

DDC sketches out development, threatens landscape

Brixworth Parish Council and the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group have raised concerns about the latest local plan issued by Daventry District Council.

DDC's Settlements & Countryside Plan, published in November 2017, identifies Brixworth as one of six Primary Service Villages in the district. These villages would be the prime locations where DDC would be looking to build future housing should it once again fail to maintain its five year supply from developments around Daventry town. Planners have already drawn up a 'wishlist' of sites around Brixworth where, between them, they believe they could build up to 825 more houses.

Bob Chattaway, chair of the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, said: "The plan will not negate our Neighbourhood Plan but neither does it appear to fully support it nor even strengthen it as we would have expected. In fact it probably weakens it. The threat of unwanted, unsustainable, development doing serious harm to the beautiful landscape will still be there."

At the same time, the Local Plan proposes to remove some of the protection of the landscape to the west of Brixworth. At the moment, the whole of the area between Brixworth, Spratton and Creaton is classed as a Special Landscape Area, which gives it additional protection from development. However DDC reassessed the area and

now wants to remove the protected zone to Brampton Brook, which means that the Spratton side of the valley would remain protected as a special landscape, but the Brixworth side not.

On behalf of the Neighbourhood Planning Steering Group and Brixworth Parish Council, landscape consultants have assessed the evidence base that led to the change and found the conclusions to be

Jittery times for the library

As you read this, the future of Brixworth library – and the rest of Northamptonshire's libraries – should have just been decided.

The many supporters of the library have campaigned tirelessly since the consultation on their future was launched late last year. Since then, the dire straits of Northampton County Council's finances have been making national headlines, particularly since NCC had to invoke emergency spending controls which signal it is effectively bankrupt.

While it wasn't immediately clear how this would affect the library decision, in the long term, it cannot be good news.

And yet, it is this short-term focus on cost cutting has contributed to NCC's financial woes. The root of the problem is the huge rise in social care costs, both for the elderly and for children being taken into care, coupled with a cut back in government funding. Brixworth library is a community hub and provides support networks for both these groups which can help them avoid going into care in the first place. Perhaps it is a function that could be further expanded in time and help solve the problem long term.

Just as long as it doesn't get closed in a desperate bid to balance the books in the short term.

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

asking to re-instate that area in the

House-builders' wishlist

The sites around Brixworth that
landowners want DDC to consider
for future development include the
land to the west of Northampton
Road managed by Savills and two
further fields along that same road,
fields along Scaldwell Road the
other side of the A508, and several
smaller parcels of land near Frog
Hall, All Saints Church and the
former woodyard at Station Road.

It is worth noting the fact that
a particular site has been put
forward does not mean it would
receive planning permission for
development; indeed the Local
Plan makes it clear that several of the primary
service villages have already seen significant
growth and that further development would
therefore 'generally' be within the existing
confines of the village.

"That commitment only holds as long as
DDC meets its five year supply plan," says
Chattaway. "All it takes is for a couple of the
large development sites around Daventry
town to run into delays and DDC would
fall behind again. While many of the sites
identified around Brixworth are deemed
'unsuitable', that is only a current view. An
inspector at an appeal hearing could see
things differently, especially if DDC no longer
has a five year land supply," he adds. - *cfw*

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Industrial estate heading for expansion?

The prospect of further development around Brixworth has been raised once again, giving rise to fresh concerns about the impact of more expansion.

A planning application is being made for a new industrial estate on land to the north of the Mercedes site adjacent to the A508 (pictured, right). The application proposes a number of light- to medium-sized units for industry, manufacturing and distribution covering up to 340,000 square feet.


The application includes only an outline plan at this stage. Steve Harley of Oxalis Planning Ltd says: "It comprises just light industrial units but no dwellings. There are no details yet regarding the exact number of buildings or exact appearance, which would be subject to further detailed planning applications. Assessments regarding archaeological interest, ecology, access, visual impact and transport are being carried out."

Robert McNaughton, one of the partners of Pedrix, the architects behind the scheme, stresses that as local people – they are based in Kingsthorpe – they are sympathetic to residents' concerns. He says: "We are based in Northampton and want to benefit the local landscape." The application proposes that

much of the existing tree planting will be retained to screen the industrial units from outside view. Traffic to the new industrial estate would not need to travel through the village, as vehicle access would be from Mercedes Avenue.

Although Brixworth already has a light industrial estate, with more industrial units planned within the new development on Station Road, the developers believe demand exists for even more, based on market research they have undertaken. Daventry District Council's latest Local Plan identifies Brixworth as a Strategic Employment Area, meaning that DDC will generally support new development for business, industrial, and warehousing and distribution in this area. A recent study has found there aren't enough employment space and small industrial units in the District, although the report found the demand for these is highest in Daventry town itself.

Oxalis sent the pre-application consultation to everyone in Brixworth in December and received some 40 responses. The Brixworth Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group (NPSG) strongly objected because the proposal does not comply with local planning policies and the Neighbourhood Plan – chiefly because it is outside the current confines of the village. As the application stands, the development would not be linked to local needs or services as it would not support existing businesses



or rural use. The NPSG believes the development would be visually unacceptable in open countryside, would cause more local traffic, and set a precedent for further development.

