# New Services Area proposal continues to divide opinion

Plans for a local service area on the outskirts of Brixworth are back with planners and they have divided village opinion just as they did before.

The new proposal contains a few notable changes from the previous iteration, which was refused by Daventry District Council in the spring of 2021 on the ground that the proposal would undermine Brixworth's village character.

The proposal is for a mixed-use development including a shop, pharmacy, gym or dance school, several takeaways or restaurants, a community hub with meeting rooms, plus spaces for other businesses and offices. The main changes from the previous submission are that the proposed space for a drive-through coffee outlet has gone to make space for the village hub, which would be run by a local company, increased floor space for the gym and dance studio which would get 5,000 square foot of space instead of 3,400 - this is to accomodate predicted demand - and the loss of a proposed retail space. Additionally, the number of electric car charge points has been almost tripled, rising from 12 to 32, and will include 150kw super fast charge points. Much of the size of the scheme has been reduced to single storey buildings, to reduce impact. Lastly, the revised scheme now only has one road access points, instead of two, which will save a tree that would otherwise have had to be removed, and allow more landscaping.

The reaction from villagers has been polarised. Many like the idea of a gym and dance studio in the village. There is also support for a convenience store on the outskirts of Brixworth near the 508, which many think is a better location than the new Co-op on the site of the Red Lion pub (though that project, controversial as it may be, is unaffected by the new plans).



#### Here comes the new play park!

Others are sad at the loss of countryside land that the development would mean, coupled with a further expansion of Brixworth that would further erode its village character. They point out that the village already has several takeaways and that gym facilities are available a short drive away in Moulton. Some have been speculating that if the proposal went ahead but wasn't successful, it would likely be easier to obtain planning permission to redevelop the land for housing than if the land remained a greenfield site.

The developers argue that the service area would bring muchneeded facilities to serve the growing southern end of the village, which has been expanding ever further away from the existing shops in the centre. The proposal is just for the outline plans at this stage if successful, the local community would be invited to give their input in an open consultation to develop the final design.

The new proposal was submitted in late November and is expected to be considered by West Northants District planning in due course.

Brixworth Velo is five years old! Five years ago, a small group of cyclists met outside Brixworth Library for the first group ride. Since then, a lot has changed, and the number of riders has grown. There are now 60 signed up members of the club.

The one thing that hasn't changed though is the club ethos. Sunday morning rides are a social event, not a race. Depending on numbers there will be different groups going out according to rider capability. ## Brixworth How the village life

The results of a recent Northamptonshire police survey, published by their Strategic Development Team in January 2022, identified that the number one priority is dealing with road safety and road traffic offences, which includes speeding. I work with around 20 or so parish councils or parish meetings across the Brixworth Ward and combatting speeding through our villages is indeed one of the issues that comes up time and time again.

Changes to the highway code brought in new rules into effect on the 29th January, so what does thing have to do with speeding traffic? Well, directly not at all, however, if we all understand how they operate and comply with them, the new rules could positively slow things down for all of us.

The main changes are regarding road hierarchy, ie who gets preference of right of way over other road users. The new rules makes it easier for drivers to be prosecuted over accidents involving pedestrians and cyclists. The key change is that pedestrians have new priority when crossing road junctions, while cyclists have priority when passing a turning car, under this new hierarchy of road users. Children, older adults and disabled people are at the top of the list, followed by other pedestrians, cyclists, horse riders and motorcyclists.

In summary the new rules are:

#### Rule HI: New hierarchy of road users

Drivers of vehicles that can cause the greatest harm in the event of a collision bear the greatest responsibility to take care and reduce the danger to others. This principle applies most strongly to drivers of HGVs, LGVs, cars/taxis and motorcycles. Cyclists and horse riders likewise have a responsibility to reduce danger to pedestrians.

#### Rule H2: New priority for pedestrians at junctions

At a junction, drivers, motorcyclists, horse riders and cyclists should give way to pedestrians crossing or waiting to cross a road into which or from which you are turning. You should give way to pedestrians waiting to cross a zebra crossing (currently you only have to give way if they're already on the crossing), and to pedestrians and cyclists waiting to cross a parallel crossing.

