Co-op takes shape

as the loading bay is approved



The new Co-op store on the site of the former Red Lion pub is taking shape. The exterior of the building is complete, and the building does fit in very well with the surrounding areas, residents have noted.

Co-op to use car park for loading

Meanwhile, the long running issue of the shop's loading bay has been resolved, after a Planning Inspector upheld the Co-op's appeal against West Northamptonshire Council's refusal of the proposed delivery management plan. The Co-op now has the green light to proceed with operating the deliveries using a section of the car park for HGVs to unload.

The Co-op will receive between two and four HGVs each day, between 7am and 10am, plus up to two transit vans between 7am and 11am. They will deliver most of the shop's goods, including sandwiches and newspapers. Six spaces of the car park's fourteen spaces will remain cordoned off while deliveries are expected.

In explaining his decision, the inspector acknowledged that using the car park for deliveries means that even fewer parking bays will be available for customers. However, he pointed out that this would only affect the shop for a few hours each day, and not during the busiest times, which would limit the number of customers having to park on the street.

While the number of parking bays is much lower than the 35 that Northamptonshire Parking Standards would call for, the inspector

felt that "14 on-site spaces [are] acceptable when considering such factors as the parking shortfall that would have applied when the site was previously in active use as a public house, anticipated customer dwell times, and the results of parking beat surveys."

Before reaching his decision, the inspector also visited the site both in the afternoon and during morning rush hour to see for himself how traffic is affected by the road layout and parked vehicles near the store. He noted that while traffic was proceeding with caution around the bend, it was nevertheless relatively free flowing.

Pedestrian crossing

Jonathan Harris, ward councillor for Brixworth at West Northants County Council, had been making the case for a pedestrian crossing and a 20 mph zone to be created near the new Co-op, to make it safer for pedestrians to visit the shop. However, this was not upheld in the appeal ruling.

The inspector said that his remit was to rule on the delivery management plan, and establishing a crossing was not a reasonable requirement in order to manage deliveries, especially as he felt that visibility at the site was acceptable. "I will be keeping in contact with highways as the store opens and we get a sense of how things are going," Jonathan told the Bulletin. "They know that if there are problems they will have a responsibility to help address matters." -

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Brixworth firefighters serve the community for 70 years

As we clock up 70 years of fire cover in Brixworth,
Northamptonshire Fire and
Rescue Service invite you to be part of the next 70 years.

Most people who become a firefighter want to make a difference in their local community and that's no different to the on -call firefighters in Brixworth who commit to spending much of their spare time on-call and ready to respond to emergency incidents in and around the town.

Brixworth Fire Station opened in 1953 and has provided emergency cover to the town and surrounding area for 70 years. Many residents have served as on-call firefighters at the fire station, not only responding to emergencies but also attending community events and local activities delivering fire safety information, as well as welcoming visits from local groups.





Firefighters have a passion to protect and help their communities, carrying out the same emergency work that fulltime firefighters do. In Northamptonshire, oncall firefighters make up around 45% of the county's operational staff and are essential in ensuring emergency cover right across the county.

Based at the station today are Watch Manager Martin Parsons, Crew Managers Edward Bibb and Paul Warren and Firefighters Lee Mayes, Jon Sharp, Richard Slinn, Jordan Tester and Carla Williams. Each on-call firefighter has a 'day' job but when on duty for Northamptonshire Fire and Rescue Service, respond to a pager when the alert sounds.

Here, some of the crew reveal their

motivations for joining the Fire Service and explain how the Brixworth community can get involved.

Martin has been a firefighter for 16 years, joining after he left university. He initially worked in the Fire Service Control Room receiving 999 fire calls from members of the public. He remembers one incident that influenced his decision to become a frontline responder.

"I was talking to someone trapped in a house fire, talking her through what to do and where to go to stay safe as well as feeding vital information to the crew who were on their way to the incident," Martin said. "The phone cut off during the conversation and I had no idea what had happened to that woman."

Martin spoke to the crew who attended the fire to find out whether he had done enough to help the casualty and the firefighters and then asked to join them on a few shifts to see for himself exactly what they do.

"It was brilliant. I was hooked," Martin said. "I knew that this was the right route for me."



About a year later, Martin was on a shift and had a visit from the woman he had been talking to at the house fire. She had spent much of the year in and out of hospital following the fire, but the advice Martin had given her over the phone and the information he had passed to the attending crew saved her from what could have been a fatal incident.

