


Expansion sees Brixworth Primary top 500 pupils

This year Brixworth CEVC Primary School will see significant building work to accommodate an increase in pupil numbers, from its present roll of 480, to a projected 525 pupils, following the expansion of the village. The new build programme will start this May and is scheduled to be completed in December.

The expansion will make Brixworth Primary one of the largest in the area, at around twice the national average for a primary school. This is still markedly smaller than the largest in the country, which run to well over 700 pupils.

The work will add two classrooms and a staffroom, extend the hall, and provide a new domestic science/meeting room and extra toilets in the Key Stage 1 area. Headmaster David Boucher says: "I cannot say at this point which year groups will be placed in them – room allocations do vary from year to year, depending on the composition of year group sizes. However, I think it is safe to say one classroom will be for Key Stage 1 pupils and one will be for Key Stage 2 pupils."

While the mobile unit that the school has been using for a number of years will remain on site for the short to medium term, Boucher says it may well be put to a different use. The amount of external space available to the pupils will not be significantly affected.



The project is managed and funded by Northamptonshire County Council, with a contribution from Barratt Housing – part of the conditions imposed by Daventry District Council for approving the Saxon Rise housing development.

The hall, which will be extended into what is currently a storage area, will allow the school to accommodate the new maximum number of pupils. It is used for PE lessons, assemblies, lunches, Brixworth Christian Fellowship services, lettings and afterschool clubs.

The work on the hall will take place over the summer school holidays. All non-school groups that would otherwise use the hall, such as Weightwatchers and Brixworth Christian Fellowship Community Church, will re-locate temporarily to the Community Centre Hall.

Your Deserving Cause 2016

The Cricket Club meanwhile is hoping to use their funding towards improving drainage at Haywards Barn – the ground in the outfield has settled a little since it was built, creating some issues with playing conditions.

Thank you all for participating in the vote, it's been fantastic to see the village so engaged with giving money to good causes.



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Blue Plaques on the way!



Our very own Blue Plaque Trail should be up and running by the end of the year. Thanks to a grant from Northamptonshire Community Foundation and donations, the first plaques are on order. Before they can be displayed, the scheme must be approved by Daventry District Council as most of the properties are in the Conservation Area. Around 30 sites and homes have agreed in principle to display the plaques, which will be individually made with historical details supplied by Dennis Coles of the History Society.

Heritage Group Chairman Mike Nice said: "We were able to build on the work of John and Mandy Dawkins, who we will invite back to Brixworth to open the trail. Their research and art work for the Information Board to be sited on The Pound has been vital."

Historic private homes as well as two current public houses, the church, the Heritage Centre and Brixworth Centre are among those that have agreed to display the plaques. – *Mike Nice*

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Still no ruling on Pointer vs Parish

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Paddy Fox

1943 – 2016

Many readers will have been saddened to hear of the sudden death of Paddy Fox, founder member and former editor of the Brixworth Bugle (1992–2004).

Paddy not only managed the editorial team with persuasive skill but was herself a brilliant investigative reporter, a reflection of her previous career working at 'The Sunday Times' in the 60s and later on 'The Kibworth Chronicle'. Her political awareness meant that it was no surprise that 'The Bugle' was voted by a national magazine, 'The Countryman', Best Community Newspaper in 1994.

Her desire to bring the Brixworth community together extended to inspiring and editing 'Brixworth Country Fare', a village recipe collection which raised money for the Church Spire Appeal. Also, all new residents were delighted to receive the excellent and informative Welcome Pack, detailing everything the village could offer, which was produced by Paddy and fellow Bugle member, David Hymas.

Paddy will be particularly remembered in the village and further afield as the heart of The Fox in the Pound Bookshop which opened in 1982. This delightful place was full of the most unusual publications which reflected Paddy's eclectic tastes and would also regularly be used to host local art exhibitions. Thanks to her charismatic personality the bookshop became a friendly meeting



point where politics and local issues were the topic of many discussions until its closure in 2008.

Before they became so popular nationally, Paddy founded the first Book Group in Brixworth, another example of her never-ending ability to take the initiative. Yet more of her talents can be seen in her participation in Amateur Dramatics. She took part in several Kibworth and Market Harborough productions and her final performance was in Winfrith, a medieval re-enactment in Brixworth Church as part of the Millennium celebrations.

The list is endless when it comes to Paddy's commitment and contribution to the local community. She was a Parish Councillor for many years, a school governor for Brixworth Primary, a driving force behind the Millennium Garden Committee and regularly helped at the local Youth Club. Whilst these are more visible roles, she also demonstrated compassion by being a friendly visitor on behalf of The Alzheimers Society and was a volunteer at Oxfam Bookshop in

Market Harborough twice a week until days before her death.

Brixworth will be a poorer place for the loss of such a life-enhancing, vibrant and passionate woman who has left us a lasting legacy. This indeed was a life well lived.

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Mercedes AMG expands Brixworth site

You may have noticed a new building being constructed near the roundabout on the A508 at Mercedes AMG HPP. A new Hybrid Technology Centre will house design, assembly and testing operations in this permanent building, which replaces temporary accommodation and containerised storage.

The new two-storey building covers just over 3000 square metres and will see the ground floor housing clean room, lab-type facilities with testing operations and also parts and component storage, whilst the first floor will be for offices and the plant equipment necessary to support these activities.

