Bambino Mio wins a second Queen's Award

Brixworth company Bambino Mio has received a second Queen's Award for Enterprise for Sustainable Development.

Bambino Mio, which produces reuseable nappies, won the award for its commitment to sustainability. The company picked up its first Queen's Award for Enterprise in 2020, that time for its contribution to international trade category.



Winners of the prestigious Queen's Awards for Enterprise are all personally approved by Her Majesty The Queen. This year, 226 UK businesses have been recognised for their

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contribution to International Trade, Innovation, Sustainable Development and Promoting Opportunity. Only 31 awards were given for Sustainable Development in 2022.

Guy Schanschieff, Founder & Manging Director of Bambino Mio, commented: "Further royal recognition from such a prestigious awards body is something that our team is extremely proud of. This is another accolade that acknowledges to the world that we are committed to sustainable development practices and are on a mission to make reusable nappies the first choice to reduce single-use disposable nappy waste."

Bambino Mio will be presented with the Queen's award for Sustainable Development at a reception held at Buckingham Palace later this year.

The company notes that reuseable nappies are better for babies bottoms, better for parents wallets, and better for the planet. Babies wearing reuseable nappies are less likely to suffer from nappy rash, the company says, and using re-useable nappies saves money compared with disposable ones. On top of that is the sustainability benefit — each baby will use around 5000 disposable nappies until toilet trained, making disposable nappies the third largest contributor to landfill.

Local service centre turned down

for second time

Plans for a local services area on land north of Brixworth Cricket Club were refused for a second time, for almost identical reasons as the first time round.

West Northamptonshire Council's planning committee unanimously refused the revised application in mid-May, just over a year after rejecting the first iteration of the plan. The proposal would have seen for a mixed-use development including a shop, pharmacy, gym or dance school, several takeaways or restaurants, a community hub with meeting

rooms, plus spaces for other businesses and offices.

The planning committee was not in favour of the proposal because it would have resulted in development outside the established boundaries of the village, in a sensitive landscape, and would "have a negative urbanisation impact upon the character and appearance of the locality, due to its prominent and peripheral location away from the main centre. Because of its location, anyone using the area would have to get there by car, and the planners had not demonstrated the need for the development to be in that location.

On top of that, the developers had not demonstrated the impact the BIN would have had on local traffic, nor had they outlined its how it might affect potential archaeological heritage – the site is close to a

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known iron age settlement as well as roman sites.

WNC's planners pointed out that the proposal conflicted with over 20 different planning policies. Their rejection was unanimous. - cfw



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Ukraine: How to help?

The war in Ukraine has led to a huge number of people fleeing the war in their country, and seeking refuge across Europe. In the UK, many have opened up their homes and registered as potential hosts with the government Homes for Ukraine scheme. However, that is where the story has stalled for many, since in order to actually house a refugee, the host has to identify and sponsor specific people. Most people do not have existing contacts in Ukraine, so how to solve this?

That's the situation that two of the Bulletin team found themselves in, so we thought we'd share our experience here in case it helps anyone else.

"When the UK's Homes for Ukraine scheme first launched, there were a few charities mentioned in the media that might help put potential hosts in touch with people from Ukraine," says Claudia Flavell-While, editor of the Brixworth Bulletin. "We registered with a couple of them – but except for one brief exchange that did not go further, nothing happened. Then I read somewhere that groups had sprung up on social media,

particularly Facebook — so that's where I headed. It is of course totally uncontrolled so you do need to be watchful and make sure you are a good match for the people you host. It's a bit tricky for us because the more rural you live, the trickier it is. People want to be able to work and make a living when they arrive and since very few come with a car, that means they favour cities and other places with employment in easy reach. Hanging Houghton might be very pretty but with one bus service an hour, it's not ideal. But I'm happy to report that there is a lot of activity, both from people wanting





to come to the UK and from potential hosts and we hope to find someone we can help soon."

Another local organization that is helping Ukraine in many ways, including pairing hosts with people needing a home, is Hub Help (https://www.hubhelpukraine.org). Run by Valentina Potter, a Ukrainian who has lived in Northamptonshire for many years and runs the Riverside Hub café and soft play centre in Northampton.

