

Judge awards Pointer £23k in damages – cost bill still not in

Brixworth Parish Council has been ordered by the Employment Tribunal to pay former Councillor Stephen Pointer almost £23,000 in damages in a long-running legal dispute over discrimination. The award consists of £15,000 for injury to feeling, £3,000 exemplary damages and £4,723 interest, bringing the total to £22,723.

The payment has already been made, though Pointer says that the PC deducted over £10,000 which Pointer owed the Parish Council from a previous case brought in the County Court. The PC is funding the payments from its Reserves.

The dispute first emerged in 2013 and revolves around whether and how the PC

was obliged to provide Pointer with 'reasonable adjustment' for his visual impairment – specifically, Pointer had asked for an electronic device to help him read Council paperwork, and an iPad was deemed to be the most cost-effective solution.

The case is still ongoing: at *Bulletin* press time, both parties were awaiting a decision on who pays the costs, which amount to many tens of thousands.

Judge Michael Ord criticised on the length and difficulty of the tribunal: "The aim of an employment tribunal is for all parties to cooperate and to help resolve cases quickly and avoid wasting costs. This case on the other hand has been conducted disproportionately all the way. Every step has been trench warfare, it's the legal equivalent of the Somme." The hearings to settle the costs of the case took place in June 2017 but a final ruling is not expected to be made public until the autumn.

More than just a pet shop, Katie has offered puppy parties, nail clipping services, boarding for small animals and birds, as well as educational visits for groups of young children. Katie has also regularly taken in distressed strays and lost animals that have been found by local residents.

"It's with a truly heavy heart that I have to close my little shop," says Katie. "I shall really miss being part of this friendly community, but as much as I wish I could stay, there's nothing I can do!" Katie's passion for the village is the reason why she has been so keen to stay as close as she can, and Katie hopes to retain as much of her current customer base as possible.

Despite the competition from the larger stores, Katie has

succeeded in growing her business year on year. "I think I was lucky to open the shop on the back of the previous owners", Katie says modestly, referring to the previous owners, and Katie's good friends, Audrey and Roger Miller, who started the shop, and Shane Davison, who followed them.



Katie says her experience of running her own business in Brixworth has been fantastic. "Since day one, the support I've had from the locals has been amazing. But the support I've had over the past couple of months has been nothing short of overwhelming!!" says a visibly emotional Katie.

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Saxon Rise continues to top Speedwatch Concerns



The new Barratts housing development of Saxon Rise continues to be Brixworth's speeding hotspot for the second year running.

Two thirds of the cars found to be speeding during the 2017 annual Speedwatch campaign were caught at Saxon Rise. In total, this year's campaign, which took place in June and July, clocked 342 cars exceeding the 30mph limit, 214 of which at Saxon Rise on Northampton Road. A further 77 were over the speed limit a little further down the same road, at Saxon Heights. The other six sites part of the campaign, on Spratton Road, Holcot Road, Station Cottages and Harborough Road between them only had 51 speeding vehicles.

The number of speeding vehicles caught is sharply higher than in 2016, when a total of 233 cars were caught, 134 of which at Saxon Rise and 54 on Saxon Heights. This is an overall increase of 47%.

"The two sites on Northampton Road are a major concern; something really must be done to address the speeds at which people drive in that part of the village," says Howard Reader, the coordinator of the Speedwatch campaign.

Speedwatch relies entirely on volunteers who dedicate a few hours on a morning or evening in the summer to running the campaign; if there aren't sufficient volunteers the campaign cannot run. If you would like to help out in the 2018 Speedwatch, please contact Howard Reader on 882238. - *cfw*

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District Council consults on Conservation Area Extension

Daventry District Council is consulting on proposed changes to Brixworth's conservation area.


DDC would like to extend the boundaries of the area to include the whole of Brixworth Hall Park (the existing area only includes half the park) and the Swedish Cottages on Froghall.

"This would give added protection to the former Hall's kitchen garden, the Gardener's Cottage in the north-east corner of the park, and several sections of the wall that were not previously protected," explains Rhian Morgan, Heritage Policy Officer at DDC. "It will also protect the general shape of the area, landscape and trees, and help preserve the remains of the hall for future archaeology."