Construction work continues apace and the team hopes to move into the new building before the end of the year.

The new building has been designed to reflect the style of the current buildings and represents a significant investment by Daimler at their Technology Centre here in Brixworth, building upon the success of winning two consecutive Formula One Drivers' and Constructors' World Championships with the Mercedes team in Brackley.



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Cleaned For The Queen

As part of the Clean for the Queen campaign to clear up Britain in time for her 90th birthday, on Saturday 19 March 2016 87 volunteers filled 72 bags and uncovered a scooter, tyres, a ten foot blue tube, a Co-op shopping basket, plastic fencing, broken branches of 12 foot, a perfectly serviceable mop and Foster lager cans dating back to the Sydney Olympics 2000!

Eighty-seven volunteers tackled rubbish hotspots such as The Ashway and St David's playing fields, the Pocket Park, Northampton Road from the doctor's surgery to the A508 roundabout, pathways leading from Holcot Road, Eastfield Road and The A508 bypass.

The most shocking area was the stretch of road leading from the Barratt's estate down to the A508 roundabout where 20 bags of rubbish were filled; this is an area suffering from fly-tipping and is, quite frankly, a disgrace.

We were lucky with the weather and everyone was extremely grateful for the union jack-festooned refreshment tent which included tea, coffee, hot chocolate and homemade cakes provided free of charge by the Olive Branch and the Brixworth Cubs and Scouts Group.

The event was a huge success not just because of the amount of rubbish picked up but also because it brought so many community groups together including the children from Brixworth Primary School who designed posters advertising the event at several village shops and organisations.

Body in Country Park is missing man

Police have confirmed that the body found at Pitsford Reservoir on 14 May is that of the missing man, Colin Addington.

Police and volunteers had been searching the area around Brixworth, Pitsford and Holcot for several days beforehand. Addington had failed to arrive for work on Tuesday 10 May; his van was found parked near the reservoir later the same day.

The reservoir and country park remained closed to visitors for most of Saturday while recovery operations took place. Police say the death is not regarded as suspicious and thanked the public for their help with the search. – *cfw*

Chinese takeaway set to open in July, Indian Restaurant delayed

A new Chinese takeaway is due to open next to the Red Lion on the corner of Northampton and Harborough Road at the beginning of July. As the Bulletin goes to press, the refurbishment works are in full swing.

ACE Recycling, which had previously occupied the premises, has moved a few doors up to road to the former Daisy Roots infant shoe shop.

Meanwhile, builders are still working on the new Indian restaurant opposite Chambers butchers on Kennel Terrace. Its owners, who run the Wild Ginger restaurant in Upton, have not yet been able to give the Bulletin an opening date. – *Jennifer Fitzgerald*

Merry Tom Mansion rejected

Daventry District Council's Planning Committee has rejected plans for a mansion built in the Arts & Crafts style at the bottom of Merry Tom Lane.

The proposed house would have seen a huge eight-bedroom mansion built off Merry Tom Lane, at the crossing with Brampton Lane.

However, the plans contravened both Daventry's policies and the emerging Brixworth Neighbourhood Plan. It could still have been approved on grounds of its exceptional architectural quality. However, Daventry's planning committee were unconvinced, and the proposal was rejected by 9 votes to 3 (despite the planning officer's recommendation to approve). – *cfw*

Finessing Saxon Rise development

Access to the new doctors surgery has become a tricky issue to resolve, specifically a proposed right hand turn lane on Northampton Road to facilitate access to the new surgery from the south. The original proposal would have cost over £400,000, a large amount for the relatively small amount of vehicles thought likely to approach the surgery from that direction.

Barratt Homes have met with Chris Millar and NCC Officers to discuss the necessity for this. It was agreed that Barratts would explore less expensive alternative schemes.

Meeting a separate requirement to provide a new three-metre wide footpath on the left hand side of the road down to the bypass, Barratts had already agreed to a suggestion by the Neighbourhood Plan Group to build a combined footpath and cycle way which will cross all the way from the bus stop opposite the cricket ground through to the southern end of the development and allow cyclists a direct route towards the country park.

Meanwhile, it is expected that the 30mph zone will be extended, likely to the bus stop. – *cfw*

Developers challenge Neighbourhood Plan

An Independent Examiner has been appointed to scrutinise the Brixworth Neighbourhood Plan in light of objections raised by several parties against the plan.

In all, the formal consultation on the plan drew eight responses. The strongest objections – perhaps unsurprisingly, given that the Neighbourhood Plan essentially seeks to curtail major further housing developments outside the village boundary until 2029 – came from agents for landowners.

Savills, who have an interest in three areas of potential development, including the field west of Northampton Road (where Carter Jonas were refused planning permission for a major new housing estate a few years ago) set out their objections over 256 exhaustive pages. Berrys, who have an interest in land near the Scaldwell Road, east of the A508, also lodged complaints, calling the Neighbourhood Plan 'backward looking'.

