BRIXWORTH PREPARES FOR DE-BAGGING!



The movement to make Brixworth plastic carrier bag free is gathering pace, with more than half of the village's traders committing to use alternative products to plastic bags.

Pupils at Brixworth CEVC Primary School were challenged to come up with designs illustrating the problems with the use of plastic bags. At a special ceremony towards the end of April, Laurie Brocklehurst learned that his picture would be printed on the side of fair-trade organic cotton bags, kindly sponsored by Merry's Estate Agents. These

bags will be distributed free to every household in Brixworth together with an explanation of the aims of the campaign.

Fellow pupil Anna Sherwood will have her picture used on posters to promote the campaign. Laurie received a Bug Hunting kit and Anna received a Big Strange and Nasty Plant kit as prizes.

Other children whose entries deserve a special mention were James Bandey, Tara Denton, Bethany Hutchings, James Johnson, George Kimbell, Ruth Knight, Tosin Segun,

Jamie Sharp, Annie Sparkes and Courtney Woodward.

Heather Pool, Customer Service Advisor at Daventry District Council's Brixworth Information Service, who first suggested a plastic carrier-bag free scheme in February, said "There were so many lovely entries that it was very difficult to choose one winner-so we chose two. The children did some fantastic work. It really got them thinking about environmental issues while, at the same time, highlighting to other people what we are trying to do.

We are continuing to get out and about to talk to people, supporting those who are going plastic carrier-bag free and talking to those not yet on board to see if we can find a solution that will make it practical for them to use alternatives to plastic bags. We are also trying to inform as many customers as possible of our aims and encouraging them to take a re-usable bag with them when they shop."

Businesses taking part in the proposed Brixworth plastic bag free zone extend from La Boutique in Harborough Road up to Expressions in Northampton Road, Kennel Terrace, Spratton Road shops including the Olive Branch Coffee shop and Pitsford Cycle shop, Brixworth Country Park shop and Manor Farm shop.

The official launch of the plastic bag free Brixworth will take place on June 26th.

Currently 13 billion plastic bags are given away in the UK each year.

Genesis Housing Association has become a partner with McInerney Homes for the 14 houses on the Holcot Road and they will be offering all the homes for either shared ownership or for rental, thus in one stroke, making the homes affordable for Brixworth people starting on the housing ladder.

Similarly Genesis is entering into a partnership with Amberley Homes this month and will be offering all the 34 units on the ex-Rigiflex site for shared ownership or rental. Instead of only 10 units deemed to be affordable under the original 106 planning consent, all units should now be affordable to new starters on the housing ladder.

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ZEBRA CROSSING – NORTHAMPTON ROAD



At last, Highways are ready to install the long awaited zebra crossing near the ex-Rigiflex site on the Northampton Road. They have the funding and manpower in place to commence the installation as soon as the developers of the building site have installed the utilities to their site. However work on the building site has been suspended for over four months and this has seriously delayed the completion of work associated with the utilities near the proposed zebra crossing on the road.

The Bulletin has spoken with John Kiele of Midsummer Housing Association and Paul West, Managing Director of Amberley Homes and they have confirmed that Midsummer Housing concluded negotiations on the 30th April with Amberley, the outcome being that Midsummer have sold their portion of the site to Amberley. Prior to these negotiations, Amberley were responsible for 21 units and Midsummer for 13. Now Amberley are owners of the site and they are concluding discussions with Genesis Housing Association to be their social housing partner. Instead of 10 of the 34 units under the original 106 agreement being affordable

houses, all the units will now be designated affordable.

Mr Samuel Accafuah of Genesis confirmed that the affordable houses would be a mixture of shared ownership and rental. Funding for the build will be provided by the National Housing Corporation and Genesis.

It is hoped that the new partnership can be persuaded to complete work on the utilities to the site as soon as possible to enable the zebra crossing to become operational without delay. The Bulletin is indebted to Lynda Ferguson of D.D.C. for her help in unravelling these complicated arrangements.

