READERS' MEMORIES OF QUEEN ELIZABETH II -1926-2022

Many of us were saddened to hear of The Queen's passing on 8th September and joined the estimated 4 billion people worldwide on 19th September to watch the State Funeral. This event, and many others from her long reign, have been well documented in the mainstream media, so we thought we'd bring it down to a more intimate level by asking readers for any personal memories of The Queen.

My own story comes from 1980 when, as a schoolgirl, I was beyond excited that the pop group Adam and the Ants (who'd actually appeared on 'Top of the Pops?) was coming to do a concert in my hometown, Lincoln, and I'd managed to get tickets. A few weeks beforehand, however, the council cancelled the concert citing that it clashed with the Queen's visit to the city, and all their resources (crowd barriers, police etc.) would be needed for that. In typical teenage fashion, I stomped around the house, '...why, why, why? Just because of the stupid Queen!' which resulted in my father, usually such a placid man, getting angry with me for showing such a lack of respect. The irony of this story, however, is that I was then one of the local school children selected to form a guard of honour outside Lincoln Cathedral as The Queen entered, thus making my father very proud. Then, on the day, standing there in my smart black blazer waiting for The Queen to pass by, a pigeon decided to offload on my shoulder - divine retribution? - or, as I like to think, her Majesty having the last laugh?

And from villagers who have lived throughout her entire 70-year reign...

On an autumnal Wednesday, I joined local pensioners for their weekly lunch at the Olive Branch to share their personal reminiscences about the late Queen.

Allan Pope, a self-confessed hoarder, started the lunch by sharing his collection of newspapers commemorating important events as far back as 1961. Amongst his collection, he had newspapers celebrating The Queen's Silver Jubilee (The Daily Express June 8th 1977) and the more recent Platinum Jubilee (The Daily Mail June 6th 2022) - it was fascinating to compare the two occasions and to see that, in spite of massive world changes in the intervening 45 years, the British people's warmth towards The Queen had not diminished.

Sue McAspurn, had the earliest '*memory*'; as a child, she'd been told repeatedly that she was 'present at The Queen's Coronation'. In June 1953, Sue's mother, an ardent royalist, had been 7 months pregnant with Sue and, along with a toddler (Sue's older sister), she'd gone down to London and waited with the cheering crowds for the Gold State Coach to pass. It was one of the highlights of her mother's life and a memory that she often shared with Sue.

On May 6th next year, Sue fully intends to be present on the streets of London at King Charles III's Coronation to honour her mother's memory.

Another 'full circle' story was shared by David and Christine Dawson. David's earliest memory of his mother was '...being dragged down the lane to watch the Royal Train pass'; he recalls standing on the embankment being 'made to wave as it sped by', and although he wasn't old enough to appreciate what all the fuss was about, he sensed his mother's excitement. Decades later, in May 2012, at his mother's funeral in Burnley, David recalled this episode from his childhood in the Eulogy he read out. Imagine his surprise when, at the wake, he was told that The Queen and Duke of Edinburgh were about to pass by; 'everybody piled out of the pub to watch as the car slowed down allowing people to look and wave'. David's family got a close-up view of Her Majesty, who was visiting Burnley as part of her Diamond Jubilee tour, and David felt that there couldn't have been a better tribute to his late mother.

Some of the pensioners had recollections of The Queen visiting the local area with her family when she was still Princess Elizabeth. Her parents, George VI and The Queen Mother often visited friends in the county at one of the neighbouring estates. It is known, for example, that as a girl The Queen used to go pony riding in the grounds of Pitsford Hall when it was the home of the Drummond family.

Peggy Lade, proud to be born the same year as The Queen, remembered a day in the early 80's, when Northampton Road was lined with people waving as The Queen and Duke of Edinburgh passed through Brixworth. She had heard that Her Majesty would always sit on the righthand side of the car, so made sure she was standing on the right side to get the best view!

None of those at the lunch had ever had personal contact with The Queen, but it was clear that she had still been a presence in their long lives and that they associated her with very fond family memories stretching across the generations.

