

Bearing a Torch for Brixworth

Monday 2 July will be an exciting day for everyone, with the Olympic Torch passing through the towns around the village – but especially so for Brixworth woman Ruth Gillett. Ruth is one of the fortunate few who were selected from over 8,000 nominees to be a Torchbearer, and will be carrying the torch for part of its way through Kettering.

“I first found out in December but we weren’t allowed to tell anyone for ages. I was so excited, not being able to tell anyone was killing me!” she says.

She adds: “I don’t know yet which part of the Kettering route I will be getting but it will be fantastic

no matter where it is. Now I’m having nightmares about anything going wrong – what if I stumble, drop the torch...”

Ruth was put forward as a torchbearer by her friend Claire Lockwood, who runs the Quercus flower business in Brixworth. “Ruth makes the most amazing difference to our community,” Claire

wrote in her submission. “She is the first to raise money for any charity, from abseiling down the Northampton Lift Tower for landmine removal charities (pictured, above) to fancy dress for Comic Relief



and everything inbetween.” [such as walking over hot coals, skydiving...] Ruth is also very active in Brixworth Primary School’s parent teacher association, where she helps to raise money for toys and equipment. If that’s not enough she’s a keen and talented sportswoman, who captains the Northampton Ladies’ Volleyball team, which has just been promoted to the First Division of the National League.

Her day job is equally hands-on and charitable: Ruth works as a carer for people with learning difficulties, particularly autism. The three currently in her care are now young men but have been with her for almost all their lives. She has also worked as a teacher for difficult children who’ve been excluded from the mainstream school system.

Ruth is not the only Brixworth resident to be directly involved with the Olympics: Mike Nice, who administers the Community Centre, is helping out with the archery competitions at Lord’s Cricket Ground. Helping the Bulletin help Brixworth

It’s not often we get a chance to do something directly for the community. So our appeal to the people of Brixworth, to help us pick a charitable cause in the village to support, was something I really hoped would strike a chord.

Ultimately, the matter was decided by just half a dozen votes: Connie had won.

Connie’s mum Rebecca says: “We would just want to say a huge thankyou firstly to the voters who got behind Connie and of course to the people at the *Bulletin* for their generosity to begin with in offering the money to a worthy cause. Particularly in today’s climate we are hugely grateful for the financial support from the *Bulletin* as it secures Connie’s next session later in the year. We have just finished our third session, and once again have seen real marked improvement in Connie’s walking which is so encouraging. We look forward to seeing further progress after the session in July.”

Meanwhile, the staff at the Brixworth Centre Pre-school were equally moved by Connie’s story. Chairperson Katherine Haxby tells us: “If by some remote chance we had won the vote, we would have donated the money straight to Connie anyway, (continued overleaf)

In light of this, the pre-school team redoubled its fundraising efforts with a bake sale and a successful application for a Parish Council grant. "A few weeks back on a cold and rainy Saturday afternoon, we assembled a group of volunteers consisting of members of our committee and their husbands, and managed to clear out the playground ourselves, cut down trees etc. We then used some of the money raised to employ a local tradesman to come and make the area safe by installing gates and blocking up cubby holes, so that the playground is now fit and ready to be used by the children.


"The only things that we are now missing are suitable child-friendly gardening tools and outside equipment such as benches, seats, pots and plants."

Plans for new care home near Cricket Club



Brixworth could see the construction of a new care home for the elderly on the outskirts of the village. The proposed Continuing Care Retirement Community would be located at Victoria Barns on Northampton Road, next to the Cricket Club.

The complex would provide a range of care options, from so-called close care, which is tailored to individual needs, to 24-hour care. The proposal comprises a 60 bed nursing home, 30 close care apartments and ten close care cottages. The apartments and cottages would be built to minimize the risk of accidents such as falls.

Close care homes are a relatively new development, designed to allow people to continue living independently while providing help with personal care as required – something most people in their 80s need to some extent.

The developers, Framptons Planning, point out that as people live longer there is a growing need for care homes. Indeed it is predicted that by 2019, one in five people living in Northamptonshire will be over 65, and that in ten years' time there will be 5,000 more people in the county living to 85 and beyond than there are today.

Framptons expect to submit a formal planning application to Daventry District Council shortly, with the Council making its decision around 13 weeks later. -cfw

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Celebrating the Queen's Diamond Jubilee



People up and down the country are preparing to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee with a series of parties, from informal picnics to big events with a packed schedule. Brixworth and the surrounding villages are no exception, with preparations already well underway in Brixworth, Hanging Houghton and Draughton .

In Brixworth, a small group of residents led by the Friends of All Saints Church is planning an evening of celebration centred around the village's iconic Saxon church. The Brixworth Beacon Jubilee Committee is inviting all residents of Brixworth, friends and relatives to join them in celebrating the Queen's 60 years on the throne. The family party will take place on Monday 4 June at the All Saints Churchyard and car park, from 6.45-11pm.