The examiner chosen to inspect the Plan is Rosemarie Kidd, a planner from North Yorkshire with over 30 years experience in rural and urban planning including advising on and examining Neighbourhood Plans. It will be up to her to decide that if a public hearing is necessary for her to reach a decision on the specific issues raised. – *cfw*

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DDC proposes three-weekly bin rota plus charge for brown bins

Daventry District Council may only empty black bins every three weeks from mid-2018 onwards, and charge extra for emptying brown garden waste bins. The proposal, outlined in a public consultation earlier this year, would see the blue and red open recycling bins replaced by a single closed bin, the same size as existing black and brown bins, which would be emptied every two weeks. Food waste would continue to be collected weekly, and the council is considering introducing a new weekly collection for used disposable nappies.

Jo Gilford, DDC's Portfolio Holder for Environment, said: "Maintaining the status quo is not a sensible option, as the cost of the service would more than double, and be too expensive to run. So we have to look at a future option that is affordable and will deliver a good quality service for our residents." DDC pays £750,000 a year for the current service, but once that contract comes to an end in June 2018, the cost is likely to rise to £2 million. The alternate proposal would cost 'only' £1.25 million.

Replacing the recycling boxes with a single larger bin is likely to be a popular measure, DDC says – the recycling boxes can be messy and are widely unpopular. Residents would also be able to recycle large cardboard boxes in the bins, without cutting them up first.

Charging separately for garden waste collections – at a cost of £35 a year – may prove less popular, especially in rural areas. DDC argues that not everybody needs or wants brown bin collections and it is unfair to charge for a service only some people want. Charging

for the service could encourage more home composting, and small quantities of garden waste can be put in the black bin instead. More to the point, DDC admits it needs to charge extra for garden waste recycling to make the numbers add up, and the law does not allow it to charge for less bulky, specialist collections such as nappies or food waste.

DDC says that while some people will be concerned that emptying black bins only every three weeks will make them smell bad, most of the sources of odours should be dealt with by collecting food waste and nappies separately.

Councillors are currently considering feedback received earlier this year and will announce its final decision over the summer. – cfw

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Fraser-Allen steps into Barratt's shoes on District Council

Local elections were held throughout the country on 5th May 2016. Brixworth also had an opportunity to elect a new Councillor (one third of Daventry District's Councillors are elected every three years).

Fabienne Fraser-Allen was elected to replace Ian Barratt who retired this year. She joins fellow Conservatives Kevin Parker and Nick Bunting as the representatives for our Ward.

Fabienne lives in Draughton with her husband and three sons aged 8, 7 and 4. They moved to Northamptonshire four years ago, but Fabienne already knew the area well as her husband's family hails from near Crick.

Having studied law, Fabienne has worked in the recruitment and food industries. Since living in Draughton, Fabienne has become very active in village life, believing strongly in the importance of being involved in the local community.

She also wants to see more visible community policing to tackle such issues as the surge in fly tipping. Making the area safe and secure financially is important to her and she plans to work alongside the new Police and Crime Commissioner, Stephen Mold, also elected on 5th May, to promote greater cyber-safety for local children.

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School celebrates Ofsted success

Ofsted reaffirmed Brixworth CEVC Primary School's status as a 'Good' school following a recent inspection by Ofsted – its first since September 2011.

The report, based on an inspection on 22 March, noted significant success and improvements since the last inspection. For example, the outcome of Phonics Screening at KS1 places the Brixworth CEVC Primary above outstanding schools; the school has recently received a Pupil Premium Award for the progress disadvantaged and vulnerable children make; and the school's sports teams have enjoyed success as Indoor Athletics County champions in the intervening period.

The school also recently defended its title as holders of the Daventry Schools Cross Country Shield against 19 other schools from the area with an impressive 189 point-margin. The competition involved 47 children from Year 3 to Year 6.

While there were some areas for improvement, these had already been identified by the school ahead of the inspection.

The letter refers to the school's shared 'aspirational values' and governors, staff and parents are determined to offer the highest levels of provision and opportunity to pupils.

The report notes: "Pupils are very enthusiastic when they talk about the school. They have a strong sense of fairness, and are very kind and mindful of the importance of looking after others."

"It was striking how often pupils in all year groups told me how they would 'keep on trying' if they found something difficult. Perseverance to improve their work has become routine."

Specific findings include:

- Senior leaders, including governors, have an accurate view of the strengths and areas to be improved across the school.
- By the end of key stage 2, more pupils than average make expected progress, with disadvantaged pupils making progress at similar rates to other pupils in the school.
- Teaching assistants receive specialist training so that they are well placed to support the specific and sometimes complex needs of individual pupils, and pass on their expertise to other members of staff.
- Pupils have very positive views about the school. They appreciate how friendly it is and that teachers make learning fun and encourage them with praise.

The next steps for the school are to improve the quality of writing and to close the gap in achievement between disadvantaged pupils and those with special educational needs and others.

Head teacher David Boucher said: "There is a real determination among staff and governors to build on the inspection and to work with energy and commitment to take the school from good to and go all the way to outstanding." - *cfw*

Brixworth primary awarded 'Most Improved' honour

Brixworth Primary School has been lauded as one of the most improved schools in the country in terms of the attainment and progress disadvantaged pupils have made in Brixworth primary since 2011.

This makes Brixworth CEVC Primary School one of only three schools, out of over 300, in Northamptonshire to have received the local award. The school received the award in the Key Stage 2 category of the Pupil Premium Awards 2016. Pupil Premium funding is provided through central government to support the learning and outcomes for vulnerable and disadvantaged pupils in schools nationwide.