The outline application is due to be submitted to Daventry District Council at the end of February. - Jennifer Fitzgerald

Red Lion closed

After particularly disappointing trade over the Christmas and New Year period, the Red Lion closed its doors at the end of January. This follows a recent re-brand which found the pub offering Mexican fare.

The landlord, Martin Black, has told the *Bulletin* that the freehold to the property is now up for sale, presenting another potential new development opportunity in the village. Its owner, Ei Group, formerly known as Enterprise Inns, is facing financial challenges and is continuing to sell off hundreds of pubs throughout the country.

Martin is now starting a garment-printing business and plans to move to Spain.

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Villagers take MP to task over funding cuts



Our MP, Chris Heaton-Harris, visited Brixworth Library in January to discuss Northampton County Council's consultation on the future of the county's libraries.

Some 25 library users and residents from Brixworth and Spratton attended to find out more and to explain how the threatened closure of the library would affect the villages.

They brought many examples of how the library is used and benefits the villages – be it as a venue for the young mums' group or to encourage children to read.

Heaton-Harris explained that the austerity measures were part of the government's plan to tackle the deficit. Villagers pointed out the effect the cut in central government funding

has had – according to NCC's website, this has dropped by £500 million between 2010 and 2019. Heaton-Harris argued that the cuts had been unavoidable to balance budgets.

Concerns were raised over the wider impact of the proposed cuts, in particular the reduced gritting, cuts to the bus services and a contraction of Trading Standards. One elderly resident expressed concern over how this would affect local communities.

Without going into detail, Heaton-Harris revealed that local Conservative MPs were working with Conservative County Councillors, some of whom had made some – in his words – 'interesting' decisions.

Northamptonshire County Council has recently moved into its new offices at an estimated cost of over £53 million, when the programme of cuts underway is designed to trim an extra £30 million.

Other points of debate were calls for better funding arrangements and the possibility of a unitary local authority, which could see Northamptonshire's seven district and borough councils merged into a single structure. Heaton-Harris was sceptical about the likelihood that either would benefit Northamptonshire in the short-term.

The consultation on the future of Northamptonshire's libraries closed in January. The decision was not yet known when the *Bulletin* went to press but was due to be announced around 22 February. Any changes will take effect at the end of March. Please check our website or social media for the latest updates. – *Richard Kempa*

Neighbourhood Alert keeps you in touch

Neighbourhood Alert is the messaging service run by Northamptonshire Police.

Previously known as Community Connect, the Northamptonshire Neighbourhood Alert now allows frontline police officers to send alerts direct from their mobile devices, while out and about policing the county.

Anyone living in Northamptonshire can sign up, free of charge. Just register at www.northamptonshireneighbourhoodalert.co.uk.

The service delivers alerts from Northamptonshire Police, Neighbourhood Watch and other partner organisations, as emails, text messages or voice messages. People can also select what topics they want to hear about and how often. Topics covered may include crime alerts, missing person alerts, witness appeals and crime prevention advice.

Police hope the tool will prove to be an effective way to improve information flow in order to help them prevent and detect crime, and reduce anti-social behaviour.

Friends fight for our library

library as much as possible, to demonstrate to NCC that it is valued and needed in our community. Borrow a book, meet some friends for a coffee, attend Rhymetime with your children or Messy Crafts. Our library is one of the few that has a My Hermes service, so make use of it please or it will be gone. Having to travel into Northampton to use a library will in reality will be difficult for some, especially for the young and the very elderly. Brixworth is a rapidly growing village, and we need to maintain a sense of community. The library and community centre provide this hub, so please help us!

Our campaign against the potential closure aside, we have of course organised some of our more standard events, such as our ever-popular Quiz and Chips evening which was well attended and lots of fun. We also held two performances of "A Christmas Carol" by the very talented James Hornsby.

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
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Brixworth Country Park

Brixworth Country Park opened in 1997 and attracts over half a million visitors every year. It provides a green space for local people to enjoy, from individuals to families, school groups and community groups, and everyone in between. The Rangers do their best to keep the park in a good condition for both the human visitors and the wildlife that the park supports. This could not be done without the invaluable support of volunteers, who invest their time into the upkeep of the park.

The three main aims of the Countryside Service are education, recreation and conservation. Much of the volunteer work in the park focusses on conservation and improving the site for recreation. The Rangers also endeavour to put on a calendar of events throughout the year that focus on these three objectives, with a series of educational events for children and adults alike, highlighting the wildlife that can be found within the park, the work we do to support it, and what you can do in your own gardens.

Should Brixworth Country Park be shortlisted as a Deserving Cause the money would go towards a new notice board for the park. The previous one rotted and had to be removed for safety reasons. The notice board would enable us to inform visitors of planned improvement works, provide updates of ongoing work, promote events and opportunities, and act as a focal point of information.