Firefighter Jon Sharp, who is a full-time paramedic, noticed the recruitment banner outside Brixworth Fire Station and made enquiries. After attending an information evening and visiting the station on drill night he decided to apply and has been with the Brixworth on-call crew for a year now.

Jon explains: "The selection process involved job-related tests, where I had to carry out activities that simulated things a firefighter might have to do as part of the role. There was also an interview and a fitness test. You need a certain level of fitness to do the job, so I started running and watched my diet to improve my chances of getting in."

Community engagement is a key part of being a firefighter. "I really enjoyed lighting up the drill tower with pumpkins at Halloween and showing cubs and scouts around the fire appliance. I have carried out home fire safety visits in Brixworth and have represented NFRS at events in the county, including Diwali,"



Jon added.

Also in the crew is Edward Bibb, who has been an on-call firefighter for more than eight years and has recently completed the full-time (whole-time) firefighter training, enabling him to serve the county as his full-time job. He continues to work as an on-call firefighter in Brixworth, saying that joining the fire service was: "one of the best things I have ever done."

Edward attended a recruitment event at

Brixworth Industrial Estate nine years ago, having previously spoken with a family friend who worked for the fire service to find out more about the role

Edward would encourage anyone considering joining the service as an on-call firefighter to visit Brixworth fire station on drill night and chat to the crew. He said: "The recruitment process takes a while so be patient because it's a great career to get into. No two incidents are the same and it's not just fires. You can go to road traffic collisions, flooding and animal rescues too. You work as a team and build strong and trusted friendships that help us serve the community."

Interested in joining?

The Brixworth crew are looking to recruit on-call firefighters to join them. If you are interested in finding out more, pop along to their drill night on a Monday evening between 7.00pm and 9.00pm for a chat.

Martin offers some sound advice to anyone interested: "The commitment to become an on-call firefighter is a unique one and one that will likely impact family and friends too. Find out what that commitment looks like by attending have-a-go days and recruitment events and meet the Brixworth crew at the station. Once you have that understanding, speak to your friends and family about it. They will be the biggest supporters through your career in the fire service and it's important that everyone understands the role."

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Country Eye - On a Stormy Night

It was about this time of year when I sat in my conservatory as darkness was hastened by black clouds heavy with rain gathering overhead. Before I knew it, the rain was lashing down, stair-rods as country folk have it. Just as well I was alone as in my conservatory as it would have been impossible to talk, so loud was the drumming above me. After about an hour it rapidly eased, the sky cleared and a brilliant silvery moon cast a light so bright I could see the still sodden garden clearly.

The next day, the patio was still wet as I stepped out to feed the birds. There I spotted an object lying on the slabs that appeared to be moving slightly. It was a large oval-shaped beetle. When I turned it over I could see that all but two of its legs were reduced to mere stumps, pathetically it was still trying to walk. As it was clearly in some distress, I poured some boiling water into a bowl and dropped it in, the quickest way to kill it humanely. I recognised the beetle immediately as a great diving beetle (*Dytiscus marginalis*). At over an inch long, it is one of our larger species of beetle.

Dytiscus has a fascinating life story. Starting off as an egg laid by the female in the tissues of a water plant, the hatchling sets out on life as an ever-hungry carnivore. Armed with curved jaws, once they are locked into the soft body of its prey they cannot be dislodged. Fond of water snails, later it moves on to tadpoles and small fish. It grows rapidly, shedding its skin several times, until almost two inches long with a slender curved body. When ready to enter the next stage it climbs out of the water, sheds its skin one last time to reveal the chrysalis. Eventually the adult beetle emerges to begin the cycle all over again. As an air breather both larva and adult must come to the surface to take on air. They do this by

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
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poking their hinder end through the surface film. The adult stores air under its wing cases and an air bubble can be seen at its hinder end as it descends. Often living into a second year, they mate and produce eggs.

As a night hunter it is not often seen, but even so is a common



As for the stump-legged individual I found in my garden, having worked in the schools education service of the Northampton Museum, I knew how I could make it live on. I pinned it to a cork setting board. Using a fine needle set in a wooden handle, I eased open the hard wing cases to reveal the neatly folded wings. Then ever so gently I spread them to their fullest extent. Mounted in this position in a small glass case it went to many schools across the county as part of the loan service.