The award recognises that staff have provided disadvantaged pupils with a good start in life and prepared them well for secondary school. The award also recognises the role leadership in the school has in sharing the school's achievements, strengths and experience with other schools. – *David Boucher, Head of Brixworth CEVC Primary School*

Country Park Update

Each spring we eagerly await the refreshing sights of buds bursting, leaves unfurling and birds busy gathering materials for their new nests. This year we have watched these changes as they unfold, in some cases the mild weather has brought bulbs to flower earlier and migratory birds move in sooner than expected. The spring also sees some positive new changes to the county council's working model, in the form of our new First for Wellbeing CIC.

What is First for Wellbeing?

First for Wellbeing is a new Community Interest Company (CIC) that was set up by Northamptonshire County Council, the Northamptonshire Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust and the University of Northampton with the aim of dramatically improving the physical, mental and social wellbeing of people in Northamptonshire.

First for Wellbeing will work together with public, private and voluntary sectors to improve and streamline existing services and to create new and innovative ways to help people live the best life they possibly can. The services they will deliver include weight management, stop smoking programmes and financial advice as well as services to support and promote community inclusion.

What is the aim?

Our aim is to support people to improve on all aspects of their wellbeing in order to live a longer, healthier, more well-balanced life.

As part of the old Public Health and Wellbeing directorate, the Countryside Service was one of the teams to be transferred to the First for Wellbeing CIC at the start of April. This is a positive change to



the way council operates. On the ground, you will still see the rangers continue to manage the County Council's parks and deliver excellent service to our visitors. Brixworth Country Park remains an asset of the council and will remain as such, open to the public to provide access to the countryside for all.

Veolia Environmental Trust – Grant Bid

Last November we applied to the Veolia Environmental Trust for a grant of £36,000. We hoped to use the grant to rejuvenate our Sensory Garden within the park. In March we learnt that our bid was not successful on this occasion.

With the funding we had hoped to completely rebuild the sleeper beds, which are slowly deteriorating; resurface the footpath throughout the area to maintain a space which is accessible for all; introduce new planting as well as new sensory play pieces and a colourful canopy structure. In short, our proposal would have given the area nearby to the café a much-needed facelift.

As it is not to be (at least not for now), we return to the drawing board to look at alternative ways to finance this project. I would like to thank any of you who offered your support. It is vital to any funding bid we make and we will keep you informed on any developments with this project.

Volunteering

With a small team of three to manage Brixworth Country Park and the Brampton Valley Way, we can feel a little short-handed at times. However, this year we have been lucky to see our volunteer numbers increase. Students from Moulton College continue to support our work, and this year we have been able to provide a volunteering opportunity for students from Northampton College. We have worked on removing redundant tree guards, hedge-laying, woodland and pond management, hay raking and deep clean litter picking.

We have also worked on weeding the sensory garden beds and keeping the area tidy, however this is a job that requires more regular attention. If you or someone you know might be interested in becoming a Sensory Garden Volunteer, please get in touch. We are looking for volunteers who have a particular passion for horticulture,

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permaculture and allotment holding as we would like to develop our "food for free" areas within the garden and in the wider park.

All volunteers will be asked to complete an application form, attend an informal interview with the Senior Ranger to assess suitability. For more information and to request an application form, either pop into the Ranger's Office at the park, or give us a call on 0300 126 5932.

We do also run a monthly volunteer day on the third Saturday of each month; the duty ranger will work with you on a wide range of practical management tasks.

Holiday Activities

I would like to thank everyone that came along and took part in our school holiday activities. We ran two activities each week throughout the holidays; with Xplorer Orienteering on the Wednesday and a pond dipping event on the Thursday. Both were very well attended, and enjoyed by all who took part. We advertised the events on the council's event page, our Facebook page, and in a number of local publications. While they are great fun for all who take part, it is particularly encouraging for us as the money we raise is used directly for park resources such as more supplies and equipment for activities, tools and materials for projects and other general maintenance items. So a big thank you to all who came along, your support is paramount, and we hope you enjoyed taking part.

If you are looking for something to do to keep the children occupied throughout the half term holidays, we will be running two activities:

Xplorer Orienteering

Wednesday 1st June, 11am – 3pm

Why not put your skills to the test and find all of the orienteering markers out in the park? With two challenges to pick from you can make the most of a day out in the park by putting your teamwork, observation and map reading skills to the test! Challenge 1 is a 15 marker trail with colourful images to find and identify; Challenge 2 is a 10 marker trail with quiz questions to answer. All trails are suitable for all of the family, and will predominantly follow the hard standing paths around the park. We suggest a donation of £1 per child to cover the cost of materials. Booking in advance is not necessary for this activity.

Mini-beast Safari

Thursday 2nd June

Throughout the day, rangers will be on hand to help mini-explorers find and identify as many insects, arachnids and invertebrates as possible. Meeting by the old bird hide, we will search high and low, using magnifying glasses to help us see the mini beasts better and sweep nets to capture flying insects. We will run three hour-long sessions from 11am, 12:30 and 2pm with a maximum of 20 children per session. A charge of £2 per child is applicable for this event; all proceeds will be reinvested in educational/activity supplies.

Booking in advance is advised for the Mini-beast Safari as all spaces will be sold on a first come, first served basis. To book in advance please call the park on 0300 126 5932.