Brixworth Centre Preschool

Brixworth Centre Preschool is an amazing preschool within the village which offers children a wide variety of experiences and opportunities. The extensive resources that they provide for the children was noted in their most recent Ofsted inspection which saw them receive the highest grade of Outstanding. Brixworth Centre Preschool is a registered charity and is run by a voluntary committee. They are heavily dependent on the fundraising that the committee do as this helps to renew the equipment and resources. In the current climate a number of early years settings are struggling and even closing, due to the Government increasing the amount of free childcare for parents but failing to match this with an increase in funding. This means that many settings including Brixworth run at a loss hourly if they are to employ well qualified staff. However, we understand the importance that well qualified staff can play in a child's learning and staff is one of our strongest areas.

Any money we might receive would be spent on developing our mud kitchen area. This allows the children to use their imaginations whilst using natural resources. They are able to make potions and meals whilst using a range of equipment, mud and water. We would purchase new mixing equipment, jugs, spoons and water containers. This would not only enhance the mud kitchen area but the outside provision in general. Many of the children love using the simple mud kitchen that we already have and it gives them the chance to access things that they would not be able to do at home.

Saxon Spires Patient Participation Group

Saxon Spires Patient Participation Group is a group of patients who are working with the Practice to help maintain standards of care and services in the Practice. We hold regular meetings every two months, alternating between both surgeries. The work of the Group includes organizing Health Talks, carrying out Annual Patient Surveys, Supporting Carers by an Information Coffee Morning and assisting with Fundraising. New Members are always welcome.

Summer 2018 will see the opening of the new Brixworth Surgery. The building will be handed over as an empty shell and while fittings and fixtures will be transferred from the existing site, there will be additional clinical rooms and a larger waiting room to furnish and equip.

The SSPPG welcome the prospect of having a surgery fit for purpose in our expanding community and would like to play a part in funding these extra items. The more spacious environment will allow the staff to provide a better service to patients.

Funding through 'Deserving Causes' would be a way for patients to be involved in providing the best care possible, to the community.

Brixworth Centre

The Brixworth Centre by the church provides venues for local activities including a pre-school playgroup, Brownies, Guides, Beavers, Scouts, Pilates and Flat Mat Bowling. In addition, we have hosted Quizzes, Harvest Suppers, Bazaars, Shoe sales and a host of other activities both charitable and commercial.

The Centre is much used and loved, but the building is showing its age and in 2018, we are embarking on a major set of refurbishment works starting with the floor and then looking to replace all the windows.

Most of the damage to the floor has been caused by fair wear and tear but it has been exacerbated by the Centre chairs. They are the standard "fold and hang-up" variety which appear in every Village Hall. Each chair leg has a rubber ferrule to stop the metal leg damaging the floor. Over the years these have disappeared leading to additional damage as the exposed tube has pressed into the floor tiles.

The overall condition of the chairs themselves is very good. All we need to do is replace the ferrules. Therefore, we are setting up a separate "Chair Fund" to raise the money to purchase the replacements. We shall save money by fitting these ourselves but obviously we shall need the cash to buy the parts.

It would be fantastic if the Bulletin could contribute to this fund as part of its "Your Deserving Cause" campaign.

A competition for women composers - why?

"Women classical composers still get a raw deal," says the festival's joint artistic director and composer, Professor Vivienne Olive. "Although there is more awareness of present-day female composers, they are still not well represented at festivals and on the radio. Many people cannot name a single woman composer who lived before the 20th century and do not realise that there is a wealth of literature out there waiting to be performed." Many of these composers were forced to write under a pseudonym, were not allowed to study, and indeed were forbidden to compose at all!

The Brixworth Music Festival – now in its fourth year – has proved very successful and has gradually gained a reputation, not only in Northamptonshire but nationwide and in Europe. It also has a strong track record in performing pieces written by women.

This year's festival is staging a privately sponsored competition specifically aimed at women composers. On 25th April, the winning work of the widely advertised Brixworth Music Festival International Competition for Women Composers will be performed by the John Clare Wind Quintet together with singers, Gwion Thomas and/or Chloe Willson-Thomas.

The programme for the next Brixworth Music Festival has now been finalised. See the calendar at the end of this issue for all the events, and of course this article. It promises to be one of our most varied and ambitious festivals yet, with a variety of concerts guaranteed to appeal to every musical taste.

From 20th to 29th April you will be able to enjoy nine concerts which range from classical to pop, and from chamber ensembles to brass band and orchestral music. It will also include a very special **Evening of Poetry and Song** which features not only the very best of local musicians and composers but also the winning work of this year's International Competition for Women Composers (see p8 for details).

The festival will start with a bang on 20 April with the band **Memphis Blue**, which specialises in the rock music of the 50s and 60s. Yes, you are allowed to dance in the church!

Next day, on 21 April at 3pm, the Russian-born pianist **Oksana King** will be giving a piano recital with works ranging from J.S. Bach to the 20th century. In the evening you will be able to hear the prize-winning **Northamptonshire County Youth Brass Band**. Not to be missed!