It is through Hub Help that Ian Topham, the Bulletin's photographer, has (maybe) found the family he is hoping to host. "We're hoping to offer a place to a Ukrainian family, mum, dad and 2 daughters. They haven't got their visas yet but hopefully that will happen soon. Meanwhile we just had our home inspection from the Council to ensure we have suitable accommodation for them."

Meanwhile, Hub Help is collecting more aid to Ukraine, using Valentina's established contacts to help those most in need. She says that the supplies most needed are tinned food, baby food, nappies and specialist medical supplies.

Hub Help uses donated funds to buy supplies to order in Poland, which is quicker and cheaper than transporting from UK, and transport it to Ukraine in a bus. Among the locations they supply are a hospital in Slavuta and a relocated orphanage in Vinnytsia.

The empty bus is then filled with refugees fleeing the conflict and driven to safety in Poland. So far Riverside Hub has raised over £20,000 to help Ukraine. If you want to contribute, visit www. justgiving.com/crowdfunding/hubhelpukraine



Call for aid draws huge response



When Oliver and Georgia Le Sueur put a call out on social media appealing for donations to help those displaced by the war in Ukraine, they could not have imagined the incredible response.

Over just a few nights in March local people donated 13 tonnes of baby food, nappies blankets, toiletries and medical supplies.

"The response was just incredible," says Oliver. "On the second night we had four Luton vans shuttling donations from Great Bowden, Naseby, Maidwell and Haselbech to storage. Our original plan was to drive any donations we were given to London. We soon realised we had far too much for that."

With the help of a contact in Hungary liaising with the Ukrainian Ministry of Health it was arranged for the donations to be sent to the Hungarian border.

A team of 60 volunteers worked tirelessly to quality check and itemise the items. Brixworth firm Bambino Mio an others

gave cardboard boxes and pallets, and haulage company Pall-Ex transported the donations to Hungary for free.

Oliver and Georgia have been overwhelmed by the kindness shown by local people - which included a couple whose daughter sadly passed away from cancer last year. They had £10k worth of liquid morphine and other strong painkillers left over from her treatment which the NHS couldn't take back. Instead, it has gone to Ukraine, where it is much needed.

Georgia and Oliver want to say a huge thank you to everyone who has donated pre-loved or newly bought supplies. They hope to continue harnessing this goodwill by raising money for medical supplies.

If you have ventured down beyond Brixworth Country Park's car park, you will have seen one the ever-changing gems of the park; a gem that is home to a surprising array of creatures and undergoing something of a polish up. The felling last year of two huge willow trees on the Eastern side and the pollarding of another on the Northern edge instantly dealt with the heavy shade and opened the area to the light. In fact, you may have noticed that a pair of ducks were obviously impressed with the new brighter environment and moved in immediately onto one of the floating bales of barley corn.



Folly Pond (originally simply known as Bottom Pond, renamed years ago) was initially excavated in 1995, not long too long after the park was constructed. And, for any pond aficionados, it is clay-puddled pond, not lined with a membrane.

Children always love a pond, forever wanting to get to the water and throw in a stick or spot the creatures above, on and beneath the surface. Pond Dipping sessions are great fun for the kids and adults alike. They reveal a wide variety of water wildlife, such as backswimmer, water boatman, damselfly nymph, mayfly nymph, diving beetle larva, whirligig beetle, water skater, dragonfly larvae, newts & frogs. The impressively huge Great Diving Beetle (pictured, right) and many more reside in the water.



Stars of the show though, and the most fascinating to watch, by far, are the energetic damsel flies and dragonflies of various types (Ruddy Darter, Southern Hawker and others),

who skim the surface and perform their aerobatics in such a dazzling display. Azure damselflies land on the weed and can often be seen mating as they dart about above the surface. On your next visit, wander out onto the boardwalk or peer over the wall into the clear water to spot the wide variety of insect life. Stand still and those ferocious-looking, inquisitive and completely harmless green, red and brown dragonflies will circle you.

the reservoir's Brixworth Bay) have been spotted, as have grass snakes enjoying a swim and hunting those frogs. However, we have one very much less welcome resident, which we are working on controlling as they do so much damage to the submerged banks and eat anything in sight on the floor of the pond - the invasive American Signal Crayfish.

