On a breezy but bright Sunday in spring, the park on Spratton Road is a hive of activity as Phase 2 of planting Brixworth's Community Orchard gets underway. The Spratton Road Park has often lived in the shadow of its larger counterparts at St.David's and The Ashway, but Christine Ware (Brixworth Parish Council) and a group of committed volunteers are determined to change this, starting with the planting of fruit trees.

The orchard at the Spratton Road Park is the second phase of a village wide project to establish a Brixworth Community Orchard. Last November, half a dozen fruit trees were planted on a patch of land along the Holcot Road which are now blossoming and doing very well. There were also Japanese flowering cherry trees previously planted at Spratton Road, as part of The Sakura Cherry Tree Project commemorating I 50 years of friendship between the UK and Japan. Sadly, however, some of these trees suffered at the hands of young vandals, although a few survived and their pretty pink blossoms are starting to show.

There will eventually be an orchard of around 20 trees at the Spratton Road Park, funded mostly by the Parish Council as part of its commitment to The Green Framework. The trees being planted are a mixture of apple trees, cooking apple trees, plum trees, fruiting cherry trees and pear trees. Once the trees have matured and started to bear fruit, anyone in the village will be welcome to come along and pick the produce for their own use, with some of it also being used to supply the Community Larder.

For centuries, orchards were widespread throughout the British Isles with every farm, country house and large garden having a collection of fruit trees. The advent of cheap fruit imports from abroad, however, and the pressure on land for house and road building saw a sharp decline in acreage during the latter half of the 20th Century. With the recent increase in community orchard

projects throughout the country, however, it is hoped that this trend may now be reversed and Brixworth will be a part of it.

Bob Cotter of the Brixworth Climate Action Group

(made up of a combination of concerned local residents and Parish Councillors) feels the planting of fruit trees at various locations around the village will have numerous benefits: "They are relatively easy to grow and maintain," he says. "They are good for the environment as they will add to the biodiversity of the area by attracting a variety of wildlife and, most importantly, pollinators." When I spoke to Bob, he and his wife were busy threading wooden poles through wire mesh to make protective fencing to go around each sapling. After what happened to the flowering Japanese cherry trees, everyone is concerned about how to prevent such a mindless act of vandalism recurring.

Going forward, the long-term plan for the Spratton Road Park is to develop a Community Wellbeing Park, envisioned as a space where anyone can come to enjoy the outdoors in a natural environment. The numerous health and wellbeing benefits of being outdoors became apparent during the pandemic and remain just as relevant today. As well as the orchard, the vision for the park includes a pathway which will make it accessible for wheelchair users, an outdoor gym, benches for resting a while in nature and a sensory garden.

The Community Wellbeing Park is set to complete the Parish Council's triumvirate of parks in Brixworth:

- St. David's Recreation Ground with its MUGA (Multi Use Games Area) focusing on children and young people.
- The Ashway Playing Fields with the focus on team sports.
- The Spratton Road Park which will focus on wellbeing and access for all in a natural environment.

Library & Community Centre are 25 Years old

It is now 25 years since our Library and Community Centre were opened by Neil Kinnock.

Funded by the Robert Horne Foundation, the building was a gift to the village. The opening was the culmination of extensive negotiations involving the County Council, District Council and the Parish Council together with Brixworth Community Church (or as it was then, BCF). Key to the success of the Project was Sue Varello, our District Councillor at the time.

The Library and Community Centre has become a focal point in the



village with a huge range of activities taking place each week. Indeed, the Community Centre has never had so many hirers with weekly Pilates, Rainbows, Self Defence, Country Dancing, Mums and Tots, Yoga, Children's Dancing, Table Tennis and Art Classes – to name just a few!

The Centre had extensive refurbishment last year, and is still a popular venue for children's parties. The day-

to-day management of the Centre is in the hands of the Community Church, with Mike Nice being the Centre Manager for the past 25 years. As part of the Centre, Community Church volunteers run the Olive Branch Coffee Shop, and they too are celebrating 25 years of service to the village.