Summer Holidays

As the summer holidays are often the busiest times for rangers it can be difficult for us to deliver children's activities. 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
Country Eye

Freaks and Monstrosities

'Eat your greens' has been heard across many a dining table over the years as mothers have urged their children to clear their plates. Cabbage and Brussels sprouts, kale and calabrese, cauliflower and kohlrabi, and many others collectively become greens when they come from pan to plate. But what do they all have in common? The answer is that all come from one wild ancestor, a plant that still grows along some of our coasts.

Beginning in the Mediterranean region aeons ago, clever gardeners among our ancestors have selected and bred from the wild stock to develop all of these and many other varieties across temperate parts of the world. Even the wild plant was used medicinally, and doubtless still is by many savvy folk. The trick that these early growers taught themselves was to keep a sharp eye out for variations, and by selecting seeds from them, over time they produced all these valuable vegetables from the one source.

Of course all this could never have happened if plants did not tend to vary naturally. Over my lifetime as a humble and hesitant naturalist/gardener I have come across quite a number of them. It was while working as a warden at Pitsford Reservoir that I found a monstrous version of the marsh thistle, commonest thistle not only of marshland, but also of damp woodland. Normally the marsh thistle is tall and slender, spiny-leaved of course, and crowned with a dozen or so smallish purple flowers. But one plant I came across would not be out of place in John Wyndham's nightmarish sci-fi 'The Day of the Triffids.' About 4ft tall the stem was narrow but nearly a foot



wide, and crowning it were over 150 densely packed flowers. Most likely the cause of this was mechanical damage to the seedling plant, perhaps by being trampled on or being nibbled. Plants with hollow stems quite often develop in this way, dandelions being regularly reported. Experts, ever ready with an obscure name it seems to me, have called this fasciation.

Purple toadflax often turns up as a weed along footpaths and on old walls in our towns and villages. A relative of the snapdragon it was introduced over a century ago as a garden flower. Its flowers are tightly two-lipped so nectar-seeking insects have to push them apart to gain access. Normally purple, as the name indicates, a pretty pink version occurs occasionally. One of this shade that grew in my garden had two flower spikes instead of the usual single one, while a third division was noticeable towards the tip of one of them. The original seed had come from a local factory car park.

For many years in my own garden I have grown and enjoyed the bloussily beautiful luxury of foxgloves. The seed originally came from Harlestone Firs, and by selecting seed from the best flowers, I have managed to produce three different colour variations apart from the normal: white but with the colour markings present, a pale pink, and almost purple. In addition the stems have sometimes been well over 6ft, double the 'normal' height. On just one occasion I was treated to a peloric flower, one that looked like a pretty single pink rose attached to the tip of a spike of the normal hanging bells. A beautiful freak indeed!

As I write this the greenish-yellow flowers of alexanders are out. Common around our coasts, introduced by the Romans, it is a tall plant related to the wayside hogweed and angelica. Like the dandelion I discover all parts of it can be eaten. Flower buds and young stems can be cooked; I have made an indifferent wine from the leaves; while the brownish-black roots can be peeled and cooked – they taste very like a strongly-flavoured parsnip. As if that wasn't enough, the large black seeds can be ground up and used like pepper. It was after I had tried this that I discovered that the name Macedonian pepper had been given to it. If there is any reader brave enough to try this for themselves, I will be happily give them a sample of the pepper and a few seeds to grow the plant for themselves. – Brian Webster

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NLR steams ahead for Station Road service

Yes, you read that correctly! If the Northampton and Lamport Railway succeeds in raising sufficient resources, we may hear again the hoot of a steam train chugging along to a station at the bottom of Station Road.

The railway line between Northampton and Market Harborough, laid down in 1859 by George R Stephenson (the grandson of George Stephenson who built the first railway line for steam locomotives) was torn up in 1984. It had initially carried two trains in each direction every day, mainly transporting coal and locally quarried ironstone, and eventually became double track. However, by the 1980s, local rail traffic had declined and the final timetabled service ran in 1973.

In 1981, a few railway enthusiasts started to explore how the line could be preserved. Since then, the Northampton and Lamport Railway Preservation Society has grown to 276 members. A core group of about thirty are actively involved in keeping the railway line running.

Chairman Simon Jenkins says: "As British Rail completely removed the old track, we have had to lay new line and bring in rolling stock. As well as the steam engine, we have several diesel shunters. We lease the trackbed from the County Council for a peppercorn rent."

The current line runs for about a mile and a quarter from Brampton station, which is tucked away between Sedgebrook Hall and the Brampton Halt pub (once the coal merchant's house). It offers a short, pleasant excursion for half an hour back and forth through the fields linking Brampton to Pitsford, and the interest of seeing a steam train and original signal box in action.

One of about 350 heritage railways in the UK, the Society holds a series of themed events throughout the year. Jenkins says: "Our Teddy Bear weekend was particularly successful. We'd like our own 'Brampton Bear' to become a well-known local brand." Further events this year include celebrating the Queen's birthday in June with a platform party, a night-time Halloween train, and Santa Specials. The experience of a train ride can be supplemented by a visit to a café, gift shop, a second hand book shop, and a bric a brac store. Plans are in place to re-open a museum of railway artifacts next year.