Do bring the kids – there will be lots of entertainment for all ages! The evening will kick off with a short Service of Thanksgiving outside the church. There will be a marquee in the churchyard with a bar and barbeque and also a selection of genuine Indian curries. For entertainment there will be Morris Dancers, a treasure hunt, lucky dips, games, competitions, face painting and bouncy castles. There will also be prizes for the winners of the Jubilee poster and hat competitions run in conjunction with Brixworth Primary School.

Round about 9pm there will be community singing of patriotic songs lead by the Jubilee Choir, and during the celebration there will be free gifts such as glowsticks, lollipops, paper hats, balloons and other goodies for all.

The evening will culminate with the lighting of the Brixworth Millennium Beacon at approximately 10.15pm, joining some 2,000 other beacons around the world in the "National Beacon of Celebration" event.

The Brixworth Beacon Jubilee Committee would like to thank the many local businesses and organisations without whose generous support the evening would not have been possible. In particular, they would like to thank the Parish Council for their grant of £600 toward the event. Hopefully the weather will be kind on 4 June and the village will rise to the occasion on this most special of days.

If this is not enough for you, then head to Hanging Houghton the following day – Tuesday 5 June - where residents are already preparing a picnic on the village green starting at 2.30 pm (or in Tom's barn if we're having yet another classic British summer).

Alternatively, if your taste is more for BBQ then join the residents of Draughton on Monday 4 June in the late afternoon. The location is the Draughton clubroom, but, as our Draughton correspondent Kate Calnan says: "It's such a small village the location hardly matters!"

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Planners appeal over housing development

Estate agent Carter Jonas has appealed against the rejection of their plans to build 150 houses on land west of Northampton Road.

The application – the first of two similar-sized housing developments currently under consideration – was unanimously rejected by Daventry District Council in January, and faced strong opposition from within the village and from the Parish Council. Carter Jonas argues that there is demand for new housing and the development should go ahead.

A planning inspector will consider the matter at an informal hearing on 26 June. If the rejection is overturned, the building work could go ahead shortly after. *-cfw*

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Volunteers relaunch Information Point

At Christmas 2011, the Brixworth Information Point in the Community Centre closed following the withdrawal of funding by Daventry District Council.

Rather than let the office remain unused, a group of 14 volunteers led by the Brixworth Christian Fellowship and supported by the Parish Council has taken on the challenge of running the office, which was formally re-opened on 27 April. The ribbon was cut by Mike Lacey, chairman of the Parish Council, accompanied by Phil Walter, minister of the Christian Fellowship (see below).

The Information Point will be open Tuesdays – Fridays; that is 10am – 1pm on Tuesdays, 12 noon - 1pm on Wednesdays, and 10am-4pm on Thursdays and Fridays. Information centre staff can assist in all manner of problems. Besides tourist

information and links to Council services, it will carry information on village organisations and bus timetables. It will also provide financial counselling from Bromford Support workers on Tuesdays and specialist advice on health matters from the Parish Nurses on Wednesdays.

The information centre is now equipped with wi-fi access to the internet, so you can surf the web whilst enjoying a cuppa in the Olive Branch.

Speaking at the opening, Phil Walter said: "It is important that villagers do use the new service, and encourage the volunteers in their new role."

protecting the shoreline

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Tackling the Ten Peaks for Parkinson's

There are a great many challenges people undertake to raise money for charity. From the Race for Life to a marathon, from skydiving to moonwalks. But few – if any! – of these challenges are as gruelling as the one facing Brixworth resident David I'Anson. David is taking on the Ten Peaks.

The Ten Peaks Challenge is a 24-hour ultra race to climb the ten highest peaks in the Lake District National Park. The course covers 73 km (45 miles) with over 5,600 metres of ascent, that's two thirds the height of Everest. There is no set route: every participant has to find their own way, using a map and compass or GPS.

Just getting round it is a huge achievement: In 2010, 52 people attempted it, including members of the Armed Forces, adventure racers, fell runners, triathletes, ultra distance and elite marathon runners. No one made it to the finish line.

David agrees. "My main goal is simply to complete the course!" he says. "From what I've heard just to finish is all one could ask for when undertaking the challenge."

The second goal is to raise money and awareness of Parkinson's Disease. "My uncle was diagnosed with Parkinson's in March of 2008, at the age of 52," David says.

"Now he says it is very rare that he does not feel tired, no matter how much rest he has. He has to concentrate when walking to ensure he doesn't drag his left foot. His fine motor skills have severely deteriorated which has a huge impact on everyday things like writing or typing, buttoning shirts, or even counting money to pay for things in shops. There are much larger impacts as well, such as the strict drug regime or having to reapply for a driving license every 18 months but it's the little things that seem to have the biggest impact."