Northampton Road Allotment Update

On 21st March, Phil Pinder, Secretary of the Northampton Road Allotments Association, presented the petition against the loss of the allotments at a full West Northants Council (WNC) meeting, accompanied by other allotment holders and the Brixworth Ward Councillor, Jonathan Harris. He was given three minutes to address WNC; his speech outlined the history of the allotments, the many benefits to villagers and the negative impact of the prospective loss to the village. He finished by asking for WNC support in finding a solution to keep the allotments for future generations. His presentation was very well received by those present.

The petition ended up with 1,134 signatures! Phil and the rest of the Allotment Association wish to convey their sincere thanks to all those residents who took the time to sign it, both in Brixworth and the surrounding villages. The support is much appreciated as the fight continues to save this important green space from more development.

Boughton extension now open!

After 17 years of hard work by a small band of volunteers, The Northampton & Lamport finally opened its half mile extension to

Boughton on Saturday 30th March 2024.

With work having begun in early 2007, the extension has involved: restoring a seven arch low viaduct, laying track, restoring and reerecting a Victorian signal box, installing traditional railway semaphore signalling, erecting fencing, building a new station platform, installing utilities, and many other jobs. It is amazing to think that so much has been achieved with hardly any assistance from mechanical plant. The final results are wonderful and a testament to the commitment and resolve of all those involved.

The extension was formally opened by local MP, Chris Heaton- Harris, as part of an invitation-only special first train on the morning of 30th March. Other guests included the Chair of WNC (and also Chair of Boughton Parish Council), Cllr John Shephard, as well as other local Parish Council representatives, neighbours and supporters of the railway, the press and ITV Anglia News.



Following the formal opening, public services resumed in the afternoon, allowing people to ride the new line for the first time. The new station at Boughton is now part of the railway's standard operation, giving us two stations for the first time ever! The railway is now nearly two miles in length, and preparations are already underway for us starting to push north, towards Spratton.

If you've not been down to visit us yet, or haven't been for some time, please make 2024 the year you come for a ride on our new extended line.

Northants Search and Rescue

Search and Rescue is a little known but vital charity serving as the 'Fourth Emergency Service' throughout our county and beyond. I met with Brixworth born and bred Emily Cockerill, a volunteer with Northamptonshire Search and Rescue (NSAR) for the past seven years, to find out more about this amazing organisation and the important work it carries out.

What does NSAR do?

In answer to the above question, Emily says: "Everybody's heard of Mountain Rescue and the RNLI (Royal National Lifeboat Institution), but nobody stops to wonder who covers that middle ground between the mountains and the sea — well, that's us." She goes on to explain that Northants Search and Rescue is part of the nationwide organisation Lowland Rescue, and they collaborate closely with the police in helping to find missing persons who are vulnerable or deemed to be at high risk.

Unlike the police and other emergency services, however, Search and Rescue

teams receive no central funding whatsoever and are completely dependent on fundraising and the occasional grant to carry out their important work.

They also participate in extra resilience activities; during this extremely wet winter, for example, NSAR were part of the team who rescued residents from 1200 homes when Billing Aquadrome flooded. Most of their call outs, however, involve people who have gone missing. Before Covid, Emily tells me, "most of these would be people with dementia or Alzheimer's, but since then we've seen an increase in 'despondent' people suffering a mental health crisis."

What happens on a 'call out'?

NSAR's volunteers are on call 24/7 and, within one and half hours of their call handler receiving a missing persons call, they aim to have up to 20 team members on the ground ready to search. Emily is keen to emphasise: "It's a myth that you have to wait 24 hours before calling the police for a missing person. If you're ever worried about someone's who's missing, please, please call the police straight away!"

When a person is reported missing, a search manager from NSAR uses mapping skills and missing persons statistics, plus a system devised by Robert J. Koester, an expert in lost person behaviour, to calculate the search area.

Teams of four or five volunteers will then set off on foot. A search can last anything from a few minutes to weeks and weeks. Sadly, of course, the outcome isn't always what they'd hoped for, but when it does work out, Emily says, "it's so rewarding getting people home and back safe to their families."