On Sunday 22 April the renowned ensemble, **Fiori Musicali**, will be giving one of their very special choral concerts, with works ranging from old to new.

Each Brixworth Music Festival includes the **Evening of Poetry and Song**, which is always a show-case for musicians, actors and composers who live in the Northamptonshire area. The winner of this year's **International Competition for Women Composers** will be performed at this concert and, since this year's Festival takes place during Shakespeare's birthday week, there will be a Shakespearean slant to this concert. But the concert will also include new works by Festival co-director, Vivienne Olive, and Brixworth composer, Stuart Cooper. Erstwhile BBC presenter David Saint and singer-actor Kay Soteriou will guide us through the evening. Gwion Thomas, Chloe Willson-Thomas and Juliet Lawson will be vocal soloists, and the John Clare Wind Quintet and pianist Oksana King will complete the line-up.

Master of the Queen's Music Judith Weir will have been the final judge of the composers' competition, so this promises to be a very special evening.

The last weekend of the Festival will offer yet more exciting concerts: on Friday 27 – due to great demand – the exquisite **Tedesca String Quartet** (pictured, top) will be playing

works by Haydn, Schubert and Finzi, and on 28 April you will have the opportunity to hear the newly formed

Brixworth Festival Orchestra, conducted by Peter Dunkley. The programme will include Beethoven's 7th Symphony and Mozart's Concerto for Flute and Harp, with soloists Graham Tear (flute) and Rowena Bass (harp).

On 29 April there will be refreshments offered after the morning service, followed by a midday choral concert by **Brixworth Songsters and the Singing Saints**. This is something special since it brings together younger and older members of the community. The concert is also free of charge.

In the evening, this exciting and unusual Festival will be brought to a meditative close with **An Old English Fantasy**, with Sarah



Small (viola da gamba), Felix Heuser (voice), Morag Johnston (violin) and Bernhard Reichel (theorbo). Sarah Small is originally from Brixworth and has now embarked on a very promising career in the field of early music with this newly formed ensemble.

Volunteers Special

It has been a year since new rangers Andy and Vikki joined the team at Brixworth Country Park and the Brampton Valley Way. They are now officially no longer 'new'! Over the last twelve months they have witnessed and experienced both sites in all four seasons and have a better understanding of the rhythms of the parks. From the sunshine of summer – through the slightly soggy August – to the snow of winter, they have come to know many of the regular visitors, both human and animal.

Working through a full calendar cycle has also highlighted the amount of work that is required throughout the year, and the invaluable support of the volunteers. Without them, none of the parks could survive. Brixworth Country Park and the Brampton Valley Way are very fortunate to have the support of a variety of volunteer groups.

Volunteering can be very rewarding, for the volunteers and for the rangers working with them. Our volunteers get the best of both worlds: they get to work in the fresh air and enjoy the physical and mental health benefits; and they have the luxury of choosing not to work when the weather takes a turn for the worst! Overall though, our volunteers are a hardy bunch and turn up in all weathers.

As rangers, not only do we get a few extra pairs of hands, but we get to share our amazing natural spaces with others and watch them reap the benefits of working with nature.

The A Team

The first mention should go to our Brampton Valley Way Thursday group, who have recently acquired the nickname 'The A Team'. A year ago it was just three men, all retired, who willingly gave up a day each week to work along the Brampton Valley Way, or at Brixworth Country

Park when extra help was needed there. Their wealth of experience, having worked with several rangers over the past eight years or more, and knowledge of the sites has proved to be an excellent resource. Gradually, over the course of twelve months that group has grown, and at time of writing we have eight volunteers in our 'A Team'. The Original Three have welcomed the newcomers, shared their knowledge and experience, and helped the rangers teach the new recruits the skills needed for practical conservation work.

Our volunteers are so keen some of them have even asked for mini-projects on areas that need extra attention. Regular walkers, or cyclists, may have noticed the work that Lyndon has been doing to expose the old iron footbridge near Keeper's Cottage along the Brampton Valley Way (*pictured, right*). When the railway was still running, this bridge allowed people to cross over the tracks safely, and several walkers have shared their memories of walking over that bridge in their youth to get to school. Lyndon has put in a lot of extra days working at the bridge, but why does he do it? 'As a walking and cycling user of the Brampton Valley Way I was happy to give something back when I first saw a notice asking for volunteers some years ago. I found I enjoyed it and so carried on! And the rangers are very good at sharing their biscuits!'

Saturday group

On the third Saturday of each month (except August) we have a regular group of volunteers who work at Brixworth Country Park. Tasks vary throughout the year but include coppicing, scrub clearance and canopy raising during the winter months. Last year they also helped with the replanting around Folly Pond after the improvement works. It is a small group but very hard working, and they do a fantastic job helping us with the upkeep of the park.