He adds: "After seeing how the disease progresses and makes everyday things difficult and frustrating for the sufferer I was resolved to do as much as I could to help."

By raising awareness of the disease, David hopes to help

other people diagnose it quicker, as the symptoms can easily be attributed to ageing. Moreover, Parkinson's UK funds research into understanding the disease which it hopes will eventually lead to a cure and offers support to sufferers and their loved ones.

Such support was invaluable to David's uncle. "My uncle can live life as normally as is possible which I think highlights the importance of the work of charities like Parkinson's UK."

David has already completed a number of races for charity. The Ten Peaks idea was born after he started running with a group of people from Brixworth. "One of the members, Gordon Heron, was

already taking part – he's supports Acorn's Children's Hospice Trust www.acorns.org.uk and recently completed the London Marathon for them. When Gordon asked if I'd like to join, I knew it was something I really wanted to do. It also provided the perfect opportunity to raise funds for a cause I felt strongly about."

A strict weekly training schedule helps David prepare for the challenge. Circuit training, running, gym work, core training, with general runs and rock climbing thrown in for good measure. On top of that come a number of only slightly less daunting 'extreme races', which David has added as part of the fundraising project and also to help him prepare. "The most recent one was the Wolf Run, a 10 km cross-country obstacle course, on 7 April. Coming up I have the Tough Mudder on 12 May at Boughton House Kettering, a 12 mile obstacle course designed by British Special Forces."

He adds: "I don't think it would be possible to undertake such a challenge without the support of my family and friends. From having meals prepared for me to supporting me at races, it's something I will always appreciate and remain thankful for."

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Police Report

This will be last time I write for the *Bulletin* as I take early retirement in July this year.

dramatic turnaround

I thought I would reflect on the years I have been in the village leading your local police officers and staff. I came to the area in early 2006 and was shocked to find that there was a dispersal area in force, anti-social behaviour was rife, crime was relatively high (242 crimes per annum, 38% of which was criminal damage) and by and large you needed attention. The dispersal zone was inappropriate for a village of this size - what was more important than anything was that you were policed. I recall marauding youths on the Ashway and gangs of youngsters hanging around the village centre intimidating others and damaging property.

I impressed upon my team, not quite a 'no tolerance' mindset, but not far off. Slowly we got to know who was causing the problems, who was committing the crime in their own village and we began to gain your support.

Your Parish Council supported [the creation of a police office in the village] in 2007, which proved a crucial turning point as it increased our presence in the village. Year on year your crime and anti-social behaviour reduced and this year, despite an upward crime trend for Daventry sector, crime in Brixworth parish was down another 20% in 2011 to 128, while calls regarding anti-social behaviour were down 26%.

Much has been achieved by my team and I thank them for supporting me through the years. I would like to express my thanks for the assistance of local residents too, Frank and Liz Wiig have always given their support to me and many other activities in the village. The Parish Council has been very helpful too and I thank them for their dedication to making Brixworth the village it is today.

I leave with pride in what has been achieved here; it's had its ups and downs

like any job but I have enjoyed serving your parish and I hope that whoever takes over from me will get from it as much as I have.

PCSOs

There has been a lot of concern recently over PCSO jobs. The County and Borough councils' financial support ended this year and the force has had to deselect about 12 PCSOs. I am pleased that Jo Hillery has retained her post. Thank you for all the letters and emails of support for Jo - you have my gratitude. Jo is looking forward to building on her good work and I am sure you will all work with her in that quest.

My thanks go to David Hymas who helped Jo build the Community Panel into a meaningful process. If you want to influence what we do locally, check www.northants.police.uk for details of the next meeting.

PCSO Glyn Lewis retires too this summer. Glyn has been a PCSO on this area for almost ten years and has become something of a legend across the northern rural part of our beat. No words can explain the positive impact he has had across his community. He will be sorely missed and I wish him well in his retirement. At this time a replacement has not yet been identified for Glyn but I am assured that his post will be filled despite the reduction in overall PCSOs.

metal theft update

In a previous Bulletin you may recall me telling you about some farm rollers stolen back last May from Spratton. Enquiries led to a scrap dealer in Warwickshire that in turn led to a Brixworth resident suspect. The male was arrested but denied the charge, however he was later charged and bailed to court. He eventually appeared before the court, was found guilty of theft and ordered to pay £550 compensation and complete 100 hours community service. It's taken time but the wheels of justice get there in the end.

Operation Guardian

The Force has been running Operation Guardian that concentrates on robbery, dwelling burglary and vehicle crime. It's already achieved terrific reductions and many offences have been brought to justice.

