

Sharing food to build a community

An interview with Miranda Wixon, founder

of TowFood

"TowFood has been operating since April 2020. Before then I was involved with the Towcester Foodbank, through which I not only got to understand how many people rely on food banks to make ends meet, but also how much surplus food goes to waste.

Community Larders are designed to build a community hub, sharing food saved from waste where everyone is equal.

Towcester Community Food (TowFood) in Towcester and Roade was the first. Castle Ashby and Denton followed in April 2022. Brixworth, Daventry and Woodford Halse made up the third wave, opening in time for the summer holidays 2022.

We work with many others including South Northants Volunteers Bureau, Food for Thought Daventry and the Hope Centre. This gives us many more options for supporting the community.

Food is sourced from FareShare Leicester and Milton Keynes which often

has reasonable "use by" dates but we also get food from local shops, supermarkets, restaurants which is often close to their date and may have been frozen. Plus we always have free fresh fruit and veg.

FareShare charges for the food it distributes, which is why we need a subscription model to ensure a supply of good food every week to members. Volunteers go out every night to collect the food to save it from ending up in landfill. Eating food that would otherwise be wasted saves our planet. Growing and processing food produces CO2 through the energy used in everything from making fertiliser to operating farm machinery, so that should not be wasted. On top of that, when food rots it gives off CO2 and methane and produces masses of water contributing to flooding.

We fund raise and members often pay forward for others so that anyone in hardship is fully supported by their own community.

The response from the community has been absolutely incredible. The pandemic has fostered so much goodwill which has been a springboard for initiatives like this, and there have been so many examples of people's responses shared on our Facebook page. It's incredible. From the elderly widow who has been afraid to go out who is now always the first volunteer to open up, to the single Dad who cannot get his teenage sons out of the bedroom but now the boys prepare the food for them all to eat together, to the Duke of Edinburgh students who bag up fruit and veg to share with members.

My role with the Brixworth Community Larder is to make links with other organisations to ensure that they have the food, safe and effective systems and policies, and provide oversight and ensure compliance. But above all to have fun. We are all volunteers together, sharing and caring for each other."

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Stop food waste (and save some

pennies)

Some 3.6 million tonnes of food are wasted by the food industry every year in the UK. At the same time, the cost of living crisis will really start to hit people in the autumn, when the second huge rise in heating bills will come on top of already skyrocketing fuel bills.

The Brixworth Community Larder (BCL), launched on 27 July, aims to address both challenges at the same time. The Larder seeks to resell surplus groceries that would otherwise be wasted, at below supermarket prices. BCL works with FareShare, a national network of food redistributors, who take good quality surplus food and redistribute it to charities and community groups.

BCL is not a food bank, nor is it restricted to people in need – it is available to everybody who wants to use it. Membership is open to everybody in Brixworth and surrounds.

Councillor Jonathan Harris, who helped to set up the Larder, says: "We want to do our bit to reduce the mountain of food waste whilst helping with the cost-of-living crisis. Everything you buy helps to reduce the risk of good food going to waste and therefore help the environment."

The concept is modelled on TowFood, the Towcester Food Larder, which has been operating since 2020 and blazed a trail for similar projects in Northamptonshire. Through TowFood, the infrastructure is already in place to buy or accept donations of food, distribute to the villages, and enable local people to buy food at below supermarket prices. In future, the Brixworth Community Larder plans to supplement supplies with surplus goods from local businesses.

"We are currently taking around 500kg of food each week, not including tinned and store cupboard produce. While some produce is extremely popular and we have to work on a first come first served basis, people have been very respectful," Harris says. "Any food remaining goes on to the next larder. Any fresh produce that really is at the end of its life is sent to farms for animal fodder. We have been told that there is a larder opening in Moulton in September and they will be running their service on a Wednesday

after ours – so any food left over from the Brixworth larder will not be going very far."

BCL operates as a club, with an annual membership fee of $\mathfrak{L}10$. Members then either pay as they go - $\mathfrak{L}5$ for up to 10 items, or $\mathfrak{L}10$ for up to 22 items. For regular shoppers, subscribing for a full calendar month at $\mathfrak{L}17.50$ for 10 items per week or $\mathfrak{L}35$ for 22.

Extra free items may be available depending on what's in season. BCL will be cashless, with payment taken through a debit or credit card, or online in advance.

Harris anticipates that typically a £5 contribution will buy food worth £20 or more,

though this cannot be guaranteed.