#### Rule H3: New priority for cyclists when cars are turning

You should not cut across cyclists, horse riders or horse drawn vehicles going ahead when you are turning into or out of a junction or changing direction or lane. This

applies whether they are using a cycle lane, a cycle track, or riding ahead on the road and you should give way to them. Do not turn at a junction if to do so would cause the cyclist, horse rider or horse drawn vehicle going straight ahead to stop or swerve. You should stop and wait for a safe gap in the flow of cyclists if necessary.

In practice in our villages, it means that pedestrians have priority not just when they are crossing the road at a junction, but when they are waiting to do so. For these rules to work effectively all of us motor vehicle drivers will need to be more aware of what's going on around us and by definition slow things down and ensure that pedestrians and cyclists are protected.

During the pandemic, most of us have walked more and in many instances cycled more. If we all do our bit, these changes could have a positive impact on active travel and potentially slow traffic in our villages to safer levels.

It's worth noting that this isn't just advice. Contraventions can be backed up with £200 fine and six points adding to the driving licence.


#### **Future developments?**

There could be further changes coming down the line. The government are consulting on the thorny issue of pavement parking. Councils in England and Wales could have the power to issue fines for motorists that park on the pavement. The new rules could mean that councils UK wide could issue £70 fines for pavement parkers.

It's already illegal to park on the pavement in London and some other parts of the UK with Scotland likely to follow suit next year. The government is still consulting on the pavement parking ban, but reports say that the decision in England and Wales could be made sometime this year.

By January 14th, 2022, they had recorded an incredible 1000 bags.

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

## Grants for young people in Brixworth and Scaldwell


Many families have found things challenging during the Covid 19 pandemic and continue to do so. A small cash grant for educational purposes may help those in need during this difficult time.



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## What is the Swim Cube?

Many of us will have noticed the Swim Cube building down at Brixworth Country Park and wondered what exactly goes on inside? I talked to the owner and manager, Stuart Hacker, to find out.


The minute Stuart opens his mouth to talk about swimming, his passion for the subject is evident; he is a self-confessed 'swimming geek' who has been swimming since he was a young boy growing up in Wellingborough. As a teen, he spent most of his weekends windsurfing at Pitsford Water, so setting up his business there seemed an obvious choice, it "felt like coming home". He loves the countryside location and the footfall of like-minded outdoorsy people, some of whom stop to knock on the window curious to find out more about the Swim Cube.

Stuart says he has always been fascinated by how people swim and set up the Swim Cube three years ago. After twenty years of working in the pharmaceutical industry, it felt like the right time to turn his passion into a way of making a living. The swimming 'pool' itself resembles a giant fish tank with an adjustable current and a large mirror on the floor. There are cameras positioned to capture every angle of the swimmer's body as they move in the water, thus enabling Stuart to analyse their technique in detail.

Eighteen months after setting up the Swim Cube, the fledgling business was doing well when Covid reared its ugly head forcing it to close for ten months. Stuart doesn't like to dwell too much on the difficulties he faced trying to keep afloat financially during the pandemic; since things have opened again, however, the business has bounced back, he has been working flat out and is excited about the future. All coaching sessions at the Swim Cube are on a one-to-one basis and tailor-made to a swimmer's particular needs, with clients ranging from beginners who need to build up confidence in a safe environment to those who compete at a national and international level who wish to improve their efficiency in the water.

"Breathing is the key to swimming," Stuart says, before going on to explain that "the three pillars of swimming are -

breathing, body position and propulsion." Many of his clients compete in triathlons and marathon swims, so they need to focus on the most efficient way to move through the water. Stuart is well placed to advise on this, in 2018 he was swimmer number 1.919 to swim the English Channel, and,



As a non-weight bearing form of exercise, the physical benefits of swimming are wellknown, but Stuart also emphasises the positive effect swimming can have on mental health, particularly wild swimming. He says, "it's important to be relaxed in the water" and he thinks of swimming as a form of escape and solitude where under the water the noise of the outside world is shut out. Stuart's favourite place for open water swimming in the UK is Lake Windermere and he often organises group swimming trips there. Whilst he welcomes the recent rise in the popularity of wild swimming, he is anxious to point out that people should be aware of what is involved and do it as safely as possible ...