The four Swedish Houses meanwhile were part of a gift of the King of Sweden during the 1940s to alleviate the housing crisis at the time. Morgan says: "There are quite a few of them in Northamptonshire and we feel they ought to be protected; they are a very specific piece of modern history."

Buildings and trees inside the conservation areas are subject to stricter planning controls, designed to protect local heritage. These controls can prevent the demolition of buildings and walls, restrict the construction of extensions, dormer windows and other roof alterations, and may affect the installation of satellite dishes and certain types of cladding. Owners also need to seek permission for any work to trees inside a conservation area.

On top of the boundary changes, DDC wants to establish a Local List which gives further protection to specific historic buildings, on top of any Listed status they might already enjoy. Proposed are 33 buildings inside the conservation area, on Church Street, Harborough Road, Holcot Road, Kennel Terrace, Newlands,

Northampton Road, Saneco Lane, Spratton Road, Station Road and Froghall.

Queen's Award for DACT

Daventry Area Community Transport (DACT) has received a prestigious Queen's Award for Voluntary Service.

The Award, also known as the MBE for Volunteer Groups, recognizes excellence in voluntary activities carried out in the community. Writing to DACT, the assessors for the Queen's Award say: "The work your group does for the community was very much admired by the independent Assessment Committee."

DACT provides door-to-door transport for people to attend medical appointments, for example by driving elderly and infirm patients to doctor's appointments and hospitals.

The organisation is funded by grants and donations. It currently has 112 volunteer car drivers, who use their own cars for the scheme, and 31 volunteer minibuses who use DACT's seven minibuses to take community groups on a variety of trips.

Rob Kinning, chief executive of DACT, told volunteers and staff: "Take a bow everyone, you all deserve this massive thank you from the Queen. This is also testament to all of the previous Volunteers & Staff who have given their time to get DACT to the level that has led to this award." – cfw



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Fresh start for Friends of Brixworth Library

The Friends of Brixworth Library was recently reformed this year after the group had been dormant for a while. The group in the past has been able to fundraise and purchase equipment for use exclusively within the library. Some of the children's area equipment and furniture was purchased by the former Friends Group.

Jill Barber, one of the library managers, was keen to revive the group, and so put out an appeal in the library to see if she could gather some fresh blood in volunteers. She was pleasantly surprised that a band of merry men and women came forward to help, including a few individuals who were part of the original Friends Group.

Brixworth library is a very central service to Brixworth and surrounding villages and is used by the community, young and old. It is more than just a place to read or borrow books. It is used to hold weekly Rhymetime sessions and baby clinics. There are always craft activities set out for local children to pop in and take part in and areas for parents and children to wait and chat whilst their siblings are taking part in Rainbows or ballet. In the summer holidays there is the Reading Agency Summer Reading Challenge to encourage summer reading plus other holiday activity sessions. The existence of a Friends Group is vital in helping the sustainability of the library.

The new group now meets approximately every two months to discuss the group's structure and future fundraising plans. It has two chairpersons, a secretary and a treasurer plus a small group of volunteers. The new group has moved into the modern age with a Facebook page "Friends of Brixworth Library" to publicise their events and connect with the local community.

So far the group has managed to organise a quiz night which was very well attended. We also held a book sale recently, selling donated books. More quizzes are to be planned at regular intervals throughout

2017/2018. We also have a Vintage and Craft Fayre planned for the Saturday 4th November, with vintage and crafts stalls, plus traditional tea and cakes.

The Friends Group has also purchased a coffee machine. This is available to all users of the library at just £1.20 per cup of coffee. They have provided safety cups for parents wishing to have a cuppa in the children's area, and mugs for everyone else. We are considering offering a takeaway service in the future.

The Friends Group are always looking for new volunteers to join their group. They are a really friendly bunch and are keen to brainstorm new and exciting ideas for the library.