Products stocked will vary from week to week, but will include fresh produce, bread, etc as well as store-cupboard ingredients and long shelf-life products.

The larder is open every Wednesday from 16.30 to 17.15 at Brixworth Village Hall, Holcot Road. People who are less mobile and unable to attend in person can have a bag delivered through a volunteer.

SSPG is currently on a mission to raise funds to equip the two surgeries with useful additional equipment. Our first target is to raise £5,000 to buy two free-standing blood pressure monitors (pictured, right).

Similar units previously stood in the surgeries but, thanks to disuse during Covid, could not be restarted. These stand-alone blood pressure monitors would enable patients to take their own blood pressure, without medical supervision, and then simply hand over the machine's report to reception for the nurse/doctor to review. This would save considerable time for the patient and



free up appointments for staff to handle more critical issues. We all know how 'white coat syndrome' inflates BP results and these machines allow the patient to be more relaxed about taking measurements.

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Parish Council grant saves Country Park volunteers' backs

The Friends of Brampton Valley & Brixworth Country Park are delighted to have received a generous grant from Brixworth Parish Council, enabling it to buy a motorised auger and other equipment.

Currently fencepost holes (however wide they need to be) must be dug out by hand... and back-breaking work it can be, especially for our ageing, aching muscles, as you can see from the image on the right. The new kit, pictured bottom right, will alleviate a great deal of work and achieve significantly faster progress with renewing bollards and fences. The extra funds augment those already received from Councillors Irvine-Swift, Parker, Harris and Rumens. Our sincere thanks go to Brixworth Parish Council and their outstanding support.

Maintenance work in the park's areas is an enjoyable and rewarding pastime, with plenty of time to socialise with the other volunteers over a cuppa. It is highly rewarding when something is built, repaired or a task completed — and there is a non-stop list of seasonal or one-off jobs to be done.

There is also the chance to witness nature going about its business. Areas that need careful treatment include Triangular Meadow, a little-known spot half a mile south of the Oxendon car park. Walkers probably do not even notice it and pass by without a look. However, it is an area that has not been ploughed for very many decades and quite unique for that - wildflowers grow and the only disturbance of the soil is occasional introduction of sheep to graze the grass and keep it under control.

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Apart from controlling the vegetation, there is plenty to keep the Friends busy: memorial benches must be installed or given needed upkeep; signs must be replaced and noticeboards kept up to date - all regular jobs. However, one of our major problems is the policing of Brampton Valley Way. The path is 14 miles long, which is too much to watch it all constantly: only in this last couple of weeks couple of weeks we have



had incidents of major vandalism on the Way and that is where the public's contribution is so helpful. If you spot any issues, please let us

know and we will endeavour to put things right. Better still, become a 'Friend'.

Planting Hedgerow Highways

Last November, as a trustee of the countryside charity CPRE Northamptonshire, I was looking for partners to help us invest in the county's hedgerows – regenerating existing hedges and planting new ones to create hedgerow highways for the county's wildlife.

I was delighted to discover from a previous issue of Brixworth Bulletin that the village already had a Climate Action Group. Councillor Christine Ware, representing both the Parish Council and Action Group, responded enthusiastically to my approach and she and colleagues quickly identified three locations for new hedges – St David's Playing Field, Ashway Park and the Pocket Park off Eaglehurst.

There was competition nationally for the CPRE funding needed and, after a nervous wait, we were thrilled to learn in March that Brixworth had been awarded the $\mathfrak{L}2,750$ it had applied for. It sounds simple, but it involved considerable volunteer effort to make our case.

At the time of writing, we seem surrounded by so many crises – a spiralling cost of living, fuel bills hitting regular new highs, a war in Ukraine and so on – that it is easy to forget the elephant in the room, the global climate crisis. Sadly, this one won't go away any time soon. It's why Brixworth has a Climate Action Group and why CPRE rallied the troops to apply for the funding. In our own small way, we are doing what we can locally to help achieve the government's net zero by 2050 objective.

The hedgerow project dovetails nicely with the Parish Council's existing tree planting plans to support the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The new hedges will soften the hard fence borders at all three of the proposed locations and provide a natural habitat for wildlife. England has reputedly lost around half of its hedgerows since 1945, a loss that will only be reversed by many small steps such as those the Parish Council and CPRE are planning.