Emily points out that there are many skills involved in a Search and Rescue team call out, including

- Map reading and navigation
- Advanced first aid
- Communication
- Lost person behaviour knowledge
- Crime scene management
- Dog handlers

In her day job, Emily is a veterinary nurse, and is hoping to specialise as a dog handler for NSAR. When I met her, she had her handsome four-legged friend Duke with her, who is in the final stages of training to become a search and rescue dog.

What equipment do you use?

In addition to the skills and expertise of the volunteers, a search and rescue operation

also involves a variety of equipment. In order to keep costs down, volunteers are encouraged to purchase their own personal kit, this should include things such as a compass, first aid kit, whistle, LED head torch, spare batteries, GPS unit, evidence bags, crime scene tape, penknife/multi tool etc. The kit needs to be carried on every search.

NSAR also owns and maintains three support vehicles and a thermal imaging drone. Each of the three vehicles has a specific purpose; one houses the Incident Control Unit which offers a mobile operational command post for searches and other incidents. The other two serve as Operational Support Units which can transport teams and their equipment to anywhere in the county; they also carry medical supplies, stretchers etc. One of them has on board water rescue equipment.



They are all terrain vehicles capable of accessing difficult and remote locations. Northamptonshire may not have coast or mountains, but it has a varied terrain of flood plains, agricultural land, forests, country parks, rivers and lakes.

At the moment, NSAR has no central base, with all its vehicles and specialist equipment being stored in members' homes and garages. Plans are afoot, however, for a team base to be established (very close to Brixworth) with plenty of secure storage, space for training and as Emily says, "somewhere to call home."

How do you become a volunteer?

Emily joined NSAR at the age of 22. After spending her teenage years as an active member of Brixworth Scouts she felt that the different skills she learned there could be put to good use. She passed the initial interview and then had to go through a rigorous training programme.



It's a big commitment as, after the initial training, volunteers still need to attend at least six mock exercises a year and ongoing CPD sessions to keep their skills up to date. Emily is passionate about the work though, "I love being outdoors and being part of a team that allows you to develop new skills that can be genuinely beneficial." She goes on to say that NSAR has a "really supportive, family feel to it."

In 2023, there were 71 active members in the NSAR team, they attended 67 call outs in Northamptonshire and neighbouring counties involving 561 hours of 'searching'.

As well as attending call outs, Search and Rescue volunteers also assist with fundraising activities, attending publicity events, marshalling and giving talks. Emily particularly enjoys giving talks to young people in the hope that it will encourage the next generation to acquire the necessary skills for volunteering when they're older. Last year, NSAR volunteers attended 235 different events.

This year, they will have a stand at the Hollowell Steam and Heavy Horse Show on $6^{\text{th}}/7^{\text{th}}$ July 2024, if anybody wishes to find out more about the work that NSAR does


In the country park, the volunteers are largely focused on general maintenance now that tree pruning has been put aside for the summer while the birds are actively nesting.

Apart from dealing with any hazardous trees or branches, attention turns to mowing and strimming, along with other routine tasks. Invasive species need to be minimised. Removing Spanish Bluebells from the wooded areas and replacing them with the indigenous variety is high on the list, together with controlling the American Signal Crayfish from Folly Pond. Hopefully, the Rudd in the pond are helping keep them at bay. The little Grey Men trail is getting a spruce up and BB Society has printed revised maps, which are available from the information booth. And the Brass Rubbing Trail also has had a grooming.

Wildlife is doing well, with plenty of birds, mammals and reptiles. We even discovered a grass snake living by the reed bed effluent management bed when we had the very unpleasant job of clearing the dead reed stems...it clearly had no sense of smell! The amount of rain left muddy areas that are being dealt with. Chippings help improve pathways and land drains are being cleared when found.

Folly Pond's drainage has been a

concern as the surrounding fields' run-off feeds into the pond causing a major ingress of water, eroding the ditch banks and flooding the area by the pond's wall. Efforts to improve the drainage revealed that we have limited knowledge of how the drainage was laid out when the park was developed. A leaky dam was added to the ditch to limit the flow and divert the water into an overflow pipe.

