination couches, digital ear thermometers, a controlled drugs cabinet, blood testing kits, blood pressure monitors, oxygen monitors, a large pharmacy refrigerator, surgical trolleys, weigh scales, high back chairs, a diagnostic set and a Doppler machine.

The latter especially helps enormously in the area of chronic ulcers and vascular concerns and is of great help to the nursing staff as it It saves much valuable time. Practice Manager Claire Deare said: "The new Doppler machine is a Dopplex Ability Automatic Ankle Brachial Index system. This enables our nurses to measure the blood flow in a patient's arms and legs simultaneously, rather than have to measure each limb individually. This assessment is required for patients requiring treatment and/or dressing of ulcers. It means that an assessment, using the new machine, can be completed in 15 minutes, rather than the 50 minutes it was previously taking us." One nurse added: "Can I please personally thank the Patients Group for kindly funding the new Doppler at Brixworth. It has made a massive difference to us here. It has made things much quicker, easier and the patients prefer it."

Northampton and Lamport Railway are looking forward to an exciting 2020 as work on the extension to Boughton is nearing completion. There's been a lot of progress on the new station platform at Boughton, though we'd still love to hear from volunteer bricklayers who can help a day or two at weekends.

Later in the Spring we shall also be carrying out the final works to Bridge 11 (the low viaduct we undertook major work to last Summer). This will involve drilling holes into the undersides of the arches and pumping in new mortar to replace that which was washed out by decades of water ingress. Food Poverty Network needs your help

Northamptonshire Food Poverty Network is calling for people to support their local food bank or food project. The network's members are struggling with ever-increasing demand for their services.

Rachel McGrath of the Network said: "With an alarming increase in demand, local food projects urgently need our help. We've therefore put together a short film to highlight the current need and positively promote the work of local agencies supporting people in crisis in and around Northamptonshire. Hopefully people watching it online will feel compelled to help in some way. All contact details for local food aid projects are available on our website."

The Network is asking local citizens to donate or volunteer to support the activities of local groups supporting people in crisis and in poverty. The video highlights four key food aid projects and the realities of what people are facing. This includes the Hope Food Club and Shop Zero, based in Northampton, Northampton Food Bank and Kettering Community Unit. The projects show the increasing need for their services as mainly due to low and insecure wages impacted by zero hour contracts and an inadequate welfare safety net including ongoing problems with Universal Credit.

According to the Social Metrics Commission around 8.4 million working-age adults, 4.5 million children and 1.4 million pension-age adults are living in poverty in the UK.

The 2020 festival starts on 8th May as part of the VE Day celebration with a concert devoted to the theme of Peace, something which we surely all long for in these present times. Under the baton of Graham Tear, the Brixworth Festival choir and Northampton Concert Band will perform old favourites that relate to the end of the Second World War, but it will be a concert of a more reflective nature, a celebration of peace and freedom in Europe. It is a special bank holiday, so perhaps people would like to come to the concert after having had their street parties earlier in the day.

will be conducting Beethoven's Prometheus and Coriolan Overtures, as well as his 8th Symphony. He will he joined by French horn player Meghan McCrimmon Foster, who will be performing Mozart's 3rd Horn Concerto.

On the 10th May there will be two concerts to enjoy: At midday, after the morning service, the celebrated local organist lan Clarke will be giving an organ recital on the newly-refurbished organ. This concert will include the prize-winning work of the Brixworth Music Festival's Women Composers Competition. In the evening we will be treated to a concert by the Fiori Musicali Choir, which has become a regular feature of the festival. Both concerts will be celebrating the 400th anniversary of the Italian composer, Isabella Leonarda, one of the women composers discovered by the Society for Women in Music, Frankfurt, of which festival co-director, Vivienne Olive, is a committee member.

Gwion Thomas, the other co-director of the festival, will be singing a new work by Vivienne Olive on 13th May. He will be joined by the Tedesca String Quartet, which has also become a much-loved regular feature of the festival. Also on the programme are works by Haydn and Dvorak.