Northamptonshire Police has set up another major operation which will focus on taking positive action to tackle violent offending across the county. Officers will use a variety of tactics including early intervention to prevent a situation from escalating, targeting prolific offenders of violent crime as well as potential victims, and taking an educational approach by involving schools and young people.

As part of the operation, High Impact days dedicated to reducing violence will take place across the county over upcoming months.

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Country Eye

Of unconsidered trifles

What goes on behind closed doors is no business of mine, but I would hazard a guess that none of you go in for a spot of reingestion or refection on the quiet. It seems that whenever animal behaviourists come across a weird observation they cannot resist labelling it not once, but twice. For both these words mean the same – they refer to animals that eat their own droppings, as a matter of routine. The rabbit has this, to us, dubious distinction, but it was not until recently that we discovered it. This is because it does indeed take place behind closed doors, ie in the privacy of its own burrow.

We are all familiar with the hard fibrous round droppings produced by the rabbit. 'Currants' is what we called them when I was a child. These are the result of food having passed through the animals' digestive system for a second time. Rabbits are vegetarians, grass making up a large part of their diet. Modified sugars that we know as cellulose



bind the cell walls of plants together, and stiffen it up. This is impossible to digest by vertebrates, so almost all of them, ourselves included, enlist the help of billions of 'friendly' bacteria in the gut to do this for us.

Food passes through the rabbit quite rapidly the first time around. The resulting dropping are tiny soft pellets, excreted as I have said, in the burrow, where the rabbit immediately eats them again. The second pass through the intestines results in much more thorough digestion of the food, and the 'currants' are the result. Not quite a second bite of the cherry, but I hope you get my drift!

Cows, sheep, and deer tackle the problem in a slightly different way; they chew the cud. The stomach, called the rumen is separated into chambers. Food enters the first chamber and is partly digested. It is then regurgitated

into the mouth, given a good old second chomping, and back into the second chamber for further digestion. And so on. This system still needs the help of bacteria.

Animal droppings are a valuable resource, and there are vast numbers of small creatures, plants, and fungi that depend entirely on them. They include the shiny armoured dor beetles of many species. One kind specialises in sheep droppings, another in those of the rabbit, while a third makes tunnels beneath fresh cowpats and stocks them with dung for its grubs to eat. These beetles fly from one source of food to another at night, and an old folklore name for them was the lousy watchman. This is because they often carry a cargo of dozens of tiny pale brown mites in the crevices of their undersides, and between their legs. Science blesses these relatives of the spiders with the name phoretic mites. Experts argue as to whether these

are merely hitchhikers, or whether they have become parasites, piercing the soft skin between the hard armour to suck body fluids.

Dung flies, khaki-coloured hairy relatives of the housefly, which may be seen swarming above cowpats in the summer, also depend on it as their food source. There is an old country belief that cowslips (pictured, above), sadly now far from common in our fields due to modern industrial farming methods, always grew best where the ground had been manured by cow dung. In fact these flowers were originally called cowslips!

Of course we humans have long recognised the value of animal dung. In the days when nothing was ever wasted I remember an aunt who lived in a little old two rooms up and two down cottage at Pitsford. The internal walls were of wattle-and-daub. To make this a lattice of woven twigs, like a sheep hurdle,

was daubed with successive layers of mud mixed with cow dung, straw and cow hair. When it had dried hard it made an effective lightweight room divider. Dung was also incorporated into the cob walling which was once common in the north west of our county. I am sure many examples still survive in our older buildings.

The wheel has come full circle; today we are looking at ways of using dung as biofuels, notably by fermenting it in digesters to generate methane (i.e. natural) gas.

How long have you been running The George?

We took over the pub one year ago, on 3 January 2011. Gary had decided he wanted a change in his work - he had been travelling round the world for twenty years as a repair engineer for heavy engineering plants. Wendy had been working as a Tesco store manager. So, it has been a big change in our life, but we think we have now adapted.

What is your relationship to Brixworth?

We come from Warwickshire and at first were looking for a pub there to take over. However, we fell in love with The George as soon as we saw it - the building, the lovely village and the surrounding countryside. We have been surprised how everyone has made us feel so welcome.

What changes have you seen?

As we have built our reputation, the pub has become a lot busier. We had a very good Christmas which has led to increased business since then. We serve home-made food and the pub has become very family oriented.



We've introduced some signature dishes such as our own special sausages which Chambers the butchers make using our own recipe and real ale. We also have a George Burger now!

We also put on a lot of entertainment. We have a live band once a month, and we make sure we vary the type of music each time. On St George's Day we had folk music and Morris Dancers. For the Jubilee we're having a reggae band and there will be a "tug of war" in the field next door in aid of "Help for Heroes". Other events have included a makeover night and a night with a clairvoyant.