- NEVER attempt open water swimming alone
- Where possible, use official swimming spots, such as at Sywell and the Falcon at Castle Ashby
- If not, swim with someone who has local knowledge of the stretch of water - the level of pollutants, the currents, what's underneath the water etc.
- Make sure there is easy access to the banks for getting out of the water
- ALWAYS be aware of how cold the water is going to be, even on a hot summer's day. For a first wild swim Stuart recommends waiting for warmer weather.
- Make sure you have the right attire for the water conditions and enough warm clothing to put on afterwards
- Never take a hot shower immediately after exiting the water
- Enjoy the experience but stay aware and stay safe!

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## George Hammerschmidt

06.01.32 - 14.12.21



'Georg' Hammerschmidt was born to Aniela and Hans Hammerschmidt on 6th January 1932 in Cottbus, Germany. However, in 1939 his family realised they were in great peril from the growing violence being inflicted upon Jews by the Nazi regime. Determined to protect their children, but unable to leave Germany themselves, George's parents smuggled his sister and him onto the Kindertransport in order to flee Germany and avoid certain death in the concentration camps.

On 3rd May 1939, clutching only a small bag, his travel pass and his 14-year-old sister's hand, George fled to the UK. He was just seven years old and spoke no English. It's difficult to imagine how hard it must have been for his sister and him to come here from a country Britain was at war with; let alone integrate into British society as well as they both did.

Despite this adversity and the painful absence of his parents,





George had a happy schooling and childhood with guardians in the Lake District and he went on to graduate from The University of Manchester, before becoming an officer and pilot in the Royal Air Force during National Service.

George was a deep thinker who had a passion

for for classical music and the theatre. He was a philanthropic, kind man who cared deeply about the plight of those less fortunate than he. Perhaps that compassion had been heightened by seeing what happened to those members of his family who didn't escape Germany and who were killed just for being born Jewish. Fitting therefore that in 2017, the German Government reinstated the German passport they had seized from him in 1939 – he was beyond thrilled.

#### PROFESSIONAL TUTORING



In 1983, George moved to Brixworth with his wife Phyllida. For many years, they ran a successful and highly popular retail business in St Giles Street, Northampton. A keen, self-taught digital designer,

George volunteered his services to the Brixworth Bugle – now the Brixworth Bulletin – as their art and design lead and quickly became a popular member of the team, as well as a regular content contributor.

In late November 2021, George had become increasingly unwell and, despite the wonderful care he'd received from Brixworth's Saxon



Spires medical centre, he was admitted to Northampton General Hospital. Sadly, on the 14th December 2021, just a few days before his 90th birthday, George passed away peacefully with his family at his bedside.

He leaves behind his loving wife, Phyllida and his two sons, Mark and Simon.





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## Celebrating a century of memories

Brixworth resident Jill (Joan) Woods was born on March 6th1922, so will shortly be celebrating her 100th Birthday. The Bulletin went along to find out more about her long life, her views on the events of the past century and the secret of her longevity!

When we visit, a smiling, smartly dressed sprightly 'old' lady answers the door and invites us in. At the age of 99.9 years, Jill still lives independently (with a little help from friends) in her own home and whizzes around the village on her own four wheels – her mobility scooter. Jill was born in Boston, Lincolnshire but spent most of her childhood and younger adult life in London, moving to Northamptonshire over fifty years ago with her husband's job.

At the outbreak of World War 2, having recently left school, Jill joined the WRAF (Women's Royal Air Force) as a clerk, performing general administrative duties throughout the war years. After basic training in Morecombe, she was posted to the RAF Records Office at RAF Innsworth near Gloucester. Whilst Jill believes you can't compare Covid to he war, she acknowledges some similarities. She says: "During the war period, everybody came together, you were all in the same boat, you know, and people died just the same."

In her long lifetime, Jill has seen four monarchs on the throne and nineteen different Prime Ministers. When asked who her 'hero' of the past century is, without a moment's hesitation, she says, "Winston Churchill, because he got us through it. I don't know where we would've been without him."

Jill was disappointed not to be posted abroad during her time in the service, but she soon made up for it after the war. She recalls the joy of her first post-war trip to Switzerland: "It was like a treasure trove going to Switzerland because they hadn't suffered at all during the war, it was pristine and gorgeous." In her younger years, Jill spent a lot of time travelling across Europe by train as "flying was unheard"

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of for the likes of me," but she passionately believes that "train travel is so much more fun, people don't get the same excitement from travelling now. There's nothing like rushing through the night, going from one country to another and waking up in a new place." The growth of the cheap airlines and package holidays is only one of the many changes Jill has witnessed in her lifetime and it seems ironic that, as she approaches her hundredth year, train travel may be about to enjoy a resurgence as a greener alternative to flying.