It's unthinkable in today's world, but I well remember as a schoolboy during the war years being left to wander at will in the long school holidays. Harlestone Firs was only a mile from my then home in Kingsthorpe. Bisected by the railway line was a small copse we knew as bluebell wood, and at its edge stood a large, galvanised steel water tank, kept filled for obvious reasons. It was here I made my first observations of the remarkable *Dytiscus*. I waited patiently as one after the other they surfaced and turned hind end upwards to take on air. I could see how they opened their wing cases slightly as they did so.

Looking back, I realise how lucky I was, and how starved of contact with nature too many of today's youngsters are. How on earth are we to inspire them to care without encouraging them to look and find out? The question needs to be asked if we are to stem nature's losses and as a vitally necessary part of safeguarding our own future.

Northants after the Roman conquest

Friends of All Saints Church presents a talk by Michael Curtis, the chair of Northamptonshire Archaeological Society, on how Northamptonshire changed under Roman governance.

Michael will explain how, in the aftermath of the Roman conquest of Britain, the Catuvellauni, a tribe that had originally established its heartland in Hertfordshire and Essex, became more prominent and expanded its territory to encompass most of Northamptonshire.

The expansion was linked to the establishment of an administrative region, with its centre at Verulamium. This talk explores the impact of this in this northern part of the region and the changes that took place in the tribal landscape of the late Iron Age as the impact of Roman governance began to take hold.

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"...you could do a lot worse than Brixworth." – a recent quote from a survey by Muddy Stilettos (the digital lifestyle magazine) on 'Best Places to Live in Northamptonshire' – where Brixworth came in 9th place.

Interestingly, in this survey, the number one and number three spots went to Towcester (population 11,542 Census 2021) and Daventry (pop 28,000) respectively, with Long Buckby taking second place (pop 4,511). The survey clearly favours our county's smaller towns and larger villages, the question is why?

In a post pandemic world, we are told that everybody wishes to move to the countryside; but perhaps smaller villages, with no amenities and a carbon-heavy reliance on the car, are out of favour or just a step too far for former city dwellers? Whatever the reason, living in an everexpanding village like Brixworth, gives us cause to consider the differences between villages and towns and what makes somewhere 'a good place to live'.

Village

It's difficult to find a clear definition of a village, but National Geographic says it is – "a small settlement usually found in a rural

setting. It is generally larger than a 'hamlet' but smaller than a 'town'. Some geographers specifically define a village as having between 500 and 2,500 inhabitants."

In the 2021 Census, Brixworth's population was recorded as 5,766 (up from 5,228 in 2011) which puts us way beyond this definition of a 'village' – although the largest 'village' in England Lancing, East Sussex, with a population of 19,000! This is not, however, a rant about the current policy to cloak our countryside with a patchwork quilt of housing estates. But given Brixworth's ongoing growth, let's reflect on what makes a village a village and a town a town.

National Geographic goes on to say that "In most parts of the world, villages are settlements of people clustered around a central point." In the UK the 'central point' of a village has historically been a church; this is apparent in the older part of Brixworth where buildings are clustered around All Saints' church. That said, the more recent linear expansion of the village has mostly been to the south, meaning that the church is no longer at its geographic heart. Spratton, on the other hand, with a population of 1,287 (C. 2021) and a church in the middle, would appear to be the perfect definition of a village.

Hamlet

The presence of a church is usually what separates a 'village' from a 'hamlet' — defined by National Geographic as "a very small settlement without a church and belonging to the parish of another town or village."

This would mean that, strictly speaking, Hanging Houghton, with its population of





84 (C. 2021), is not a village but a 'hamlet' which falls under the parish of Lamport.

Town

National Geographic defines a town as "generally larger than a village, but smaller than a city... a small town having between 2,500-20,000 residents. Towns usually have local self-government, and they may have grown around economic activities such as mining."

So, by population alone, Brixworth could fall into the 'small town' category.

Traditionally, villages became towns when awarded a royal charter to hold a market, but today it's more likely to be down to "population growth or the addition of small industry providing employment." — wait a minute, doesn't that sound like Brixworth?

Northampton is an example of a market town; although with its population of 245,899 (C. 2021), up from 215,273 in 2011, it's considered to be one of the largest towns in the UK. Which leads to another question 'when is a town a city?'