There's also a darts team now which plays on Tuesday nights.

Who is involved in the business?

Apart from ourselves, there is Matt our bar manager, who comes from Rugby. Annette, who comes from Brixworth, helps Wendy in the kitchen. Our bar staff are all local young people and we like to think we are one big family.

What type of customers do you have?

On Friday and Saturday nights we have a regular drinking client base, of all ages ranging from late 30s to 60s, and we have made many good friends among them. A lot of local groups now come to meet at The George, including the football coaches for the Under Eights, the Photographic Society, the Drama Group, the Bellringers and the Cricket Club.

Describe your typical day

After getting Wendy's son Cameron ready for school, in the morning there is paperwork and the books to be done. There is also cleaning, ordering and preparation in the kitchen before we open for lunch at midday. After lunch, we have to re-lay the tables, do our emails and arrange the buffets for opening at five thirty. We are open all day on Friday, Saturday and Sunday from midday. We close on Monday for a break and to catch up on paperwork.

Any seasonal variations?

The business has been pretty consistent with no real slump at any time, although it tends to be a bit quieter during the school holidays.



What is the funniest thing that has happened to you?

We can't think of anything in particular. Sometimes we have spontaneous sing-alongs with our customers at the bar!

There have been a lot of outstanding memories. We are surprised that we have been able to turn around the business more quickly than we expected, and by how well we have been accepted by people here.

What is the strangest thing that has happened to you?

The George, along with the Red Lion, is reputed to be haunted. Wendy and Cameron have experienced some things which have really scared them. Sometimes Wendy can feel somebody standing by her side in the kitchen. She was once checking the kitchen door was locked when she saw a big black shadow there. Cameron has seen somebody standing at the end of the upstairs corridor at night.

What are your top three challenges?

We want to increase the range of food we serve, so we can also attract customers from outside Brixworth. We are focusing more on children's food and can also cater for vegan, vegetarian and gluten-free customers. We want to grow the music and entertainment, and to introduce more guest ales. Information on our guest ales, and our specials, is posted on our website.

Local musicians wanted!

Do you live in or near Brixworth? Are you a budding musician?

The organisers of Brixfest, a musical festival coming to Lake House in the heart of the village in July, would like to offer local performers a chance to participate at the festival.

"We would love to offer a platform to local artists," says the festival's host, Rosemary Tuckley.

So far the line up of rock, blues and acoustic musicians includes one local artist, the young singer, guitarist and composer Charlie Howitt. However the organisers would like to extend the invitation to other local talent, who'll be able to perform in the picturesque surroundings of the lake at the centre of Brixworth Hall Park, the village's best-kept secret.

On yer bike!

How many bikes does your family own? According to Jeff Webb of Pitsford Cycles at Brixworth Country Park, it is likely you'll now have more bikes than people in your household.

This is because biking has been going through a great resurgence in recent years. In particular, there has been a "vertical explosion" in road bikes, he says, following Lance Armstrong's sustained success in the Tour de France. Bikes offer a combined package of benefits – an enjoyable leisure activity, an opportunity to socialise with other cyclists, and exercise for keeping fit.

There are about a dozen different types of bikes nowadays – racing bikes, mountain bikes, hybrids (road bikes with some facilities for offroading) and downhill bikes. (Many Alpine and Scottish ski resorts now offer downhill bike tracks off season). The "Aston Martins" of bikes are made from carbon fibre, which offers frames that last a lifetime - they don't rust, are very light and absorb vibration.

You probably already knew there were bikes for hire at Brixworth Country Park. You may also have seen the gleaming rows of new bikes for sale outside the Warden's office. However, Jeff offers far more than these. His team specialises in building customised bikes for individual requirements. They also undertake a great many repairs.

Jeff opened Pitsford Cycles in 1998 when Anglian Water took over the Country Park

and the Visitor Centre opened. At first he offered just cycle hire but gradually increased his stock so that his shop is now a vast cavern of bike accessories offering everything from special energy-boosting drinks and snacks to trendy biking fashionwear.


His four full-time staff are all qualified specialists who are mad keen on the sport. A couple of them compete at national level and one is aiming for the 2016 Olympics. They are supported by four to eight part-timers, depending on the season, who are usually Brixworth young people.

Northamptonshire County Council has responded to the growing popularity of cycling by starting the Norbitel cycle ring road, which joins Brackmills with Moulton Park and will eventually link up to the Brampton Valley Way. It may take another ten years, however, before the scheme completes a cycle route right round Northampton.

Many family businesses have folded as

bike retailing has moved from small shops to big chains. By contrast, Jeff's business is booming and he is now looking for ways to expand.