Pond weeds are beneficial to the water,

especially the British native oxygenating plant, spiked water milfoil, with its submerged olivegreen feathery foliage and another common British native, hornwort.

Bullrushes and water mint are also present and lilies have recently been introduced to provide additional habitat. But blanket weed is a potential problem: despite its benign sounding names of water silk or mermaid's tresses, blanket weed is Spirogyra, an alga that consumes the pond's oxygen. The bales of barley corn sitting in the pond help combat that blanket weed through the release of an enzyme that kills algae and helps clarify the water. The ducks like the bales, too — a nice sunny spot to sit on.

Also, you may have noticed carved wooden panels around Follypond, these tell the story of the brother gnomes — Baldmoney, Sneezewort and Dodder. 'The Little Grey Men' trail weaves through the park: this and many children's stories were written by local storyteller, Denys Watkins-Pitchford (known as 'BB' and born at Lamport)

Follypond is a work-in-progress, with further remedial work is planned for the location, such as to clear the drainage system currently blocked by the roots of those former huge willows. Repairing bank erosion is another task brought about by the overflowing water bypassing the proper drain.

We hope you will enjoy the pond and watch its changes through the seasons. – Keith Dobell

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Lisa Wainwright celebrates MBE investiture

In May of last year, as reported in the Bulletin, Brixworth resident Lisa Wainwright found out that she had been awarded an MBE for her pioneering work with child safeguarding in sport; but, due to a Covid backlog, she had no idea when she would be able to attend the ceremony to receive it in person. Earlier this year, the invite finally arrived – the date: 16th March 2022, the place: Windsor Castle, the host: HRH The Prince of Wales.

Few of us get to experience receiving such an honour, so Lisa was happy to share the details of her special day with us.

In the end, she was given only three weeks' notice and faced the age-old conundrum — "What am I going to wear?". She wanted to find something 'a little bit different', and after much searching, found an independent boutique in London, choosing a long, deep blue and cream patterned jacket over tailored black trousers. The wearing of a hat or fascinator was compulsory, something Lisa was not used to wearing, so she was delighted to find a haberdasher with a cottage industry hiring out hats.

As the day approached, Lisa says she felt excited and anxious in equal measure. In pre-Covid years, she would have been allowed three guests at the Investiture, but as this is now restricted to only one, it was Lisa's mum who accompanied her up the long tree-lined drive to the castle. Once through the many layers of security, they went inside the castle for a mini tour, volunteer guides were on hand to answer questions about the abundant art and armoury lining





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the walls. As the time of the ceremony approached, the hundred recipients and their guests were split into three holding rooms to be briefed on the precise details and etiquette for when they would meet Prince Charles.

When her turn came, Lisa and her mum were escorted into The Grand Reception Room - one of the rooms destroyed in the fire of 1992 but now faithfully restored. As they entered, Lisa was 'dazzled by the amount of gold everywhere' before noticing the three enormous chandeliers hanging from the ceiling. She recalls how clean and polished the room smelled and that there was a string quartet playing in the corner, but, as she received the prompt to move forward, her nerves took over.

Lisa knew she had to curtsy on meeting HRH and again before leaving the room, and, despite having met several other members of the royal family through her work, 'getting the curtsy right and not falling over' was what worried her most. When the time came, however, Prince Charles immediately put her at ease and made her feel 'like the only person in the room'. As eighty other people had passed through the room before her, he joked that she 'must be ready to retire after waiting so long'. Lisa was surprised by how quietly Prince Charles spoke and how close he got, ensuring that her one and half minute private conversation with him was indeed private. He was aware that her MBE was for safeguarding, asked about what she was doing now and finished by telling her '...you have done some amazing work and should be very proud of yourself' before shaking her hand – the signal to leave.

Proudly wearing her insignia, Lisa was then escorted out of the Grand Reception Room into another room for the official photographs. She felt like a celebrity as nine photographers lined up and cameras clicked for the next fifteen minutes! Then, after months of anticipation, the main event was over.