While the Society has benefited from bequests and a significant donation of old track from Transport for London, it is always stretched for volunteers. Running a railway is labour-intensive and needs dozens of people on visitor days. Society secretary Brian Chambers emphasises that

any and all skills are useful: "We need people not only for engineering work but also for restoring old carriages, cooking, accounting, shop-keeping, managing the website and marketing." For those seriously interested in fulfilling a childhood dream of being a train driver or working signals, access to training courses and qualifications are available.



The next steps are completing the extension of the line to Boughton, repairing a bridge, and raising £50,000 to build a brick station at Brampton. After a new contract with the County Council is signed this month, track can be laid to Merry Tom, and eventually on to Brixworth. This will result in a line 3 – 4 miles long with three stations. However, at an estimated cost of a least half a million pounds, Brixworth may have to wait a few years to hear that familiar hoot!

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Chris Heaton-Harris MP's WESTMINSTER REPORT

My Private Member's Bill – Royal Assent!

This April, at the end of a long parliamentary journey, my Access to Medical Treatments (Innovation) Bill received Royal Assent.

I brought in the Bill, which is now an Act of Parliament, back in June 2015. The Act evolved considerably as it passed through the Commons. After ten months of extensive cross-party working, and key measures on off-label prescribing were added, the Bill passed into law with support from MPs of all parties.

The Act has the potential to make a real difference to patients by encouraging and expediting the spread of innovative, evidence based treatments, and warning against those which have proven to be risky or ineffectual. Furthermore, by facilitating better information sharing it is hoped that it will support and encourage medical research in new areas.

In an age of ever-evolving medical treatment, this Act will make sure the amazing work that goes on in our NHS every day is not isolated to one hospital, surgery or practice, but is easily seen and accessed by every registered medical practitioner searching for the best treatment. The appetite for encouraging medical innovation and supporting off-label use has been made very clear throughout the passage of this Act and I am delighted these measures have finally made it into law.

The Act empowers the Secretary of State to create a database of innovative medical treatments, including new uses of existing drugs, off-label. Its central aim is to ensure the effective collection and dissemination of information about innovative treatments carried out by registered medical practitioners.

This has two strands. Firstly, with regards to new, emerging treatments, the Act seeks to make sure that data is shared across research centres and that both the successes and failures of new treatments are readily available to clinicians up and down the country.

Secondly, its other key aim is to raise awareness of the off-label use of existing drugs which have been proven to be effective for other conditions. This includes drugs for breast cancer, Parkinson's, multiple sclerosis and prostate cancer and the list is likely to grow rapidly as more new uses are found for old drugs. These 'repurposed' drugs, which are often very cheap, are regularly prescribed in specialist centres but are not consistently used across the country.

A few weeks ago, US President Obama said in his State of the Union address to Congress that it was time to attempt a "moonshot" in cancer. He affirmed that information and data sharing would be at the crux of this final battle against the disease. The following day, the President visited a school in Louisiana. He told the children there that cancer would be cured, not his lifetime, but in theirs.

This Act has the potential to be a small foot up for our own research, and to let us tell our own school children that it was British scientists who achieved this momentous moment in history.

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Why you can't beat face-to-face

At Horts we pride ourselves on the way we work. We are experienced estate agents who believe in a personal one on one service with our clients. So when I read the past Ombudsman's thoughts on the matter I thought it worth bringing to your attention. Here's what he said.

"A current major debate in the property world is whether online agents (that is those that only provide a service through electronic channels) will have an impact in the marketplace. Looked at objectively, such a new service provision is simply another way for consumers to buy and sell properties.

However, any new concept in the market place should improve or develop what is there so that service to the consumer is enhanced, and the debate is mostly about whether online agents can improve the process of selling property or whether they bring some reduction in service to consumers.

It seems odd to me, given my experience of consumer dissatisfaction over the past nine years, to introduce to the process of selling people's most valuable asset (with the associated emotion and difficulties that can arise) something which does not give the consumer an advantage over what is already there – and in many ways could bring about disadvantage.

I recently purchased some goods online, paying by credit card. When the items arrived they were damaged and I had been sent an invoice for the purchase price to be paid within 14 days. Naturally enough I wanted to complain but was unable to get any sense from or indeed any certain method of contacting the online provider.

The frustration of such poor after-sales service was enormous – and I was only spending around £50!

I cannot help thinking that someone who is selling their house, incurring fees in the thousands and trying to coordinate a move to another property, would be experiencing levels of frustration far beyond mine in a situation where the service provider was a remote function.

Where service provision fails, the consumer wants to speak to someone face to face: after-sales service is key if there is a shortcoming.

But there is a greater danger if the service fails pre-sale and there is no way of easily speaking to a real person. Under 'traditional' estate agency arrangements, if a buyer or seller is unhappy or has a question or concern pre- or post-sale they can simply go to the branch office and express their concerns.

Some people might be culturally aligned with online service – but when selling a house? It has got to be better for the consumer if there is a real and readily available agent.

A particular message has to be that transparency and full disclosure must always apply. There has to be a level playing field for both agents and consumers so those key principles of transparency (charges,

liabilities and commitments) and disclosure (any material aspects of the contract that might be unusual) are all important.