Brampton Valley Way has also suffered from the heavy rain and high winds. Some sections of the path are very water-logged and the volunteers are working to improve the drainage by clearing self-set trees and shrubs from the section of track above Kelmarsh Station: it is an ongoing project. Other wet areas are the focus of further improvement work.

Walls, self-sets and ivy are not compatible, as plants can grow through, push cemented-brickwork apart and weaken structures. We have cleared back along the wall at Kelmarsh Station to reduce the potential damage.

Clearing the banks and walls has the double benefits of improving drainage and opening the canopy, allowing greater sunlight in to encourage wildflowers to grow where previously there were very few.



Annual inspections of the Way and its old railway infrastructure mean we have to open access to the culverts for the survey engineers and clear any drains we identify. And, to our infinite joy, we sometimes unearth unknown drains and culverts.

Routinely we make sure the tunnels drainage gullies are clear. This year we had extra work, as winds had blown down trees onto tunnel tops... a chainsaw did the trick. But getting up and down those muddy slopes requires the agility of a mountain goat at the best of times: with the slopes resembling ski slopes, it has been an even greater challenge at times.

Maintaining the park's three main locations is an ongoing task and the Friends of Brampton Valley Way & **Brixworth Country Park Volunteers** are dedicated to making them one of the best places for miles around.

The hidden stories of Brixworth

Did you know that Brixworth has a Blue Plaques trail leading past many of the historic buildings in Brixworth?

The Brixworth Heritage Trail starts and ends at the green opposite the Coach & Horses pub. Over a short walk around the older parts of Brixworth, you will visit 30 houses seminal to the history and story of Brixworth.

The Blue Plagues video was filmed and photographed by Sean Goodhart with video editing by Vernon Salmon. Their collaboration started several years ago when Vernon asked Sean if he had drone footage of the local area he could use in videos he was making for the Brixworth Christian Fellowship. Their collaboration has developed a YouTube channel of local views called "BrixworthScenes" https:// www.youtube.com/@brixworthscenes with videos of Brixworth village and Pitsford Reservoir.

The Blue Plaques video covering the Brixworth Heritage Trail was created because Vernon and Sean felt there would be many current and past residents of Brixworth who would enjoy this "armchair traveller" walk around the village perhaps encouraging people to get out and



see the historic buildings in Brixworth. It has taken a lot of effort to create the video, with the many short video clips being taken over the past two years using a combination of filming on foot, on bicycle and with a drone - and many hours of video editing to pull it all together.

This latest video has had nearly 500 views after just one month on YouTube, with many positive comments from the Brixworth History Society and the

Restored: Lamport Hall's alpine garden

Lamport Hall is to unveil the restoration of its renowned alpine garden and rockery.

Standing at 24ft tall, the imposing garden, constructed in 1847 by Sir Charles Isham, is a unique horticultural feature originally 'clothed' in dwarf conifers, alpine plants and flowering perennials. It is probably best known for its population of gnomes, believed to be the first ones in the country, some of which are planned for reintroduction later in 2024.





Jake Croft, Lamport Head Gardener, said: "The Alpine Garden had been closed to the public for a long time due to concerns over its structural stability and had become overgrown, with the loss of much of the original planting scheme. Work began in early 2023 to clear unwanted vegetation whilst preserving plants of value. Contemporary fencing and concrete slabs were removed, and the original path was reinstated". Jake undertook diligent research to find out as much as possible about the original planting and to get the sense of place just right. Planting subsequently began at the top of the rockery with over 200 plants being planted in the top section alone. The Lilliput Pond was recreated, fed by a restored gentle cascade.

A number of the original dwarf conifers remain, along with some of the original Japanese Maples. Many lost dwarf



Chamaecyparis, Thuja, Pinus and Abies have been replaced. These are modern and interesting cultivars of the original planting scheme. The Rockery has been restocked with Utah Agaves and many different sedums, saxifrages, sempervivums and Ivies, in



line with the original planting scheme.

The restoration has been made possible by a generous grant from The Finnis Scott Foundation as well as hard work from the estate's team of staff and volunteers, led by Head Gardener Jake Croft. The Rockery will be open to visitors from May 2024. The Lamport Hall gardens are open on Wednesdays and Thursdays until the end of October and for the National Open Gardens Scheme on Saturday 08 June.