The hedgerow planting will be carried out early next year by a



local contractor, but we hope to involve the local community in the project as well. It would be a wasted opportunity to just quietly plant hedges and trees and leave it at that. We will be getting in touch with the Primary School, youth groups and other village organisations to involve them in what will be a valuable and interesting learning experience. We regard the project as a springboard for similar projects in the future. Gaining the interest and support of the community, especially the young, is a way of ensuring this will happen. 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Country Eye

A Tall Story that just happens to be true

I had long since given up any hope of fairies in my garden. If you could see the tangled, deliberately created wilderness at the end, you would understand why no self-respecting winged sprite would want to live there. For the two years since I abandoned it to nature it has been dominated by weeds that thrive in the shade cast by the lime tree. It is obviously going to take some time for a settled community to develop. Definitely a work in progress!

But this year I had an eight-foot giant appear elsewhere in my garden. Well, to be truthful, not quite as tall as that, but only three inches shorter. I know the origin of this giant because I brought it here. It came from Harlestone Firs over 30 years ago. Attracted by a foxglove's showy flowers I snipped off a few seed pods and sowed them in my garden, where they did well. When I came to live here in Brixworth in 1991, of course I had to bring them with me.

To say they flourished in the local soil is a bit of an under-statement. Usually foxgloves are no more than a yard or so in height, but as the years passed I noticed mine were getting taller; not only that but a number of different colours were starting to appear among them. From the normal deep carmine pink to a range of darker forms of which the one in the picture is an example. At the other extreme were a dusky white with all the interior dark spots still present, and a purer white with grey ghostly throat markings.

I find all of them stunningly beautiful but need to remind myself that their ethereal beauty is not for my benefit. As with birdsong there is one overriding driving force – the urge to reproduce. With many plants, the allure of nectar is not enough. Over aeons of evolution



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they have found ever more complex ways of ensuring pollination. At its simplest, many plants rely on the wind to carry their pollen from flower to flower. A ring of petals gives us daisy-type flowers, while flowers bunched together give us the flat heads of yarrow, or spires of Buddleia, much loved by butterflies.

The deep bell-shaped foxglove flowers came much later in evolutionary time. They have the black guide markings to lead longtongued bees to the source of the nectar, literally a flight path for their use. Needless



to say, there are always going to be the renegades with an eye to the main chance, and so there are short-tongued bees that chew a hole at the top of the flower and steal the nectar. Luckily, the cheats are in a minority and an average foxglove will produce many thousands of seeds. Surprisingly, these look like no more than specks of dust and I find it mind-boggling to think that packed within it is all the information necessary to grow my giant. All that is needed is soil, sunlight, rain and the alchemy of photosynthesis.

Another tall plant in my garden that has flowered well is moth mullein. I have taken it with me on my travels for a half century, since a friend gave me seed from plants found on a Gloucestershire roadside. It usually has yellow flowers but mine are a simple milk-white, each with a patch of colour at its centre that I can only describe as burnt crimson. This comes into its own in the hours of darkness when it seems to glow, a beacon irresistible to night-flying moths.

Reluctantly leaving the natural world, I write this just as we are hopefully emerging from the ravages of a record-breaking heat wave. Since 1884 we in the United Kingdom have suffered only four such episodes. All four have been in the last four years. We must turn things around, fast. All of you, find out what you can do, and get on and do it. We cannot wait for the 600-odd Neros in parliament fiddling away to no purpose. Left to them, we fry. – *Brian Webster*



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Brixworth Country Park Update

The Queen's Green Canopy

A wander along the edge of the outer parts of the park by the boundary hedge with Pitsford Water will take you through the newly planted 'Oak Avenue', planted as part of The Queen's Green Canopy Initiative to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee. Iain Welters (owner of Orange and Black Coffee) supplied the trees and, assisted by his son Anton and some helping hands, planted this avenue of 100 oaks. The avenue will become quite a feature as the decades progress: a feature that will become



increasingly appreciated as the trees grow tall, spread their boughs and their beauty shows.

lain's long-standing interest in the environment and tree-planting started when a youngster in Scotland. His work with The Forestry Commission and, more recently, at Irchester Country Park and now Brixworth Country Park has continued his involvement. So far, over 1000 indigenous hardwood trees have been planted within Brixworth Country Park (350) and Martin Moore Wood (860).

Incidentally, trees have also been planted within Northamptonshire Cricket's County Ground with the help of cricket team members. And the idea that one day the willows about to be planted in the park could maybe be used to make the cricket bats of tomorrow gives the trees an appealing potential dual purpose.