City

Britain's smallest city, St. David's in Pembrokeshire, has a population of under 2,000, so clearly city status cannot be determined by population alone.

According to the House of Commons library, several factors come into play to confer city status. This includes having a cathedral (which explains St David's city status), a particular form of local government, or having a large population.

That said, it still comes down to a royal charter – city status is granted by the monarch, on the advice of ministers.

What about Brixworth?

So going strictly by population size,

Brixworth might have become a small town some time ago. But should population be the only thing that determines 'village' or 'town' status?

Villages and towns are usually very different in character. In the Muddy Stilettos survey, the positives for living in Brixworth were listed as "Just a stone's throw from the county town, Brixworth Village has got it all: the location, the character, the community vibe and the bustling amenities ..." So, let's examine the criteria more closely.

Location: Brixworth is indeed close to town and, Kingsthorpe traffic and roadworks permitting, it's possible to get to Northampton station in 20 minutes and commute to London - but then, Long Buckby has its own railway station!

The survey goes on to point out, however, the many advantages of living next to the reservoir and the Brampton Valley Way – which few residents would dispute. It also mentions 'nearby attractions' and the beauty of the surrounding countryside.

Character: Brixworth may not be first choice on any film location scout's list looking for a quintessential English village, but the sandstone buildings in the old part of the village are arguably as cinematic as anything in the Cotswolds. Panning south to

the Hunter's Way shops and successive tacked on housing developments, however, any similarity with the Cotswolds is soon dispelled.


Bustling amenities: for 'bustling' read 'busy' – if around the shops on a Saturday morning, the adjective 'chaotic' may even spring to mind. With the population of a small town, is our one restaurant, two pubs, three cafes and a single supermarket enough? Second place Long Buckby boasts two supermarkets, four pubs and numerous restaurants and take aways.

Community Vibe: This is where Brixworth is still very much a village! We proved this during the pandemic when every street was covered by a volunteer 'street rep' and the community came together to care for the elderly and vulnerable – this wasn't the case in many towns and cities. The library noticeboards or a flick through the Bulletin show just how many groups, clubs and activities are available in the community for every age range.

So, does it really matter if a place is defined as a 'town' or 'village', as long as it's a good place to live? On reflection, perhaps it's true that "...you could do a lot worse than Brixworth!"

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Drama Group celebrates with two comedies







Volunteering at Brixworth Country Park & Brampton Valley



Way may seem to some a rather masochistic pastime, especially if you follow Doug's regular reports on our Friends of **Brampton Valley** Way Facebook page. Working in -12°C only a couple of months after almost 40° can be a challenge. But we managed to cope by finding suitable jobs wherever possible!! The

volunteers are a great bunch and enjoy the company, banter, fresh air, exercise, tea & biscuits.


And we have very much enjoyed all the tremendous support given



by members, Facebook followers and the financial help from BCP & WNC: reinforced by all the goodwill expressed to us by users of the park and way.

What drives a volunteer? That is a very hard thing to define, especially with the mud,

get up to, read on...



Teams, in one form or another, are in at the park on several days of the week and one set concentrates on the Way on Thursdays to support the Park Rangers, Debbie and John. Tasks range from simple horticulture through to low-end civil engineering projects and, over the year, a wide spectrum of jobs is undertaken. Brixworth Country Park and Brampton Valley Way have common needs but also differ in many respects. Manual tools are augmented by power kit: the Park can use 2-stroke equipment but, for the Way, battery-powered is lighter to handle and far more suitable. Within the park the Kawasaki Mule is used to move kit and materials to the project site; whereas, for the Way we need a roadworthy vehicle to get up and down the A508.

Loading Roger the Ranger (park's pickup truck), that is my 1st job on Thursdays - checking kit suitability, selecting tools for the jobs in hand, but the tea/coffee, biscuits & chairs take priority. Sadly,



I always forget something and am often late to reach the rendezvous point. To make matters worse. frustratingly, access to the Way can often be obstructed by badly parked vehicles. We decide on the specific tasks in consultation with the park rangers and plan with their guidance. Priorities can change suddenly as nature is unpredictable and urgent attention called for.