It wouldn't be right to finish this article without thanking the Olive Branch for allowing me to join their lunch. They do a wonderful job every Wednesday allowing our senior citizens to meet and share their memories in such a welcoming and safe environment.



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Bulletin helps deserving causes

Earlier this year, the Brixworth Bulletin invited readers to suggest local initiatives, people or groups that would benefit from some financial support. We've been lucky enough to be supported with loyal advertisers every issue, which enables the Bulletin to periodically give back to the local community.

This year, we're able to help three different organisations or fundraisers.

Firstly, the Bulletin gave £2000 to Little Stars parents and tots group,

which is based outside at the Brixworth Centre Preschool and meets every Wednesday from 10-11.30am. So far, the group has used the money to buy some new tuff spots and stands. "*These allow us to set up different areas the children can play in and house a range of different resources on a weekly basis*," said the group's chairwoman, Victoria Starmer.

"Resources might include sand and diggers, painting, building blocks, potion stations, and corn flour messy fun."



The group also bought new rugs for the playground floor so the children can lay and sit and be comfortable whilst they play, and some rubber matting for the younger children so they can sit or lay and enjoy their time at group.

The group leaders plan to use the rest of the money to buy some more sit on, push along toys, expand the range of cars and trucks, and stock up on items such as lentils, sand, corn flour, shaving foam for the children to experience messy play.

Then there is the Saxon Spires Patient Participation Group (SSPPG),

which is raising money to buy two blood pressure monitors for Brixworth and Guilsborough surgery. Patients will be

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able to use the monitors themselves at the surgery, saving time for patients and freeing up surgery staff to deal with other appointments. The Bulletin donated £1500 towards this, bringing SSPPG a lot further towards their £5000 fundraising goal.



They have not yet reached their target, so if you are able to help too, please contact <u>ssppg2022@gmail.com</u> for details. See p12 of this Bulletin for more information on the role of the SSPPG and the contribution they make to our village surgery.

Lastly, the Bulletin gave £460 towards the caretakers of Loder Hall in Maidwell. Loder Hall is a much-loved small village hall, run by a charitable trust, which is used for village events and groups. Its gravelled car park was in need of an overhaul.

"It's been at least six years since we last resurfaced it and the gravel had slowly but surely disappeared and given way to potholes," said local resident Colin Rabjon, who maintains the carpark. "The Bulletin's donation paid for new gravel to be laid which makes a huge improvement."

Co-op still considers loading bay options

Operators of the Co-op store currently being built on the site of the Red Lion pub are still considering options for where deliveries to the shop might be unloaded.

Planners acting for the Co-op have twice applied for planning permission for an unloading bay on Northampton Road, outside the row of shops next to the new Co-op; both applications were refused.

A new application now due to be considered by West Northants Planning Committee would instead use the car park as an unloading area. Delivery lorries would enter the car park using the normal car park entrance, unload, and then leave the car park to the north, crossing the car parking bays there. Collapsible bollards would block the northern entry to the car park when not in use.

Local residents have raised a concern that if deliveries take place during times when the shop is open, this would have a huge detrimental impact on the already-limited parking on the site. "The lorries would be coming up Northampton Road from the south, crossing the road into the main Co-op entrance and then unloading in the parking area," said a concerned resident, who lives near the site. "All movement in and out of the car park would have to stop and the five spaces at the northern end of the car park would have to be emptied before the arrival of the lorries. What a mess and what a nightmare for traffic and pedestrians."

Brixworth Parish Council's Planning Committee, which discussed the proposal in October, shared many of the concerns raised. They further questioned how frequent the deliveries would be – the Co-op's application refers to 'infrequent' deliveries, but local residents fear that could mean anywhere between four and seven deliveries per day.

Whilst the Planning Committee ultimately agreed to accept the proposal in principle, it asked for the application to be dealt with by committee at West Northants Council, and for the committee to

consider whether deliveries could be restricted to being made out of hours.