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
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Draughton's Classic Cars & Village Fair

Kelmarsh Hall wins £15k Council grant

The Kelmarsh Trust is delighted to have been awarded a grant of £15,000 from Daventry District Council to support the Heritage Lottery Funded Tunnelling Through the Past project.



The grant has been awarded through Daventry District Council's Capital Grants scheme which is available for organisations needing assistance with capital investment. Work is now well under way at Kelmarsh Hall to open up the 'below stairs' servants' quarters and old laundry to visitors (due to open in late summer 2017).

The grant from Daventry District Council will specifically support the completion of Kelmarsh Hall & Gardens' new Learning Space. Kelmarsh currently runs an award winning school visit programme to the Gardens as well as family trails and craft activities, but these are largely weather dependent and constrained by a lack of dedicated facilities.

The Tunnelling Through the Past project will open up hidden areas of the Hall and provide dedicated learning facilities and an exciting programme of events and activities for families and schools.

Carla Cooper, Manager for Fundraising and Visitor Services said: "This support from Daventry District Council will help to provide much needed improvements to lighting, storage and enable us to install magnetic walls and sinks inside the Learning Space to enhance the way we use it."

The Learning Space will be housed in the former stables and will be a central location for the busy activity programme for families and schools which Kelmarsh is currently developing.

General Manager, Lesley Denton, added: "We want to become one of the few historic houses in the country to offer a real family and education experience. In addition to the exciting technology which will be there for visitors to enjoy in the Hall, the Learning Space will mean we can offer a great day out for families and schools with lots of hands-on activities with a space dedicated for that purpose."

The project at Kelmarsh supports Daventry District Council's vision to 'Develop a Better District.' The families and school programme will enable Kelmarsh to target specific under-represented audiences by offering free or subsidised visits through partnership organisations and schools as well as breaking down barriers and encouraging access and equality through improved disabled access and extending opening times for the Hall (including offering after-hours events).

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Country Eye

No-go in the countryside

'Are the badgers still there?' The question came from my daughter, and referred to the long-standing badger sett just 300 yards from my home. Indeed it is likely that this sett had been home to a badger family much longer than the house I live in, which was built in 1977. Diane knew that I had kept an eye on the comings and goings of my grey haired black-and-white faced neighbours.

It is a sad but far from untypical fact that I am no longer able to wander the short distance along the lane at the end of my garden, for the informal permission to do so has been withdrawn. Similarly the tiny field corner where wild flowers and the priceless bees, beetles, and butterflies they supported, is out of bounds. Yet I can be reasonably certain they are all still there. The badgers still visit the garden of my daughter and son-in-law just a few doors along the street. Only a day or so ago they heard them in the small hours noisily Hoovering up the nuts and seeds scattered around below the bird feeders. Bees and butterflies of several different species are regular visitors to my garden, so I know they continue to exist.

This erosion of our 'right to roam' in the countryside has continued for centuries. Many would say that it started with the rise of the sheep barons, who with their private armies rode into our countryside, evicted all who stood in their way, and built the great stone walls around them that shout KEEP OUT at us. But the pace quickened in succeeding centuries when the hundreds of Enclosure Acts of Parliament led to the parcelling up of huge swathes of our countryside, which have since been for sale only to the highest bidder.



So for many years past real access to open countryside here in the lowlands has been confined to those narrow ribbons that are our footpaths and bridleways.

It would be nice to say that these trackways at least are well trodden, and some of them are. But all too often these days they are neglected and overgrown, in far too many cases impassable. We owe a huge debt to those rambling clubs and associations whose members strive heroically to keep them open. Even those dog walkers who are daily taken walkies by their dogs, in all weathers, are to be praised if they encompass a public footpath.

We have entered an era when fewer of us visit the countryside. I know a child, now a teenager, who had an irrational fear of trees, simply because he had never been close to one. It was a simple pleasure for me to gently lead him to a big lime tree; to get him to run his small hands over its bark; to notice the bright greens of the lichens; to put his arms around the trunk; and finally to put his ear close to it and listen to it as it talked to him. Is it possible that you have never done this? If not I urge you to do so. If you listen hard enough you will find the tree does indeed talk to you, of unfathomable truths.