This community tree planting project is also found to have a worthwhile social element to it as well, giving a mental lift to those participating either as sponsors or planters.

Funded by Orange and Black Coffee, the project is co-sponsored in a sustainable way with donations from several local businesses being matched on a like-for-like funding basis.

Country Park Open Day..... I 7th August

The Meadow was home for the day to several displays and activities at the Brixworth Country Park Open Day - a fund-raising day to pay for woodland bulbs for planting around the park and plants for the Sensory Garden. Various organisations were present with stalls. Activities included 'Name That Skeleton' when skulls of animals were on show and youngsters could guess the creature.

A Crop of Wildflowers

Since May, both Country Park and Brampton Valley Way have bloomed continuously with wildflowers popping up in meadows, on the banks and in woodland, where we have recorded among others: Meadow Salsify (aka, Jack-go-to-bed-at-noon); Red & White Campions (producs a heady scent at night, attracting many feeding moths); many species of Vetch; Oxeye Daisies; plus, over 7 grasses at Brixworth. On Brampton Valley Way, in a quietly tucked away corner, over 100 Common Spotted Orchid were recorded.

Our work throughout summer and autumn in the Country Park and along Brampton Valley Way is being focused on making more space to encourage even greater flora next summer, keeping pathways accessible and opening up the views from many of the memorial benches.

Our hope is that all will continue to enjoy and respect this fabulous local resource throughout the seasons. – *Keith Dobell*





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Volunteers - the beating heart of

our communities

During the lockdowns Brixworth rose to the challenge with the Covid 19 volunteer network. At the peak of activity, we had more than 100 people giving their time and support to those who needed it. People collecting shopping, cooking pies and soups, making phone calls to reach out to those who were isolating alone were just some of the ways that our volunteers made a difference.

Volunteering goes on all the time though – it's not just a pandemic thing. There is the team at The Olive Branch, The Scout Leaders, The Rainbow leaders, the folk who organise the U3A to name just a few.

The benefits of volunteering are many and different for different people. Many people describe a sense of purpose or making a difference, for some it's a sense of community and a way to make new friends and contacts, some gain new skills, some want to give something back to their community. There is research from the London School of Economics which has examined the relationship between volunteering and measures of happiness. Compared with those who never volunteered, the chance of being 'very happy' rose by 7% amongst those who volunteer monthly, by 12% for people who volunteer every two to four weeks and by 16% for people who help out on a weekly basis.

Of course, there are challenges, such as lack of transport or time constraints, but there are ways around that. Some volunteering roles can be undertaken via the phone or email. Writing and graphic design skills are always valued. The more volunteers the easier the work. You don't have to give huge amounts of time unless you want to!

There are so many ways you can volunteer. In this issue of the

Bulletin alone, groups offering new volunteers an opportunity to get involved include the Scouts, the Country Park, Brixworth Community Larder, Brixworth Central Sports, the Spratton Girlguiding groups, and of course the Bulletin itself.

I would like to talk about a couple in more detail.

FareShare Volunteer Drivers

FareShare need volunteer drivers to help transfer donated food from one larder to the next over the summer.

Donated food from FareShare is currently being stored centrally at Daventry Community Centre and is then distributed to the other larders in Brixworth and Towcester at the right time. To make this work, organisers need volunteer drivers with a largish vehicle (expenses will be paid).

Volunteer help would be needed as follows:

- Monday afternoon 2.30 pm at Woodford Halse to drive provisions to Daventry
- Wednesday afternoon 2.15 pm at Daventry to drive provisions to Brixworth
- Wednesday afternoon 5.15 pm at Brixworth to drive provisions to Towcester

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The Shopper Hopper

Thanks to a fantastic response to our pilot scheme we are delighted that phase 2 of the Shopper Hopper started in September.

CommMiniBus is a new social enterprise seeking to improve the mobility of villagers by introducing a demand responsive minibus service. A pilot scheme launched in May this year and following this successful trial we are delighted to confirm we are moving to a weekly service. We are also stretching out to Pitsford from September too.

From September onwards the Shopper Hopper will operate on a Monday and rotate around four different locations. Each week will be a different supermarket location, Aldi at Moulton, Weston Favell Centre where there is Tesco, Morrisons at Spinney Hill and Sixfields where there is Sainsbury's, M&S Food, Lidl. All these stops include a visit to Brixworth so the Shopper Hoppers can take advantage of our fabulous shops and services in Brixworth.