Seasonality plays a big part – March until August is 'nesting time' and we avoid cutting back to avoid disturbing the birds and mammals. Weather can get in the way with flooded areas needing attention or wild winds tearing down vulnerable trees, all delaying the routine work. That is especially a problem at the wooded sections of BVW, such as tunnel approaches' banks. Hanging Houghton is a section prone to having fallen trees (big or small) across the pathway. Trees may be rooted on private land but the fallen timber is on the Way and dealing with them means getting the owner's permission before taking proactive action. Cutting them up

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and clearing the way can be quite a task needing special cutting equipment – and only fully licenced operators can use the chainsaws. That spectrum of jobs ranges from simply controlling vegetation, planting, through to repairing fences, steps and paths... even recently building the new 'Pagan Circle'.

Hedge-laying is a fascinating countryside skill and plenty more of that is planned for a number of locations. Crown-lifting opens the wood's floors to shed more light on the ground encouraging wildflowers and making walking through easier. Scalloping is clearing sectors of self-sets and thinning out areas along the Way, again opening the floor to light.

Bench areas are also thinned out opening new vistas by benches or simply reinstating previous excellent views. The tunnels, top $\,$

drainage channels and tunnel approaches, as well as the culverts along the Way need to be kept clear for access and ready for the annual official infrastructure safety inspection. And, if you follow Doug's frequent reports, finding a new drain is an extremely exciting time for us: we are very easily amused, you know.



Pathways and Steps repairs,

such as trying to

improve the deteriorating pathway at Oxendon need us to find suitable timber. Materials are re-used and recycled, wherever possible; for example, step risers need replacing - old signposts uprights are ideal for the job.

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As almost 95% of property searches begin with an online property site, so it just makes sense to advertise with both of the two most popular property portals available.

Many clients ask me how important it is to have their home marketed on Zoopla in addition Rightmove when Rightmove is so recognised. My answer is simple. Some people, according to Zoopla's own research, only look on Zoopla? They call these 'unique visitors'. So, if your property is only on Rightmove and not Zoopla, then you could be missing out.

With a brand awareness score of 95%,

Zoopla may not be the original property website in the UK, but it still pulls in a whopping 55 million visits a month. The history of Zoopla is quite interesting too. It started life as Primelocation.com. We all know that one! Primelocation was the

major property portal used by house hunters in London. Outside of London it got its reputation as the portal for more up -market homes. The website is alive and well today. It still attracts a huge following. So, if you are not on Zoopla.com, then you are not on Primelocation.com either.

What else does Zoopla offer in terms of exposure for your property? Zoopla also partners with sites such as MailOnline, The Times, and The Telegraph. These all display Zooplas' property search tool on each of their websites. So, if you are not on Zoopla.com, then you are not on MailOnline, The Times, and The Telegraph.

Being on the right property portals is only

half the battle though. It is no good creating lots of leads if there are not experienced property consultants available to process the activity. An agent may not need a local office in this modern era but, with more and more people working from home and visiting property portals throughout the day, they do need to ensure the leads are dealt with quickly and efficiently.

With all of the above in mind, this is how I would choose the best estate agent to represent me and my home.

Firstly, I would look on Rightmove and Zoopla for properties in my price range.

I suggest going 10% either side of the asking price you expect your home to be. First impressions count so see what the main photo is like. If there are some additional ones, are they attractive? If you like the look of the primary photos, then click into the main particulars. Is there a floorplan? This is now one of the first things people look for. Now the description. Has the agent done a full description of the individual rooms or just a summary. Many people like the full descriptions still.

Once you have narrowed down two or three agents you think represent homes in the way you would like yours represented, email them for more information. See how long they take to come back to you as a potential buyer and, when they do, how knowledgeable they are about that particular property.

The theory being that when estate agents come out to value your property you are seeing them at their best. You need to know how they treat potential buyers!

Households who have an income of less than £31,000 per year or claim certain benefits and whose homes have an Energy Performance Rating of D, E, F or G may be entitled to new lower-carbon heating measures. These schemes are available to people who own their own homes or live in privately-rented properties.

Plumb-Line Contracting Limited in Moulton Park, Northampton, is approved to install the heating measures as part of the government's drive to alleviate fuel poverty and reduce carbon emissions. Plumb-Line is certified to have all the skills and experience to complete the installation work to a high standard.