If our wider countryside continues to be neglected in this way then perhaps we deserve to lose it. I hope that in years to come, when these open spaces are managed more sensitively than they are today, folk will again seek out the trackways, where whitethroats and yellowhammers demand that you listen to their songs, and where the beloved skylark pours out its liquid cascade of notes while just a speck in the blue sky. All these are in danger of being lost to us.

So how do we imbue a sense of these things into the rising generation? Perhaps it begins at home. We need to light the spark that will encourage us to look around us once more. To lift our eyes from our phones and just look at what's going on out there, in the real world. – Brian Webster



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Country Park rangers enjoy a busy summer

It has been a very busy summer for the rangers, full of highs and lows. Summer is the time of year when we can see the results of the conservation work that has been done over the winter, and there have been a variety of wildflowers blooming both in Brixworth Country Park and along the Brampton Valley Way. We were extremely pleased to spot several different species of orchids in various locations, including pyramidal (*pictured, below*), common spotted and bee orchids. Orchids are a protected species, so if you do spot any while out for a walk, please do not to pick them. Remember, take only photos, leave only footprints.



We have spotted a number of interesting birds in the park, including Redstart and Pied Flycatchers, as well as a nesting pair of Spotted Flycatchers with three chicks.

Summer is our busiest time of year, with thousands of people taking advantage of the nice weather to enjoy the park, whether it be for a walk, a picnic or a barbecue. The rangers also led a busy calendar of events throughout the summer holidays, from making s'mores to pond dipping and searching for minibeasts.

Green Flag Award

We are delighted to announce that Pitsford Water has once again been recognised as a quality park by the Green Flag Award Scheme. The international award, run by the environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy, recognises the collaborative efforts of the rangers, staff and volunteers of the three organisations that manage the green spaces surrounding Pitsford Water. Those organisations and spaces are First for Wellbeing (Brixworth Country Park), Anglian Water (Pitsford Reservoir) and the Wildlife Trust BCN (Pitsford Water Nature Reserve). A record-breaking 1,797 UK parks and green spaces received the award this year and we are very proud to be one of them. Keep Britain

Tidy describes the Green Flag Award as 'a sign to the public that the space boasts the highest possible environmental standards, is beautifully maintained and has excellent visitor facilities.' Thank you very much, we certainly try our best!

Rutland Cycles

On 1st June, as well as hosting the Green Flag Award judges and showing off our beautiful park, we also welcomed Rutland Cycles to our family. The acquisition of Pitsford Cycles at Brixworth Country Park brings Rutland Cycles number of stores up to eleven in the region and has already caused some mild confusion to some of our visitors



('Hello, I'm here. I'm standing outside Rutland Cycles.' 'Good grief! You're at the wrong park!') We bid a fond farewell to Pitsford Cycles and its owner Jeff Webb, and wish Jeff

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a very happy retirement. It may be under new management but the cycle shop still offers cycle hire for visitors wanting to explore the seven mile reservoir track on two wheels, so why not hire a bike and see for yourself why we were awarded a Green Flag!

Vandalism & Litter

The rangers and volunteers work very hard to keep the park safe and clean for everyone to enjoy, although unfortunately sometimes it does feel like an uphill struggle.

There has been a noticeable increase in litter and vandalism in recent months, with one incident of arson severely damaging the top of one of our memorial picnic benches. The bench, paid for by a member of the public to honour the memory of his late wife, was only installed in February this year. Thankfully our team of seasoned volunteers, who helped install the bench, was on hand to replace the bench top.

If you witness any suspicious or anti-social behaviour in the park, we would greatly appreciate it if you could report the activity. Speak to the duty ranger onsite, or if it is out of hours email the rangers at brixworth@firstforwellbeing.co.uk. If a crime is in progress then call the police. Under no circumstances should you put yourself in danger by approaching or confronting the miscreants.

We want Brixworth Country Park to remain a green space that everyone can enjoy, and would like to remind our visitors to follow the Countryside Code. The Countryside Code

applies to all areas of England and Wales and gives advice on how everyone can act responsibly to protect the countryside. It focusses on three main principles: respect, protect, and enjoy.