In my experience from complaints I saw in my time as Ombudsman, consumers do not always understand the agreement that is put in front of them and the liabilities they are taking on. The ability to question and perhaps negotiate is afforded if the agent is sitting in front of you, not so easy if the agreement simply arrives in your inbox.

The Consumer Protection from Unfair Trading Regulations require that agents fully equip consumers to make informed decisions. That principle can be better achieved if the consumer is able to challenge what is presented and if conversations are possible face to face.

Consumers need to understand that service levels may differ from agent to agent, but will particularly between the professional in the high street and the remote internet offer."

History Society records its silver

Hundreds of people flocked to the Village Hall on Saturday 16th April to have a look at an exhibition arranged by Brixworth History Society.

The Society celebrated 25 years last year with a free exhibition to show everyone what had been accomplished since 1990.



Maps and items of interest from the society's archives showed the development of the village through the years especially artefacts and coins from the Roman Villa excavations in the 1960s and 70s, newspaper articles about Brixworth and details of the Lords of the Manor. Photographs depicted the lives of the ironstone workers in the 19th and 20th centuries. There were photographs of May Day from 1914 until 1983 when the first and last May Queens were crowned, village celebrations, school life throughout the 20th century and of the ten public houses.

More recent research on World War I and villagers' memories of life in the Brixworth during the 20th century were included.

Other areas included the railways and employment, sports, farming, the workhouse, the Pytchley Hunt, and results of the society's analysis of the census details from 1841 until 1911; all of which have made Brixworth what it is today.

Refreshments and items to purchase from publications were also available.

The History Society would like to emphasise that the archives could only have been put together by the Society because villagers and ex-villagers, both in England and abroad, have kindly given us or lent us their own photographs to copy. Without their help there would be no archive of Brixworth for future generations. Therefore very many thanks to all who helped to make the exhibition so successful.

It was noted during the exhibition that the Society had no pictures of school or playschool since the 1980s; photographs from Lesson Road, Broad Street and Eastfield Road were also lacking as were new developments in the village. We feel it is important for village life to be recorded.

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Ultrafast broadband to arrive by the autumn

There has been relief for residents of Maidwell, Draughton, Lamport and Hanging Houghton after ultrafast broadband Gigaclear announced they had had sufficient signups to roll out their service to the area.

The company is currently finalising plans and network routing, with installation work to begin imminently. Work is expected to commence in June and be complete by the end of October.

The news was all the more welcome after it became clear that British Telecom were not looking to bring faster broadband to the area, even if the villages weren't covered by an alternative supplier. BT's rural broadband rollout depends on financial support received from the county councils. Northampton County Council says it only allocates such funding to villages where no third party provider has indicated an interest – irrespective whether that service ultimately goes ahead. - cfw


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Parish Council Elections and Call to Arms!

This year the Parish Council was to be elected on the 5th May along with the election of the Police and Crime Commissioner and Councillors for Brixworth Ward and Daventry District Council. Brixworth Parish Council consists of 14 members from which a chairperson is elected.

However, this year only 7 of the present council decided to stand for election and as there was only one application from the residents of Brixworth the election was uncontested and the 8 members were automatically elected.

The parish Council needs a quorum of members (5) in order to be able to vote on issues raised at meetings which are held monthly, therefore we are looking to recruit more residents to the council.

Despite the application date for election has now passed, after the 5th of May interested parties can apply to be co-opted on to the council and will have as full voting rights as the elected members.

The Parish Council has completed a number of projects over the past 12 months and looks forward to doing many more in the future so if you would like to support your local community we would welcome your applications. All new members are allocated a mentor to support them in the first few months and training is also available.

The eligibility criteria is that candidates must be at least 18 years old, a British citizen or an eligible Commonwealth citizen or a citizen of any other member state of the European Union, and meet at least one of the following four qualifications:

1. You are, and will continue to be, registered as a local government elector for the parish/community in which you wish to stand from the day of your nomination onwards
2. You have occupied as owner or tenant any land or other premises in the parish/community area during the whole of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election
3. Your main or only place of work during the 12 months prior to the day of your nomination and the day of election has been in the parish/community area
4. You have lived in the parish/community area or within three miles of it during the whole of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election.

The elected members of the new PC are: Ian Barratt, Jackie Bird, Neal Brown, Alex Coles, Stephen James, Sandra Moxon, Kevin Parker and Peter Saxton. We would like to add your name to this list.

Planning matters

This report on Planning Matters is the last of the current Parish Council's Term of Office as, following the uncontested election, a new committee will be formed.

With reference to the last report on the large Arts and Crafts style residential property off Merry Tom Lane, this application was defeated by nine votes to three, by Daventry District Council Planning Committee. Whether this is the last of the matter, the coming weeks and months will see, as the applicant does have a right to appeal.

As you will probably have noticed from the works currently proceeding, the application by Mercedes AMG High Performance Powertrains received approval, and the provision of the permanent facilities is now well under way.

During February an application was made by Telefónica to improve O2's 4G coverage in the area by installing a new

15m mobile mast on the corner opposite Mercedes, in front of Mawsley Machinery. Your Parish Council did not object to the application.

Negotiations are continuing between Barratt Homes and Northamptonshire Highways in respect of the extent of footpaths and a right hand turn into the proposed surgery.

ACE Recycling have recently taken over the old Daisy Roots premises; does this mean the owner of 132 Northampton Road is going to convert his premises into the hot food takeaway for which planning permission has been granted?