Duke of Edinburgh Award

The rangers receive several enquires each year from students undertaking the various levels of the Duke of Edinburgh Award. The award is designed to give young people the opportunity to challenge themselves and learn more about themselves as they learn new skills, meet new people, and discover that they are capable of more than they imagined. One aspect of the award is volunteering, and we give the students the opportunity to complete that element in the park. Lily completed her DoE with us last year, doing practical conservation work and helping with events during the school holidays. She enjoyed it so much she has stayed on as part of our Saturday group. 'I carried on after my Duke of Edinburgh because I enjoy working with the rangers, meeting new people, working outdoors and doing new things.'

Extra-curricular volunteering

Throughout the year we welcome several different volunteer groups. These can be corporate groups looking for a team-building day out of

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

the office where they can give something back to the community, but we also have groups from some of the local colleges. These groups vary in skills and ability, and each group has a different reason for wanting to work with us.

This year we have several small groups of Public Service students from Northampton College. These are students hoping to pursue a career in an area of public service, for example, the police or the armed forces. At first glance, practical conservation work may not appear to be the most relevant area for their studies, but it allows them to work as a team, use their initiative, listen to instructions and learn new skills. They have to access the situation they are in (usually unfamiliar to them) and ensure the safety of themselves and everyone around them, including members of the public using the park. If you see us in the park with a group of students, please feel free to stop for a quick chat, as engaging with members of the public is another valuable skill they can learn during their few weeks with us.

Each year we also accept a couple of students studying Countryside Management, or a related qualification, who are looking for work experience to complement their studies. Anyone working in a conservation-based role will know that a wealth of volunteering experience is essential to getting your first job, and the rangers at all the parks are keen to share their knowledge and experience with the young people who may become tomorrow's rangers. The students are with us for a full academic year, and as such, they learn the plethora of skills necessary to manage a country park throughout the year.

Thanks to funding from the Mick George Community Fund, we have been giving the Sensory Garden a much-needed face-lift. We are looking for a volunteer gardener, or horticulturist, to help to keep the raised beds looking their best. If you are a keen horticulturist, or just enjoy pottering about in the garden, and would like to volunteer

we would love to hear from you. Whether it be a couple of hours a week, or half a day a month, any help would be appreciated. You don't need any formal qualifications, just an interest in gardening (although if Alan Titchmarsh has recently moved to the area and is looking for



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something to do...). Events

The rangers have put together a full calendar of events for 2018, both fun and educational. Remember, only a few of our events are aimed exclusively at children (Nature Tots, for example). Many are great fun for adults too, so don't be afraid to book yourself onto Underwater World!

Nature Tots offers a nature themed walk with a ranger followed by a craft activity for pre-school children. £3.50 per child per session, includes refreshments. Booking essential. Brixworth Nature Tots meet at 10am on the third Wednesday each month during term time. Next dates: 21 March, 18 April, 16 May and 20 June.

Our **Xplorer** events provide an excellent introduction to orienteering and are a fun way for families to spend an hour or so exploring the park. Follow the map to find the markers and report back to the rangers to collect your certificate and a gift. Suggested donation of £1 per child. Next dates: 28 March, 4 April, 30 May,

Signs of Spring Guided Walk is a ranger-led walk around the park looking for signs of spring, from the first wildflowers to emerge after winter to the reawakening of the trees. 3 March, £2 per person.

The **Great British Spring Clean** is part of a national Keep Britain Tidy campaign and we will be holding a two-hour walk and litter pick along a stretch of the Brampton Valley Way. Free event on 4 March, no booking necessary.

Underwater World – this is a popular event which gives people, of all ages, the opportunity to explore the aquatic life of our ponds from the safety of dry land. The one hour sessions of pond dipping provide ample time to dip the nets into the water, identify the exciting creatures that you find, and to look at the creatures that other people

have discovered. There are six packs per session and we recommend a maximum of three children (or adults!) per pack. Packs are £5 each. Next dates: 3 and 10 April.

It doesn't matter if it's thin or thick, there are 100 things to do with a stick! The birds are busy with sticks right now, but what can you do with one? **Stick-tas-tic** is a two-hour event exploring the many fun things you can do with a stick, from making mini creature dens and playing games to magic wands and weaving! We will have two sessions on Weds 11 April and 10.30am – 12.30pm and 1.30pm – 3.30pm.

Join Ranger Andy for a stroll through Martin Moore Wood on 26 May in celebration of the Tree Council's **A Walk in the Woods** month. Spot the different tree species and simply enjoy the experience of being out and about.

A ranger-led **Wildflower Wellbeing Walk** on Saturday 2 June through some of our meadows will reveal the amazing diversity of wildflowers and grasses growing in Brixworth Country Park. £2 per person.

As part of National Insect Week join our **Minibeast Safari**. Ideal for kids to explore, search and find some of the different insects of Brixworth Country Park. Next event Saturday 24 June, £2 per child.

Lastly, if you're not averse to getting some dirt under your fingernails and helping out, come join us on a **Volunteer Work Day**. These take place monthly on Saturdays, next on 17 March, 21 April, 19 May and 16 June, 10am to 4pm.