There will also be trips every second Wednesday to places like Rushden Lakes and Beckworth Emporium.

The Shopper Hopper is another fantastic service supported by volunteers. All the CommMiniBus drivers are volunteers, the administration again done by volunteers. This is how the funds from



the Social Enterprise Fund Northamptonshire can go to where they are needed - the passengers' service linking our rural community up to supermarkets and Brixworth. If you are a bus pass holder then the service is free to use. You can learn more about CommMiniBus at www.cmbus.org/shopper-hopper.

There's been an explosion in interest in paddleboarding in recent years and Pitsford Water is a beautiful place to paddle around. What's more, there are all the facilities available at the club house – changing rooms with hot showers, plus the bar and galley along with safety cover at specified times.

If you're new to paddleboarding or would like to have a go, taster sessions are available to non-members and equipment hire is available to members.

Stand-up Paddleboarding Tips

Here are some tips to get you started and keep you safe on the water.

 Be wind aware – check the wind conditions before leaving the shore. Ideally, try to set off into the wind so that you drift back when you're tired.



- Use a leash falling off is part of the fun so make sure that you're attached to your board and don't have to go swimming after it.
- Wear a buoyancy aid these are required at all times on the water at Northampton Sailing Club.
- 4. Make sure the board is the right way round it's not always obvious which end is the front/nose, especially when using a beginners' board. You can find out by checking where the fin is – it should be at the back to help keep the board straight while you paddle.
- 5. Look at the horizon if you keep your head up, back straight and look at the horizon, it gives you much more stability than looking down at the board or the water around it. Also by engaging your core and relaxing your feet, you'll find it easier.
- Be mindful of other water users. Sailors and Windsurfers will try to avoid you if they can see you, but do be aware of any racing or activities that are taking place and avoid these areas.

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Brixworth Central Sports Club

Brixworth Central Sports Club (BCSC) has deep roots within the village, and was founded in 1969. The building itself was built in 1972, at no cost to the parish, by local volunteers for the village football and cricket clubs. The ground was leased to the club by Brixworth Parish Council on a peppercorn rent of £1 per year for a period of 50 years.

Today, the club remains at the heart of the community and its membership is made up from both long-standing residents and newer arrivals. It is managed on behalf of its 240+ strong members by a committee of unpaid volunteers who oversee its on-going operation and maintenance.


As a 'not for profit' organisation, it has always been the ethos of BCSC to reinvest 'in the community, for the community'. All revenue generated is either ploughed back into club facilities or used to support local sports, good causes and charities.

In recent years there has been plenty of work on the club building: the roof has been replaced and the interior has been completely renovated with new furniture and flooring. New patio furniture enables members to enjoy a drink in the sunshine whilst watching their children play in the park.

The club continues to support local sports teams by providing use of changing, showering and toilet facilities free of charge, even though it has to cover the cost of cleaning these facilities. BCSC has funded kits for Brixworth football junior and senior teams, paid pitch fees, and refurbished the skittle table for Brixworth skittles team, who use the club as their home base.

BCSC has always supported local and national charities. Some of the more recent causes BCSC has supported include the Anthony Nolan Trust, Brixworth Food Share, Brixworth Surgery, and the Christmas Hampers run by Paris Robinson.

The support and local commitment to the





ongoing sustainability of BCSC was never in more need than during the Covid pandemic, which not only affected club activity through lockdowns and restrictions, but during which time the club also suffered a mindless breakin resulting in thousands of pounds worth of damage.

The club is open four days a week for members. Membership is £5 for the first year and £1 for renewals. Anyone over the age of 18 is welcome to join and is encouraged to bring along family members of any age.

The current committee are merely the latest custodians of what is essentially a village sporting and social hub operated by the community, for the community.

The 50-year ground lease comes to an end later this year and the committee are currently working with the Parish Council to retain their fantastic support and ensure this invaluable community asset thrives long into

the future

The BCSC Committee and members will continue all of this tremendous work, with further exciting plans for BCSC already in the pipeline. Here's to the next 50 years! - Jackie Bird





Whether you want to invest in property or save for retirement, there are pros and cons for each. If you're unsure what's best for you, this guide should help to give you a few handy tips to fit your circumstances.

After all, there are no tenants or repairs to think about when you compare it to a buy-to-let property for example.