Parish Council Annual Report



Chairman's Overview — Cllr Michael Lacey

As we rapidly approach the end of a four year term as a Parish Council it seems appropriate that I should express my thanks to those who serve now and those who have served during our four year term. The effort each has given in service to our community is seldom appreciated. None are paid and several even pay their own expense and so it is only right that I say a sincere; thank you.

Looking back across this last year, we have done most of the things that are, traditionally, expected of us. We have given financial grants to various organisations within our community, in order to assist them. We have acted as a consultee for Daventry District Council in planning matters that are brought before us and have done our best to meet legislative expectations, especially where large developments have come forward. To that end, we declined to support the Carter Jonas application as we could find nothing in relevant local legislation to justify it. In other cases decisions were not always as clear cut, but we have done our best to meet the obligations of legislation, while maintaining an active concern for the community.

When we came to set our budget for the coming year, we made a point of living within our means and did not ask for any increase that would have affected taxes; in fact, if you look at your Council Tax Bill you will find that we actually ask less per household than we asked last year.

We also reviewed how we communicate as a Parish Council and started to look into Public Relations resulting in potential changes to how we use our website and our creating a Brixworth Facebook page.

Lastly, learning that the position of the PCSO in our village is under threat due to Northampton County Council budget cuts we have voiced our support for the position and the Officer involved, in the hope that Brixworth might avoid the brunt of the change.

A new Parish Council will be elected on May 3rd. I very much hope you will be able to support their efforts on your behalf for the next 4 years.

Planning Committee Report – by Cllr David Parnaby Chairman

Following the surveys which took place last year on land to the south of the village, an application for the construction of an estate of 150 houses was submitted by Carter Jonas on behalf of the Society of Merchant Venturers. This application, for an estate outside the village confines created grave concern throughout the village and, following a campaign by residents and rejection by the Parish Council, was finally refused by Daventry District Council on 11 January 2012.

An application for the building of 14 houses on the former Ilmor carpark, a brownfield site to the north of Eaglehurst was approved, subject to certain reservations, at a full Council meeting on 23 August 2011.

The Committee meets at three-weekly intervals on Mondays at 7.30 pm in the Library/Community Centre. Applicants are invited to attend. Members of the public are also most welcome.

Recreation and Amenities Committee Report—by Cllr Steve Pointer

The Parish Council is looking at regenerating the play area and tennis courts on St David's Recreation Ground. A working group has been set up, which includes members of the council, local residents and members of the football clubs. The group have also been looking at ways to improve the access to the car park. A consultation on ideas for new play equipment is to be held from Saturday, 21 April 2012. Residents are invited to come along to the Library / Community Centre foyer to view the ideas and make suggestions. How Near Are We in Appointing a New Vicar?

There isn't a great deal to report in terms of what has happened to date with regard the appointment of a new incumbent. It is still early days and there are a number of hoops that need to be gone through before the position is advertised.

Nevertheless, that is not to say that nothing has happened. The parochial church council and churchwardens have met with the Rural Dean and the Archdeacon of Northampton to discuss the procedures of a new appointment and how the parish is to be managed during the course of the interregnum. In essence, the churchwardens with the Rural Dean become the official sequestrators of the parish, and church life carries as normal with visiting clergy covering the main Sunday Eucharist, baptisms, weddings and funerals. Details of the main Sunday services are outlined in the Calendar. The only significant change is that baptisms will for the time being be held in the main Sunday service and not in a special baptism service as they have been under Father Watkins. Those wishing to discuss arrangements for baptisms, weddings and funerals should contact the churchwardens in the first instance.

The most crucial aspect of the new appointment procedure, is the compilation of a parish profile. This document will be used to inform prospective incumbents about the village: its social make-up, organisations and the relationship of the church within the community. Importantly, the parish profile will also outline the vision of where we see the church in the future. It will take a little while for the PCC to agree on the parish profile, but when it does the position will be advertised.

Appeal for an Organist

After providing sterling service in his retirement for almost 8 years, our regular organist Ron Gates has decided to call time on his playing on a Sunday. Ron, who lives in Northampton, has decided to assist in a church nearer to home. This does mean that we do need an organist on Sunday mornings. A regular commitment, although ideal, is not essential. During the interregnum, the organist would simply need to accompany hymn singing and play a selection of short pieces during the eucharist – nothing elaborate would be needed. The post would suit both an experienced organist or equally a pianist wishing to gain some experience on the organ. There is a remuneration fee per service. For further information contact the churchwardens.

Reverend Watkins retires

After 30 years as Vicar of All Saints' Church Brixworth and as Rector of St. Mary and All Saints' Church Holcot, the Reverend Anthony Watkins has retired. To mark the occasion, and following a service of Solemn Evensong and Benediction, a farewell party was held on 19th February at Brixworth Centre attended by many, many parishioners and old friends. He was presented with several gifts, tokens and cards. Father Anthony takes with him our very best wishes for a happy retirement at his new home in South London.