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Chris Heaton-Harris MP's WESTMINSTER REPORT

Foreign Aid: Value for money?

I'm often surprised by the large number of my constituents who write to me concerned about the amount of money we spend on foreign aid and if it gives us good value for money.

After the recent reshuffle, Penny Mordaunt MP, the new Secretary of State for International Development, spelt out her overarching strategic priorities for the future of 'Foreign Aid'.

It basically boils down to five points:

1. Develop a bold new Brexit-ready proposition to boost trade and investment with developing countries.
2. Work with the governments of developing countries to ensure they take responsibility for investing in their own people.
3. Push for reform of the multilaterals that receive UK support – and be prepared to cut funding for poor performers.
4. Support the national interest and work with Departments across Whitehall to deliver 'win-wins' for the world's poorest and our Government's domestic agenda.
5. Improve the quality of aid spent by all Government Departments.

Personally I'm very proud of the UK's global leadership in this area but know, if we are to maintain public support for spending money in this area, we must make sure that it is money well spent and actually achieves the goals we set.

Those of you who have contacted me about this subject before will know I believe, if we are serious about alleviating poverty permanently, we need to remove barriers to trade, domestic and international – including those currently imposed by the European Union.

Increasing trade with other nations allows them to not only grow in real economic terms, but also in a sustainable manner. Trade and export-led growth are key to alleviating states from poverty and, as seen with China's rise, can allow countries to enter a virtuous cycle of import and export of goods and services, creating wealth and removing poverty. Essentially, if we get this right we can create and spread wealth across the developing world.

Now that the UK is leaving the EU building stronger trade links is a target we can hit and plans are already afoot, with talks between the UK and other states around the world now taking place regarding post-EU trade.

This includes interest from nations of ASEAN (Association of South East Asian Nations), an area with a value of around \$2 trillion, and continuing to grow at average rates above 5% per year – an area that is a prime example of how the concept of 'trade, not aid' can work in practice thanks to the 'Four Tigers' and the 'Emerging Ten'.

A lot has changed in this area of policy in the recent past and a lot more will change once we leave the EU. Whilst some may feel we are slow in re-orientating our international development policies, I hope that you are happy with the direction of travel.

I can you assure you that I will be watching this with keen intent as I know how important this issue is for many of my constituents.

Operation Christmas Child



Like many other people in our community, each year before Christmas my family and I spend some time and care packing a shoe box or two for Operation Christmas Child. For years now, Brixworth Community Church has managed and run a processing centre at the Library and Community Centre for people to leave their shoe boxes. This year I had the great pleasure of helping the boxes that little bit further along their journey and learnt a bit more about the wonderful community in which we live.

Before our boxes can be moved on to their next destination, every single one must be checked through thoroughly by a team of dedicated volunteers.

After all boxes are checked and sealed, they are carefully stored upstairs in the Community Centre awaiting a collection day. Collection day arrived with a big white van driven by two more volunteers who were taking our boxes to a warehouse in Coventry. Our amazing community and surrounding areas donated 1,239 boxes this year. Due to this staggering kindness, some boxes had already been collected a week or so before... but we still had over 600 shoe boxes to carry downstairs and load into the van like a game of Tetris.

With achy legs and wry smile we only just managed to close the van doors after the last box was loaded. Our part was done and our shoe boxes were off on the next leg of their journey.

It has been incredible, yet very humbling, to be able to witness closely what the community efforts of so many add up to both metaphorically and physically – seeing the sheer volume of 1,239 brightly wrapped shoe boxes is somewhat overwhelming! Our community was just one small part of a huge scale operation, run completely by volunteers, to reach out to children in poverty stricken or war-torn countries. Just think, on Christmas Day there were 1,239 children with smiles on their little faces as they opened their shoe boxes and discovered someone, somewhere in the world, thought of them this Christmas and cared enough to let them know. 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Ambitious and full of local colour

It's the end of January which traditionally means Panto time!

Panto time means songs, dancing, laughter and interaction with hopefully a young audience. The opening performance was a matinee on a grey Saturday afternoon. I had 'borrowed' a couple of young ladies from some friends so I was not feeling out of place and we headed off to the Village Hall to be entertained.

Brixworth Drama Group have spent many months rehearsing their take on the old tale of Snow White & the Seven Dwarfs. It's a Panto, so there are a few things we need; A Dame, a baddie or two, a hero and of course a beautiful star to be rescued. We got all these and more.

This was a debut production for two new directors, Sandra Moxon and Caitlin Braham-Nicoll and judging by the nervous looks on their faces and frantic running between lighting and back stage, they were on edge.

The audience were in their places, some with non-poisoned apples purchased at the front door (a nice touch), others with sweets, but everyone ready to be entertained.

Brixworth Drama Group, whilst overflowing with enthusiasm and not too shabby in the talent department, are an amateur group and this should not be forgotten. A first performance is daunting, especially when you have put so much work into the preparation,

so nerves can lead to a few minor errors and there were a few. However, you had to look hard to suggest they spoil the performance. In fact, I would argue they added to the occasion and made it all that more special. I am quite sure the cast won't need a director to shout "Wake up, Snow White" on all the performances!