There are no litter bins at Brixworth Country Park, the wider Pitsford Water area or the Brampton Valley Way. There are several reasons for this.

- Much of the litter dropped in the park can be recycled, please take it home and recycle it.
- Barbecue waste can be especially dangerous to wildlife, and other visitors' pets.
- Litter bins attract wasps, vermin and more litter, collecting around the bin rather than in it.
- Bins are not attractive countryside

features, they look unsightly and smell bad.

- Bins need emptying regularly, when more constructive work could be completed.

If you do have a barbecue, or a picnic, in the park we would strongly urge you not to bag up your rubbish and leave it on a bench, or next to a dog bin for us to collect in the morning. This is just as bad as leaving it strewn all over the meadow as wildlife (usually crows, but often foxes as well) will open up the bags in search of food, undoing your efforts to tidy up. Food waste, such as small bones, can be fatal to dogs, and we are sure you would not want to be responsible for causing harm to someone's dog.

Sensory Garden

In the last issue of the Brixworth Bulletin we reported that we had submitted a bid to the Mick George Community Fund for funding to improve the Sensory Garden. We are absolutely delighted to announce that our bid was successful and we have been awarded £28,000 to contribute to the works which will include the addition of sensory play equipment, sand play and sculptures. A further consultation will now take place with the local community to choose the pieces of sensory play equipment. We will be engaging with local schools and community groups. We welcome your input and would like to share your views on the types of play equipment you would like to see installed in the Sensory Garden.

Working with the Community

The rangers work with various individuals and local community groups throughout the year. These range from students completing their Duke of Edinburgh Award, work experience placements, and students with additional learning needs. This year, from Moulton College, we have had two hard-working work experience students helping us out every Wednesday, and a small group of students every Friday during term time as part of their Rural Skills module. Over the course of the year they have all helped with many tasks, from essential maintenance work, to important conservation tasks and the day-to-day upkeep of the park. As well as gaining work experience and practical skills the placements aim to help the students to

improve their confidence and develop social skills that they can carry forward into the world of work. We are very grateful for their hard work over the past few months and hope they have benefitted from their time with us.

The rangers also worked with a group of students from Northampton College. About a dozen students joined us for a series of six days to carry out conservation tasks. Much of their work focussed on improving our new outdoor education area, which is used by our Education Rangers with school groups. The students also worked to tidy up the den building area in Baldmoney's Wood. Torrential rain caused their final session to be cancelled, so the rangers went to Northampton College for a morning to run a special event where the students cooked S'mores and made nettle tea.

Corporate Volunteers

Managing a country park, and a rail trail, involves a lot of work and the rangers cannot do it alone. As well as the invaluable support we receive from our regular volunteers we also welcome corporate volunteer groups who want to contribute to the park. So far this year we have had groups in from Barclays, IHS Markit and Coca Cola. In May, a team of 22 people from Barclays gave the Sensory Garden some much needed TLC, cutting back vegetation, weeding the raised beds, repainting the leaf seats and benches and transforming the old water feature into a lavender bed. June saw five enthusiastic people from IHS Markit braving some inclement weather to move 16 bulk bags of play bark into the play area, as well as shifting over two tonnes of sand into the sand pits in the main play area and the toddlers' play area. Also in June, a team of seven from Coca Cola spent an afternoon in one of our pine plantations raising the canopy to make the area more suitable for our Education Rangers and their school groups. We thank them all for their fantastic efforts and look forward to welcoming more corporate groups in the autumn.

Brampton Valley Way update

The Brampton Valley Way has been blooming lovely this summer. The rangers have spotted an array of wildflowers on their patrols, including a small patch of bee orchids. It has also been a good summer for butterflies, with a variety spotted along the rail trail throughout the summer months. Brimstones, Red Admirals, Meadow Browns,

Gatekeepers, blues, whites and skippers have all been seen on the wing, as well as a good selection of dragonflies and damselflies.