At the time of going to press, it is not known who will fill the vacancy created by Reverend Watkins' retirement. We're expecting an interregnum of several months before a new incumbent is appointed. Sunday Services will continue to be conducted by visiting clergy for the time being.

Dear People of Brixworth,

A few months have passed since my official "farewell" took place in February and my subsequent retirement began but I am anxious to let it be known in the village how much I appreciated not only the generous gifts (including, of course, the handsome cheque) but also the warmth of the tributes and the reception given to me both verbally and in the form of cards and letters. It is my intention to respond to all these written messages but I know that will take some time.

Many years ago when I was about 17 and still in school, I remember attending the "farewell" of my local rector, the Rev H. S. Richards, who had baptized me, prepared me for Confirmation and in many ways been a role model for the priesthood to which I secretly aspired as time went on. I was brought up in a village called Llanfoist, just outside Abergavenny in Monmouthshire. In thanking the parishioners for their farewell gifts to him the rector related the tale of a previous incumbent in a neighbouring village, who had become so unpopular that hardly anyone went to his church. So relieved were his parishioners to hear he was going (incumbents in the C. of E, weren't obliged to retire in those days and could stay

on until they died) that they gave him a really generous leaving present. But he decided he had better remain in the parish, thinking himself more appreciated than he had thought!

Perhaps the reason why the rector told that particular tale was due to his feeling that he was tolerated rather than loved or even appreciated in his parish over the 29 years as incumbent and was therefore quite surprised by the warm reception he was given when he retired. Similarly, I have believed myself to have been tolerated more than liked and certainly never tried to cultivate popularity during my time in Brixworth. I know that I have upset people at times and had disagreements but regarded all that as inevitable in trying to do my job. Indeed a former churchwarden at Holcot (my other parish) warned me when I arrived in September 1981 that I was never going to please everybody and so might as well please one person at least, namely myself! However, I hope that pleasing myself hasn't been seen as my guiding principle in my ministry while not allowing myself to be swayed by others simply in order to please or avoid disagreement.

Despite a few painful experiences in earlier days through my lack of experience, I can honestly say that I have enjoyed being Vicar of Brixworth with its variety of opportunities and I can look upon many blessings and enrichments through my dealings with the people whether churchgoers or not. My regrets are to do with missed opportunities and all that I have failed to do for individuals and the parish as a whole.

I find that I am missing the countryside of Brixworth and the surrounding area as well as its unique parish church, but Bromley has its compensations with lots of shops near at hand as well as frequent buses and trains and the seclusion of the college and its grounds.

Please remember me in your prayers as I try to adjust (not altogether willingly) to retirement, as I continue to keep you in my own prayers.

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WESTMINSTER REPORT



So, pending an appeal, the infamous "Cleric" Abu Hamza recently lost his case at the European Court of Human Rights against him being extradited to the USA to face terrorism charges.

Good! I hated the fact that British taxpayers were paying huge sums of money to keep someone in the country who, quite obviously, didn't like the country he was living in, even though it had looked after him so well.

But what exactly is this European Court of Human Rights and why does it seem to have so much power over how we go about our everyday lives here in the UK?

This Court (the ECHR) was created by the European Convention for the Protection Human Rights and Fundamental Freedoms way back in post-war 1950 and is based in Strasbourg, France.

The Convention itself recognised that "Human Rights" are not absolute. Exactly what they mean in practise often involves the balancing of an individual's rights against the rights of others and the need to uphold a civilised and well-functioning society. Thus no document can set out exactly what these rights mean in every circumstance and thus the application of "Human Rights" actually confers great powers and discretion to the judiciary.

Even though the Court was set up all this time ago, it was only in 1998 that an amendment to the original Convention was passed that it became a requirement for all countries that had signed up to the ECHR to accept the Court's power to make binding judgments. At the same time, the last Labour Government introduced the Human Rights to apply the legislation in the UK.

From 1966 when the UK first subscribed voluntarily to the Court's pronouncements until the end of 2010, the UK faced over 350 rulings from the ECHR and about 75% of these ruled against the UK. Many

of the latter judgments have been high profile cases which caused great concern across British society.

Indeed, the Court's recent rulings seem often fly in the face of the common understanding of what "Human Rights" are and mean.

Since 1998 we have effectively sub-contracted the definition of our "Human Rights" to a number of foreign Judges. Their interpretation of rights has led to our ongoing troubles in trying to extradite individuals like Abu Qatada and Abu Hamza. Whilst these cases have annoyed a large number of people, probably the judgment that has caused the most controversy and public debate is the Courts' demand for the UK to give convicted prisoners the vote.