A few lines were forgotten here and there, but the prompt hidden at the side of the stage did her job to almost perfection and when they could not help, 'Dame' Dolly Dumppling, played brilliantly by Rod Rogers, was on hand to ad-lib his way through the pause. Although not even Rod could fix the non-opening door to the Dwarves' house. Still, invisible walls allowed the show to go on.

Rod's interaction with the audience, whilst strained at times, gave many of the young audience a memory to take home with them. However, Rod does need to take note of his timings towards the end as the groans of "Finish, finish" could clearly be seen and

heard from those behind the curtains after at least the fifth rendition of 'I am the Music Man'.

The songs were well chosen and expertly converted to include Brixworth references, including a very fine line about the 'Yellow' Lion! Our young dancers did Olivia Church's choreography proud and Sue McAspurn was highly amusing as Speak True, the mirror.

Whilst everyone on stage was excellent, there were a few stand-out performances.

Young Maya Hall was a very believable Snow White and held the stage in a way that defied

the knowledge that this was her debut performance. Another debutant, Sam Pickles, displayed exuberant flair as the flamboyant Prince Frederick.

Fiona Hodkin was a very bad Queen Caligula. Bad in character, which took some acting skill to carry off. There were strong displays from stalwarts, Allan Pope and Roger Chapman as the hapless bunglers, Bogwort & Stinkwort, and Tom Moxon is clearly learning from his time on the boards with a solid performance as Danny Dumppling.

However, the performance of the afternoon goes to Mike Culverhouse as Black Wing. He owned the stage each time he appeared which gave confidence to the debutants around him. Well done, Mike.

This was an opening performance from an amateur group that is growing in both confidence and depth of talent. Its purpose was to entertain and that it did exceedingly well. Credit should be given to the joint Directors, Sandra and Caitlin for having the confidence to push the bar. Being a joint effort and their first stab at direction, they could have played it safe. They didn't. They set the bar high and came very close to exceeding it.

There were mistakes, there were missed cues and missed lines. There were prop malfunctions, although I doubt we will ever know who kicked the smoke machine away from the stage and onto the audience, but the whole cast set out to entertain the audience with oodles of passion and as the audience left, the conversation was of content and satisfaction as well as young shouts of 'Wow, how good was that!'.

Brixworth amateur dramatics is alive and kicking thanks to this merry band of players. I for one will wait with eager anticipation for their next performance. – Neal Brown







Neighbourhood Watch

Neighbourhood Watch itself began life in the UK over 30 years ago in response to rising crime, but as times have changed it covers all aspects of keeping safe.

In 1983, Northamptonshire Police set up a Neighbourhood Watch scheme which was seen as one of our first in the UK. Five years later, in 1988, the Northamptonshire Neighbourhood Watch Association was formed to establish and run the scheme as an independent organisation.

The main aims are to prevent crime, reduce fear of crime, improve safety, and encourage neighbourliness and a supportive spirit across communities.

That means that whilst combating crime remains the core aim, it also helps out in other important ways to help protect communities, such as supporting the elderly and vulnerable.

Neighbourhood Watch promotes good citizenship and greater public awareness through Neighbourhood Watch groups run by volunteers. It increases public participation in the prevention and detection of crime and anti-social behaviour; reduces fear of crime; improves police/community liaison, and increases public and community safety.



Today Neighbourhood Watch is about making sure that no one has to feel afraid, vulnerable or isolated where they live. It's about encouraging and empowering people to look out for each other: crossing barriers of age, race and background to create strong, safe and cohesive communities that benefit everyone.

Neighbourhood Watch acts as the ears and eyes of the community. As a result, it has been shown that Neighbourhood Watch areas are far less likely to be targeted by criminals: crime cannot flourish in a community that cares.

In Northamptonshire the schemes are run by a dedicated and loyal band of volunteers that operates an independently constituted not-for-profit organisation: run by its members, for its members. Any resident of the county can join the scheme.


Residents in any neighbourhood, who support the aims and objectives of Neighbourhood Watch, agree amongst themselves that they will come together and form a local scheme. This might be a single street or set of streets, a housing estate, a wider community or town. There is just one Brixworth neighbourhood watch scheme which is co-ordinated by Katie Elmore, (email address katie.elmore@hotmail.co.uk)

Our 2018/19 budget

April sees us enter a new financial year and over the last few months the Parish Council has been busy planning the budget for Brixworth. Within your Council tax bill is a portion called the 'precept'. This is the amount of your Council tax that is provided to Brixworth Parish Council to manage its responsibilities in the community. These vary from paying staff who administer and carry out maintenance in the village to the provision and upkeep of facilities such as playing fields, grass verges and some street lighting, to name just a few.

Balancing a budget is no easy task. Whilst ensuring we fulfil our mandatory requirements, we also wanted to take account of the views of as many residents as possible.