The rangers and volunteers have had their hands full trying to keep on top of the mowing, strimming and cutting back of over-hanging vegetation. Added to this has been the long, dry spells followed by heavy rain which has brought down small trees over the track and caused many branches to droop and create obstructions. We are, as always, very grateful to the vigilant members of the public who report any obstructions to the path, and we do our best to get it cleared as soon as possible.

Martin Moore Wood

Many of you will have heard about Chalara, or ash dieback, which has made the headlines over the past five years. Some parts of the country have been severely hit by this fungal disease (*Hymenoscyphus fraxineus*) which causes leaf loss, bark lesions and crown dieback in affected ash trees. Northamptonshire had been lucky so far, but alas the disease has recently been found in Martin Moore Wood on the Brampton Valley Way.

There is currently no cure for Chalara, and it is usually fatal to the infected tree. It is not harmful to people or animals. The disease is spread by spores from fruiting bodies of the fungus found on fallen ash leaves. Once airborne, these spores can carry the disease over several miles. There are, however, things you can do to help minimise the spread of the disease. The most obvious one is to avoid



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affected areas. Regular users of Martin Moore Wood will have noticed that we have not been mowing the rides this summer. This is in part to deter visitors, but also to avoid disturbing affected leaf piles and reducing the likelihood of spores becoming airborne. Please see the inset box for how the Forestry Commission's advice on how you can help.

Events

The Country Park has hosted various external events, many raising funds for charities. In June, Walk for a Cause returned for the 4th year to raise money for local causes and community groups and the first CoppaFeel was held in aid of breast cancer. In July, Jog for James raised £2300 for Always a Chance, a charity who supports families who have lost a relative to violent crime.

By far the busiest event was Go Beyond's Pitsford Triathlon. Held on Sunday 16th July, 200 triathletes swam, cycled and ran their way to victory in aid of Teach Africa. This event has increased in popularity year after year, and we would like to thank regular park users for their patience and understanding on the day when the car park was full.

At the time of writing, the rangers were preparing to lead a number of events throughout the summer holidays, designed to be fun but educational, teaching children, and their parents, about the wildlife in the park and how to enjoy the park safely and responsibly. The ranger-led walks that took place in the early part of the summer were a success, and we hope to repeat these next year, as well as other seasonal ranger-led

walks throughout the year.



MP, ROYAL HOSTAGE AND PURVEYOR OF COMMONS GOSSIP

Well, it has been a little while since I last wrote in the *Brixworth Bulletin* and I think it is fair to say quite a lot has happened in that time!

Our country has faced some of the most cowardly terrorist attacks anyone could contemplate and the Grenfell House fire shocked the world. British sportswomen have provided some brighter moments, with Johanna Konta making it to the semi-finals of the Women's Singles at Wimbledon and the England Women's Cricket team winning the World Cup in style.

Oh, and there was a General Election, the outcome of which few could have predicted. Locally, my result was amazing and I would like to thank all of you who voted for me to be your Member of Parliament. It really is a great honour and privilege to be your MP.

As a politician, I could talk about what went right (very little for my party) and what went wrong (I think that is more for a discussion in a pub somewhere at some time in the future); but the result is a matter of fact and the United Kingdom now is being governed by a minority administration.

I know this not just from being told, but every six to eight weeks, I have an audience with Her Majesty. I have only just experienced my first such audience and whilst I am not allowed to reveal the content of any conversation I have had, I can guarantee to you our Queen is probably more up to speed with everyday political issues affecting her subjects than most people I regularly talk to and that includes elected Members of the House of Commons!

What I can say is that Her Majesty has very fond memories of spending time around here, in Pitsford and Maidwell. Yes, it turns out that some of those old folk tales are true after all...



I wish Mrs Young every success in the future as she leads the school in its aspirational journey.



That is followed in September with another first time visit, on that occasion, to Silverstone.

On 5th May members of the London Studies Group set off from sunny Brixworth on a trip to Three Mills Island and a chilly breeze from the River Lea. On the way they saw the site of the famous Match Girls strike where 2,000 young women stood up to Bryant and May. There have been mills here since medieval times. Ownership has reflected the changing politics of the era. A wonderful day out to a hidden part of London.