Normally, recipients and their guests are allowed to mingle in the Quadrant but, as it was pouring with rain, Lisa left with her mum to join her wife, Karena, and their two children, Bowen and Mackenzie, for a celebratory afternoon tea at The Christopher Wren Hotel by The Thames in Windsor. The children were excited and aware that it was a very important occasion for their mum, but the highlight of the day for them was going to The Works to buy books and colouring pencils. For Lisa, however, the highlight was her one and half minutes talking to HRH The Prince of Wales and how special he made her feel.

So, after such royal recognition for her hard work, what's next for Lisa Wainwright, MBE? Lisa says that as youth participation in sport, particularly amongst girls, is still lower than it was pre-covid that is one of her immediate priorities. Otherwise, she will 'carry on helping people better themselves through sport.'

The Honours System

Whilst The Peerage system has its roots in the Dark Ages, the Orders of Chivalry evolved in Holy Orders and was confined to those of noble birth until well into the 19th Century. After the Great War, however, it was felt that, outside the military, there was no way of recognising the outstanding contribution of many civilians. George V solved this by instituting a new Order of Chivalry – The Order of the British Empire.



In modern times, anyone can be nominated by anyone for an honour and a list of successful recipients is

drawn up twice a year (at New Year and on The Queen's Birthday) for significant personal accomplishment in many different fields. It is administered by The Lord Chamberlain's Office, and in non-Covid times, there are twenty six Investitures annually. There are strict rules about how and when Decorations should be worn but all recipients become members of a very distinguished club.

Lisa was awarded with an MBE – Member of the Order of the British Empire, Lady, Civil.

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Country Eye

Ever changing, ever new

A bright sunny day with just a few fluffy white clouds drifting by. The big tree that shades my garden is just beginning to clothe itself in its new mantle of soft almost translucent green. Fortunate am I that in about 1880, then-landowner the Lady Wantage would decide to have planted the avenue of lime trees, one of which I am presently the custodian. This avenue runs alongside Park Farm and forms the western edge of the village. They are of pretty even height and are more than twice that of the houses they shelter.

Gently stirred by a soft westerly breeze, the new leaves are in constant motion so that the whole landscape shimmers and shifts, as if even the land itself is in motion. In all a soft canvas painted by nature to yield a green masterpiece. So it seems until a shower of gentle rain leaves in its wake millions of tiny rainbows reflected in the droplet-covered greenery. Yet others sparkle more brightly it seems than any diamond. The light shower soon passes, and again there is bright warm sunshine. The life-giving liquid seeps into the soil to recharge the tangled mass of roots.

A male blackbird begins to sing from the topmost branch of the lime, a rich cascade of bird music from the master singer, who has been dubbed the 'Mozart of the bird world'. Certain it is that he burnishes his repertoire as the season wears on, and there is some evidence that females actively seek out the better singers when choosing a mate. A reminder that birds do not sing for our pleasure and that song has a range of purposes. First to warn off rivals from his patch, then to attract a mate, and later so that the young can learn the correct song from their parent.

Literally coming back to earth with a bump my patch of grass has long since lost any pretext to be called a lawn. Annually it is reshaped by a family of moles who moved in some years ago, refugees from the chemical-drenched machinery pounded nearby fields. Having followed their worm and other invertebrate prey over winter to frost free depths, the rewarmed soil brings them to the surface again where they set about refurbishing old burrows and digging new ones, with a fresh set of molehills the result. Long ago I gave up any attempt to evict them and rather like the idea of having them around, although actual sightings are very rare. Once I saw the soil of a new hillock actually being pushed up through the grass, and on another occasion a bedraggled one was forced to the surface after a day of monsoon-like rain had flooded its burrow.