In the post war years, Jill believes the biggest change of the past century has been "all this IT stuff" – although she has very little use for it herself and doesn't even own a mobile phone. She is amazed how today's generation "don't seem to be able to live without it, we didn't suffer because we didn't have it." She goes on to reflect how, "when I was young nothing much changed for so many years and inflation was unheard of, it was probably the sixties when I first noticed real change ... I remember the fashion changing and Mary Quant in her white boots." Her 'greatest disappointment' of the sixties, however, was the moon landing in 1969. "A man on the moon was always the stuff of fantasy, science fiction" but when it happened in real life, Jill found it all a bit of an anti-climax.

Jill's travelling days are behind her now and, when she's not visiting the hairdresser's or the Co-op, she keeps her mind active by reading, doing Sudoku and playing Scrabble. She also enjoys watching her fellow nonagenarian, David Attenborough, on television. When asked about the secret to living such a long and healthy life, she says categorically, "I don't think there is a secret, it's pure luck, good genes and good luck." She then went on to say, as many centenarians have, that a positive outlook is also important, "I was never a glass half empty or a glass half full person, my glass was always overflowing."

Jill feels very fortunate to have lived such a long and happy life; she is very much looking forward to her week-long birthday celebrations of lunches and dinners with friends, a party hosted by a friend and - most of all – she can't wait for that card from the Queen! The Bulletin team wishes her a very Happy 100th Birthday and hope that she enjoys every minute of it. – *Tracey Calnan* 



# Friends of Brampton Valley Way & Brixworth Country Park launched



Brixworth Country Park is more than many may realise. Apart from the extensive main park with its outstanding views of Pitsford Water, it is also encompasses a 14-mile-long stretch of the Brampton Valley Way – great for walkers, cyclists and riders alike – as well as the delightful 17-acre Martin Moore Wood (adjacent to The Windhover Pub). These gems of the Northamptonshire countryside have proven immensely popular, especially throughout the Covid crisis and continue to do so.

To support and further enhance all three, the current team of volunteers is launching The Friends of Brampton Valley Way & Brixworth Country Park, with the purpose of promoting, maintaining and improving the combined resource.

The initial needs of the group are to raise funds to buy equipment that will make the maintenance easier, more efficient and help the volunteers in their work. And we are delighted to have financial support from all three of our Brixworth Ward Councillors from their Covid Support Fund and thank them greatly

In the short term, the friends will be collaborating with the park's rangers to implement the current action plan and develop it further: Jobs like keeping the walkways open, clearing overgrown trees and ground vegetation, repairing fences & gates, and, of course, litter-picking. And members will be very welcome to come along and participate in the volunteers' activities.

Longer-term, there will be encouraging youngsters from the local schools to take a greater interest in the local nature, and we

will be organising events both in the park and along Brampton Valley Way.

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## Country Eye

### Time for a change

I step out of the car, binoculars slung around my neck, and instantly they are airborne. Wings flashing alternately black and white shot with vivid green now and then, they tumble to and fro with anxious 'pee-wit' calls. All is meant to draw my attention away from their precious young hidden somewhere in the grass, their colouring so perfect they are near invisible even at close range. Skylarks too have their nests of well-grown young here, the female busily hunting for food, her mate soaring high overhead with that rich cascade of song that proclaims ownership. Their chosen home will be mown later for hay to feed to the livestock over winter. But they will be long gone by then.

The breeze sets the grasses tossing back and forth like waves across a green sea. Of many species I can see cocksfoot, foxtail, crested

dogstail and sweet vernal grass. Among them in profusion are wild



flowers of many hues. Buttercups topped with shallow bowls of shining yellow. Queen Anne's lace and pignut together add a frothy white haze. Yellow and burned orange peaflowers of bird's-foot trefoil, eggs and bacon as they are called by country folk, are framed by their deep green leaves. And there are pink and purple spotted orchids, their spires standing tall in the grass. Together they confirm that this

field has been farmed with a light touch for generations, probably by the same family.