Another major plus point for pensions is the fact they attract tax relief. So instead of seeing lots of your investment go into the government's pocket, you'll be benefiting personally, with pensions being the most efficient investments from a tax perspective.

Pensions – The Cons

The main downside to a pension is that you can't access any of the money until you're at least 55. However, as it's an investment for your retirement, this shouldn't be an issue, and in some ways, this can be a blessing, as it stops you from pulling the money out on a whim.

Another possible downside to a pension is the fact it's invested in stocks and shares, meaning it could fluctuate. However, as with property, it tends to go up over time, and you have the option to decrease your risk if you wish to.

The Verdict

Ultimately, it comes down to circumstances to determine what's right for you.

When it comes to tax benefits, pensions are the clear winner as they attract tax relief, whereas landlords have been hit with everincreasing tax bills in recent years.

However, when it comes to growth, property fares better than pensions, with house prices reaching record highs recently.

Wombles win Council Grant

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



By the time you read this, hopefully some rain will have fallen to rectify the blistering heat which has taken its toll on all of our green areas.



The upside of such good weather is the fact that the new play area has been extensively used. Other projects soon to open include the eagerly awaited Multi-Use Game Area (MUGA) including floodlights and table tennis at the Community Centre.

Like many other Parishes, our celebration of the Queen's Jubilee will extend into the Autumn, with a celebratory tree planting event in recognition of the Queen's reign.

I hope that following the lifting travel restrictions of the last couple of years you have been able to visit our great local attractions—some of which the Council has been pleased to support with grants.

Community Grants

Grants have been approved to the Friends of the Brampton Valley Way and Brixworth Country Park as well as to Northampton and Lamport Steam Railway.

£500 was awarded to Northampton and Lamport Steam Railway towards the Ironstone Train Project, working to restore a train of 6 ironstone 'tippler' wagons.

The Friends of the Brampton Valley Way and Brixworth Country Park is a newly formed community group set up to promote the use of and support improvements to the Brampton Valley Way and Brixworth Country Park. The group has received £1500 for an augur drill and the training to use it which will be used to help the group dig holes for bollards and fence posts.

Table tennis is one of the most popular sports in the world and there are many benefits to playing!

Table tennis is good for your health – it's great for getting up a sweat and getting the heart rate up. It's easy on the body. You can play pingpong according to your own capabilities and limitations, and still be competitive. Being a non-contact sport, you don't have to worry about those bruises or even broken bones that you can get in contact sports.

There are no age or gender barriers — it's common for 60-year-old veterans to be playing 15-year-old juniors, or men playing against women, and with everyone having a great time. Families can all play each other without having to worry about the bigger or stronger members dominating the game. In fact, many athletes with disabilities can compete on equal terms with able-bodied athletes at table tennis since there is much more to the game than sheer power or strength.

As you get older, ping-pong is good for the brain. There is an awful lot of thinking, planning and strategising on the court, all of which helps keep the grey matter active.

Fire Risks




There are always risks with lighting fires in open areas and outdoors. In Summer, barbecues can cause problems especially if the surrounding grass is very dry as was seen in Duston Mill at the start of July when a large wildfire - roughly the size of a football pitch - was caused by the careless disposal of a barbecue.

Later in the year, gardeners start to burn their waste and in November bonfires help to satisfy our more primitive urges for fire. Biologist Richard Wrangham believes that fire was essential for developing human society, but Northamptonshire Fire Service ask us to be careful.In 2019 they were called to 13 incidents when candles had got out of control. They advise people not to light bonfires at home at all.

The same advice goes for floating "sky lanterns" which pose enormous dangers to crops and wildlife.

The main advice seems to be to resist the urge to set things on fire and keep yourself and environment protected.

Tree and TPOs

Many of us are lucky enough to have gardens with trees, but when it comes to maintenance what can we do? And when do we need permission?

Can I prune a tree outside my property if it blocks my light?

No. If you think a council tree may need maintenance, get in touch with the clerk and let them know.



Can I prune my neighbour's tree if it's overhanging my garden?

There is a right which permits a person to prune back any growth of tree or shrub to the line of their boundary, from their property, as long you dispose responsibly of any cuttings, and first offer them to the owner of the tree.

What is a Tree Preservation Order?

A TPO is made by a local planning authority to protect specific trees, groups



of trees or woodlands. Trees that have a TPO are protected from work and destruction, which cannot happen without the local planning authority's written consent.

Permission is also required for work on any tree in a conservation area - whether it has a TPO or not.