The councillors also considered carefully the impact the proposed unloading scheme might have on road safety and asked for Northants County Council to reassess visibility at the site, as the current assessment is over four years old. If the proposal goes ahead, proposed tree planting around the site



would need to be re-evaluated. The Parish Council Planning Committee further asked that parking restrictions along the southern edge of Northampton Road should be considered, to ensure vehicles leaving the site have a clear line of sight and don't endanger other vehicles or pedestrians.

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Impressive sporting success for 3 of our readers

The London Marathon: 2022

Duncan Collins

After several unsuccessful applications to the marathon ballot, Duncan was delighted to be offered the opportunity to take part this year through his work. He drew up a 16 week training plan involving 4 runs a week of varying lengths, mostly around Brixworth, along the Brampton Valley and many circuits of Pitsford Reservoir. He found the extreme heat this summer a bit challenging but was fortunate enough to stay injury free. Duncan describes himself as "quite driven and competitive"



and set himself the ambitious target of finishing the course in less than four hours!

On the day, Duncan found the first half of the course "a breeze... the crowds and atmosphere were amazing and I felt good," but then, at

around the 17 mile mark, *"I started to feel it... doubting I could finish in my target time – questioning if I'd run too quickly early on..."* and at 20 miles, he had to walk for a minute *"just to*



reset". Luckily, not long after this, he spotted his wife and eldest daughter in the crowd and recalls *"this gave me the lift I needed to get through the last five miles or so to the finish line."*

In the end, Duncan completed the course with an official time of 3h 56m and although "...feeling hugely fatigued and having the worst cramp I've ever experienced," he was so pleased and relieved to have achieved his target. He was also grateful to his wife and family who supported and encouraged him from day one. He is still running and eager to have another go, but was unsuccessful in the 2023 London Marathon ballot.

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Country Eye Crash, Bang, Wallop

To say that this government has got itself in something of a pickle is a gross understatement. Yet order could be restored by changing just one word in the prime ministers initial address. Growth, growth, growth should have been renewables, renewables. renewables. Had this country gone all out for harnessing the power of the sun, through wind, sun, tidal, and hydro, instead of signing up to David Cameron's "cut the green crap", we could be well on the way to the 1.5°C of warming target climate scientists tell us is the maximum, if we are to have any chance of moving along a path towards a climate-friendly future.

In past articles I have tried to remind you of the former wildlife



riches that we took for granted in my early years in the 1940s to 1950s. When butterflies bees and myriad other insects jostled each other in their quest for nectar in flowerfilled meadows.

Birds and small creatures galore made our hedgerows seem

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to vibrate with the sounds of their daily lives. Even a short car drive would have us getting out to clear kamikaze insects from the windscreens. But scientists now tell us the decline in our wildlife populations was already well under way. Long before global warming was even suspected by most of us our daily activities were causing changes. It is widely accepted that Rachel Carson's "Silent Spring", published in 1962, marked a profound shift in understanding how our actions



could affect the wider environment, could in fact cause profound changes. We ought to have heeded those changes but we didn't, and now with catastrophic climate meltdown staring us in the face we are beginning to pay the price.

Yet the lesson we need to re-learn is out there in what's left of the natural world that we haven't already trashed. Take the blackbirds that still squabble over who owns what in my own garden, and in your garden and the local parks. First off they settle their disputes with sham fighting, and no serious harm results. There is a lesson here for the evil Putin and his warmongering like, I think. When spring comes around they seek a mate and settle down to breed and raise as many young as possible. With the blackbird they are known to nest up to four times in a good year, so that if all the young survived there would be maybe 15 birds where there were but two. Before we knew where we were we would be waist deep in blackbirds!

In reality, to maintain a stable population only two birds need to survive to breed the following year. Stability is key here and it is achieved without conscious thought being given to it by a parliament of blackbirds sitting in high places. Natural regulation of animal numbers is built in to the system. We are still part of that system, whether we choose to acknowledge it or not, and so must learn to set our lives to it. This does not mean returning to the Stone Age, as many detractors would have you believe.