Bees are already active at this early hour, bumbling their way from flower to flower, their hairy bodies dusted with pollen, leg baskets filling rapidly. The warming sun will awaken the butterflies of many kinds and colours, sulphur yellow brimstones, small and large whites, orange tips, peacocks and small tortoishells, small heaths and coppers, the list goes on. Along with them are the hoverflies, solitary bees, wasps and all the other pollinators. An unseen horde meanwhile lives in the ground layer. There are

countless millions of beetles, harvestmen, spiders, grasshoppers, the hunter stalking the hunted in this glorious tangle. It is only lately we have begun to unravel the wonder of the rich life that lives beneath our feet. How it is that using the fine underground threads of fungi that connect them they can communicate one with another. Even to the extent that they warn each other of the presence of hungry caterpillars.

The thick hedges that bound the field almost seem to vibrate with the wall of sound from the birds to which they are home. Among them are whitethroats that explode with scratchy song in a bundle of feathers before gliding gently down again. Dunnocks often host the young of the neighbouring cuckoo. Melodious blackcaps and garden warblers vie with blackbirds and thrushes, each a master songster in their own right. In all over 20 kinds live here.

Sad to say all that was many years ago. Today the hedges are gone, long since grubbed out and the huge tractor ploughs a lonely furrow across a prairie-like landscape. The whirling clouds of hungry gulls, crows and others feasting and following are gone. That's because the continuous drenching cocktail of chemicals sprayed over the years has killed virtually everything there. The soil has become just an anchor to hold the crop in their neat rows.

COP26 is done and dusted and I can sum up my views in just a few sentences. Instead of setting our planet on a path to recovery, our diplomats and politicians have steered us towards the rocks of oblivion, with a temperature increase of over 2 degrees C. Follow this route and the extinction of a million species looks ever more likely, while our own lives will become very much more unpleasant. Any hope of survival now rests in the hands of the millions of young activists, alongside those who live on threatened island nations, not forgetting indigenous races and the legions of the peasantry. Experts tell us we need 3.5% of us to reach a point where change will come, and we will shift towards a convivial future with a benign climate. Despite all I still believe we will act together to turn things around and be so much the better for it. – Brian Webster



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## A New Year start with a difference!

We often look to start a new year with a bright mind and an enthusiastic approach. Some of us look for something different to signal this new start.

A couple of us from Brixworth did just that and ventured for an open water swim in the middle of winter!

We are very lucky to have a number of venues for open water swimming in our area. None better than Castle Ashby. Situated in the grounds of Castle Ashby house, lies the Capability Brown-designed lake.

The weather at New Year was doing its it best to ignore the norm with mild temperatures and blue skies. The temperature in the lake was 9 degrees. Warmer than it had been (a week earlier it was down to 5 degrees).

The wet suit stayed at home. If you are going to do something different at New Year, then you should do it properly and go in what is described as skins, although modesty does require a swimsuit.

This was my first time in the lake since late October as I am normally averse to water temperatures below 10 degrees, but this was going to be special.

As you walk from the car park to the lake, the view you get is stunning, especially on a blue-sky day. It's almost tranquil.

As we approach the jetty, we are met by Jackie, our trained lifeguard for the session. Castle Ashby open water swimming only started in May 2021 and is thought to be the only life-guarded venue in England. Safety, especially in cold water, is paramount and the team at Castle Ashby take it very seriously indeed. Every swimmer must wear something on their heads. A swim cap is the norm, but winter brings woolly hats to the lake, in all their variety of colours and styles. A tow float in also required, regardless of the time of year.

Although not an experienced open water swimmer, I am an experienced swimmer that swims at least three times a week in a Northampton swimming pool, but as I walked along the jetty to the ladder that takes you into the lake, I was a little nervous.

With words of encouragement from my friend and Jackie, I took my first steps down the ladder into the water.

One of the important tips you are given before you get in, is to not pause. Simply set in, take a good intake of breath and as you swim away from the jetty breathe out slowly. I did exactly as I was told.

It is not easy to describe the feeling you get all over your body as the impact from the cold water penetrates through your skin and reaches every part of

you. I started to feel calm as my temperature dropped.

Swimming is a bit like riding a bike. Once you learn, it becomes a sub-conscious skill. The impact of cold water can make you forget instantly, so you need to concentrate and listen to the words of encouragement from the jetty.

If you can do that, you can relax and swim.

This time of year, the lifeguards watch you like hawks. Looking for signs of distress before you can notice. They will never let anyone get in to danger and will ensure you only stay in the water as long as you are safe. Regular cold-water swimmers will stay in the water for 20 minutes. For me, nine minutes was enough.