The 14th May will be devoted to many local performers. Kay Soteriou and David Saint will treat us to a selection of numbers from various musicals, and songs from Stuart Cooper's new musical "Wonderland" will also be performed. The line-up will be completed by the local young singers Alexandra Smith and Sam Pickles and the poet Roger Brandon-Jones. This concert has been sponsored by the Brixworth Parish Council.

There will be a change of pace on 15th May, as we are joined by the award-winning contemporary music theatre acappella ensemble Electric Voice Theatre. "Echoes – Minerva Scientifica" is a unique and thrilling programme devoted to women composers and scientists, which also features many aspects of the Northamptonshire countryside.

On 16th May there will again be two concerts. In the afternoon

at 3pm the brand new festival grand piano will be played by the pianist duo, Oksana King and Andrew King. Not often does one get the chance to hear a professional piano duo, and these two pianists will be playing works by Beethoven, Rimsky-Korsakov and Vivienne Olive. This grand piano was a gift from a private sponsor, together with added support from the Brixworth Parish Council. Apparently, the concert will involve some audience participation – but this must remain a secret until the concert...

In the evening we will then hear the award-winning Towcester Studio Band with a programme of brass music conducted by Peter Wain. Brass music always goes down well at the Brixworth Music Festival and this programme promises to be very entertaining.

Another two more reflective concerts will bring the festival to an end on 17th May. After the morning service you will hear a midday concert with our regular guests, the Brixworth U3A Songsters, together with the All Saints CEVA Primary School Choir (Northampton) conducted by James Bonsor. Children of Brixworth will also be performing the prizewinning entries for the Brixworth Music Festival Poetry Competition*, which will have as its theme Peace, echoing this season's opening concert. The closing concert in the evening will be given by the awardwinning Kettering-based Belcanto Female Voice Choir, with a mixed programme of works in various styles. The instrumental interludes will be supplied by Graham Tear (flute) and Sarah Small (viola da gamba) – both musicians hailing from Brixworth.

While tastes vary in music, the Festival Pass will give you the possibility of coming to a concert that may well not normally be on your preferred list. And this is one of the festival's aims: to give everyone an opportunity to not only enjoy their favourite music, but also to come along and perhaps discover something new. – Vivienne Olive, Joint Artistic Director of the Brixworth Music Festival; www.brixworthmusicfestival.co.uk



Brixworth residents who are interested in art will already be familiar with Claira Corfe, painter and print-maker, who has exhibited her work on many occasions in the village.

In 2017 she married wood engraver lan Stephens, now re-named Ian Corfe-Stephens: together they set up home in Broad Street. The houses there are not renowned for being enormous but nonetheless, lan was determined to bring with him his beloved Columbian Press, numbered 13 and built by its inventor, George Clymer from Philadelphia in London in 1818, since when it has been in continuous use for typographic printing.

lan was educated in local schools before attending Northampton School of Art to train as an illustrator, gaining his NDD in 1961.

He taught art in local schools before resuming a career in graphic design and illustration, whilst also working on producing prints for exhibition. Wood engraving is an exceptionally exacting technique whereby the reverse of the planned image is incised with finely pointed tools into the mirror smooth end grain of boxwood or lemonwood before being inked and then pressed with strong pressure in a press such as the Columbian owned by Ian.

He has been commissioned to illustrate many books with engravings including for the Folio Society. e.g. for James Woodforde's The Diary of a Country Parson, 'A Month in the Country' by J. L. Carr, Anne Brontë's 'The Tenant of Wildfell Hall' and Selected Poems by Alfred Lord Tennyson. He also provides pen and ink drawings every other month for 'The Jackdaw', a bimonthly periodical.



The local housing market is seeing renewed optimism due to the settled political situation and a clear path forward where before there was uncertainty. With confidence returning to the market business has sprung back into life from the moment we returned to work in the New Year. Here in Brixworth the number of new instructions in January is up by a third compared to last year with many of these properties achieving multiple viewings and a sale within days. We have also noticed a jump in the number of applicants registering to buy. Hopefully, if the trend continues, the increase of choice and confidence will make for a strong and fluid market.

Our experience seems to mirror the National trend.