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OBITUARIES OF LOCAL RESIDENTS

MARTIN ANDERSON



Martin Harry Anderson, 1959 – 2008. The dash simply denotes a time span, but Martin compressed so much into that dash, achieved so much and touched all of us who had the pleasure of knowing him.

Martin was born in Wath-Upon-Dearne and it is here that he grew up with his brother Michael, sister Liz and parents Nancy and Geoff. He was a true Yorkshire man and very proud of his roots and heritage, even harboring thoughts of playing for his beloved Yorkshire at cricket.

Upon leaving school Martin joined a national food company, FMC in Sheffield and embarked upon a management training program that encompassed all aspects of food manufacture, from a short time working in an abattoir as a “hands on red meat man”, working in the manufacturing process on the factory floor to selling to supermarkets. His career developed and moved him around the country finally settling in Brixworth in 1994 at this time working for Geest in Lincolnshire. This culminated in his position from 1998 as Sales Director at Walkers Charnwood Bakery, part of the Samworth Group of companies, based in Leicester, market leaders in ready meals, sandwiches, and PORK PIE production – yes PORK PIES! Martin was passionate about everything he did and this included his work, there was never a man more passionate about pies.

Martin had many, many friends and from so many circles, he was able to converse with people at all levels and they would instantly take to his warm and caring personality. He was always in contact and would never let a friendship die or dwindle away through lack of contact whether that be with his life long childhood friends from Sheffield, work friends past and present, his Thursday night drinking friends here in Brixworth or the many people he knew in the village.

His other great passion and well known to most, was Barnsley Football Club. His Volvo

could have found its own way from Brixworth to Oakwell. Having being a season ticket holder over 20 years his passion was soon shared by his son, Harry and they would regularly make the pilgrimage North every other weekend.

Family was of utmost importance to Martin. In Rosemarie, he found a soul mate and partner, getting married in 1987, with whom he could share everything of value to him. Nothing more so than their children, Grace and Harry, and how proud he was of them. Grace, when she made the decision, as a nine year old, to spend six months in France with a French family, and latterly their shared passion together for music. (They were usually found together in the “mosh pit” at concerts). Harry, during their first cycle around Pitsford Water, keeping up with him all the time, and of course for the last few years, the shared passion with him for Barnsley Football Club.

He died after a 16 month battle with cancer, which proved difficult and draining for both him and his family. Martin was a man who would have wanted us to remember the positives in life during our times together, his presence and easy going attitude being testament to a person who truly cared about the welfare of others. He would always take time to speak to everyone he knew, not rushing but really listening, you never left his company without feeling that you had had a proper conversation. Beneath the exterior was a person who really did care, his actions speaking louder than words, none more so than in him personally raising over £5000 for charity by cycling 250 miles in 5 days in Cuba.

CYRIL PRATT

1916-2008



Cyril Pratt, who had lived in Brixworth for 33 years, passed away after a short illness on 11th February 2008.

Cyril who was born in Filey, Yorkshire, and brought up in Peterborough, served in the Home Guard and Territorial Army during the war.

He joined the Metropolitan Police at the end of World War Two and one of his first jobs was controlling crowds at the Victory Parade. He was on duty at the funeral of Queen Mary and the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. He rose to the rank of Station Sergeant and received three commissioner’s and four commander’s commendations. One of his most memorable incidents was cornering a gang of four, single-handed and making arrests.

On retirement from the police force, Cyril and his wife Margaret ran the shop in Cottesbrooke for four years.

They moved to Brixworth in 1975. His interests centred around his gardening, the Church and his family. He and Margaret were regular attendees at All Saints Church. Margaret died in 2002. Cyril served as a Church Warden and for a spell assisted Father Watkins as Verger. A choirboy in his youth, he took up singing again and was a member of the Church Choir for 25 years.

Cyril is sadly missed by his 6 children and 14 grandchildren. He was particularly proud of his 23 great-grandchildren who he referred to as “All of my Treasures”.