Executive Director of Lamport, Mark Herrod, said "The alpine garden at Lamport is well-known on an international level as it was one of the first of its kind to exist in England. Sir Charles Isham, 10^{th} Bt, had the alpine garden built to house his collection of gnomes purchased in Nuremburg. This prompted the beginning of the enduring fashion for garden gnomes. We are grateful to the Finnis Scott Foundation for its generous help in restoring this notable and rare piece of horticultural history."

Exhibitions at Lamport Hall

An exhibition to celebrate Lamport Hall and its 50th anniversary of being a charitable trust brings together work by 19 local artists produced for and inspired by the Hall and gardens itself.



And our Royal Yacht Association affiliation ensures we maintain the highest level of safety standards and that their demanding operational practices are observed. Northampton Sailability has been operating since the 90s. While it has been a struggle at times, the members have managed to keep it going. Thank goodness, as it does so much good for the visitors.

Our visitors love their day and leave very happy with their trip, with their spirits lifted and their confidence built, regardless of which craft they are in. Individuals or



groups from care homes, support groups come along either on

Mondays or Fridays or the first and third Saturday of the month.

Volunteering at Sailability is an extremely rewarding experience. Some jobs (but certainly not all) can be quite physical. It is as part of a very happy crew, bolstered by tea and biscuits which help keep us going throughout the day. We prepare the boats, man the pontoon, sail the craft with the visitors on boats and train them, crew the safety boat RIB and many more tasks, including putting the boats to bed again safely for the next session.

We always need new volunteers. New volunteers do not need to have any sailing experience as training is part of the package. There are onshore roles as well, so no need to even get into a boat. Sailing experience would obviously be helpful but not a prerequisite for volunteering, and you can get trained up to participate at every level from sailing qualifications through to First Aid. Leeds-born Ann has lived in Brixworth for the past seventeen years and may be known to some readers for her successful massage business Ann Foley Holistic Therapies, but she now has a second string to her bow after training to become a celebrant.

Before moving to Brixworth, Ann had had a variety of jobs, until 14 years ago, an ice-skating accident left her with serious whiplash and head injuries. During her long recovery in the months following the accident, Ann found herself fascinated by how the human body heals. Her curiosity aroused, she asked her physiotherapists lots of questions which led her down the road to retraining and becoming a massage therapist.

Over the years, in a cabin in her garden, Ann has built up a regular clientele in Brixworth and was busier than ever when the first Covid lockdown came in March 2020. After attending a wedding in 2019, however, the presiding registrar, "who was so lively and amazing", made such an impression on Ann that she started thinking about becoming a celebrant. It's not a requirement for a celebrant to be qualified, but Ann found the perfect distance learning course which she completed during the three months of lockdown, followed by a five-day residential at Highgate House.

Initially, Ann trained for 'Couples and Naming Ceremonies' and became a member of The Association of Independent Celebrants. Then, during the second lockdown, she extended her qualification to become a Funeral Celebrant as well. Sadly, the first job she undertook was at a friend's funeral; knowing that she was dying, the friend specifically requested that Ann conducted her funeral service. Although she was nervous about doing it at the time, afterwards, Ann felt "If I can cope with that, I can cope with anything!"



Unlike registrars, celebrants have no legal jurisdiction to marry people. They cannot say the words 'I now pronounce you man and wife' as this is a legal term; so, some couples will attend a registry office for a quick 20-minute legal ceremony before the main event. In an increasingly secular world, many couples and families are now choosing a celebrant to conduct their wedding/naming ceremonies, vow renewals or to say goodbye to their loved ones.

A celebrant is also far less restricted

than a registrar and can conduct a ceremony almost anywhere. Many choose a place that is special to them as it doesn't have to be somewhere that holds a licence. The service can be semi-religious, completely secular or spiritual, and include almost anything. Before conducting a ceremony, Ann explains "I will spend three hours or more getting to know the couple or family so I can make the ceremony as personal and unique as possible. I then go away to work on the first draft of the script for the ceremony, before further discussion with the clients."