To me and to many others the garden is an ever-changing delight. Even the greyest and gloomiest days have their place, if only to remind us, however much we choose to deny it, that we still totally depend on nature for our very survival. Winds strong enough to tear whole

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trees out of the ground; to bodily rip a steel garden shed from its foundations as I have seen, reminds us that we are sol vulnerable, that nature is still very much in charge. On the benefits side we should welcome the fact that modern medicine is beginning to recognise that time spent out there in the open air amid nature's varied greenery has positive therapeutic value in tackling a range of medical disorders. Similarly our remaining semi-natural woodlands, wetlands, and so on are vital if we are to move towards a climate-friendly future.

On Sail Again

Creative up-cycling raises over £4,000 for Sailability in five years

Six years ago, Sarah Butcher had little or no idea how to sail or sew, she, in her words 'didn't know one end of the boat from the other' and hadn't sewn 'since making a nightshirt at school.' Now, she has learned to sail and improved her sewing, putting both skills to effective use as a volunteer for Northampton Sailability at Pitsford Water and by making bags from tatty, torn old sails which she then sells to raise funds for the charity.

When Sarah started learning to sail, with a view to becoming a Sailability volunteer, she noticed that when old sails were worn

out, they were just put to one side and no longer used, so she asked if she could have them. Sail fabric is strong, pliable and light, and Sarah had heard that it could be up-cycled into bags - although she had no idea how to go about it! She bought a second-hand heavy duty sewing machine which soon broke; then she sourced an old industrial sewing machine at a factory in Kettering and has never looked back.

The bags come in various colours, shapes and sizes; the strength of the sail fabric making them particularly popular as tote bags, bottle



bags and kit bags, 'Ditty Bags' are also a favourite, with their many pockets useful for storing a variety of things. Sarah designs the bags first, then comes the toughest part – cutting out the sails using home-made templates, with larger sails needing to be laid out on her lawn.

Once the sails have been cut out, sewing them together, adding strong webbing straps, chunky zips and labels, it takes Sarah about two and half hours to finish an average sized bag, with each one being a unique creation. More recently, she has also enjoyed working with windsurfer sails as they tend to be lighter and brightly coloured.

Sarah dedicates at least a day a week to making the bags and, with tote bags selling for £10 and a large barrel bag at £30, all profits go to Northampton Sailability. Over the past five years, she has raised more than £4,000, a remarkable achievement for a self-taught seamstress! Sarah has no intention of stopping yet though, so, if you would like to see more of her amazing bags, please follow her on Instagram @ onsailagain. – $Tracey\ Calnan$



Grants for young people in Lamport and Hanging Houghton

The Isham Charities make grants to people in Lamport or Hanging Houghton. Grants can be used to support education, training and formal apprenticeships for young people, up to the age of 25. Recipients of grants must have lived in one of the three villages covered for at least two years. All applicants are streated in the strictest confidence.

The trustees will next meet on 28 June to consider applications. The deadline for submissions is 21 June. Applications must be made in writing and include brief details of the request, including costs and copies of receipts or invoices. Brixworth Climate Action Group Update

'Summer's here

The grass is ris'

I wonder where the mower is?'

Everything is bursting into life and the blossom has been magnificent this year. Just before you dig out the mower and cut the grass spare a thought for the insects, bees and your carbon footprint. If your mower is petrol powered then one hour of use has the equivalent carbon emissions of a 97 mile car journey. Mowing less often not only provides a better habitat for our pollinators but can also reduce your carbon footprint!

Another way to provide food and habitat for the bees and trap carbon back into the ground is to plant trees that blossom. Early flowering species provide early food for the bees and insects and even a young tree will capture around 6kg of carbon a year. As the trees mature they absorb more and more carbon so a tree planted now really is an investment for the future. Tree planting season is October to the end of March so we are working on our planting plan for the Autumn.

We aim to progress the Community Orchard plan as well as introducing new hedgerows in the village. We have secured funding from ACRE to plant three hedgerows and these will be a mix of native hedge plants including hawthorn, blackthorn, dogwood and hazel.

Planting will be in the Autumn and if you would like to get involved with either the Community Orchard or the hedgerows then please let Cllr Christine Ware have your details.



The Brixworth Climate Action Group is continuing to work on Brixworth's Green Plan which covers a number of different areas in addition to the Environment and Biodiversity projects, including waste and recycling, food and agriculture, transport, energy use and sources. Dangers of Open Water

As the warm weather (hopefully) approaches, it may be tempting to seek out places to swim, but Pitsford Reservoir is not a suitable place.