Miles Shipside, Rightmove director and housing market analyst comments: "These statistics seem to indicate that many buyers and sellers feel that the election result gives a window of stability. The housing market dislikes uncertainty, and the unsettled political outlook over the last three and a half years since the EU referendum caused some potential home-movers to hesitate. There now seems to be a release of this pent-up demand, which suggests we are in store for an active spring market. The early birds are on it, with over 1.3 million buyer enquiries to agents since the election, up 15% on the same period a year ago. Some buyers are even further ahead and have snapped up a property already, with the number of sales agreed up by 7.4% on this time last year."

Shipside notes: "Whilst a substantial rise is the norm in January, buoyed by the start of a new year, this is the biggest new-year price surge that we have ever recorded. However it is still a price-sensitive market, with stretched buyer affordability, so sellers should be careful not to get carried away with their pricing and miss out on this window of increased activity.

One factor behind the upwards price pressure has been the shortage of property coming to market in many areas of the country, with some would-be sellers postponing their moves until they judge the outlook to be more certain.

While there may well be more twists and turns to come in the Brexit saga, there is now an opportunity for sellers to get their property on the market for a spring move unaffected by Brexit deadlines. For those who can afford to move and have been putting it off, now would appear to be a good time to get a view from a local estate agent on their property's value, and a mortgage quote for the great fixed-rate deals that are currently available."

So, there you have it, a positive start to the year which I predict will continue.

Country Eye: Enjoy the view while it lasts

When I leave Brixworth towards Northampton, the view over open countryside to the right of the new estates marks the first real breath of fresh air.

I treasure it as one of the finest vistas in the land, although the land itself is intensively farmed, and its community of bugs, beasts, birds and plants has been devastated. It was only a short while ago I joined with many villagers to fight off a planned housing development over this field. It was the trashing of this tranquil prospect across the valley of the Brampton Nene that formed one of the main objections to the application that was eventually thrown out.

Much as I would like to believe that this was the end of the matter, I am afraid it was merely a stay of execution. We only need to remind ourselves of the Buckton Fields fiasco to see why. For something like fifteen years the planners submitted one planning application after another, gradually wearing down the opposition. With the law favouring the developers it was the threat of costly legal action that eventually led to Daventry District Council backing down.

Returning to Brixworth, it is of course impossible to predict what may happen to this priceless viewpoint, but I think it may be worth a stab at it.

Some way of magically destroying the view without anyone realising would surely be the best plan. And I think the developers and their client have cracked it. The answer is to plant trees across the site, which is what they did shortly after the application was turned down. Meanwhile the margins can still be used to grow crops, adding to the illusion that all is well. If you plant the right kind of trees, they will put on up to four feet a year. And in a decade or so they will completely obscure the view. Job done and the planning applications can start rolling in again. Entirely surmise on my part, but we shall see.

Ironically, as the trees grow there is likely to be a short-lived revival of the bird and other wildlife. Species like the whitethroat and the yellowhammer, butterflies such as meadow brown, ringlet and the skippers, could return for a few years until the trees shade them out. Even the linnet and greenfinch, all species I seldom see these days around here may put in an appearance. Enjoy them while we may, for they could all be swept away before they have had a chance to establish themselves.

These days it is hard to talk about the countryside without mentioning the weather and climate breakdown. As I write towards the end of January, we have average temperatures after a mild autumn. The last time I looked the grass on my lawn needed cutting, despite having been given a going over at the end of November. No snow so far, yet on the other side of earth an area the size of England has gone up in flames.

A glimmer of hope comes, not as it should from politicians and the elite, but from the

very young, led by the remarkable Greta Thunberg. And as an 85 year old I cannot refrain from banging the drum for Sir David Attenborough, eight year my senior. There is still time to turn things around, just. Perhaps three to five years in my estimation, to begin meaningful and lasting action. The result, carefully planned, could be a good life for all. So what's not to like about that?







Chairman's Chat

As residents will no doubt be aware from our social media postings, that the Council have agreed to keep the precept at the same level as last year. The precept is basically revenue raised in order to help meet spending requirements in Brixworth under broad headings such recreation, projects and grants, highways and environment, and administration. Members of the public are always welcome to attend our finance meetings.