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HANGING HOUGHTON AND LAMPORT NEWS DRAUGHTON NEWS

Work is proceeding apace now at Clint Hill Farmyard development at Hanging Houghton – now called Manor Gardens, with some 8 houses already at first floor level. Prices range from £500,000 to £1.8million. It will be interesting to see how these properties sell in the current housing/mortgage situation.

The Parish Council have received a Scoping Report on this development of a proposed wind farm between Hanging Houghton and Brixworth. This development involves seven 120 metre high wind generators. The proposed site will be on the right hand side of the A508 going south from Hanging Houghton to Brixworth, in the fields opposite the entrance to Lodge Farm. The Parish Council is totally opposed to this development and is in the process of forming an Action Group to fight this proposal. At this point in time no formal plans have been passed to Daventry District Council.

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POLICE QUARTERLY REPORT

Our thanks to your Parish Council and Brixworth residents for your continued support, part funding and securing our office base; it's been advantageous to us, being close to the heart of our area and I am sure, increased our presence and time in the village.

Your Local Community Panel met once more in February 2008 and following discussion agreed to leave area priorities as Parking, Youth Nuisance and Speeding.

Parking – Firstly I would like to apologise to staff and residents at Boniface House as I incorrectly suggested that parking was available in their car park at weekends. Extra parking is available at weekends but in the car park of **QMP/Saxon House** car park.

On Tuesday 29th January 08 your Parish Council hosted a public meeting to discuss the ongoing issues surrounding parking problems and solutions for Brixworth. After listening to comments and observations from the floor the Parish Council agreed on a number of parking restrictions. The agreement was for double yellow lines to be placed on the junction of Kennel Terrace and Northampton Rd/Holcot Rd on the corner of Spratton Road leading round onto Northampton Rd, on the junction of Pytchley Way and Spratton Rd supported by a waiting restriction in the lay by outside the shops to stop those who choose to park there all day. We still wait a date for the commencement of these works.

As most are aware we have placed no waiting cones on the junction of Spratton Road and Pytchley Way, as this seems to be the most congested and most abused area. Please park sensibly keeping junctions clear and not on the pavement. Despite this, since my last report 5 £30 fines and 10 warnings have been issued. In addition, I appeal once more for those using St David's sports field to use the club car park off Froxhill Crescent and not block entrances or pavements in St David's Close.

Youth Nuisance/Underage drinking – We are continuing to monitor this situation and by and large are pleased with the improvement in general behaviour in the village. We were disappointed however, on the night of 7-8th March when a large group local youngsters, mostly Moulton Secondary school attendees, decided to meet up in Brixworth. This group were responsible for 3 cases of indiscriminate damage across the village and an assault on a 14yr old girl. Two 15-year-old girls have been processed appropriately for the assault. If any one has any information regarding these incidents please get in touch.

A pub watch scheme has been launched and includes the pubs in Brixworth and surrounding villages. Once set up, the landlords will run this scheme, and they will have the power to ban anyone (who commit offences on their premises) from not only their pub, but all licensed premises that are scheme members. Trading standards have and will continue to run test purchases at the pubs and off licenses in the village targeting under age sales.

Youth provision is often raised as an issue and work is being undertaken by members of the community panel to provide a BMX track in the village. The Youth Club is always keen to attract

young helpers; please contact John McFadyen through the Parish Council or us if you are interested or would like to know more.

Speeding – Speeding remains a primary concern and since the last report we have had several speed surveys carried out. These measure speed and traffic flow 24/7.

Northampton Road between the Ashway and Froxhill roundabouts show some marginal speeding, Holcot Road is rather more of a concern along with the Harborough Rd.

We will be conducting speed enforcement in these locations and have issued 22 tickets and 7 warnings over the last 6 months in the village. Together with your Parish Council we continue to work towards solutions for traffic calming to make your village safer for all.