A few years ago, the Parish Council adopted the Living Wage as an ethos for those who directly work for the Parish Council and, in keeping with this ethos, the 2018/19 budget has allowed for an increase in line with recommendations from The Living Wage Foundation.

The Parish Council recognises that with village growth comes an increase in vehicles and by its very nature, more challenging issues surrounding speeding. In last year's budget, funding was allocated for the purchase of an electronic speed sign and this project is in its final stages of completion. We hope to see electronic speed warning signage appear in the village in the coming months.

For 2018/19, the Parish Council wanted to once more, focus some attention on transport issues.

Parking, or should we say *illegal* parking, is a growing concern for many residents and the Parish Council recognises this. It is not an easy process to bring an increase to traffic warden presence in the village, however, the Parish Council believes we should get started. We have allocated funding that we hope will result in a significant increase in activity. We will keep the village updated on our progress through our social media information points and future issues of the *Brixworth Bulletin*.

In 2016, the Parish Council introduced festive lighting to the village. Our local businesses supported this idea by allowing us to locate these Christmas trees and lights on their premises. Mr Troop also provided some additional trees at his own expense for which we again thank him. The result was a real festive feel in the village. Last year we increased the number of Christmas trees and lights and we have allocated funding to further expand this project in 2018.

In addition to the festive lighting, 2017 saw the introduction of flower planters at the entrances to the village. We have increased the funding for this project further to potentially include winter flowers in 2018.

The creation of a Brixworth Sports Council to bring organised sporting activity, no matter what size and what sport, together is something the Parish Council is passionate about.

Creating such an organisation is important as we want to ensure everyone has an opportunity to take part in and have a say in how we enable sporting activity in the village. Deciding what facilities are needed, now and in the future is a key part of growing community. There are two things that are needed to achieve the goal of an active Sports Council; time and money. It takes hard work by those Councillors who have taken ownership of the task and a lot of time to achieve the right result. Progress has been made and the Parish Council recognises that what will be needed during 2018/19 is money to implement the Sports Council. Therefore, funding has been allocated in the budget to support the Sports Council.



Creating a budget that meets our growing needs must be done carefully as it is all of us who have to provide this funding within our Council Tax. The Parish Council's Finance Working Group have worked hard to accommodate all the improvements we have mentioned as well as keeping the normal costs of the village as controlled as possible. They have done a great job. The net result of the 2018/19 precept will be to see the precept for a Band D property rise from £1.27 per week (2017/18 financial year) to £1.52 per week (2018/19 financial year). That's a £0.25 per week increase.

Planning matters

The meeting of the Planning Committee of 20th November saw the election of a new Chairman, Frances Maria Peacock, who with previous planning committee experience and a relevant professional background was keen to take on the role.

Since the last issue of the Bulletin we have received a number of applications, a significant proportion of which were for tree works within the Conservation Area. The others were more diverse in nature and included one domestic extension, as well as an application for the siting of a storage container on St. David's Recreation Ground. Another application was concerned with changes to nos. 130 – 132 Northampton Road, to create an additional flat, new staff areas and the division of no. 130 into two shops. This has since been approved by Daventry District Council.



Two other applications involved demolition of existing buildings, and the respective sites used for new development. An application for four new dwellings on the site of a garage in Holcot Road was received in November and a decision is awaited from DDC. The other application is for the construction of a single storey office, as well as a steel building to accommodate plant and serve as a repair workshop. This was received in December and a decision is awaited from DDC.

Saturday surgery

Our monthly Parish Council surgery continues to raise a host of questions. Here are a selection of questions and answers from the last quarter.

I have overhanging trees in the street and it's restricting the pathway.

If the tree is on adopted highway land then Northamptonshire County Council would deal with this. This can be reported through the NCC Street Doctor web site (www.northamptonshire.gov.uk). If the tree is within the garden of one of the adjoining houses then you should speak direct to the occupier. If the tree is dangerous or causing an obstruction then the Council can serve notice on the resident to rectify the matter.

I think my neighbour has changed the property and has not had planning permission.

You can check on the Daventry District Council website (www.daventrydc.gov.uk) to see if a planning application has been submitted. If you think permission is needed and you can't see an application online, you can ask for an Enforcement Officer to look into the matter. You can email the details to comments@daventrydc.gov.uk or call 01327 871100.

It is important to remember that planning enforcement must be discretionary, proportionate, expedient and reasonable. An enforcement notice will only issued by Daventry District Council as a last resort.



The condition of the road needs urgent attention. Who do I report this to?

Any issues regarding a public highway should be reported to the County Council using Street Doctor. (www.northamptonshire.gov.uk). This includes potholes, street lighting and footpaths.


How can I view a Planning Application? How do I lodge an objection?

All planning applications can be viewed online at the Daventry District Council website. There is an option on the Planning Application details screen to comment on any current planning application.

Who enforces the parking in the village disabled bays?

The disabled bays at the Community Centre & Library are the responsibility of the Northants County Council. Any enforcement would therefore come direct from the County Council.