What it does mean is learning to live within the limits set by the finite size of this fragile speck of cosmic dust we call Earth. Sounds simple yet it does require rapid changes to our current lifestyles. A way must be found to redistribute wealth so that we all may have a roof over our heads, keep warm, have enough to eat; a convivial life for all. Many would call this pie in the sky, but I am far from alone in believing that given the collective will, it is there for us to work towards. A universal basic income would allow this and work towards a stable, benign climate would be vital.

To be clear what I am suggesting is that we do not abandon technology rather that we aim for a combination of the best of the traditional with the best of the new. Surely that is not beyond our grasp? All it takes is the collective will. Are you up for it?

Enhanced access to GP Appointments




From the 1st October the NHS require Primary Care Networks (PCN's) to provide Enhanced Access to appointments between the hours of 6.30pm – 8pm Mondays to Fridays and between 1pm to 5pm on

Saturdays. Saxon Spires is one of a group of five Practices in the Northamptonshire Rural PCN.

The Practice has had to look at achieving the increase of appointments whilst also protecting staff from burnout. The PCN has engaged the services of a firm called LIVI.

They employ fully qualified GP's to offer telephone and video link appointments during the extra hours. If a prescription was needed, they can be sent directly to a local chemist of the patient's choice. The appointments can be made in the usual way, by contacting the surgery reception.

Steam to Green — The Brampton Valley Way

All those decades ago, when the Victorians laid the railway through, little could they have even guessed what a lovely place it would become. No doubt, the trains would have looked good in their magnificent individual liveries when passing through: LNWR, Midland Railway and Great Western Railway travelled the line. But (and with apologies to railway enthusiasts) a railway line itself is a pretty bleak place; however, Brampton Valley Way's verdant corridor makes it a completely different kettle of fish. There is such a stark

difference between the openness of the original railway and today's beauty of the greenery along Brampton Valley Way. The views enjoyed by those rail passengers of old are still there but can be taken in at a far more leisurely pace by sitting on one of the many benches. Walking along an active railway line would have been a risky business; whereas, today, the only threat is of being attacked by a blackthorn bush.



Overall, roughly 5,000 miles of track were closed and more than 2,300 stations were axed across the country in the 1960s, mainly in rural areas, following the Beeching Report. Although the line from Northampton to Market Harborough closed after Dr. Beeching's axe fell, it carried freight traffic until 1981 and then fell into disrepair before being stripped of its



rails and fittings. But then nature took over and 50 years on we have a fabulous local resource bordered by shrubs and trees.

There are plenty of railway features to be

seen among the vegetation along the 14 miles of BVW. A walk along the whole of the Brampton Valley Way reveals remnants of the former infrastructure...buildings, tunnels, bridges and the like. Originally, stations opened in 1859 were built at Pitsford & Brampton, Brixworth and Lamport. The additional stops of Spratton, Kelmarsh and Clipston & Oxendon were added later. All closed in 1960 for passenger services but freight traffic continued for a few years.

Pitsford & Brampton Station, by Brampton Halt, opened 1859 closed in 1950 but sees new life thanks to the efforts and dedication of the Northampton & Lamport Railway.

Spratton Station, opened 1864 closed in 1949. Its Signal Box, long since relocated to Lamport & Northampton



Railway's yard at Brampton Halt, is still intact. One enterprising signalman based at Spratton is said to have been a part-time barber: train crews would get their haircut from him while the signals were held on red...one explanation for delays and makes a pleasant change from the hackneyed 'a cow on the line' or 'wrong kind of leaves'.

Brixworth Station, located on Creaton Road, opened 1859 closed 1964: its ruins are barely visible today. Pictured here is as it was and contrast that to today's green scene...no comparison!



Lamport Station, opened 1859 closed 1960, is said to have played host to The Royal Train when it stopped overnight in the siding there on its journey North. Apparently, The Duke of

Edinburgh, no less, was the passenger. The train was heavily guarded overnight and it is said one of the sentries almost shot a coughing cow, thinking it was a dangerous intruder preparing to attack.