As I left the water, my body felt like it was glowing. I had what I can only describe as a tingle all over. This tingle can stay for hours after you leave the water.



A fellow Brixworth resident, Grace Chandler, who swam with her friend, Emma Eccles, said: "As I walked down to the lake, I had thoughts of Grace – you are crazy! But I loved every minute of it. "

The last few years has brought the topic of wellness into many people's thinking. Open water swimming is an amazing experience. Grace said: "Anyone who loves water, nature and mindfulness, should visit the venue".

If you are thinking of doing something local, different, challenging and in touch with nature, this is worth considering. Each session is limited to just 10 swimmers. Always supported by a trained life guard and easy to book.

The peace, tranquillity and connection to nature that Castle Ashby open water swimming offers you is stunning and I highly recommend you give it a try. – *Neal Brown*

#### Chairman's Chat

Welcome to 2022 and a year in which the Parish Council hopes to make a big impact!

Hopefully by the time you are reading this the new St David's play area will be finished and the new planting scheme that



accompanies it will start to take shape in the Summer. Once the play area has been finished then the battered, old tennis court will be transformed into a multi-use games area (MUGA) which will enable the community to dip its toes into sports such as basketball. Alongside these projects the council will be upgrading the upper hall of the Community Centre and Library in order to make it more comfortable for users and to also encourage new sports such as table tennis — all of this has been made possible with Section 106 monies given to the council for the specific use of enhancing and providing indoor and outdoor sports to residents.

The other project that takes up a considerable amount of time is setting the precept every year. This is the element of council tax paid by Brixworth's residents to Brixworth Parish Council and we have managed to keep this increase to a minimum at 0.96% which in pounds and pence translates to an annual increase of just 76p per household. The Parish Council hopes this goes some way to alleviate the stresses and strains caused by the pandemic of the last two years.

So, onwards and upwards and here's to a better year.

#### **Community Grants**

A council grant helped Brixworth Community Food Share to provide food boxes for some residents this Christmas and February half term. Donations were received from many other residents and also Troops, Brixworth Cricket Club, Brixworth Central Sports Club, The Co-op, Brixworth Community Church and All Saints' Church.

If your voluntary organisation would like to apply for a grant to help with its community activities and projects to bring direct benefit to the parish and its residents please download the "Grant Application Form" from the Parish Council website.







#### **Brixworth Climate Action Group Update**

As part of our support for the Queen's Green Canopy for the Jubilee celebrations, Michael Venton from West Northants Council helped the group with practical ideas and advice about appropriate native species for planting a number of trees and hedgerows within the village. We have also applied for funding for three hedgerows from the Countryside Charity (CPRE).

Our aim is to plant 'Saxon Mix' hedgerows which will include native species such as hawthorn, blackthorn, elder, dog wood, holly and hazel which will also add habitats for wildlife as a way to support biodiversity within our village and help in our drive towards the UK's Net Zero Carbon target. We are currently working on the planting plan.

Our aim is to plant 70 trees in line with her Majesty's Jubilee in addition to the three cherry trees already planted on the Spratton Road Park donated by the Sakura Project. Planting will open for the whole community to join in and will happen throughout the year, depending on the individual species. Keep an eye on our social media to find out when to get involved.

We are also exploring funding opportunities to develop a Green Roof project for the village bus stops. We are investigating which of our bus stops may be suitable to have a sedum and wildflower roof - again another way for us to support the biodiversity of our village.

#### **Community Orchards**

As part of our biodiversity and tree plan, Bob Cotter from the BCAG presented a plan to develop a 'community orchard'. This would be a long term project to plant a number of fruit trees in various accessible locations around the village for the benefit of our residents -



you will be welcome to pick fruit as it becomes available. There will be opportunities to get involved if you wish. The trees will enhance our environment, we will have blossom in the spring and fruit in the autumn and they will help our drive towards net zero carbon.

## What is the Brixworth Climate Action Group?

The Brixworth Climate Action Group (BCAG) has had several meetings and has started to develop ideas for the "Green Plan" for Brixworth.

This is a long term initiative and we know the plan will take time to develop and implement. We have made a start.