The local Emergency Services are encouraging parents to talk to children about the dangers of swimming in open water spaces such as Pitsford Reservoir as the weather improves.

Darren Carson, prevention team leader at Northamptonshire Fire and Rescue Service warned of the risk in taking part in unsupervised open water swimming. He said: "Even in warm weather, open water can be extremely cold and dangerous."



On its website, Anglian Water says that "Swimming is only permitted in designated areas and during Anglian Water consented events. The permitted swimming area is at Rutland Water. There are currently no designated swimming areas at Pitsford Water."



The second half saw Brixworth create more opportunities, back post headers went wide, some soft shooting saw chances missed. Then Brixworth put together a lovely move and took the lead into the second half. Corby responded and put some further pressure onto the lads which resulted in a goal being disallowed for off-side. But then they themselves worked the ball superbly from left to right and had a shot which nestled into the bottom corner sending the game to penalties.

In the nerve wracking shoot out it was 3-3 after the first five penalties had been taken. It came to those players who least like taking them, but some quality penalties took it to 7-7. Tom Cole saved



his fourth penalty of the day, meaning Riley had to step up and score to be cup winners. The tension around the stadium was truly nail biting. The ball struck just wide of the keeper, struck the inside post and went in. End result - glory for the Brixworth team taking home the Pinner Cup for a year.

Cup Finals

At the end of the first complete football season for two years, Brixworth Junior Under-14s Girls – the only girls' team on the Brixworth Juniors Squad – have finished at the top of their league. As a result, they played in the Northamptonshire FA County Cup final against Northampton Town U14s on April 24th.

The day started early for the girls, with a coach journey to the Corby Steelbacks ground. The sunshine and blue skies made for an auspicious start and spirits were high and several parents and supporters, including siblings and other local fans, made the trip to lend the team their voices and encouragement for the match.

The coaches want to thank the club for putting on the coach to get the girls to the ground, and the sponsors (CPL Aromas, Kip McGrath and Midland Machinery) for their kind generosity throughout the season, contributing towards kits and personalised kit bags for the girls.

Brixworth made a very strong start in the game and by half time had kept Northampton down to a 2-0 lead. This is quite some achievement, considering that



this was a grassroots vs professional match – Northampton are a professional club playing Saturday morning football against the likes of West Ham, Brentford and Lincoln.

Substitutions were brought on to support the team's powerful defence. After an unlucky third goal, Northampton scored twice more



to win 5-0 – a much smaller lead than the last time the two teams met two seasons ago.

The Brixworth keeper was awarded a very well-deserved player of the match, and she made at least two phenomenal saves very early on. The scoreline doesn't reflect the strong challenge that Brixworth made to the Northampton team. While in the end they couldn't quite dominate the play for long enough to convert their hard work into goal scoring chances, it was a great effort by the girls who should consider themselves Grassroots County Champions.

The excellent achievements of Brixworth Juniors U14s girls were recognised by their

coaches, who took them out bowling to celebrate their second place.

The team then competed again in another Cup Final, the Macron League Cup. They made it there through an extremely tense semifinal against Brackley, who came back after a 3-I lead at half time to equalise at 4-4 by full time. A nailbiting penalty shoot-out was ultimately won by a confident Brixworth team

holding their nerve and taking the team through to the final.

The final was played on the afternoon of Saturday 14 May against Kettering Town, once again at Corby Town football club.

In a close encounter, Brixworth had the

most of the play for the first 20 minutes and took the lead with a super strike from the edge of the box to give the girls the lead. Unfortunately for the girls, only a few minutes later a super quick player from Kettering received the ball down the right wing and struck itl past one of our stand-in keepers to level the score.

The game continued into the second half with both sides seeking opportunities, but at the end the score remained I-I which meant yet another end to a cup game on penalties.



Again our second half stand-in keeper performed heroics with two great saves. With only one miss from five penalties, Brixworth u14s Girls won 4-3 on penalties. They were delighted, as were we all!