So, how do you solve the problem of this Court making bizarre judgments that can both upset the law-abiding majority and be in conflict with protecting our nation's security?

I believe the time has come for us to repeal the Human Rights Act (1998) and replace it with a new UK Bill of Rights. This would allow British Judges to interpret "Human Rights" as before, but if the Judges believed that legislation approved by Parliament violated these rights, they would refer it back to Parliament for alteration. Thus Parliament could check whether a legislative change was needed to respect "Human Rights" or determine that the Judges verdict had gone beyond those rights.

In short, this reform would reinstate Parliamentary democracy in this field and then, hopefully start the process of restoring public confidence in "Human Rights" and the sooner we reconnect "Human Rights" with the British people, the better.

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High Street Offices and Newspaper Ads

The internet is changing the way we buy and sell property and is now, by far, the preferred method used for finding or selling a home.

Less than ten years ago estate agency branches were the first port of call for those looking to buy or sell property. Clients would telephone to register on a mailing list, or arrive armed with a torn-out advert from the local newspaper.

Estate agents used to claim that a third of all of the properties they sold came from potential purchasers walking into their offices, a further third came from newspaper adverts and the final third from people that had seen 'For Sale' boards. This is no longer the case.

As technology goes forward it may be no surprise for you to hear that the majority of property is now sourced via the internet.

So is this the end of the estate agent?

My answer is a definite No! Although I do predict an end to estate agents having multiple offices in one town, most buyers and sellers will still prefer to benefit from the expertise and negotiating skills of

knowledgeable property experts but will not choose them based on the number of branches they have or the amount of pages they have in the property section of the local newspaper.

With most people now searching for their ideal home online, vendors will demand that agents advertise on the best sites and in the right way.

Rightmove.co.uk, primelocation.com and findaproperty.com are used by most estate agents but even that is not enough. With so many properties on these sites the best agents are now upgrading their monthly subscriptions in order to be able to advertise their vendor's homes in larger boxes and with premium positions, thus giving their clients the edge.

The moral of this story is: when looking to get a valuation on your home, check the estate agent out online first. Look at their website, read reviews of their service and make sure they subscribe to a minimum of three National portals (including Rightmove) and see how well they present their current selection of homes. - Stuart Little

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Thought of making your Will?

It is natural to feel uncomfortable about making a will. In fact one of the main reasons why people do not make wills is because they feel it is tempting fate. However, it is very important that you consider making a will as you can ensure that your assets are passed to those who you wish to benefit.

While on maternity leave and talking to other mums and dads in Brixworth I got many questions. Many did not have wills, or have parents or family members in need of a will or power of attorney. I hope to answer some of the frequently asked questions here and hope to arrange a drop in day at the community centre to give out some free legal advice in this area if there is a good enough response.

Whilst this is not any by any means an exhaustive list, if you can answer yes to any of the following questions then it is important that you make a will:

- Do you own a house?
- Do you have children?
- Do you have family that you do not wish to inherit?
- Do you want to leave money in trust to a vulnerable child or adult?
- Are you unmarried and cohabiting with someone who you would want to leave your estate to?
- Do you wish to leave a legacy to a charity?

why make a will?

A will is a legal declaration of who you wish to leave your estate to on your death. It enables you to also appoint an executor and trustees to deal with the administration of the estate and any trusts created out of the will. Furthermore you can appoint a guardian for your children.

who can make a will?

If you are over 18 (or even younger if you're in the Armed Forces) and of sound mind then you can make a will. It is also possible to make a will for a loved one who has lost capacity by applying to the court of protection (you'll need legal advice for this).

what are the intestacy rules?

If you don't leave a valid will your estate will pass in accordance with the intestacy rules. If you are married or are in a civil partnership, the first person entitled to your estate under the intestacy rules is your spouse/civil partner, but he or she will not necessarily inherit the whole of your estate. The amount your spouse/civil partner would inherit depends on how much is in your estate and which of your blood relatives survive you.

do I need to see a solicitor?

It is always recommended to see a solicitor to ensure your will is validly drawn up and executed; however, it is possible for you to create a will by yourself.

how can I protect a disabled child?

Whether your child is a minor or an adult it is important that you make provision in your will for them to ensure that anything that is left for them is held in trust so that any benefits that they may be entitled to are not affected.

what is a lasting power of attorney?

A lasting power of attorney ('LPA') is a document in which a person can appoint someone or more than one person to act for them at a time when they perhaps no longer have mental capacity to deal with their own affairs. There are two types: one deals with property and financial affairs and the other with health and welfare decisions. It is important that you do not delay in having one of these in place. Once someone loses capacity, family and friends may need to apply to the courts for authority to deal with matters on their behalf without a valid LPA in place. – *Caroline Redshaw*