In October Brixworth U3A will be celebrating their 10th anniversary with a "Ten Year Tea Party" to be held at Brampton Heath Golf Club.

Programme for 2018 Music Festival revealed

Plans for the next Brixworth Music Festival are going very well and the programme promises to be an exciting mix of events that will appeal to all tastes and ages.

The Festival, which previously always took place in September, has been moved to April to resolve scheduling issues. The next one will take place 20 - 29 April 2018, directly after Easter and, as ever, in our beautiful Church of All Saints. The six month delay will give all those involved in education, choirs and ensembles more time to prepare.

Although the emphasis is on classical music, the idea of the Festival is to get everyone involved, and will include music of all styles and tastes.

The opening concert on 20th April will feature the pop-band Memphis Blue which specialises in music of the 50s and 60s, so you will have a chance to dance in the church!

In contrast this will be followed the next day (21st April) with an afternoon piano recital by resident pianist, Oksana King, and a concert by the Northamptonshire County Youth Brass Band in the evening. On Sunday 22nd April you will have the opportunity of hearing once more the wonderful ensemble "Fiori Musicali" in an evening of sacred choral music.

On Wednesday 25th April there will be our regular feature, an Evening of Poetry and Song which has proved so popular in recent years. Local musicians, composers and actors will treat you to a varied programme, ranging from opera to contemporary classical music, interspersed with poetry readings and lighter entertainment. The John Clare Wind Quintet will also be playing.

On the following Friday, 27th April, we have invited back the prestigious Tedesca String Quartet. For those of you who enjoy exquisite chamber music this is a must.

On 28th April Peter Dunkley will be conducting the Kettering Chamber Orchestra in a concert of well-loved classical works by Mozart and Beethoven, including Mozart's Concerto for harp and flute.

The Festival will be brought to a close on 29 April with a Community Event involving schools, choirs and musicians of all ages.

One special feature of the next Festival will be a Competition for Women Composers who have been so shamefully neglected in the past. 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The Friends of All Saints' Church

Living in times of great change and uncertainties many of us identify with things around us like our wonderful Church and countryside which is a constant in our village and a reason why many of us choose to live in Brixworth.

With the help The Friends of Brixworth Church, through donations, subscriptions and support we manage to keep the Church in good repair. We are fortunate that we have so many people like Tony Brunton who have helped to repair the Church over many decades, saving valuable amounts of money. We are also very grateful to people who give up countless hours of their time to help us raise money and maintain a fund for the fabric of the Church but of course, there is never enough money to do everything.

In 2016 we faced a challenge and that was to bring ourselves in line with Charity Law as dictated by the Charity Commission. We have now formed a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, known as a CIO. The Friends and Trustees now operate as one Committee not two and I think it's true to say that with our limited resources we operate very well as one Committee. We have also adopted a Code of Practice which is best practice as advised by the Charity Commission.

In 2016, with the help of a grant from Daventry District Council, we were able to refurbish the Heritage Centre, a very valuable amenity to the community as well as the Church. The revenue from the Heritage Centre provides a valuable source of income. In March we attended a film evening at the Errol Flynn Film Theatre and this event raised over £1000. In May 2016 Peacocks of Bedford hosted a Valuation Day for us in The Church. The Lecture Day in October was very well supported and our Family Christmas Music Evening raised over £400.

The Trustees join me in offering our very special thanks to Roger Brown who has almost single-handedly raised over £4k for refurbishment of the organ. The Trustees have also transferred

£1200 to the PCC towards the cost of providing toilets and a servery. This year Gildings of Market Harborough organised an Antiques Quiz for us in February and this raised £1100, followed by a Car Boot Sale in the Churchyard raising £180.

Thank you all for your continued support and especially your attendance at our events. Without your continued help we couldn't preserve our beautiful historic Church to the standard it is today.

Strong support for Sports Council



As reported in the last edition of the *Bulletin*, Brixworth Parish Council is looking to form a Sports Council.