Nature has managed to claw back this man-made structure and the overgrown vegetation has transformed its appearance from a stark open area to a rich leisure resource. Repossessed by greenery, Brampton Valley Way provides a place of relaxation, tranquillity and exercise for us to enjoy. Park Rangers and the team of Volunteers endeavour to keep it all under control and maintain the paths.

However, despite all the good intentions, the spectre of reopening the official line remains over it. Contradictory opinions and comments abound about the future of Brampton Valley Way. The threat of reinstating the Northampton to Market Harborough line remains and there are conflicting inclusions with Northampton's Strategic Plan and that of West Northampton Council. Fortunately, there is a great deal of effort going into trying to preserve Brampton Valley Way and gaining a protected status for it as, for instance, a formal linear park. But that is an ongoing debate, at local government levels and, hopefully, a proposal has been tabled. Personally, I sincerely hope that protected status can be secured enabling generations to come to enjoy it to the full.





Table Tennis Makes a Difference

Not all care homes have the funding or provision to offer residents a wide scope of activities which engage them mentally and physically. Helen, 84, has Vascular Dementia but when she plays table tennis, she 'comes alive and has a zest for life'. Her daughter said, 'it's like new connections are forming in her brain when she plays, Mum will play anyone and she's really good!' Helen had also previously suffered from Sciatica which disappeared through playing table tennis. She knows how to play an ace shot across the table too.

Table tennis is a truly social sport and has allowed Helen the opportunity to mix with fellow enthusiasts of all ages, coupled with the mental and physical benefits of playing. Helen's family would love to see future studies into the health benefits table tennis can offer and more provision for the sport in care homes and day centres.









Hedgerows and Hedgehogs

According to the CPRE - the Countryside Charity- "Hedgerows are the vital stitching in the patchwork of our countryside." The CPRE wants to see more hedgerows planted and restored because they support existing wildlife and help to combat climate change. To help with their campaign to extend the hedgerow network by 40% by 2050, we are using a grant to improve the hedgerows in various places in the village including The



Ashway Playing Field and St David's Playing Field. The current hedgerows on The Ashway will be trimmed to improve their quality and security for existing properties while hopefully allowing for fewer lost footballs in the brambles. This will promote biodiversity within the hedgerow.



The Brixworth Climate Action Group is hoping to get involved with many other local groups over the winter months, to support wildlife in the village. This could be making bird feeders, or building hedgehog shelters, or perhaps your group would like to help with planting. If you would like to get involved please contact the Clerk. 
This is supported by information from the Domestic Violence Assessment Consultancy and Training says that "Financial pressures, alcohol on tap, trying to create the 'perfect' Christmas and being cooped up together for long periods all contribute to a regular rise in domestic abuse."

In 2021, a number of protection notices were issued over the Christmas period to help safeguard victims.

The Proclamation

Following the sad passing of Queen Elizabeth II the Parish Council put into action the plans as set out by central government in Operation London Bridge. A wreath was laid by the flag pole at the Community Centre and then another later at the All Saints' Church.

At 1500 hours on Sunday the 11th of September, the Proclamation was read out to a crowd of residents by the Chairman Sandra Moxon and Vice- Chairman Jackie Bird proclaiming King Charles III the new Sovereign of the United Kingdom and the



Commonwealth. This is the traditional way in which the people would have been informed going back many centuries. prior to modern media coverage.

The Accession Council met at St James's Palace to formally announce the death of The Queen and proclaim the new Sovereign. The order requires the High Sheriffs to arrange for the Proclamation to be read in their areas of jurisdiction. The flag, which



was flying at half mast, was briefly raised to announce the new King and then lowered again as a mark of respect for the death of the Queen.

This is an historic moment in Brixworth which provided an opportunity to come together and reflect on the moment in our history when the reign of our longest serving Monarch came to an end and our new Sovereign succeeded.