As with previous reports there still remain several applications outstanding with Daventry although at this time a majority of these are domestic extensions and have not been opposed by your Council.

Parish Council Achievements

These are some of our achievements over the past 12 months.

Pet shop: In 2015 a planning application was received relating to the retail premises at 130 Northampton Road, Brixworth, currently used as a pet shop. The application, which was for a change of user of the premises from its current use to that of a hot food takeaway, was objected to vigorously by the Parish Council and this objection was later sustained by the Planning Committee of Daventry District Council.

Dog fouling: This initiative of education and enforcement activity specifically targeting irresponsible dog ownership was a great success whereby volunteers were provided with cans of brightly-coloured biodegradable paint to spray on dog mess, in order to shame irresponsible dog owners into clearing up their dogs mess.

Speed watch: Each year Brixworth Parish Council supports Brixworth Community Speedwatch in their efforts to tackle the Fatal Four. This operation targets those motorists committing the four most common offences that can contribute to serious injury or road deaths on our roads. They are speeding, mobile phone usage, not wearing a seatbelt and drink driving. We would like to thank Howard Reader for his tireless dedication in co-ordinating Brixworth Community Speedwatch.

Station Cottages traffic calming: Whilst there continued to be a drop in cars caught speeding from the first Speedwatch campaign, it became evident that Station Road had the biggest problem, with 48% of speeding offences. Therefore, to combat speeding in excess of 70mph, it was decided that extra measures were needed. New village sign plates reading "Station Cottages" were erected as well as "30" carriageway road marking roundels being painted, to remind drivers that they are entering a community where 12 families and their children live. These signs were made possible by joint funding from Brixworth Parish Council, Northamptonshire County Council Highways and from County Councillor Cecile Irving-Swift's Empowerment Fund.

Silver Street traffic calming: The residents of Silver Street and Brixworth Parish Council got together to discuss how inappropriate speeds on Silver Street could be tackled as well as reducing the number of drivers using Silver Street as a rat-run. It was decided that introducing a narrowing feature, i.e. chicanes with bollards, would best serve the community. The cost of this scheme was met by partnership of Northamptonshire Highways and the Parish Council and was a great success.

Grass verges: In 2015 the decision was taken to bring the mowing of grass verges back in-house and under the control of the Parish Council. This led to them being mowed 16 times in 2015 compared to just 3 times in 2014.

Grants awarded: Brixworth Parish Council have recently reintroduced the Grants Fund which is available to local organisations that benefit local residents. One such organisation to have received a grant is the Brixworth Community First Responders, an organisation of volunteers who are trained in basic life-saving interventions to attend emergency calls received by the ambulance service and provide care until the ambulance arrives.



Bulb planting: In October last year the Parish Council invested in more daffodil bulbs which Parish Councillors and members of the public planted around the village.



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U18 Pumas victorious



Brixworth's Under 18s football team, the Pumas, have achieved their ambition of lifting the county-wide Pinner Cup trophy – the same one that a year ago only just eluded them.

This year, the Pumas were more determined than ever to leave the pitch at Sixfields Stadium with both hands on the winner's trophy.

From the first whistle, the Pumas looked defensively solid with the back four being well-shielded by two defensive midfielders. Wooldale Blues struggled to keep possession whenever they ventured into the Pumas' half and whenever the game broke down the Pumas launched a lightning counter attack through their lone striker and fast supporting wingers.

As the game progressed, Wooldale found themselves pushed back into their own half and a succession of corners piled some serious pressure on their goal. The Blues' goalkeeper didn't look at all comfortable with corners being floated towards the back post and the Pumas knew it. A lovely floated cross caused chaos and a fine header saw the ball nestle in the far corner of the Wooldale Blues net. The stadium erupted as the Pumas travelling fans cheered them on.

A couple of the Wooldale Blues players were obviously unsettled by this and their tackles and general demeanour deteriorated badly with the referee having to step in a few times to calm things down. The Pumas central midfield duo certainly helped to wind them up with some excellent play that made it almost impossible for them to get the ball.

By half time it was clear that the Pumas were really the only team likely to win but 1-0 is never a secure scoreline in football. The second half followed much the same pattern of play with Wooldale trying to pressure the Brixworth goal but Wooldale's link up play in the final third was poor and Brixworth took every opportunity to counter attack quickly.

As the game drew on you could see there were many tired legs and minds on the pitch. The game was becoming a succession of tackles and poor passes when from out of nowhere Wooldale struck a shot that the Brixworth keeper only just managed to deal with. This seemed to focus the minds of the Brixworth Pumas and they redoubled their efforts.

Some great vision saw a superb long pass from the left midfield across to the right wing were the attacker rounded the keeper but was forced wide by a defender. The Pumas attacker showed great clarity of mind as he controlled the ball, waited and then slipped an inch perfect pass for his team mate as he ran in at the back post. The net rippled and the Pumas fans roared. The score was 2-0 with less than five minutes to go. The Pumas goal scorer was clearly emotional as the magnitude of what he had just done overwhelmed him.

The referee's final whistle blew and the contrast between the two teams' body language showed just how much this trophy meant to the Pumas. This was the last ever cup game for the team and their manager, Adam Hayock, and I am sure it made it all the sweeter to go out on such a high point.