BCAG is made up of residents and three Parish Councillors and you will always be welcome if you want to get involved, share ideas or even just find out what's going on. Contact Cllr Christine Ware christine.ware@brixworthpari shcouncil.gov.uk

Whilst we have made a start on the green plan, net zero carbon requires many other areas that we are looking to develop including:

- Rubbish and Recycling
- Travel and Transport
- Communication and Education
- Refill and Repair shops
- Residential and Power

If you have any other ideas for the group, please get in touch.

## **Community Centre Hall**



Renovation works have started in the hall in the Community Centre Building which is expected to finish in mid-March. Work will include improvements to the flooring, lighting and storage facilities.



#### **MUGA**

The second project at St David's playing fields is a multi -use games area called MUGA; which will upgrade the existing fenced hard-court tennis area and will take place later in the year.

This project uses funds that BPC has received via West Northants Council as part of Section 106 funds. Section 106 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 allocates money donated by developers for the provision and enhancement of sport. This is given to mitigate the impact for the village of significant development projects such as the Saxon Rise development.

#### **Rural Policing in Brixworth**

We speak to PC Joshua Tyers and ask about his role in the police and in Brixworth.

I am sure everyone in the village will be glad to meet you. Can you tell us something about your duties in the village?

I am one of the Neighbourhood Constables; we are dealing with issues in the local community, not necessarily emergencies. We will be speaking to people and working long-term on long-term issues such as drug dealing and anti-social behaviour. It should be a bit more of a considered approach, we are finding out what we can do to support people.

#### Will we see a police presence in the village?

Yes you should see more of a police presence; there are two vehicles and another police officer starting soon. We hope to be out and about a bit more during the daytime as well. There are five of us covering from Long Buckby to East Farndon, Kingsthorpe to Sywell.

#### How should people get in touch with you?

If it's an emergency, always call 999, if not then 101. You can leave a message for me on 101 even if I am not on duty. We do now have a base in the village at Catherine House, this is the base for the Neighbourhood team at Daventry. Unfortunately there is no facility for the public to visit.

Is there a way people can come and talk to the police face to face and ask questions?

Yes, there is the "Beat Bus" which we are hoping to bring to Brixworth Library and Community Centre. We might be able to tie it in to Parish Council Surgeries, but we will make sure we publicise that.

#### What is the focus of the Neighbourhood Policing team?

We are rural, but there is a separate Rural Crime Team which is very active. We try and engage with the hard to reach areas, to deal with farm equipment burglaries and hare coursing for example. We are looking to increase the amount of awareness and engagement with that but we want people to call us if they see unusual incidents of people in the fields with dogs running around for example. It means that we want some of the smaller villages to get as much time and attention as the larger communities.

#### What do you want to hear about from the people of Brixworth?

I'd like people to get in touch with us, let us know what they need to know and leave a message for the Brixworth Rural Team – we are there to provide a level of service. It's a New Year and we are a new team.




#### St David's Play Area



I wonder if you saw the news about the fossilised Ichthyosaur, found at Rutland Water? It was discovered in February 2021, but was in the news recently. The BBC article said, "The 33ft (10m) long ichthyosaur fossil, which is about 180 million years old, was found at Rutland Water Nature Reserve."

#### Does the existence of dinosaurs, or the dating of fossils disprove Christianity?

There are those who think that science has utterly disproved the biblical creation account, and so can ignore it...and indeed ignore the rest of the bible. Atheists, like Richard Dawkins, would argue this way.

Then there are those at the other end of the spectrum that say that, because the bible describes creation in 6 days, modern science must be wrong. You might have heard of Ken Ham. He'd argue that way.

But there's a third camp and this camp sees Genesis 1 and modern science as complementary. I'm in that camp. In fact so were many great scientists throughout history. You may have heard of Michael Faraday (electricity, 1791-1867), Gregor Mendel (genetics, 1822-1884), Georges Lemaître (cosmology, 1894-1966) and William Philips (Nobel prize in Physics, 1997). All of these were motivated by their belief in a Creator to investigate creation. Johannes Kepler (astronomy, 1571-1630) spoke of "thinking God's thoughts after him." It was a desire to know *how* God had made the universe that drove these men to great discoveries.

There are many reasons to see science and Christianity as complementary not mutually exclusive; asking and answering different questions about life.

Christianity doesn't require us to 'leave our brains at the door'. Rather, as we understand more about the world around us - from massive cosmology to micro-biology - we are given even more reasons to praise the One who created everything and sustains everything.

"The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands." Psalm 19:1 (the Bible)