The aim of the Sports Council is to work across multiple sports and recreational organisations to encourage and promote sport for all within Brixworth. It will be responsible for assessing the sporting needs of the village and assist with any strategic development of facilities. It will also have autonomy to manage the

Section 106 funding - the approximately £242k made available from the Barratts housing development that must be allocated to sports and recreation within the village.

Sports clubs, organisations and stakeholders were recently asked to attend a discussion meeting about the formation of the Brixworth Sports Council with the purpose of the meeting to gauge support for such a council and discuss at a high level how it may operate. Thirteen clubs attended alongside venue management and a healthy, robust discussion was had about how this funding could and should be spent to benefit the village as a whole. In attendance to answer the questions were Cllrs Collyer, Jennings and Moxon, alongside Nick Hughes, Chair of the Mawsley Sports Council and sports consultant Liz Behnke of Syzygy Leisure.

The next step is for all interested parties to feedback in order to ascertain the next step in formulating a successful and progressive Sports Council for the residents of Brixworth.

Best Village: Highly Commended

In the spring, Brixworth was entered into the Best Village of the Year 2017 competition; a competition sponsored by Hollowell Funeral Services and organised by ACRE, an organisation which helps support rural communities in Northamptonshire. This is a competition open to all villages in Northamptonshire with populations of up to 6,000, with three different categories based on village size.

Mike Nice kindly volunteered to spearhead Brixworth's entry with the support of the Brixworth Parish Council members, Peter Rowbotham, the Clerk and Councillor Sandra Moxon. The judges came to Brixworth on 17 May and were given a tour of some of the organisations in the village, as well as a presentation of what our village offers. The presentation was put together with the support of many of the village's organisations using photographs to illustrate what the organisations do for the community, eg help in community projects such as litter picking, looking after children either through pre-school clubs or youth clubs, or offering sports facilities to young and old.

The judges looked at all aspects of village life: community and social activities; local communication; the village website; the provision for young people and more senior residents; the involvement of local businesses; sustainability; general tidiness; and the welcome given to visitors. They also looked for villages



that demonstrated enterprise, initiative and community spirit in how a village cares for its inhabitants and how a village is looked after. They wanted to know not only what has been done in the past few years to help the community, but also about plans for this year. In the end Brixworth won third place with Highly Commended in its category of 'large villages' – coming in second and first respectively were Moulton and Irchester. What the judges particularly liked was that Brixworth has a strong sense of community with a large range of activities available to all and in particular that these activities are maintained by a core of very dedicated people.



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

Brixworth Juniors were awarded the coveted title of Northants FA Charter Standard Club of the year by the Northants FA.

There are currently over 1300 affiliated clubs which make up the membership of Northamptonshire County FA but thanks to information they received, the FA were impressed enough to send out a film crew of volunteers from Tresham College to speak to the club. They interviewed some of the committee members and also filmed a training evening where one of the younger girls was asked a few questions and she even showed off a few tricks for the camera!

As a club, Brixworth have really promoted girls' football in the past two years and it is something that club secretary Simon Compton believes is one of the main reasons that the club received the award.

Simon said: "Thanks to the committee and the coaches over the season for their hard work and commitment. They give up their spare time and promote excellent learning and good sportsmanship values within the club, allowing players to play and show off their skills in a friendly and easy going environment."

Some of the things the FA looked at to make their decision:

- Brixworth are a grassroots club promoting inclusion for all
- As a club, Brixworth try to inspire the children to learn and play football but also to give them life skills along the way
- We insist on referees to be treated with respect at all times
- All coaches are fully trained and have safeguarding qualifications; several have further youth and level 2 qualifications. We expect all helpers to be DBS checked and encourage them to take the safeguarding certification.
- Half of all coaches are also FA licensed and actively seek out further professional development
- Brixworth has two pitches, St. David's and The Ashway

- There are currently 17 boys teams and over the last two years the club has re-introduced girls football to the village
- There is an under 12s girls teams and a weekly girls session for u10s and below
- The club is really proud of the numbers of teams registered, particularly the growing number of girls – at present there are around 210 boys and 25 girls