March 31st is the end of the Force year and we are pleased to announce that this sector has seen a significant reduction in crime. Brixworth has seen the greatest drop in overall crime across our sector (down 23%). Criminal damage in the village is 52% down along with a reduction in Dwelling Burglary. Of concern is that theft of motor vehicles is up, very many of which had been left insecure with the keys in the ignition, and one went from Ferrofields very recently (keys in the ignition).

Although crime is down overall please don't become complacent, much is committed by opportunists so blatant invites like keys and property on display, keys on the hall table, in the door lock etc– I hope you understand. Taking simple measures can prevent a great deal of crime; we can assist with advice, a home security pack and crime prevention products, just ask.

Following the report of the 3 drink drivers

from the village in the last bulletin another Brixworth resident has been prosecuted for drink drivING and has received a lengthy ban and this time, a suspended prison sentence.

The 18year old Brixworth female on remand for serious offences committed elsewhere has now been convicted and is serving a 2½ year sentence.

We are holding regular surgeries at the Community Centre 10-11am on Saturday mornings, please feel free to come a long to discuss anything. Dates as follows 3rd May, 24th May, 14th June, 5th and 26th July.

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BEST OF BOTH WORLDS



Since we moved to Thrapston eighteen months ago we've lost count of the number of times we have been asked 'Do you miss Brixworth?'. Having lived in the village for most of our married lives our answer has consistently been 'Yes, of course we do' – you can't live somewhere for 36 years without building up a vast collection of memories, memories that don't immediately disappear when you move.

In truth, much of what we now say we miss had sadly disappeared from the village's social calendar many years before we left Kennel Terrace; events like the annual village firework display held on land now occupied by Mawsley Machinery (with a group of Brixworth ladies supplying hot dogs and drinks from a caravan), the May Queen pageant, the horticultural show, Village Hall dances with live bands (providing you had reached the top of the waiting list for tickets) and so much more that all helped make Brixworth such an attraction for us when we arrived from Northampton in 1970 (incidentally our first house was on Brixworth's only housing estate at this time, Stannard Way!)

More recently new events we particularly enjoyed supporting and taking part in were the Old Tyme Music Hall shows, pig roasts at Park Farm, History Society exhibitions (who will ever forget the late Phil Forman parading round the village on his showground steam engine 'Yorkshire Belle' advertising the event in 1991), and the Friends of All Saints' Art Exhibition in the Heritage Centre (so good to see the annual exhibition now in its 12th year). We have fond memories of these events and the many friendships we have made with those associated with them.

Thankfully we have recently renewed our passports so we are able to visit many of our friends and catch up with the latest Brixworth news and gossip! (surprisingly our journey

time from Thrapston to Brixworth is about the same as it was from Brixworth to the centre of Northampton). On most visits we discover new houses springing up in the most unlikely of places, notably on the Northampton and Holcot Roads, and building sites that seem to have been deserted for months. No parking cones on various street corners seem to have become a permanent feature of the village landscape, suggesting to us there are even more vehicles clogging up the village than there were when we lived there. We haven't

seen evidence of additional facilities in the village to cater for the apparent increase in the population, so nothing new here since we moved. Thankfully the rural charm of the conservation area that attracted us to Brixworth nearly forty years ago has been preserved, and long may this be the case.

So 'yes' we do sometimes miss Brixworth, but there is so much we now enjoy in our new lives in Thrapston. Having distant countryside views from our bungalow along the Nene valley and the river meandering its way northwards towards Oundle and beyond is a big plus for us. Living in a small town, not much bigger in population than Brixworth, we are in walking distance of many more facilities, like a first class supermarket, specialist shops, banks, hotels, a street market, an undertaker and an excellent leisure centre (we also have double yellow lines, traffic wardens and a mayor!). However, the Brixworth Library and Community Centre is one facility we cannot match in Thrapston. 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

So What's a Hemiparasite Then, and Why Does it Matter?