Following residents' comments and concerns about parking within the village, the Parish Council had a joint meeting with County Highways and Daventry District Council together with the police in the hope of providing a solution—please read our article which goes into more detail.

In our bid to make Brixworth an even more beautiful and pleasant place for you all to live in, and to supplement the flower boxes at the entrances to the village and the Christmas trees, a working group will be trailing a wild flower area. The designated area for this trial is adjacent to the Village Hall and we hope that it will prove to be both popular and beautiful!

Parish Councillors are actually elected by the public and serve four terms. This year the elections are due to take place on 7 May. If you are at all interested or are just curious please read on and get in touch with our clerk, Peter Rowbotham.

Parking Issues In Brixworth

Village Parking

Parking has no doubt become the big issue within Brixworth. It is consistently the number one topic raised with Councillors at our monthly Parish Council Surgery.

With no easy or immediate solution to hand the Parish Council raised awareness of the matter in a joint forum consisting of the police and local councils which resulted further requests for Traffic Regulation Orders (Yellow Lines) and a request to increased levels of parking enforcement; it is also looking at additional bollards as a way of protecting our green spaces.

Inconsiderate

As a result of the increased demand for parking spaces there is a clear rise in inconsiderate drivers parking on double-yellow lines, across dropped kerbs, at highway junctions, highway grass verges and even on pavements.

An Offence

Parking a vehicle on the pavement could lead to an offence of obstruction being committed – this results in a fixed penalty notice being issued to offending vehicle owners. This is because parking on the pavement can obstruct pedestrians and wheelchair users, forcing them to use the road to pass parked vehicles.

It should also be noted that, unless you are accessing your property via a lowered kerb driveway, it is an offence to drive on the pavement, even for a short distance. It's also an offence to park a goods vehicle over 7.5 tonnes on the verge or pavement.

Who Do You Speak To?

It will depend on the circumstances as to whom you should report problems with pavement parking. Your County Council (0300 126 1000) will usually deal with vehicles in breach of parking restrictions on the yellow lines, whereas your local police (101) will usually deal with vehicles driving on the pavement or causing an obstruction.

Please park considerately and safely within our village: off the grass verges and pavements, and clear of the yellow lines.

Become a Parish Councillor

WHY BECOME A PARISH COUNCILLOR?

Brixworth Parish Council is a local authority that makes decisions on behalf its residents in the parish. It is the level of government closest to the community and therefore most aware its needs. For this reason Parish Councillors are a vital part of Brixworth.

A TYPICAL PARISH COUNCILLOR?

If you have never been to a Parish Council meeting before, you may be forgiven for thinking that Parish Councillors are a group of retired folk who meet every now and again, tutting and being disagreeable — well in Brixworth Parish Council's case you couldn't be further from the truth! Of our current 13 Councillors 46% are women, 70% have jobs and only 30% have grey hair!

By becoming a Parish Councillor you become someone that your community will look to for help, guidance and support — a community leader with the power to influence decisions for the benefit of the people you serve. Seeing your community change for the better, as a result of decision that you have helped make, is something that can give you a sense of achievement and pride.

WHAT DECISIONS CAN I MAKE?

There are many decisions on issues that affect the local community. Probably the most common decisions that Parish Councillors get involved in are planning, crime prevention, maintenance and highways.

HOW MUCH TIME DOES IT TAKE UP?

Full Council meets once a month and those meetings can last one hour or if there is something very contentious then longer! There are committees such as planning and working groups such as media and communication which take no longer than an hour because we want to get home as well!


SO ARE YOU ELIGIBLE?

To stand for election you must be a citizen of the UK, the Commonwealth or the Republic of Ireland and be at least 18 years old. You must also:

- be eligible to vote in the Brixworth parish; or
- for the whole of the previous 12 months have lived in the parish of Brixworth or within three miles of the parish boundary; or
- during the previous 12 months have worked in the parish.

STILL NOT CONVINCED?!

The best way of finding out what it is like to be a Parish Councillor is to talk to someone who's doing it now. Come along to a Parish Council meeting or to one of the monthly Saturday surgeries at the library and we will let you know what we think it's like being your Parish Councillor!