Adrian Brown, Managing Director of Plumb -Line says: "This is an excellent opportunity for people on low incomes to heat their homes in a much more affordable way. The heating measures really are free of charge to households who meet the qualifying criteria. If you have a gas boiler than was installed before 2005, have a household income of less than £31,000 or receive certain benefits, and your home has an energy performance rating of D, E, F or G, then you're likely to qualify for a brand new high efficiency condensing gas combi boiler".

"If you don't have mains gas and you use electric heaters or warm air units, have an income of less than £31,000 or claim certain benefits and have an energy performance rating of E, F or G, then you could be eligible for a brand new heating system powered by an air source heat pump," Adrian adds.

As well as installing the heating measures, Plumb-Line can also install insulation measures free of charge under the same scheme, if applicable.





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

Big thanks to all those who made it happen!



The grant will be used to purchase parts of the ceremonial uniform, a standard and flagpole which will be used during ceremonies and services.





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


MUGA - Grand Opening

Public Spaces Protection Order

West Northants Council approved the introduction of a new Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) in November 2022 to promote responsible dog ownership and prohibit smoking across the Daventry and South areas of West Northamptonshire, including Brixworth.

Anyone who is in control of a dog in a public place must:

- Pick up after the dog immediately;
- Have the appropriate means to pick up after that dog:
- Prohibit dogs from entering the following: children's play areas; schools when open and in use by pupils; skateparks; tennis courts; multi-use games areas (MUGAs) and bowling greens;
- Keep the dog on a lead when in: cemeteries; graveyards; memorial gardens; allotments; car parks; sports grounds, fields and pitches, when in use for authorised sporting activity and near schools when open and in use by pupils;
 - Put the dog on a lead when requested to do so by an authorised person;
 - Restrict the number of dogs that can be walked by one person to a maximum of four dogs at any one time.

A £100 fixed penalty notice may be issued if you fail to comply with any of the requirements within the PSPO. The PSPO can be viewed here: https://www.brixworthparishcouncil.gov.uk/public-spaces-protection-order-pspo/



Pocket Park CPRE Hedgerow Project

We must also applaud the UI5s Girls this season who continue to go from strength to strength in the county. Last season they won the league cup final at uI4s and now defend that title, with two finals to compete in – the UI5s Girls League Cup, where they played the final against Rushden & Diamonds on



14 May, and Northampton Town Football Club on 20 May. And with just five games left to play,

they also lead the league table. It's just fantastic to see the improvements with these 18 girls, 11 of whom have been there pretty much from the outset.

We had other close encounters this season as the U15s boys went to a County Cup final at Cogenhoe where they took on Santos $\,$

effectively an academy. A great game was played and the Brixworth boys did themselves proud as they drew I-I in the 80 minutes of play. There



was some terrific football played but no extra time meant the game went immediately to the dreaded penalties. Sadly, Santos took the trophy, but the future looks bright for the team going forward.

Elsewhere we have a really strong minis section in the 4 to 6 year olds, who train every Saturday morning. We will be looking for new volunteers next season as some of this age become U7s. Next year,

we are likely to have two new teams: the current U7s to U1Is where we have seven teams. This includes the newly formed U9s Girls team, who were recently spotted celebrating the end of their first season with brunch at the Olive Branch (pictured). These teams all play in non-competitive leagues to help with the development of the players. We endeavour to produce footballers who can play without fear and play through the thirds to produce highly technical footballers, along with parents who can watch and enjoy without fixating on the score.

In the 12s-18s groups, we say goodbye this season to the U18s Jaguars who make it to their final season. Once again, a group of players who have all stayed together virtually from the age of seven. Hats off to the coaches and thank you for your commitment over the years. Any players who are 17 and 18 can also register to become involved in the Seniors 1st team set up and we would welcome hearing from explayers and players who will stay in the village to come and join them next



It's great to see teams in the village now have more girls playing for them in age groups where we cannot set up a girls only team; U11s/U12s/U14s are all mixed teams. How far we have come from when I joined the club ten years ago – back then we had two girls playing, now it is over 50. A special mention must also go to Rachel Clipston, who used to play for our current u16s team and has now signed for Aston Villa Ladies.

Well done to the UI3s team who gain promotion, the UI5s who should finish in the top three, the new UI4s girls who are playing together for the first time this season in competitive matches and the UI6s boys who went to the semi-finals of the League Cup.