When I was a boy growing up in old Kingsthorpe in the 1940's, just 50 yards from my front door was a stone-walled field. Climb over the five-barred gate and I was in another world, where the grassland was bespangled with colourful wild flowers all summer long. Where clouds of butterflies, bees, hoverflies and other nectar-seeking insects jostled each other for a place at the nectar tables. The drowsy hum of these legions, it seemed to me, almost drowned out the rich song of the skylarks overhead. Intent on finding their nests I would watch where they landed, mark the spot, and run to it as fast as my legs would carry me, only to find no nest there or nearby. It was only later that I discovered that the wily bird deliberately landed some way from the nest, and then cautiously threaded its way through the massed stems to the actual nest.

It's fair to say that in this small field I cut my natural history teeth. I could and did spend hundreds of hours here, honing my identification skills, at every turn discovering something new and wonderful. I am glad to say that this wonder, bewilderment even, stays with me still. I was not alone in my natural world. Most of the time I shared this private space with Tess, the rightful owner. She was a sturdy, shaggy-coated pony, who earned her keep by pulling a churn-laden cart around the local streets, delivering milk from the farm in the next street to the local households. Tess's day ended early, so for the rest of the time she whiled away the hours in her field. Most of the time Tess and I got on pretty well, but she did have her bad-tempered side, and as I learned a savage bite. More than once I was forced to beat a hasty retreat, clearing the gate like some champion hurdler with Tess hot on my heels.

The butterflies, which were my special interest in those days, included clouded yellows the small copper, the wall, gatekeeper, common blue, brown argus, as

well as the orange tip and green-veined white. All these evocatively named insects are much reduced in numbers, indeed some are no longer with us locally.

Sadly these distant memories will ever remain just that. The field has long gone, together with its incredibly diverse natural history community. Today the primary school stands on the site, the grassland reduced to tiny fragments of carefully-manicured lawn. Meanwhile Northampton now extends a full mile to the north of this spot, and will undoubtedly extend still further in the next few years, with more of our tiny fragments of wildlife-rich countryside covered over with concrete, bricks and mortar. This they call progress.

One of the wild flowers of these far-off days was the hayrattle. This little wild flower has intense yellow flowers, followed by papery seed-cases, in which the large seeds rustle, rather than rattle, when you shake them. I have found it sparingly in the grassland around Pitsford Water, and along the Brampton Valley Way. The amazing thing about this plant is that it is what the botanists call a hemiparasite. You and I could get away with calling it a semi-parasite. It seems that underground it is quite capable of getting along on its own roots. But it will also invade the roots of nearby plants, literally getting into the other plant's roots, and stealing nutrients from them. Amazing you might say, but so what? Well, in order to accomplish this the hayrattle will most likely have had to produce complex chemicals in order to avoid the plant equivalent of tissue rejection in its host. In other words this process has some similarities to that in some human diseases, cancer being one obvious example. Could it be that this insignificant little plant hides something useful to us? Let it become extinct, and we will never know.

U3A PRESS RELEASE

Brixworth and District U3A has now been accepted as a full member by the Third Age Trust with effect from 1st April 2008 and has in excess of fifty members. Interest groups have been formed for Art, Away Days, Genealogy, Lunching, and Walking and it is hoped that more groups can be started, in particular for table games such as whist, bridge, scrabble or dominoes, from September onwards.

The group meets on the first Wednesday of every month at 2 pm in the Community Centre above the Brixworth library and a full programme of speakers has been arranged. After the presentation, tea and biscuits are served, the raffle is drawn, and members sign up for any of the group activities in which they may be interested. The next monthly meeting is on **June 4th when the subject is the Family Tree**. Recent activities have included a blue badge guided tour of the village of Kings Cliffe, lunch at the Tollemache Arms at Harrington, and a four mile circular walk from Maidwell followed by lunch at the Stags Head.. These activities take place once a month apart from the art group which meets twice monthly.

The committee meets every other month to ensure that matters of an ongoing nature are receiving adequate attention, an interesting programme of events is being arranged, and to co-ordinate the group activities.