When asked what qualities a celebrant needs, Ann said "You need to be very organised, have good interpersonal skills, be aware of social and religious differences and of course, have a great speaking voice." Most of Ann's work to date has been local and she says that there are some lovely venues around. She was particularly impressed by Plum Park Manor near Towcester and a ceremony that she conducted by the canal in Leicestershire.

Last year was a very busy year for celebrants, but Ann says that this year has seen a nationwide slump in the number of people getting married and many in the wedding industry are experiencing a lack of bookings. This has been put down to a knock-on effect from the Covid lockdowns

Going forward, although it sounds morbid, Ann would like to conduct more funeral/memorial services. She says: "I find it so interesting to learn about people's life histories, some people have had fascinating lives." For a funeral, she will spend time with the family discussing their loved one and listening to their stories and reminiscences in the hope that she can do them justice on the day.



The Parish Council has been working hard since the beginning of this year to make the village more attractive for residents. We started with maintenance and repainting the old railway benches. There was an interesting article about the refurbishment of the benches in the Chronicle and Echo both on line and in print.

New planters (purchased by the Co-op) have been installed on the verge outside with plants provided and planted by the Parish Council. The box planters signifying entering and leaving the village are next in line for replanting for the summer.

Spratton Road Park is undergoing the process of some updating with the planting of fruit trees for the Community Orchard. Thanks go to the Brixworth Climate Action Group for their hard work in planting a selection of apple, cherry, pear and plum trees. Villagers will be able to pick the fruit for their own use once the trees are established.

The Parish Council are also exploring exciting plans to redevelop Spratton Road Park into an energising wellbeing park complete with herb gardens. wildlife habitats, accessible pathways and an outdoor gym. We will keep you posted as these ambitious plans unfold.

These are all ongoing projects and our thanks go to the residents, friends and councillors who frequently give up their time to help maintain the village. Wishing you a bright Summer.

Northampton Road Bus Stop - Living Roof

We're excited to share the completion of another transformative project at the bus stop on Northampton Road. As part of our ongoing commitment to sustainability and community well-being, a living roof has been installed, featuring lush vegetation that offers many benefits.

Living bus stop roofs act as natural air purifiers, filtering out harmful pollutants and releasing fresh oxygen into the surrounding atmosphere. Through the process of photosynthesis, the plants on these roofs absorb carbon dioxide, a major greenhouse gas, helping to mitigate air pollution and combat climate change. Cleaner air benefits not only commuters waiting at the bus stop but

also the broader community. Living bus stop roofs can also retain rainwater, reducing runoff and help manage stormwater.

By absorbing sunlight and retaining less heat than traditional roofs, living bus stops can help mitigate the urban heat island effect, which can lead to cooler temperatures.

Living bus stop roofs create new habitats for plants, insects, and birds. The presence of greenery attracts pollinators like bees and butterflies, essential for the reproduction of many plant species and supporting biodiversity.

Developing Spratton Road Wellbeing Park

A huge thank you to all of the volunteers who gave up their time and came out back in March to plant 20 fruit trees at Spratton Road Park. Following the success of the Community Orchard planting last year, we hope the community will be able to enjoy apples, pears, plums and cherries from this phase of planting as we begin exploring and developing Spratton Road Park into Brixworth's very own Wellbeing Park. We aim to transform this underutilised space into a vibrant community hub for all ages.

The proposed park will offer a variety of features to promote leisure, exercise, relaxation, and reflection, while supporting biodiversity with wildflowers, fruit bushes, and a community orchard. The space will also be used for village events and provide a safe area for children to play. The project is expected to cost around £25,000, with some funding already allocated by The Parish Council for the three-year redevelopment. Key features of the Wellbeing Park include an accessible walkway with shrub and herb gardens, an outdoor

gym, and picnic benches. The park will also attract wildlife, such as butterflies and birds, through the growth of wildflowers and the installation of hedgehog houses, bug hotels, nest boxes, and bat boxes. These features aim to create a relaxing and enjoyable environment for the entire village to enjoy. More details can be found on our website at


Community Defibrillator Training
